



HERE WE GO AGAIN

TODAY'S contest with the Chicago Cardinals launches the New York Football Giants on their twenty-ninth consecutive season of operation at the Polo Grounds and brings to the Big Town the first contingent of a six-section parade of the gridiron's brightest stars.

Passing in review this afternoon with the Cardinals will be the mercurial Charley Trippi, whose seven-year record stamps him as one of the great all-around backs of the pro game; Johnny Olszewski, the dynamic line-busting rookie fullback from California; Don Stonesifer, swift and elusive pass-catching end, and such stalwart forwards as Jerry Groom, Don Joyce and Jack Jennings.


Next Sunday the mighty Cleveland Browns will be here, with Otto Graham, Dub Jones, Marion Motley, Dante Lavelli, Len Ford, Bill Willis and Lou (The Toe) Groza.

Visiting the Polo Grounds on Nov. 15 will be the Pittsburgh Steelers, with Lynn Chandnois, Ray Mathews, Franny Rogel, Jim Finks, Elbie Nickel, Ernie Stautner and Bill Walsh.

A week later, on Nov. 22, Washington's refurbished Redskins will come whooping up from the nation's capital, led by Jack Scarbath, Eddie Le Baron, Harry Gilmer, Charley Justice, Mule Train Heath, Hugh Taylor and Dick Modzelewski.

Then, on Nov. 29, the Philadelphia Eagles will present Adrian Burk, Frank Ziegler, John Huzvar, Ralph Goldston, Bobby Walston, Bibbles Bawel, Frank Kilroy and Chuck Bednarik.

And in the grand finale on Dec. 13, the world champion Detroit Lions will display Bobby Layne,

Doak Walker, Hunchy Hoernschemeyer, Pat Harder, Cloyce Box, Leon Hart, Thurman McGraw, Lou Creekmuir and Les Bingaman.

Against these shining lights of the opposition, the Giants will turn loose their own Eddie Price, Kyle Rote, Sonny Grandelius, Charley Conerly, Jim Duncan, Arnie Weinmeister, Em Tunnell, Frank Gifford, Tom Landy, et al.—with Arnie Galiffa also scheduled for early action—maybe even today.

Bringing the stars together is a can't-miss formula for the best in football entertainment. That's what is on tap today and five succeeding Sundays at the Polo Grounds.

The National Football League was never so well balanced as in this, its thirty-fourth season. There isn't a weak sister in the circuit and every game is an all-out battle for survival.

With green personnel in several key spots, the Giants got away to a slow start. But Steve Owen hasn't given up on his team—and neither should you. This Giant squad has the potential to be one of Steve's best—and he's had more than his share of champions.

An 8-4 record gave Cleveland the Eastern Conference title last year. In the Western Conference, Detroit and Los Angeles finished in a tie at 9-3 and had to play off. Both divisional races went down to the wire.

Commissioner Bert Bell, who called the turn of events, predicted more of the same for this season.

The 1953 race is just starting and there'll be a lot of excitement before it finishes, with much of it at the Polo Grounds.

Sonny Grandelius

GRANDELIOUS: *Fast, Strong, Elusive*

TAKE a good look this afternoon at Everett (Sonny) Grandelius, fabulous 1000-yard rookie from Michigan State and the Giants' starting left halfback.

With Kyle Rote temporarily out of action Grandelius will see full service at the left half position which he has shared with Rote up to now. The two run much alike. Fans today will see Grandelius, number 24, resembling Rote, number 44—with swift, sharp cuts, speed in the open, tremendous power into the line.

For Grandelius it has been a long pull from the Michigan State campus to a starting role with the Giants. An ROTC second lieutenant, he went away to war following graduation in 1951. He was a military policeman Stateside for a year. A second year was spent in combat in Korea attached to the 25th Infantry Division. His promotion to first lieutenant came through while he was in the battle lines.

Before that he had been the scourge of the Midwest. During his senior season he gained 1023 yards rushing. When a passing play was called he either threw the ball or caught it. He did the punting. He kicked extra points. Mostly this man called Sonny just ran with the ball.

For a 23-year old halfback Grandelius is a man of many talents. At graduation he won two

medals for combined scholarship and athletic accomplishment. His classroom average was just under A.

Nor is football his only love. At Michigan State he caught for the baseball team, was a collegiate boxing champion and made All-American left halfback as well.

Other loves are Marty, his wife — they were married just after graduation — and Steven John, a husky 24-pounder whom Sonny calls his blocker. Young Steven was born while his father was in Korea. Sonny didn't see him till he was six months old.

The family lives in Muskegon Heights, Michigan, Sonny's home town. Marty, the former Martha Thomson, is from Port Hope, Ontario. She was a Michigan State co-ed when they met.

Gradelius will go into coaching when his playing days are over. Biggie Munn, Michigan State coach, held an assistant coaching job open for two years so Sonny could have it when he came back from Korea. To play with the Giants, Grandelius declined the offer. Playing pro-football would make him a better coach later on, he felt.

At Michigan State Grandelius had played on the baseball team which boasted Robin Roberts, now of the Philadelphia Phillies as a pitcher. Sonny, who caught Roberts many times, says he didn't have

exceptional stuff then.

Another of Grandelius' famous team mates was Chuck Davey. Both were on the Spartan boxing squad. Davey went on to fight for the welterweight championship of the world but Grandelius quit boxing after winning the Big Ten light-heavyweight title as a sophomore.

