## *25th Anniversary for Men of Mara*

The New York Football Giants welcome you to the Polo Grounds today for the start of their twenty-fifth, or silver, anniversary year as a member of the National Football League.

This indeed is a milestone—not only in the history of the Giants but also in the history of professional football, which has grown so tremendously since its humble beginnings in Canton, Portsmouth, Frankfort, Providence and, of course, New York, a quarter of a century ago.

To help celebrate the occasion, the management of the Giants has arranged to have here today many great Giant stars of other years, and as he did twenty-five years ago Surrogate William T. Collins will throw out the first ball.

Gathered on the field you will see members of the first edition Giants of 1925 and many other old Polo Grounds favorites. To these pioneers of 1925, the Giants pay special tribute. It was their fine play and spirit in the difficult days of introducing professional football to New York that enabled the Giants to establish this new sports enterprise on a solid basis.

Heroes all were these Giants of 1925, who are depicted below in battle array.

Heroes too were such Giants of yesteryear as Benny Friedman, Steve and Bill Owen, Harry New-

man, Ken Strong, Ed Danowski, Mel Hein, Tuffy Leemans, Ward Cuff, Dale Burnett, Johnny Dell Isola, Hank Soar, Kink Richards, Jim Poole and others too numerous to mention. Many of them, too, are here today to revisit the scene of their past but far-from-forgotten glory.

In the presence of this gallery of greats, another Giant team takes the field and from its ranks will come fresh recruits to the distinguished company of the past.

It is for you to judge, as you have in other years, who will be the new additions to the Giant Hall of Fame.

There are candidates galore on this young, rebuilt 1949 Giant squad. Tried-and-true performers like Chuckin' Charley Conerly, Gene Roberts, Joe Scott, Jim White, Tex Coulter, Bill Swiacki and Ray Poole already have one foot in the door and there are many others knocking on it.

There is another important element in the rich tradition of the Giants of which all the Giants are most conscious. On this Silver Anniversary Day, the Giants of the past and present also wish to pay special tribute to the loyal fans who have supported the team through thick and thin.

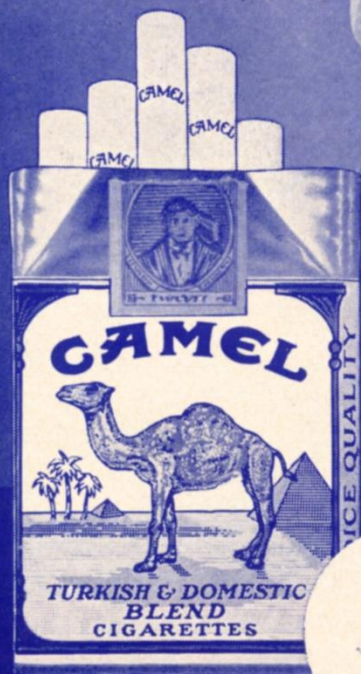

# THE GIANTS PRESENT—

## Conerly Leads Versatile T-Squad

The 1949 New York Football Giants employ the T-formation exclusively on the attack. Since this is something new, old Giant fans probably will find it necessary to make frequent reference to their programs to identify ball-carriers and pass-receivers. However, we feel that it will not take long for you in the stands to recognize that this Giant squad is well qualified to handle to a T the intricacies of the T.

Chuckin' Charley Conerly (42), who won National Football League "rookie-of-the-year" honors for his great passing and all-around play at tailback in A-formation last year, has moved up under center in the new alignment. This was a difficult adjustment but Charley has made it. There never has been any question of his rare passing genius and he has been improving sensationally from week to week in the other phases of his new job.

Although Conerly naturally will handle the bulk of the work at quarterback, he will not have to carry the load alone. In one of the most important deals they ever have transacted, the Giants recently purchased Ray Mallouf (22) from the Chicago Cardinals. A veteran of five National League campaigns, Mallouf was the sparkplug of the dynamic Cardinal attack last year and wound up as the fifth-ranking passer of the circuit (Conerly was third). His acquisition gives the Giants a potent double-barreled threat in the key T spot.

To round out their first backfield, the Men of Mara have a trio of explosive runners. Gene (Choo Choo) Roberts (35) and Joe Scott (30) at the halfbacks, need no introduction. They flank Bob Greenhalgh (12), a rookie from the University of San Francisco, which also sent up Scott last year. Greenhalgh has the power to blast and the speed to go all the way, as have Roberts and Scott.

