





I am told that six previous Armed Forces' benefit games have yielded \$300,000.00 for these agencies. I hope that this year's game will make possible a further generous amount for the fund.




Chicago Bears' Coaching Staff



George Halas





The Chicago Bears' coaching staff has set the pattern in professional football during the years. It was first with the modern T-Formation with Man In Motion, and first with many of the innovations. The 1952 staff consists of six coaches—George Halas, Luke Johnsos, Paddy Driscoll, Clark Shaughnessy, Phil Handler and Bulldog Turner. In addition, Jim Benton, head coach at Arkansas A & M College, helped tutor the ends during the training season.

GEORGE S. HALAS . . . One of the pioneers of professional football and an organizer of the National Football League. Born in Chicago on February 2, 1895. Attended Crane Tech, competing in baseball, basketball and football. Entered University of Illinois September, 1914; graduated January, 1918. Earned letters in baseball and captained basketball team in 1917-18. Outstanding member of Bob Zuppke's Fighting Illini elevens 1915-16 and '17. Entered Navy in World War I. Played on famous Great Lakes team which won Service Championship and routed Mare Island in the Rose Bowl, New Year's Day, 1919. Played professional football with Hammond that fall (1919). Halas joined the A. E. Staley Company of Decatur, Ill., the following spring and played baseball under Iron Joe McGinnity. The famous Decatur Staleys' were organized by Halas that fall, a team which was to win glory, unrivalled, on the gridiron. Halas moved the Staleys' to Chicago in 1921, where they played at Cubs Park and became known as the Chicago Bears. The Bears were champions from the start, winning the world championship the first season. Halas played end and coached the team. He continued as player-coach until 1930, when Ralph Jones took over the field direction of the club. Halas returned as head coach in 1933, winning another title for the Bears. He has been at the helm ever since, except for a brief period from November, 1942, through 1945, when he served with the Navy in World War Two. He rejoined the Bears in 1946 and led the team to its seventh world championship. The Halases have two children: George Jr. and Mrs. Edward (Virginia) McCaskey.



Clark Shaughnessy

LUKE JOHNSOS . . . Born in Chicago and attended Schurz High. He is a graduate of Northwestern University, winning honors both in baseball and football. Luke received a trial with the Cincinnati Reds in 1928 but decided to devote his professional career to football. He joined the Bears that fall along with Walt Holmer, Northwestern's All-American fullback. Johnsos took the play away from Holmer and held down an end post with the Bears for seven seasons. He teamed together with Bill Hewitt to form an outstanding end combination.

Luke earned all-league recognition in 1933. Appointed assistant coach in 1937, Johnsos has been a member of the Bears' staff ever since. He has been with the Bears, as player or coach, 24 seasons, and during that time was associated with six world championship teams. Johnsos and Hunk Anderson were named co-coaches on October 25, 1942, when George Halas was called to active duty by the Navy. They were at the helm of the Bears for the remainder of the '42 season, and during 1943-1944 and 1945. Like the other members of the staff, Johnsos is a keen student of football, and an ardent advocate of the T-Formation. He is recognized in football circles as an outstanding strategist. Luke is part owner of Johnsos-Coppock Co. in Skokie, Ill. He is the champion father of the club—one boy and four girls. The Johnsos' make their home in Evanston.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL . . . Paddy joined the Bears' staff in 1941, thirteen years after he completed his playing career with the same club. Driscoll rates as one of the greatest athletes ever developed in the Chicago Area. He was an outstanding football and baseball player at Northwestern University from 1915 through 1917. Paddy served with the Navy in World War I, and was a teammate of George Halas on the mighty Great Lakes Naval Training Station team, which won the service championship in 1918 and defeated Mare Island in the Rose Bowl the following New Year's Day. Driscoll turned in one of the greatest individual performances in the history of the Rose Bowl. Paddy signed to play with the first Bear team in 1920. A league ruling awarded him to the Cardinals. Coached and quarterbacked the Cardinals in 1921 and '22. He was a One Man show for the Cards for six seasons, and finally joined the Bears in 1926. Paddy celebrated his reunion with Halas by leading the Bears to a 16 to 0 triumph over the Cards, scoring all of the points himself. He retired as an active player at the end of the 1928 campaign. Many observers rank him with the four greatest backs of all time. Coached St. Mel High School for several years and became head coach at Marquette University in 1939. Paddy has a seat on the Chicago Board of Trade. The Driscolls have a son and live on Chicago's north side.