He admits that he never had the killer instinct; once he had a boy hurt he wanted to stop hitting him. He is just the opposite on the football field where he hits harder and oftener than most fullbacks.

Little of this athletic versatility was displayed when Grandelius reported to Giant training camp this summer. He had not played a game in almost three years. Stale and rusty, he blocked awkwardly, could hardly catch a ball at all. Only when charging through the line did he look like an All-American.

Within two weeks he had regained his confidence and agility. He was the team's leading ground gainer throughout the exhibition season and especially against the 49ers in the Polo Grounds last month where fans saw some dazzling runs as he sliced, cut, drove forward with uncanny precision. Watch him today, Sonny Grandelius, number 24, an invaluable addition to the Giants' great backfield corps.


Meet the Giants



Charley Conerly

Charley Conerly (42), calling signals for the Giants for the sixth year, is one of football's great passers. Always at his best in the clutch, Chucking Charley had fired 70 touchdown tosses coming into this season and has looked sharper than ever to date. A record-breaker as a collegian at Mississippi, he has cracked Giant marks right and left and earned several listings in the NFL book as a pro.

Eddie Price (31) enters his fourth season as a Giant established as one of the most productive and durable runners in pro football history. In three pro campaigns, the fleet Tulane graduate ripped through enemy lines for a total of 2,422 yards, leading the league in 1951 and finishing second last fall. A fullback who runs with halfback speed and elusiveness, he is the backbone of the Giant running attack.


Joe Sulaitis

Joe Sulaitis (21), senior Giant in point of service with eleven years at the Polo Grounds, has bobbed up in a new position this season. The Jersey Jolter, one of the few pro stars to vault directly from high school into football's big league, now is a defensive end. Joe has been invaluable to Steve Owen as a jack-of-all trades ever since he joined the Giants. Over the years, he has played just about every position on the team.

Jim Duncan (86), who joined the Giants in 1950, has been a king-pin of the defensive line for four years. He has been described as "the perfect end" because he so seldom makes a mistake. From his post on the left flank, he harries rival passers mercilessly, tackles with deadly ferocity and, when asked to drop off, covers his pass-defense zone like a blanket. Wake Forest was Jim's alma mater.

Emlen Tunnell

Emlen Tunnell (45) plays on defense only for the Giants but nevertheless qualifies as one of Steve Owen's prime offensive weapons. The fleet and sure-fingered Iowa graduate, six years a Giant, gained 924 yards last year on his spectacular returns of punts, kick-offs and intercepted passes. A whirling dervish in the open field, Em is a touchdown threat any time he gets hold of the pigskin.

Tom Landry (49) collaborates with Tunnel in the back line of the Giant defense as a main-brace of the celebrated Owen umbrella. The strong-jawed Texan, a decisive tackler and vigilant pass defender, calls defensive signals and, in an emergency, also is ready, willing and able to direct the team on defense. Tom is a tremendous punter, too. Until Butch Avinger came along this year, he was the Giants' No. 1 kicker. This is his fourth season with the Giants.



Joe Stydahar, the new coach of the Chicagoans, has come up with two good new quarterbacks in Ray Nagel (7), from U.C.L.A., and Jim Root (9), from Miami of Ohio. Both these boys pass well and they have crack receivers in Don Stonesifer (80), who leads the league with 20 receptions,

good for 224 yards, and Gern Nagler (84), a fleet rookie from Santa Clara.

In the line, the Cardinals have a blend of veterans and rookies. The old dependables include Jack Jennings (70), Don Joyce (71), Bill Fischer (72), and Jerry Groom (57). Prominent among the newcomers are Tom Higgins (73), Jerry Watford (64) and Nick Chickillo (68).




Giant Jottings



THIS league—and my job—gets tougher every year. It used to be enough to peg a few key men on each team. You can't get away with that any more. There are too many good players. It's amazing the way this league keeps improving. This is football to end all football. It's wonderful to watch. The only trouble is that, as a scout, you need eyes in your eyes to take it all in.

I've got news for you... The Browns were playing the Colts at Akron in an exhibition game. Everyone was breathlessly waiting for Cleveland to use its favorite formation—new guard in, old guard out. When three plays went by without a move, a stunned silence fell over the press box. Then a gentleman of the press—he's from Cleveland and has to live with Paul Brown, so I won't identify him—exclaimed: "Flash! Otto Graham has just been appointed quarterback of the Browns!"

Seriously, though, Graham and the Browns look better than ever—I'm sorry to say. Otto was terrific against the Cardinals last week. Even when the Browns were behind, 28-14, you knew he was going to bring them home on top. He's even picked up a few new tricks. Against the Eagles, he threw a strike to Lavelli while running at full speed to his left. That's the hardest play a right-handed passer has to make. As if it weren't hard enough to stop him before, now he's doing things like that!

You'd think that with Speedie gone the Browns would have lost something on attack. They haven't. Darrell Brewster has moved in at left end and is

doing a bang-up job. Dub Jones and Ken Carpenter are tremendous halfbacks and Harry Jagade and Marion Motley provide a great one-two punch at fullback. Defensively, the Browns have not been quite as sharp as in the past, but they are getting squared away.

Talking about rookies, you'll see one of the best today in Johnny Olszewski of the Cardinals. There are a lot of other good freshmen in the league, too. I'll give you a more complete report later on.