Cletus Fischer (37) and Jack Salscheider (40), the latter a fine punter, are two other swift and elusive new backs and Bus Mertes (34), a seasoned pro, also has been added to the ball-carrying corps. Noah Mullins (20), from the Bears, and Ray Coates

(49), Em Tunnell (45) and Joe Sulaitis (21), hold-overs, are defensive backs who also can step in and do a fine job on the offense.

Another mighty offensive weapon has been added in Toeless Ben Agajanian (41), a prodigious place-kicker who booms his kick-offs into the end zone and can split the uprights with uncanny regularity within the range of half the field.

One of the best end squads in Giant history is available to snag the passes of Conerly and Mallouf and guard the flanks. Bill Swiacki (81) and Ray Poole (82), back from last year, are now supported by Navy's Dick Duden (87), Frank Lo Vuolo (89) of St. Bonaventure, Colgate's George Kershaw (86) and Dick Hensley (85) of Kentucky.

Captain Jim White (77) leads a tackle-to-tackle wrecking crew that hits with the old Giant authority on defense and is coming to block with crushing crispness on the attack. White, Don Ettinger (74), Ed Royston (61) and the pivot pair of Tex Coulter (79) and John Cannady (52) are the only holdover linemen.

The newcomers are Al De Rogatis (78), a New-ark boy who won All-America tackle designation at Duke; Jon Baker (76) from California; Ralph Hutchinson (71) from Chattanooga and Bill Austin (75) from Oregon State. New to the Giants but old hands at pro football are Ed Kolman (72) (Bears), Jack Colhouer (63) (Cardinals), Carl Butkus (62) and John Sanchez (70) (Redskins).

This new and very different Giant team has improved steadily with each start and its future appears bright.