CLARK SHAUGHNESSY . . . Became member of

Bears' coaching staff officially in 1951, although he acted in advisory capacity prior to World War Two. Shaughnessy was born in St. Cloud, Minn., on March 6, 1892. After playing fullback at the University of Minnesota he began his coaching career at Tulane University in 1915. His 1925 Green Wave eleven was named National Champion. Shaughnessy moved to Loyola of the South in 1927, again producing outstanding teams. He succeeded A. A. Stagg at the University of Chicago in 1933 and remained on the Midway until collegiate football was abandoned. Shaughnessy stunned the football world in 1940 by leading Stanford to the Pacific Coast title and a victory over Nebraska in the Rose Bowl. It was the first time the modern T-Formation With Man in Motion made famous by the Bears was employed by a major college eleven. "Shag" moved to the University of Maryland in 1942 and became head coach at Pitt in 1945. He acted in advisory capacity with the Washington Redskins and later the Los Angeles Rams. Shaughnessy assumed full command of the Rams in 1948 and after one season led the Angelanos to the Western Division championship of the NFL. Has coached such great quarterbacks as Frankie Albert, Lauterschlager, Jay Berwanger and Norm Van Brocklin. The Shaughnessys have three children, two girls and a boy, and make their home in Santa Monica, Calif.

PHIL HANDLER . . . Joined the Bears as Line Assistant this year, after serving 22 years as player, line coach, co-coach and head coach of the Cardinals. Phil is regarded as one of the best line coaches in the game. He was born in Fort Worth, Tex., July 1, 1908. After gaining national recognition as a guard at Texas Christian University, Handler joined the Cards and starred from 1930 to 1936, when he was appointed line coach under Ernie Nevers. Phil became head coach in 1943 and served in that capacity until 1946, when Jimmy Conzelman returned. He was named co-coach in 1949 and remained as line coach in 1950 and 1951. Handler tutors the tackles and guards, acts as a defensive assistant and also aids Walter Halas in scouting opposing teams. Phil is associated with a lumber company, lives in Chicago, is married and has two children.

BARWEGEN, RICHARD (Dick) . . . Guard 6:1, 230, born in Chicago, Dec. 25, 1921. Third season with Bears. One of the outstanding linemen in pro football. ● It's another winning toss for the Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society, the Air Force Aid Society.

It's seven—come TWO "elevens."

It's the seventh annual Armed Forces Benefit Football Game and, again, it brings together two "elevens" which could be giving you a preview today of the National Football League championship playoff in December.

The always contending Bears, the always formidable Giants, there's always a battle when they appear on the same field. It was Bears vs. Giants in the first Armed Forces game in 1946. The Bears won. It was Bears vs. Giants for the championship that same year. The Bears won. They have not won a NFL title since.

A seven-year cycle may be nearing completion in the destiny that rules the fortunes of sport.

The Bears barely missed last season. This could be the year defeat-bored Chicago sits down to a festive board of football triumph. Not since the Cardinals carried off the NFL crown in 1947 has Chicago had a major sports champion. Casting desperately about, it has hung its cap—the one with the feather in it—on the hook reserved for the amazing dominance of collegiate sports by the University of Illinois.

The White Sox have kicked up a first division fuss in the last two campaigns. The Cubs' fifth place finish in '52 will be acclaimed a moral victory. The Black Hawks continue to entertain hockey teams at the Stadium, but watch Stanley Cup playoffs from spectator seats.

Even the Chicago Westerners couldn't make it logical enough to win the Roller Derby "world series."

Chicago is proud of a Gary boxer who won an Olympic title; of a pole vault champion who once represented the Illinois Athletic Club but resides now in California; of the native sons who annually distinguish themselves at Northwestern, Illinois and Notre Dame—at Evanston, Champaign and South Bend.

