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
Long-Range Scoring Strikes Mark Stepped-Up Giant Offense

DDEPTH in the backfield, improved passing and a more aggressive offensive line this year have opened up rival defenses and your New York Football Giants have been hitting for the long score. In the four games to date the shortest touchdown play by Steve Owen's boys has been a ten-yarder and, of twelve touchdowns scored, only four have come on plays of less than 20 yards.

Despite the injury to Joe Scott in the Cleveland game, which put him on the sidelines for thirty days, the backfield situation is more than under control. Frank Gifford and Bob Wilkinson, since Scott's injury, have been the starting left and right halfbacks and the rejuvenation of Kyle Rote has been a terrific shot in the arm. The former Mighty Mustang from S. M. U. can run at either right or left halfback and equally as well. Starting slowly, while strengthening a knee operated on last spring, Rote now has regained full effectiveness and is second only to Eddie Price in ground gained rushing for the Giants.

Price, of course, still is No. 1 boy at fullback and continues to set the league pace in quest of the rushing title he won last year. When Eddie needs relief, which is seldom, Owen has a capable runner in Johnny Amberg, who is most often seen on defense.

As an example of how the Giants hit for the long score: In the first game at Dallas the touchdowns were scored by Rote (52 yards), Price (25 yards) and Bob McChesney (26 yards on a Charlie Conerly pass). In Philadelphia it was Joe Scott for 30 and 10 yards, McChesney 18 yards from a pass from Gifford and Bill Stribling 20 yards on a Conerly pass. Then, in Cleveland, Wilkinson took Conerly's pass for 70 yards and Tom Landry re-

turned an interception 30 yards. Last week McChesney tallied twice on 15 and 34-yard pass plays and Rote took a Conerly toss for 17 yards. Add to this 36, 16 and 25-yard field goals by Ray Poole.

As for Conerly, hamstrung all last year by a bad shoulder, the chucker from Mississippi so far in four games, or only one-third of the season, has connected for six touchdown passes. Last year when he was fourth best passer in the American Conference of the National Football League, he hit for only ten touchdown passes all season.

McChesney is the leading pass receiver with seven for 137 yards and four touchdowns. Last season he caught only fourteen and tallied only twice. Stribling, who caught eighteen last year, already has six completions which keeps him up to his 1951 pace and he has tallied once where he scored only twice all last season.

Rote, used as a pass receiver for the first time last week, caught three passes for a total of 58 yards and one touchdown. On that touchdown pass he showed that he could maneuver on his knee, cutting away from a defender and then tight-roping the final six or seven yards down the sideline for the tally.

The Giant offense, as Owen so aptly puts it, "can pop from anywhere at any time." This is a club that will give plenty of thrills as the season progresses, so come out and see them. And, don't forget, there are special area days when blocks of tickets have been put aside for special parties such as might be formed by service clubs and other civic organizations. Today is Philadelphia and New Jersey Day. Next home game is Nov. 9 and will be Connecticut Day with the San Francisco 49ers as the opposition.

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



The Mighty Mustang Shows His Kick

KYLE ROTE, the Mighty Mustang from Southern Methodist, this season is on the way to fulfilling the promise he showed last season before a knee injury in the fourth game knocked him out for the remainder of the campaign.

The Giants' "bonus pick" in the collegiate draft two years ago, Roe was expected to make his No. 44 as celebrated in the Polo Grounds as was the No. 4 worn so well by Tuffy Leemans a few years back. But, after having twisted his knee in pre-season practice and then, when able to run again, suffering a more severe recurrence of the same injury, Rote was lost for the rest of the year.

So, last spring Rote's knee was operated on for the removal of a torn cartilage. Kyle came to training camp in tough shape. He had not been able to do any work to strengthen the knee and the first couple of weeks in training camp he walked up and down the concrete stands at Gustavus Adolphus College in order to strengthen the weakened member.

In the league opener at Dallas on September 28 he only carried the ball once. But that once was good for 52 yards and a touchdown. The next week he had a bit more action at Philadelphia and carried six times for small yardage. Then came the real test. Rote worked most of the second half at Cleveland against the hard-hitting Browns, carried nine times and racked up 62 yards against as tough a defense as he's likely to see all season.

