

BEFORE WE SAY GOODBYE FOR 1947





Governali, the Record Buster, Shares Giant-of-the-Week Honors with Roberts


ONCE again we present Paul Governali, the Record Buster, as the Giant-of-the-Week. Pitching Paul achieved his old-time All-America form for the first time as a Giant in the stunning upset of the talented Cardinals and Governali at his best always means the record-book is in danger. That is his history. At Columbia from 1940 through 1942 he wiped out 12 Sid Luckman marks which seemed destined to stand forever. As one of the finest pro freshmen in the history of the National League at Boston last year he gave the Yanks an entirely new set of passing records, as he finished third only to Waterfield and Luckman in the league standings. And now, with Paul finally integrated into the Steve Owen system, the Giants may look forward to sensational feats by the old Lion next year.

Governali had a close fight for Giant-of-the-Week honors in the Cardinal game. Just as Paul put forth his finest exhibition, so also did Gene (Choo-Choo) Roberts from Chattanooga. Governali passed for two touchdowns and plunged for two more. Roberts provided the speed running which the Giants so badly lacked this season, and helped split the defenses for Paul's masterful signal-calling. With running power at his command for the first time, Governali cleverly used his passing skill as a threat through his faking on the fourth touchdown drive, in which he called five straight running plays to travel 61 yards with Choo-Choo drilling the final nine.

To see Governali and Roberts operating in matchless form against the Cards, you might not realize they were badly handicapped in previous games. Roberts, the prize Giant rookie, was hurt in training camp at Superior and, injured again subsequently, was not able to show his true form until the Cardinals got to town. He demonstrated last Sunday that the Giants were right—and the scoffers wrong—in selecting him in the draft off last season's record of 1113 yards and 18 TDs.

Governali of course came back to an old love—the single wing—after his 1946 experiences as the slot-man under the center at Boston. But that wasn't all there was to it. Paul had to learn signals, had to estimate the talent and speed of his mates, particularly the pass-catchers, and had to revamp his own timing from T to single-wing and A-formation plays. That took five weeks.

Something the fans didn't know last year, when Paul got a good-pitch, no-run reputation at Boston, was that he suffered a bad charley horse just before the season opened and that it never healed because of the rugged work demanded of him in the campaign. He ran last week, and ran well.



PAUL GOVERNALI


One of his dashes, in fact, launched the final thrilling touchdown march which Paul capped with a scoring pass to Frank Liebel. This brought the Giants their first victory of the season, after their gallant efforts against Pittsburgh and Green Bay produced only a defeat and a tie.

These stars of the Cardinal game have mighty impressive figures in their background, portentous of success for the Giants in the future. No more sterling mark ever was put in the books than Governali's 1442 yards passing at Columbia to lead the nation in 1942. You remember the slogan of the Lion's foes that year—Stop Governali and you stop Columbia. Instead of being stopped, Pitching Paul led them all, and such great passers as Glenn Dobbs, Otto Graham, Frankie Sinkwich and Angelo Bertelli were throwing the ball that year also. Last year with a poor team at Boston, Paul gained 1293 yards, threw 13 touchdowns, and saw his receivers fumble at least 10 other sure-fire touchdown flips.

Roberts, who is only 22 and truly a Giant for the future, rolled up only 212 yards fewer than the combined yardage of the Blanchard-Davis combination with his 1113 yards at Chattanooga. Gene was No. 2 ground-gainer and scorer in the nation, and also starred at track.

So future foes must watch out for speedy Roberts, once again the Choo-Choo, and above all for Governali, once again the Record Buster.





SAMMY BAUGH, SUPREME STYLIST, IS FOOTBALL'S GREATEST PASSER

In Slingin' Sammy Baugh, the Washington Redskins present one of football's all-time greats. There never has been a passer to match the rifle-armed sharpshooter from Texas.

Steve Owen of the Giants summed up the best defense against Baugh in a few succinct words after the newspapers carried glowing reports on Sammy's great performance against the Chicago Cardinals, when he completed 25 of 33 attempts for 355 yards and six touchdowns.

"When old Sammy gets hot, there's just one thing to do," said Stout Steve to Jimmy Conzelman, the mournful victim of Baugh's aerial depredations. "That's to sit on the sidelines and fan yourself!"

Other passers have had their moments of greatness—Cecil Isbell, Sid Luckman, Bob Waterfield and Paul Governali, just to mention a few—but year in and year out Baugh carries on, adding new records to the flock he already holds.

A stand-out ever since he came to the Redskins from Texas Christian in 1937, Baugh is having one of his greatest seasons—this in a year when the Redskins are sub-par.

There is no passer quite like Sammy. Gifted with split-vision eyes and a whiplash arm, he has an uncanny knack of getting the ball away to the receiver who is open, with that quick, side-arm wrist flip of his.

He throws them long and he throws them short, and heaven help the defensive halfback

who commits himself before Sammy releases the ball. It is a big feature of his wizardry that he can capitalize on such rashness in the last split-second.

Baugh's name and forward-passing greatness have been synonymous for so long that casual followers of football may be inclined to forget his other attributes. There is no finer punter than Sammy and, after taking a couple of seasons to get adjusted, he has developed into just as bewildering a T-formation magician as Waterfield.

The accompanying table will give an idea of Baugh's ability. An off-year for Sammy would be a great year for anyone else and at his best, of course, he is beyond approach.

Giants Lead Redskins in All-Time Series

There is no rivalry in the National Football League that provokes more frenzy than the traditional late-season battle between the New York Giants and the Washington Redskins. Ever since the league was broken into two divisions, this contest has decided the Eastern championship as often as not.

Up to this year, when both teams are out of the running, either the Giants or the Redskins have been the leaders of their section. New York won that honor eight times, Washington six times. In addition, the Giants have been runner-up twice and the Redskins have finished second thrice.

The fact that there are no title implications in today's battle does not lessen its importance to these keen rivals. This still is the game that both teams want to win above all others. The sting of other defeats will be forgotten in the exultation of a victory today.

New York and Washington have been meeting regularly since 1937, when George Preston Marshall shifted his Redskin franchise from Boston to the nation's capital. Twenty-two games have been played in this period and the Giants have registered twelve victories to nine for the Redskins. One game was tied. The point tally gives an idea of how close the competition has been.

In the scoring department, Washington holds a minute edge, 299 points to 295.

Their October game at Washington, won by the Redskins 28-20, was a real thriller and today's contest promises more of the same frenetic action. It is always a torrid fray when the Giants and Redskins get together.

All the odds in this set-up ride with the Bears, who are a full game ahead. But, of course, nothing is ever sure until that final score is posted.