Somehow, in its search for a champion it can call its very own, Chicago looks, year after year, to the Bears. Winners of seven world championships, the Bears are Chicago's most consistent sports kings.

And they're the annual champions of America's men and women of the military services. In six Armed Forces Benefit games since George Halas, owner-coach of the Bears, conceived the idea in 1946, nearly \$300,000 has been directed to the personal needs of the soldier, the sailor, the airman, the marine, and their families.

There are no governmental funds for this purpose. The one major source of revenue for the service guy or gal came from YOU when you purchased the ticket that admitted you to this game.

You've done more than buy an afternoon's entertainment. You've helped build that priceless morale which makes your fighting man supreme among all mankind.



STEVE OWEN—*A and T Coach*

Steve Owen has been a Giant for 27 years, as an all-time tackle of professional football, and as coach. He first saw the sights of New York in 1926, with the Kansas City Cowboys, a team which toured the country in wild west garb. Today, Steve is a part of the big town, yet he has lost none of the characteristic zest and humor which he carried under a 10-gallon hat when he first arrived from native Oklahoma.

Owen teaches the everlasting kind of football, the contact sport based on block and tackle, quick-thinking, exquisite precision, and above all, on the eagerness of players to HIT!

Owen was born on Apr. 21, 1898, at Cleo Springs, Okla., in the pioneer land of the Cherokee Strip, where Indians, outlaws bound for the bad lands, and U. S.

marshals in pursuit, were a part of life. Steve enjoyed a romantic youth, as a wrestler of renown in a wrestling state, and as a worker in the Texas oil fields and on cattle ranges which the railheads had not yet reached.

He first played football at Phillips U. in Enid, Okla., in 1918, under Johnny Maulbetsch, of undying fame at Michigan. He was captain and tackle of the great Giant team of 1927, which allowed 13 opponents a total of 20 points, a record never approached.

Steve became coach in 1931, and ever since, in the fashion of early Oklahoma, he has judged players by their acts as men, and not by their "names," so that his teams, whatever their luck, always know how to play their hand as it is dealt, and make the most of it.

OWEN'S ASSISTANTS

Here, just before turning to the players, is the ideal spot to introduce the threesome which moulds those men into a team under direction of Steve Owen. These assistant coaches are Al Sherman, backs, Ed Kolman, line, and Jim Lee Howell, ends.

All three command the respect which athletes accord only to those who have played the game. Sherman, former lefthanded passer and field general for the Philadelphia Eagles, was lauded and recommended by Greasy Neale for his thorough grasp of the tactics of the T. Kolman for six years was one of the mighty Chicago Bears, and ranks among the great tackles of that team. Howell was a premier end with the Giants for eight years.

Sherman, 30, helped the Giants install the T for 1949. He had coached at St. Joseph's Prep in Philadelphia, at Gettysburg (Pa.) College and he had won

the American League Football championship with the Paterson (N. J.) Panthers, who put up an 11-1 record.

Kolman, a native of Greenpoint, Brooklyn, was all met at Boys High, and all America at Temple U. Ed missed the '48 season because of injury. He tried a comeback with the Giants in '49, but his tutoring influence on the young Giant line turned him to a coaching career.

Howell, former state senator from Arkansas, last played in '48, and joined Owen's staff the following year. The 8-1 record, best in history, which Wagner College of Staten Island, N. Y., reached under his direction in '49 was a minor miracle in New York football.

Fred Benners **Southern Methodist** **22** **195** **6'3"**

Texans call Benners the greatest "arm" since Sammy Baugh. His career is highlighted with sensational performances. He was the big show on national television last season while defeating Notre Dame 27-20, with 22 completions out of 42 for 336 yards and four touchdowns. Ohio State saw him complete 19 for 306 and four touchdowns in '50, and 21 of 29 in '51. In the Blue-Gray game at Montgomery, Benners hit 14 of 21 for 272 yards and two touchdowns. Norman Morgan, coach of Highland Park H. S. in Dallas, discovered Fred. The coach saw the boy throwing a football and invited him to practice. Fred was a T center one year in high school. He had a brief trial at Suwanee before transferring to SMU. There he again met Morgan, as freshman coach, and launched his career. Ticketed for T quarterback as well as Southwest spreads under Owen. Giant foresight, in drafting Benners No. 8, 1951, brought one of the greatest collegiate passers to New York. Home town Dallas. Law student. Single.