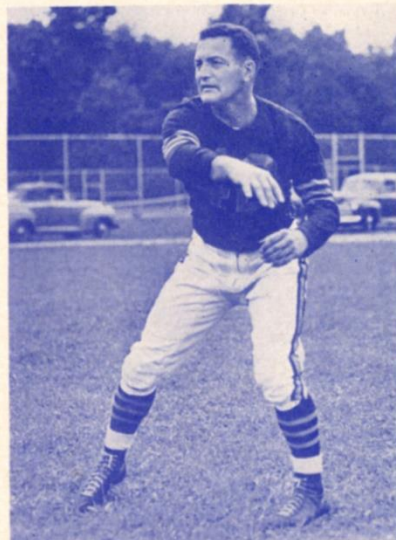

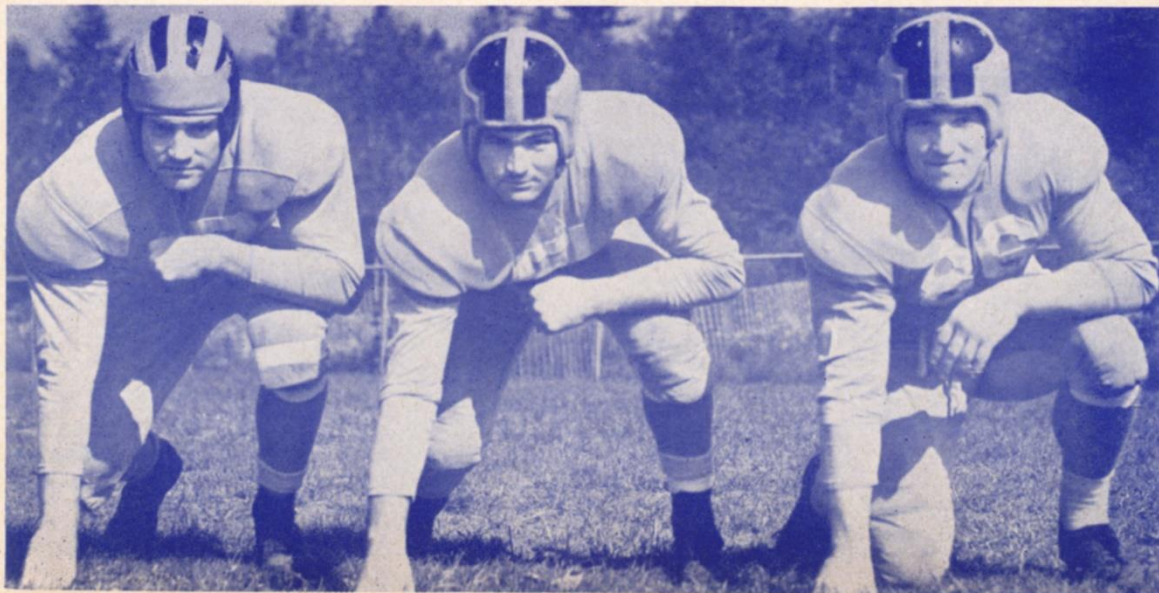

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# MEET THE STEELERS—

## Coaching Staff

Head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers is **Johnny Michelosen**, an outstanding quarterback at the University of Pittsburgh and first lieutenant for ten years to the late, great Jock Sutherland. Carrying on in the best Sutherland tradition, Michelosen has produced another Steeler squad that is noted for its fine condition, its vicious blocking and tackling. At 33, Johnny is one of the youngest head coaches in professional football. Michelosen's aides are **Mike Nixon** and **Ken Ormiston**, two more former Pittsburgh stars; **Walter Kiesling** who has a 24-year background in pro football, and **Chuck Cherundolo**, one of the game's great centers.

## Style of Play

The Steelers, under Michelosen, have retained the single wingback offense developed by Sutherland in Pittsburgh's heyday. From this formation, they stress power thrusts off tackle, spin bucks and deep sweeping reverses around end. Deception figures in their running game, with much multiple ball-handling, but the big thing is the power they get ahead of the ball-carrier. While the Steelers in the past have not been noted as a passing team, Michelosen is putting more emphasis on aerial tactics. From his set-up, all four backs can pass, and do, which puts added pressure on the defense. Key to the Steelers' own defense is aggressive line play and savage tackling. The Steelers play the game to the hilt, giving or asking no quarter.

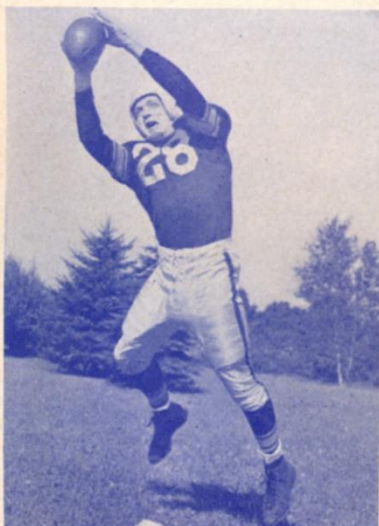
## Prominent Backs

**Bobby Gage** (77), rookie tailback who led Clemson to an undefeated season in 1948, is a running dervish and a crack passer. . . . **Don Samuel** (66), another rookie just up from Oregon, is a fleet wingback who specializes in whipping left-

handed passes on the run. . . . **Jerry Shipkey** (49), from U.C.L.A., and **George Papach** (27), from Purdue, are a pair of busting 210-pound fullbacks in their second year of pro football. . . . **Joe Geri** (35), veteran of four bowl games with Georgia, and **Jim Finks** (45), from Tulsa, are two more multiple-threat tailbacks. . . . **Joe Glamp** (17) is one place-kicking ace who is no specialist; he runs, blocks and catches passes in expert fashion from wingback. . . . **Jerry Nuzum** (22), 200-pound sophomore wingback from New Mexico A. and M., is another rugged operative. . . . **Charley Seabright** (33), a five-year-man, is a blocking back and backer-up par excellence and one of football's better quarterbacks. . . . **Vince Ragunas** (48) is another "two-back" who takes fiendish glee in racking up opposing ends and backers-up.

## Leading Linemen

**Val Jansante** (54) is the best pass-receiver in Steeler history; he set a team record last year by grabbing 39 tosses for 623 yards. . . . **Charley Mehelich** (55), from Duquesne like Jansante, is a bearcat on defense and a dynamic blocker. . . . **Bill McPeak** (37) is another busting, destructive defensive wingman. . . . **Frank Wydo** (79), who played at various times for Duquesne and Cornell, is developing into one of the NFL's better tackles in his third pro year. . . . **Jack Wiley** (75) combines ruggedness with slickness to enjoy rating as the Steelers' No. 1 lineman. . . . **Steve Suhey** (62), All-America at Penn State in 1947, was a freshman sensation at guard last year and is continuing to improve; a well-stacked 215 but fast on his feet as a halfback. . . . **Bill Walsh** (46), 230-pound rookie from Notre Dame, was called "one of the greatest centers I have ever coached" by Frank Leahy and is living up to that high praise with the Steelers.