Rote was hit, and hard, but the knee didn't bother him and he came out of that game convinced that his knee was sound again and that he could, as he puts it, "Earn the money they're pay-

ing me." His brilliant catch and tight-ropeing run to a touchdown against the Cardinals last Sunday supplied further evidence that he is ready to do just that.

Rote is a versatile player. He can run at either right or left half and he can pass and kick. He also is a good pass receiver and his speed and uncanny ability to change direction and a sharp change of pace make him especially tough when he gets into the open. But it is not only speed and guile that make him a fine runner—he can run over a tackler and hit like a fullback with his 195 pounds.


Last year before he was injured, Rote rushed twenty-one times for 114 yards and a 5.4 average. He caught eight passes for sixty-two yards. That was in four games. This year in his first three, playing only part time, he gained 133 yards in sixteen rushes.

Steve Owen, usually conservative in his appraisal of a rookie, last year stated that he thought Rote would become one of the great stars of professional football and has proclaimed Rote the most versatile back the Giants have had since Leemans. The injury cut short Rote's attempt to make Owen's prophecy come true last season.

The coach likes Rote and the fans like him. An incident in Dallas shows what the players think of him. After he had completed his 52-yard scoring run, his first effort in a league championship game since his injury last year, the entire Giant bench rushed down towards the end zone to pummel him on the back and congratulate him. With that kind of spirit, both Rote and this Giant team could go far.

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


Bob McChesney

Bob McChesney (88), acquired from the Eagles in a waiver deal at the start of the 1950 season, is one of the top Giant pass-receivers. He led the club in 1950 with 19 receptions and added 14 to his total last year, scoring eight touchdowns over these two campaigns. The slim Hardin-Simmons graduate not only is fast and nifty but does a solid job of blocking.

Bob Wilkinson (87), an All-America end at U. C. L. A. in 1950, has been converted to a halfback by the Giants and Coach Steve Owen is confident that he will develop into one of the league's best. The big Californian has all the physical attributes for greatness. He stands 6:3, weighs 215 and can run like a deer. His 70-yard touchdown catch and run against the Browns rates as one of the top Giant plays of 1952.





Tom Landry (49), who came to the Giants from the disbanded AAC Yankees in 1950, is one of the charter members of Steve Owen's famed "umbrella" quartet. A vigilant pass defender and deadly tackler, he has been a tower of strength in the defensive secondary. His value was emphasized in the big game with the Browns at Cleveland, when he scored the lock-up touchdown on a pass interception. The 27-year-old Texan also is the No. 1 Giant punter.

John Cannady (52), now in his sixth season with the Giants, has provided the Maramen with the deluxe type of line-backing to which they became accustomed during the long tenure of the peerless Mel Hein. A booming tackler and a keen diagnostician who seldom is lured into a false move, Big John from Indiana always seems to reach his highest peak against the Browns. He's just about won the permanent possession of Marion Motley.

Harmon Rowe (22), who came to the Giants from the AAC Yankees with Weinmeister, Landry, Schnellbacher, et al., in 1950, has been a stiff spoke in the Owen defensive umbrella for three seasons. He's a tackler par excellence, who specializes in coming up to spill rival ball-carriers behind the line. It's also flirting with danger to pass into his territory. Before and after a hitch in the Navy, he played with Baylor and San Francisco University.

Bill Stribling (81), whose square name is Majure B. Stribling, hails from Ole Miss, the alma mater of such other distinguished Giant ends as Jim and Ray Poole. As a pro rookie last year, he led the Giant wingmen in pass-catching with 18 receptions. This season he again is one of Charley Conerly's favorite aerial targets. He's a sure-fingered receiver who can go places with the ball after he latches on to it.

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
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Looking Over the Eagles

THE Eagles pay their annual visit to the Polo Grounds in charge of a new coach, personable Jim Trimble, who, at 34, is the youngest NFL football mentor. Trimble took over during pre-season practice when Wayne Millner, who succeeded the late Bo McMillin during the 1951 campaign, resigned because of ill health. Vic Lindskog, one of football's best offensive centers of all time, and Frank Reagan, a star with the Giants before he switched to his home-town team in 1949, are Trimble's top aides. Lending a hand also is Steve Van Buren, who had been scheduled to play until he suffered a severe leg injury in September.