De Witt Coulter **Army** **27** **260** **6'5"**

Army's greatest all-time tackle is one of the mightiest men in Giant history. Tex is billed for offensive center as well as offensive tackle duty this year. He serves as well—with the best—at both positions. A landslide choice for the Pro Bowl game for the Associated Press All-Pro team last season. Drafted No. 1, 1946. Home town is Dallas, Tex. Coulter is a talented cartoonist, specializing in sports and in portraits, and has worked for a newspaper and ad agency in his own Texas. His work also has appeared nationally, in connection with the Giants. Married.

Al De Rogatis **Duke** **25** **240** **6'4"**

Coach Owen believes that De Rogatis and Arnie Weinmeister, as a tackle team, rank with the greatest of all time. These two make possible the four-man Giant line which, despite its thinness, still holds opposing running attacks helpless. Al was picked for the Pro-Bowl and Associated Press All-Pro team last season. At Duke, "De-Ro" was named All-America in a national players' poll. Outstanding in the East-West game. Drafted No. 2, 1949. Home town Newark, N. J. Junior executive in periodicals distributing firm. Birthday, May 5. Married.

James Duncan **Wake Forest** **26** **205** **6'2"**

"He played every minute on defense and never once made a mistake," is Steve Owen's tribute to Duncan for the '51 season. Contributed two interceptions to the marvelous Giants' pass defense. Jim was a 50 minute man at Wake Forest in '50 despite the two-platoon system in vogue there. He won four football and four basketball letters at Reidsville (N. C.) H. S. and attended Duke a year before Wake Forest. Jim was drafted by the Bears and by the Browns of the All-America Conference and was claimed from the latter when they joined the NFL. Service veteran. Home town Reidsville. Construction worker in off season. Married.

Thomas Hanlon **Penn.** **22** **205** **6'1"**

Fast young end who played both offense and defense in college. Another met area boy on Giants with home town White Plains, New York. Signed as free agent.

Clinton Holder **Hardin-Simmons** **22** **225** **6'2"**

A rugged rookie who impressed at tackle despite his weight, and who might prove an outstanding guard. Captain of his team, and picked for All-Border Conference team. Free agent. Naval reservist. Home town Loving, Tex. Birthday, November 1. Single.

Eddie Price **Tulane** **26** **190** **5'11"**

This former All-America from Tulane gave one of the most spirited and indomitable performances in the club's history last fall. Although he was a marked man on attack after Rote was hurt, Eddie won the league championship as an Iron Man at rushing. He also set an all-time record of 271 rushing attempts. His league leading total of 971 yards would have bettered 1,000, had not a 70-yard run been called back because of an offside. He scored seven touchdowns and was invaluable to his team. Price, who so narrowly missed becoming the third 1,000 yarder in NFL annals, surpassed that figure twice at Tulane with 1,178 and 1,137 in '48-'49. As a Giant rookie in '50 he gained 703 yards, for a 5.6 average, and went as well in the A as in the T, although he was brought up in the latter system. One of the most adaptable and consistent ball carriers of recent history, and surely one of the most rugged. He made the Pro Bowl and the Associated Press All-Pro team—of course.

Ray Poole **Mississippi** **30** **215** **6'3"**

The crashing end who got in Otto Graham's hair so often in tense games with Browns. Topped Giants in scoring with 66 points on 30 points after touchdown and 12 of 16 field goal tries. His brother Jim founded the Poole tradition with Giants and Ray carries on. Specialized on defense last two years but in '49 caught 25 passes thrown by his old college chum at Ole Miss., Chuck Conerly. First lieutenant of Marines in Pacific Theatre. Drafted No. 4, 1946. Home town Gloster, Miss., where he has engaged in organized politics. Birthday, April 15. Married.