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# INSIDE FOOTBALL.....WITH THE GIANTS

## *The Importance of Fundamentals*

By COACH STEVE OWEN

The most important thing in football is a thorough knowledge of the fundamentals of the game. Fundamentals always have been the basis of successful football. Regardless of what system of play a team uses, it is the team that masters blocking, tackling and the other fundamentals that will be the consistent winner.

Some uninformed fans have the mistaken idea that professional football teams do not work as much on fundamentals as they should and that their practices are chiefly given over to the rehearsal of special offensive scoring plays.

Nothing could be farther from the truth. A visit to any professional training camp or practice field will reveal that constant attention is given on fundamentals in an effort to arrive at what we call perfection of detail. Every play that goes for good yardage represents the fruit of many hours of painstaking labor.

I like to compare this concentration on football fundamentals to the time that a champion golfer puts in on the practice tee. The topnotchers work and work on their shots with every club until they get their swings so grooved that they can step up to the ball with perfect confidence in the tension of the sternest competition.

So it is in football, perhaps even more so. Whereas a tournament golfer will play 100 rounds or more during a season, a professional football team must

stand or fall on the outcome of a dozen to fifteen games. Under these conditions, one slip can be fatal and the long practice hours that are put in from August into December are devoted to the avoidance of just such mistakes.

We stress fundamentals endlessly with the idea of making their efficient execution so much a matter of habit with players that they will instinctively do the right thing at the right time in the heat of the game.

Along with blocking and tackling, we emphasize charging and faking. In a contact sport like football, you have to hit with impact. That comes from leg drive and coordination, so a good part of our time is devoted to pairing off linemen against linemen, blocking backs against ends and letting them whale away at each other.

The importance of faking can't be stressed too much. In this tough league, you can't consistently run over or away from the opposition. You've got to keep them guessing, at least to the extent of creating a moment of indecision that gives you a chance to get your play under way. Our pass-receiving ends and ball-handling backs work long and hard at perfecting the fine art of deceiving the enemy.

There are fundamental qualities of the spirit that a team must possess, too—such as team play and the desire to win. A football squad that blocks, tackles, charges, fakes, pulls together and wants to win is mighty hard to beat.

## **Know Your Penalties—**

**OFFSIDE**—A player is offside when any part of his person is beyond his scrimmage or free kick line when ball is put in play.

*Penalty*—Loss of 5 yards from previous spot.

**BACKFIELD IN MOTION**—At the snap of ball all players of offensive team must be stationary in their positions without any movement of feet, head or arms, swaying of body or leaning in motion forward, except that one player only may be in motion clearly backward.

*Penalty*—Loss of 5 yards from previous spot.

**PASS INTERFERENCE**—It is interference by either A or B when any player movement beyond A's line hinders the progress of an eligible opponent in his attempt to reach pass, except such incidental movement or contact which may occur when two or more eligible players make a simultaneous and bona fide attempt to catch or bat ball. This restriction ends for both teams when pass is touched.

*Penalty*—Interference by A: loss of down and 15 yards from previous spot; interference by B: first down for A at spot of any such foul.

**DELAY OF GAME**—Ball must be in play promptly and any action or inaction by either team which tends to prevent this is delay of game. It is delay of game: (a) if snap is not made within thirty seconds after neutral zone starts; or, (b) if referee's whistle indicates that a free kick may start.

*Penalty*—Loss of five yards from (a) succeeding spot if between downs and ball remains dead or (b) previous spot if ball was in play. This penalty may not be refused.

**CLIPPING**—Clipping is throwing the body across the back of the leg of an opponent or charging or falling into the back of an opponent after approaching him from behind, provided opponent is not a runner or it is not close line play.

*Penalty*—For clipping, loss of fifteen yards.

**RUNNING INTO KICKER**—Defensive players may not run into or rough a kicker who kicks from behind his line unless such contact is incidental to and after he has touched the kick in flight; is caused by the kicker's own motion; caused during a quick kick or one made during or after a run; or occurs after kicker recovers a lost ball on the ground.

*Penalty*—For running into kicker, loss of five yards from previous spot (fifteen yards for roughness and also disqualification when flagrant).

**UNNECESSARY ROUGHNESS**—Tripping or striking an opponent anywhere above the knee with foot or any part of the leg below the knee, tackling the runner when clearly out of bounds or throwing the runner to the ground after the ball is dead.

*Penalty*—For unnecessary roughness is the loss of fifteen yards.

