

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A FAMOUS SERIES CONTINUES

HERE is no closer rivalry in football today than that between the Giants and Browns. Today's is the eighth game between the two titans of pro football, who began to trade blocks and tackles in 1950. The Giants have won four, the Browns three.

The average margin between the teams has been less than a touchdown, 5.3 points. Overall, the Giants have scored 93 points, the Browns 88.

Three times the divisional title has hinged on a Giant-Brown game. On the first occasion, the Giants won 17-13, only to lose a play-off to the Browns, 8-3. The third time Cleveland shut out the New Yorkers, 10-0, to clinch the 1951 crown.

Steve Owen's celebrated umbrella defense was invented to combat the threat of Otto Graham's passes. The umbrella works two ways: it can satiate the passing zone with defenders, or it can rush the passer to distraction.

In the first Giant-Brown game Owen called for the downfield flood. Graham didn't complete a pass in the first half. The Giants intercepted three times. The Giants won, 6-0, still the only time Cleveland ever has been shut out.

If the Browns worked for weeks on new pass patterns after that, they must have been doubly chagrined to find that Owen had reversed his field for the second game.

This time the rush was on. Six men rushed Graham so hard on each play that he lost tremendous yardage eating the ball. Cleveland never got started. The Giants won, 17-13.

Which way cagey Steve will play it today will be revealed soon enough. That he will stress defense is not even certain. In the season's finale

last year, he virtually threw defense to the winds and the Giants outscored the Browns, 37-34.

The Browns don't change much. For eight seasons now they have depended largely on their three G's: Graham, Groza and Gillom. Groza is the field goal threat, dangerous anytime the Browns cross midfield. Gillom is the punter who gets them out of trouble.

With service calls and retirements coming at awkward moments, the Giants have changed constantly. This season they have their best batch of running backs since pre-war days and a new and promising quarterback in Arnold Galiffa. But they also have a rookie line that still has much to learn.

The Giant defense is almost 100 percent veteran and out of the Owen titanic mold. It held the Cardinals to minus one yard rushing last week. With Frank Gifford and Em Tunnell at safety, the umbrella is stronger than ever.

The umbrella, developed and perfected under Brown pressure, may be the Giants' ace-in-the-hole. The umbrella is an offense on defense, with any of its four main spokes (Tom Landry and Don Menasco in addition to Tunnell and Gifford) able and liable to go all the way with an intercepted pass.

Last season Tunnell gained 924 yards on defense, much more than the league-leading ground-gainer gained on offense. A quarterback must be careful against such as this.

The Giants, getting stronger now with the rookie line coming alive, will have all their weapons primed for the Browns, including quarterback Charley Conerly, who has completed six touchdown passes against them and is the only quarterback ever to defeat them four times.




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DOUBLE-BARRELED PASSING THREAT: Arnie Galiffa and Charley Conerly.

One-Two Punch at Quarterback

THE signing of Arnold Galiffa two weeks ago marked the end, the Giants hope, of a seven-year quest for quarterback strength.

Since 1946, when Frank Filchock directed the Giants to an Eastern Division title, a dozen players have had a shot at the quarterback job. Only one of them, Charley Conerly, has operated with proficiency.

In the six years he has been with the team Conerly has been more than a competent quarterback. At times, Chuckin' Charley has approached brilliance. But he has not been able to do the job alone.

Now Conerly has Galiffa's help—and the Giants have a one-two punch second to none. Not only is Galiffa, ex-Cadet, ex-All-American, ex-battlefield hero, a standout quarterback in his own right but he will also take some of the pressure off Conerly. It is expected that Conerly will attain more consistency as a result.

In his senior season at West Point, Galiffa completed 50 of 97 passes—51.5 percent. He threw 13 touchdowns, gained 887 yards at the rate of 9.1 yards a clip. Army was unbeaten that year and in Galiffa's final game sacked Navy 38-0. Coach Red Blaik called it the finest job of quarterbacking he had ever seen.

Three months after graduation this 11-letter man (he played first base and basketball at West Point also) was in action in Korea.