Kyle Rote **Southern Methodist** **24** **195** **6'**

The "Mighty Mustang," one of the most famous and most publicized college players of all time, struck hard luck as a rookie last season. After a brilliant inaugural, Kyle suffered a knee injury, and appeared in only five games. Diagnosis disclosed a damaged cartilage and the star was withheld from action by Owen for fear of aggravating the damage. An operation last May corrected the trouble. In his brief career as a Giant, Kyle rushed 21 times for 114 yards, a 5.4 average, and caught eight passes for 62 yards. Owen believes Rote will become one of the all-time big league stars. Kyle was MVP at Thomas Jefferson High in San Antonio in '46, and was showered with honors ever since. His most celebrated stand was against Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl in '49, when his spirited drive for three touchdowns forced the Irish to the limit to close their four-year march without a defeat. Unanimous All-America choice, Sportsmanship Trophy winner of Southwest Conference, voted to have achieved outstanding athletic performance by a Texan in this century. Played minor league baseball. Has given leading golf pros tough tussle. Rote was desired by all clubs of the NFL for 1951: the Giants were lucky to draw him on the bonus pick. Home town San Antonio. Housebuilder in Corpus Christi development. Birthday, October 27. Married, with a boy born on Christmas.

Charley Conerly **Mississippi** **28** **185** **6'1"**

Chuckin' Charley, who completed more passes in a game, 36, than any other in NFL history, is ready for a comeback after a gritty but sub-par performance because of a shoulder separation last season. Conerly often played although in pain, but his long throwing lacked effectiveness. This season he is back to normal—which means terrific. He completed 93 of 189 for 1277 yards, 49.2 per cent and 10 touchdowns. Chuck rewrote the nation's collegiate passing records as a senior in '47 at Ole Miss, and now has surpassed the marks of his illustrious predecessors on the Giants. All-America at Mississippi and NFL Rookie-of-the-Year in '48. Conerly came up as single wing tailback, and learned T quarterback chores for '49. He now directs the T and the A with equal facility. Marines corporal. Obtained in trade with Redskins, 1948. Cotton farmer in home town, Clarksdale, Miss. Birthday, September 19. Married.

Travis Tidwell **Auburn** **27** **185** **5'10"**

This sparkling rookie of two years ago was laid low by the Giants' injury jinx last season, with a fracture of a transverse process of the spine, and played only 37 minutes. He is completely healed, and ready to resume the quest for honors which came so freely in college: MVP in Southeastern Conference, national leader in total offense in '46, outstanding player in Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl games. Fireman, first class, in Navy. Drafted No. 1, 1950. Home town Birmingham, Ala. Preparing for radio and TV career. Birthday, February 5. Single.

John Amberg **Kansas** **23** **195** **5'11"**

Here is a versatile rookie in '51 who can step into the umbrella defense or take a post in the regular backfield. Intercepted three passes, ran seven times for 35 yards. Ready to star as a "sophomore." Amberg succeeded Forrest Griffith, Giant now in service, as fullback at Kansas. A "find" as a free agent, 1951. Home town Kansas City. Clothing salesman. Birthday, March 6. Single.

Francis Gifford **Southern California** **22** **190** **6'1"**

A genuine triple-threat player in this age of specialization. Gifford is an old-time Iron Man as well as a brilliant all-around star. Played single wing tailback and also quarterback in the T. Last season rushed 841 yards, completed 32 of 61 passes, scored seven touchdowns, and kicked 26 extra points and two field goals for a point total of 74. Also accurate punter, and crack pass catcher. His 69-yard run for first touchdown against California, on optional tailback play, launched sensational win. Of his 111 passes in three years, only three were intercepted. Was co-captain of the West team against the East, and also of the North against the South, and worked 60 minutes in both post-season games. Halfback on American Football Coaches Assn. official All-America team. Will play left half for Giants in A and T. Drafted No. 1, 1952. Home town Bakersfield, Calif. Played athletic roles in movies. Birthday, August 16. Married.