With Van Buren hurt, Clyde Scott (27) playing defense and Frank Ziegler (41) off to a slow start, the Eagles have been emphasizing fullback plays in their running attack. They have two real line-busters in 230-pound John Brewer (36) and 241-pound John Huzvar (38), both rookies. Al Polard (21), the former Army star, and Don Stevens (20) of Illinois' 1952 Rose Bowl champions, are other useful runners. The Eagles

have a whole battery of passers. Adrian Burk (10), also a magnificent punter; Fred Enke (17) and Bobby Thomason (11) take turns in the pitching box.

Fast ends give the Philadelphia passing attack a real sting. Besides the veteran Pete Pihos (35), the Eagles use Bob Walston (83) and Harry Grant (86) at the flanks.

Grant, ex-Minnesotan who plays basketball with the Minneapolis Lakers in the winter, has blossomed out as one of the NFL's top pass-catchers as a pro sophomore. Two rookies, Ken Snyder (73), a Georgia Tech teammate of the Giants' Ray Beck, and Wayne Robinson (52), from Minnesota, have won places on the offensive line, which also includes Frank Wydo (75), acquired from Pittsburgh by trade.

On their defensive line, the Eagles have two of the NFL's senior operatives: 34-year-old Vic Sears (79), now in his twelfth season, and 31-year-old Frank Kilroy, a ten-year man. Chuck Bednarik (60) and Ken Farragut (53) are the line-backers. Deployed behind them in a Philadelphia version of the Giant umbrella are Russ Craft (33), Ed Bawel (81), Joe Sutton (45) and Scott (27).

The Eagles and Giants have had some ding-dong battles in recent years. The Giants, who lead the series, 24-12-1, have taken the last five games but dropped six straight to Philadelphia from 1947 through 1949, when Greasy Neale's squads ruled the NFL's Eastern roost.



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SCOUTING AROUND With Jack Lavelle

THERE's not much point in talking about the Eagles. You'll see what they have to offer probably even before you get around to reading this fine print. So the Forty-Niners will be today's main theme. Believe me, that's quite a ball club Buck Shaw has!

San Francisco is the toughest club in this league to scout. I've told Steve "Be ready for anything." How can you figure out a guy like Frankie Albert? He doesn't even let Buck in on what he's going to do next. Between us, I don't think Frankie knows himself; he just makes 'em up as he goes along. Seriously, though, that little guy puts on the greatest show in football. Maybe Graham passes better. Maybe Waterfield is slicker at hiding the ball, but no one I've ever seen yet has Albert's flair for doing the right thing at the right time. He's got a million ways to beat you and he's most dangerous when you think you have him on the run. There's nothing wrong with that Y. A. Tittle, either. Yel-verton Abraham (no wonder he prefers the initials) has one of the best "long arms" in the game.

I told you Ollie Matson was good, didn't I? Well, the Forty-Niners have two runners who are at least as good as Matson—McElhenny and Perry. Both these guys are real fast to the outside and at 198 and 210 they also have the power to rip up through there. With J. R. Boone, who used to be with the Bears, in there with them, San Francisco's backfield ought to get a ticket for violating the speed limit. Joe Arenas is another scooter and so are Cathcart and Cason on defense.

Frisco also has football's most lovable character since Ed Sprinkle backing up the middle of its

line. Hardy Brown is the guy I mean. He specializes in a "shoulder" tackle that's put more guys down for the count than Rocky Marciano's right. Up front, the Forty-Niners have some big guys who play for keeps, too: Nomellini, 260; Campora, 265, and Toneff, 252 (he's a growing boy just out of Notre Dame). And bad news for Carl Waite, our golden-voiced announcer: Visco Grgich may be back in action in time to face the Giants. In the meanwhile, Bob Momsen has football's toughest assignment. He's spelling Grgich.



TODAY'S SELECTIONS: With three winners out of five on last week's card, I'm way ahead of last year's pace. Another day like that, I'll switch to the Armstrong publications. Here's my super-sleeper for today: Pittsburgh over the Cardinals (let's see if they can stand prosperity). 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

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