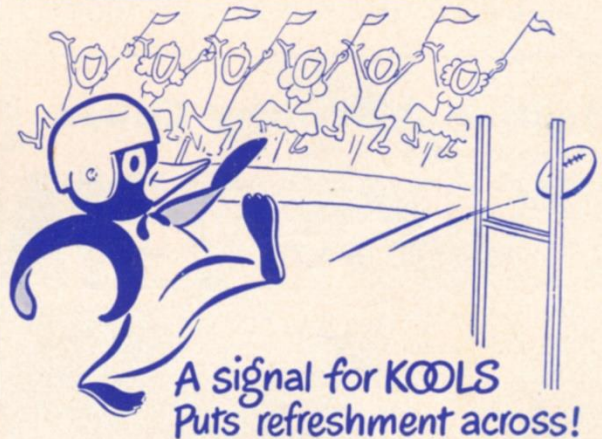
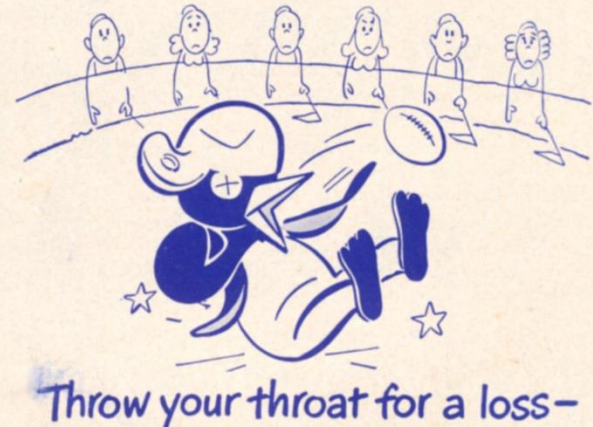

## Helping A Worthy Cause

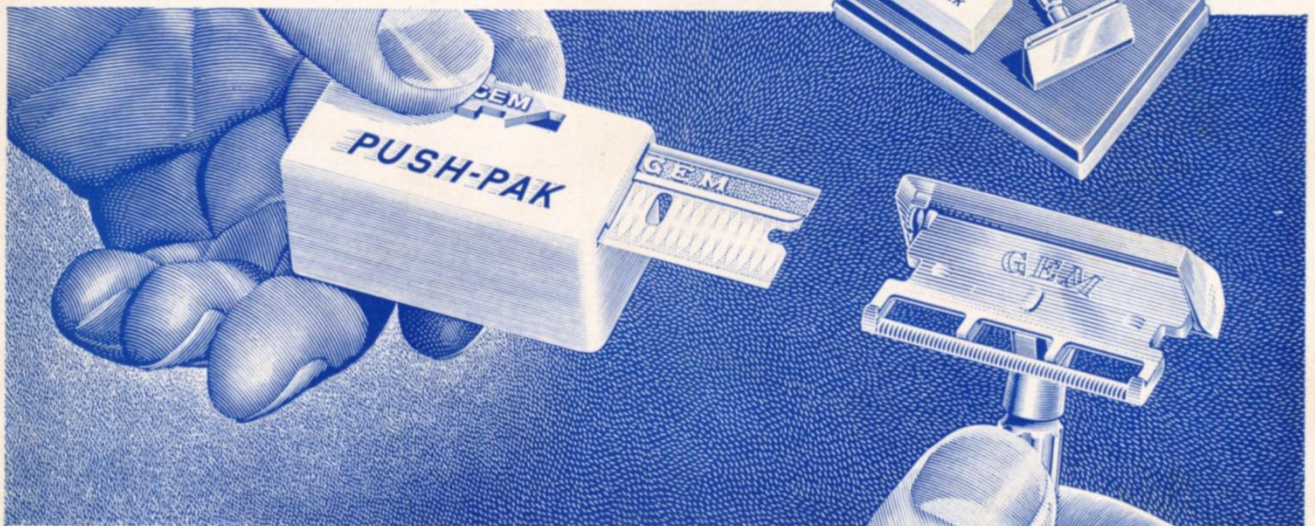

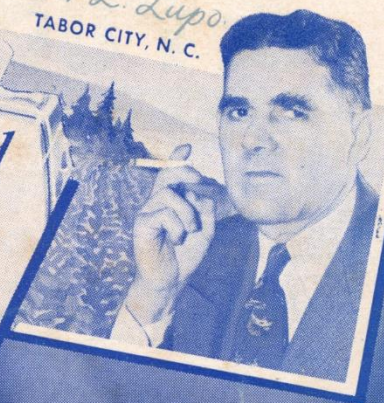