There he narrowly escaped death several times, won a battlefield promotion to first lieutenant.

"I used my platoon as a football team," he said later, "I was quarterback. We had sneak plays up the middle, sweeps around end. There was one difference—those Reds were shooting to kill!"

To get Galiffa the Giants had to give up a fine defensive back, S. M. U.'s Val Joe Walker, who is perhaps the fastest man in football, and their first draft choice.

It is a high price to pay but the Giants, who have been willing to pay high prices to strengthen the team, believe Galiffa will be worth it.

To replace Filchock in 1947, the club gave up Bill Paschal, who had led the league in rushing two

straight years, plus a bundle of money for ex-Columbia star Paul Governali.

The following year, in fierce bidding for Conerly, the Giants went so high that the disappointed Branch Rickey of the now-defunct Brooklyn Dodgers labeled the whole thing "un-American."

To back up Conerly, the club made Travis Tidwell its No. 1 draft choice in 1950. When Tidwell failed to live up to his college reputation Fred Benners was picked. Benners gave up the game this year to finish law school.

Now it's Galiffa and Conerly.

On or off the playing field Galiffa is an officer. His leadership qualities as much as his ability to pass determined the Giants to get him at whatever cost.

He can also run with the ball. Against Michigan during his final undefeated season at West Point it was the celebrated Galiffa keep play on a quarterback sneak which was the upsetting force.

In Army's 14-13 close shave with Penn, time was running out with the Cadets training when Galiffa rushed the ball to set up two essential passes. With 30 seconds left he threw the touchdown pass to John Trent, Army captain.

After the 1949 season the Navy players voted Galiffa the outstanding individual Navy had faced. As a Giant, the six-two, 195-pounder promises to impress NFL teams in like manner.

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
Meet the Giants

Arnie Weinmeister (73) has been pro football's best defensive tackle ever since he broke in with the AAC Yankees six years ago. The 235-pound Washington graduate has the speed and mobility of a halfback to go along with his power. His lateral range is phenomenal. A natural leader, he is co-captain of the Giants.

Kyle Rote (44), beset with injuries in his three seasons with the Giants, has had only a few opportunities to flash the form that won him the nickname of "Mighty Mustang" at S. M. U. However, there's no question about his ability and the Giants feel sure his run of tough luck soon will be over. His flashing cutback runs and brilliant pass-catching are vital to the success of Steve Owen's team.






John Cannady

John Cannady (52), seven-year Giant from Indiana, has supplied the Polo Grounders with their most effective linebacking since the days of Mel Hein. Big John, a rib-cracking tackler who really "makes that leather pop," is at his best when the going is roughest. He has particularly distinguished himself against the Browns. Thanks largely to Cannady's vigilant attention, Marion Motley, Cleveland's great fullback, has been completely stymied by the Giants.

John Rapacz (53) rates as one of football's best offensive centers. The huge Oklahoman, 6-4 and 260, who got his start with the AAC Chicago Rockets, was Steve Owen's No. 1 draft pick when that circuit disbanded in 1950. It was a happy choice for the Giants, for John has been bowling over opposing linemen like tenpins ever since. An off-season knee cartilage operation has made him more effective than ever this season.





Bill Austin (60), back with the Giants after a two-year hitch in the Army, has played a lot of football for a 24-year-old. He was a four-year regular at Oregon State, had two brilliant seasons with the Giants and also managed to sneak in a little gridiron action in the service. The Blond Bomber plays a key role in the attack at running guard and is rapidly recovering the form that established him as a Giant star in 1950-51.

Randy Clay (12), like Austin, returned to the Giants this season after spending two years in service. He was a rookie sensation in 1950, accounting for two upset victories over the world champion Philadelphia Eagles and winning hero's honors in the celebrated 6-0 defeat of the Browns. The fleet Texan has moved right back into the regular line-up at right half and, besides doing a solid job of running, blocking and pass-catching, has taken over the place-kicking assignment.

