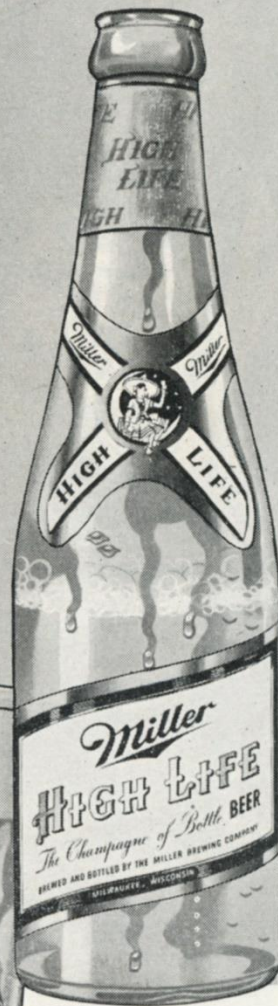

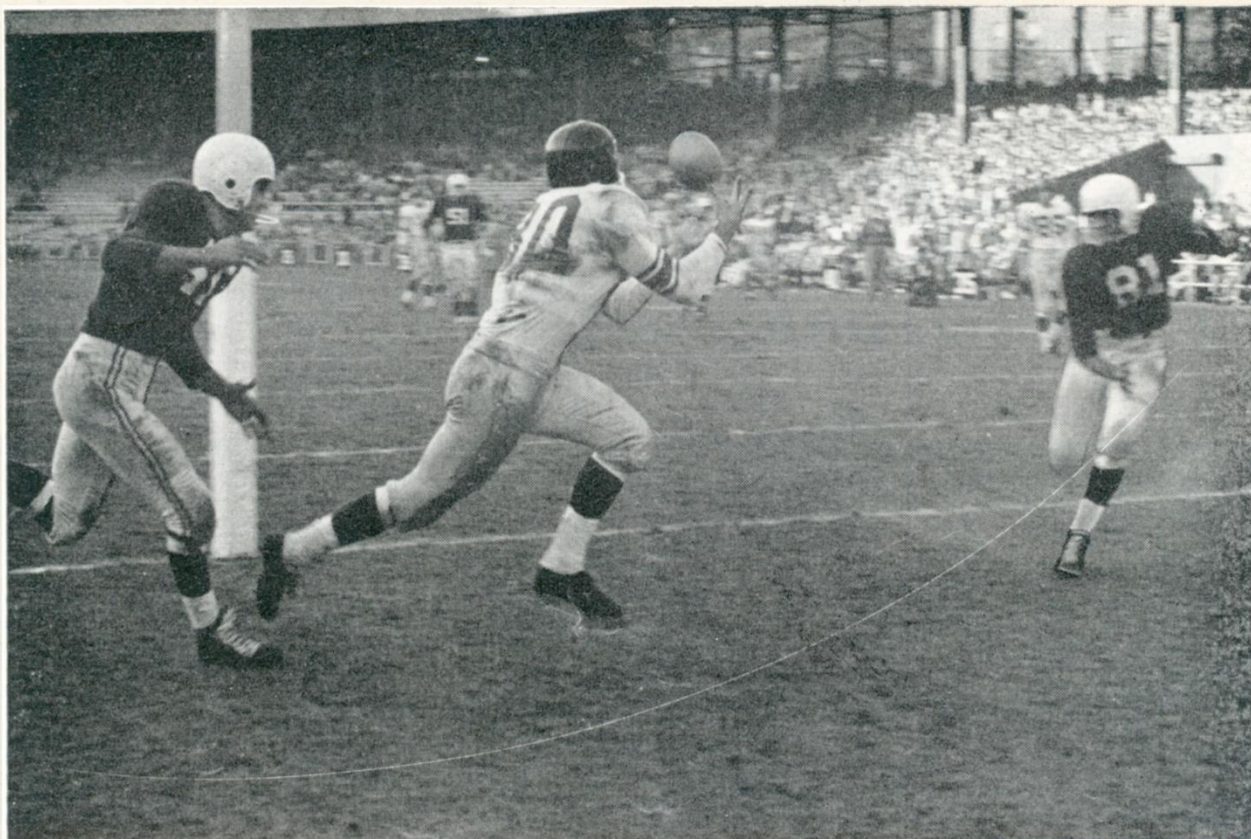

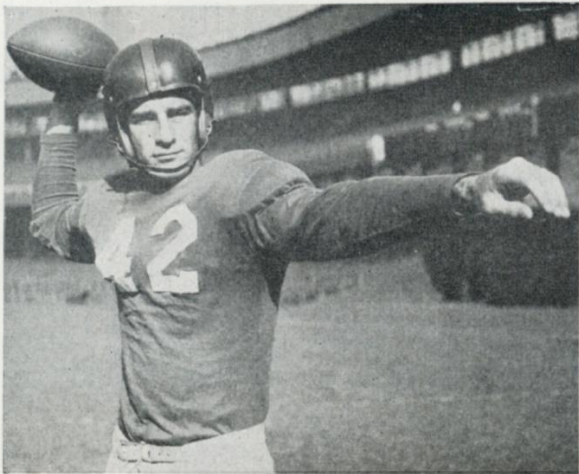

The "Old Pro" of Giants Comes Through Again

THROUGH the murk and mire of the frightful weather at the Polo Grounds last Sunday, the Giants showed enough bright qualities to endorse Coach Jim Lee Howell's statement that this is a stronger Giant squad than last year's.

The way the National League race is shaping up, with everyone taking pot shots at the leaders, the Giants are far from being out of title contention. Here, with two-thirds of the season still to go, every team in both divisions has lost at least one game.

With a 1-3 won-lost record, the Giants are only two games behind the Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers, who are deadlocked for the Eastern Division lead at 3-1.

With the Steelers here today, the Giants have an immediate opportunity to do something about reducing that gap. They will have two cracks at Cleveland later on.

They will play the Browns on the road two weeks hence and meet the Clevelanders at the Polo Grounds on Nov. 27.

Last Sunday's rain-splashed game with the Cardinals emphasized the sterling virtues of the Giants' two prize rookies, Roosevelt Grier and Alex Webster. The 261-pound Grier spent most of the afternoon in the Cardinal backfield. The elusive Webster was a constant threat as a runner and pass-receiver.

Little Bobby Epps, reactivated when Eddie Price was put on the disabled list, did a whale of a job at fullback and Frank Gifford, at left half, ran with amazing effect in the slippery going.

While the principal accolades went to others, discriminating observers also tabbed Charley Conerly as a major hero of the moist occasion. They were correct in doing so.

The "old pro" of the Giants piloted the team on both scoring marches with a remarkable demonstration of sure-fingered ball-handling and play selection.

In a recent magazine article, Coach Paul Brown of Cleveland described Conerly as football's best "wet ball" quarterback. Charley made the designation stand up—and how! He was positively uncanny.

Don Heinrich, who gave way to Conerly when it became obvious that the going was not suited to his style, may be back on the firing line today. If so, Giant fans will see a vastly improved quarterback over the youngster who joined the team last year.