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
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
LOOKING OVER THE BROWNS

WITH eight charter members of the squad that Paul Brown organized for Mickey McBride (who sold the franchise last spring) in 1946 and few important variations from their original style of play, the Cleveland Browns are as familiar to pro football fans as a well-read book.

The Lakesiders adhere faithfully to the pattern that has brought them five championships in seven seasons. That pattern features highly efficient passing and pass defense and the use of kicking as an offensive weapon.

Their key operative once again in Otto Graham (14). Football has known few greater passers than the Browns' great quarterback, who stays cool, calm and collected under the heaviest pressure. As in the past, Otto specializes in button-hook and deep sideline passes to his crack ends, Dante Lavelli (56) and Darrell Brewster (88), who has taken over Mac Speedie's number as well as his job; flanker pitches to Dub Jones (40), Ken Carpenter (20) and Ray Renfro (26) and screen flips to Harry Jagade (32) and Marion Motley (36).

The Browns can run the ball as

well as any team. Carpenter and Jones and their young replacements, the fleet Renfro and Billy Reynolds (46), are superior halfbacks, while Jagade and the still-dangerous Motley supply a lethal one-two punch at fullback. But by habit, they give preference to their passing game. In view of their consistent record of success, who can fault them?

They supplement their aerial

dynamics with the place-kicking of Lou Groza (76), a field goal threat any time they cross midfield, and the tremendous punting of Horace Gillom (84), who can, and often does, boom the ball 70 yards or more downfield.

On defense, Cleveland operates from 5-2-4 and 5-3-3 alignments. From either deployment, the Browns concentrate on rushing opposing passers and harassing opposing receivers. George Young (82) and Len Ford (80), their veteran ends, and Doug Atkins (83), the 6-foot-8, 250-pound rookie who spells them, crash relentlessly.

Their line-backers, Tommy Thompson (54), rookie Tom Catlin (50) and Walt Michaels (34), who joins them in the 5-3-3 set-up, do everything the law allows to check eligible receivers on the scrimmage line. Warren Lahr (24) and Tommy James (42), at the halfbacks, and Ken Gorgal (15) and rookie Ken Konz (22), the twin safety-men, provide vigilant deep coverage.

There's no great mystery about the Browns but it's still a big job to solve them, they carry out their assignments so well.

STEELERS HERE ON NOVEMBER 15

THE Giants will be on the road, playing the Cardinals in Chicago and the Eagles in Philadelphia, the next two Sundays (don't forget to tune them in on Channel 5). Then, on Nov. 15, they open a three-game stand at the Polo Grounds by facing the Pittsburgh Steelers.


As far as Steve Owen is concerned, the Steelers are the toughest club in the National League. In winning eleven of seventeen

contests with the Giants since 1945, Pittsburgh has done the Polo Grounders out of a couple of Eastern titles. The 63-7 count the Steelers rolled up last year was the worst defeat in Giant history and they knocked off Steve's team 24-14 at Pittsburgh three weeks ago.

Perhaps the most improved team in the National League last season under the coaching of Joe Bach, Pittsburgh has added new weapons to its arsenal and will bring to the Polo Grounds a typically rugged and hard-hitting squad.

Distinguishing the Steeler cast is a blazing fast backfield and a block-busting defensive line. The Pittsburgh backfield, rated by the experts as one of the best in football, is composed of Jim Finks, a sharp-shooting quarterback who threw 20 touchdown passes in 1952; Lynn Chandnois and Ray Mathews, mercurial halfbacks who specialize in breakaway runs, and Fran Rogel, a ripping, clashing fullback who ranks among the top ground-gainers in the circuit.

The Steeler defensive line,

which has been pierced for only 245 yards by rushing in four games, is led by Dale Dodrill at middle guard, Ernie Stautner at left tackle and Bill McPeak at right end.

Other Pittsburgh assets are elusive end Elbie Nickel, a pass-catching wizard; Bill Walsh, all-league offensive center, and Pat Brady, the loop's top punter with a fantastic average of 49.8 yards from the line of scrimmage.