In the meantime, it's a comfortable feeling for Coach Howell and Giant fans to know that the reliable Conerly is standing by in the wings, ready to take over in an emergency.

Webster Leads Prize Crop of Giant Rookies



WHEN Alex Webster, rangy rookie halfback, slashed off left end against the Chicago Cardinals and rambled 71 yards in a zig zag pattern which electrified the fans, he keyed the high quality of the half-dozen rookies on this Giant squad.

It's normal for a pro team to come up with two or three top rookies a season. But the Giants point with pride to six who are sure to be Giants of the future.

By all odds, Webster is the top catch. The tall, 210-pounder out of Kearny, N. J., has been the most valuable player wherever he has played, as a tailback at North Carolina State and last year with the Montreal Alouettes.

Close behind Webster rank Roosevelt Grier, titanic 261-pound defensive tackle from Penn State; Mel Triplett, crushing 218-pound fullback from Toledo; speedy Joe Heap from Notre Dame, a constant touchdown threat at halfback; Rex Boggan, Mississippi's All-America tackle; and Jimmy Patton, also from Mississippi, one

of the top college defensive backs last season.

With Montreal last season Webster led the Canadian League in ball-carrying, touchdowns, scoring and assorted other departments. He was a pass-catching leader too. At season's end, he was named most valuable back in the Big Four League and the "most popular" Alouette.

A Giant fan since grade school days, Webster listened attentively when Jim Lee Howell suggested he transfer to New York. Webster admitted he always had wanted to play in the Polo Grounds. Besides, his wife and baby would be happier with him playing near their Kearny home.

In training camp, the 24-year-old Webster immediately showed his quality. He was the most effective Giant ball carrier during the exhibition campaign and in the first three games of the league season he averaged 6.1 yards.

Alex is not particularly fast. But he is big and strong and has

the ability to cut and change direction without slowing down.

Jim Lee Howell says of Alex: "Webster hits into the line like a fullback. Once he is in the open he is all halfback, swerving, cutting, using a good change of pace."

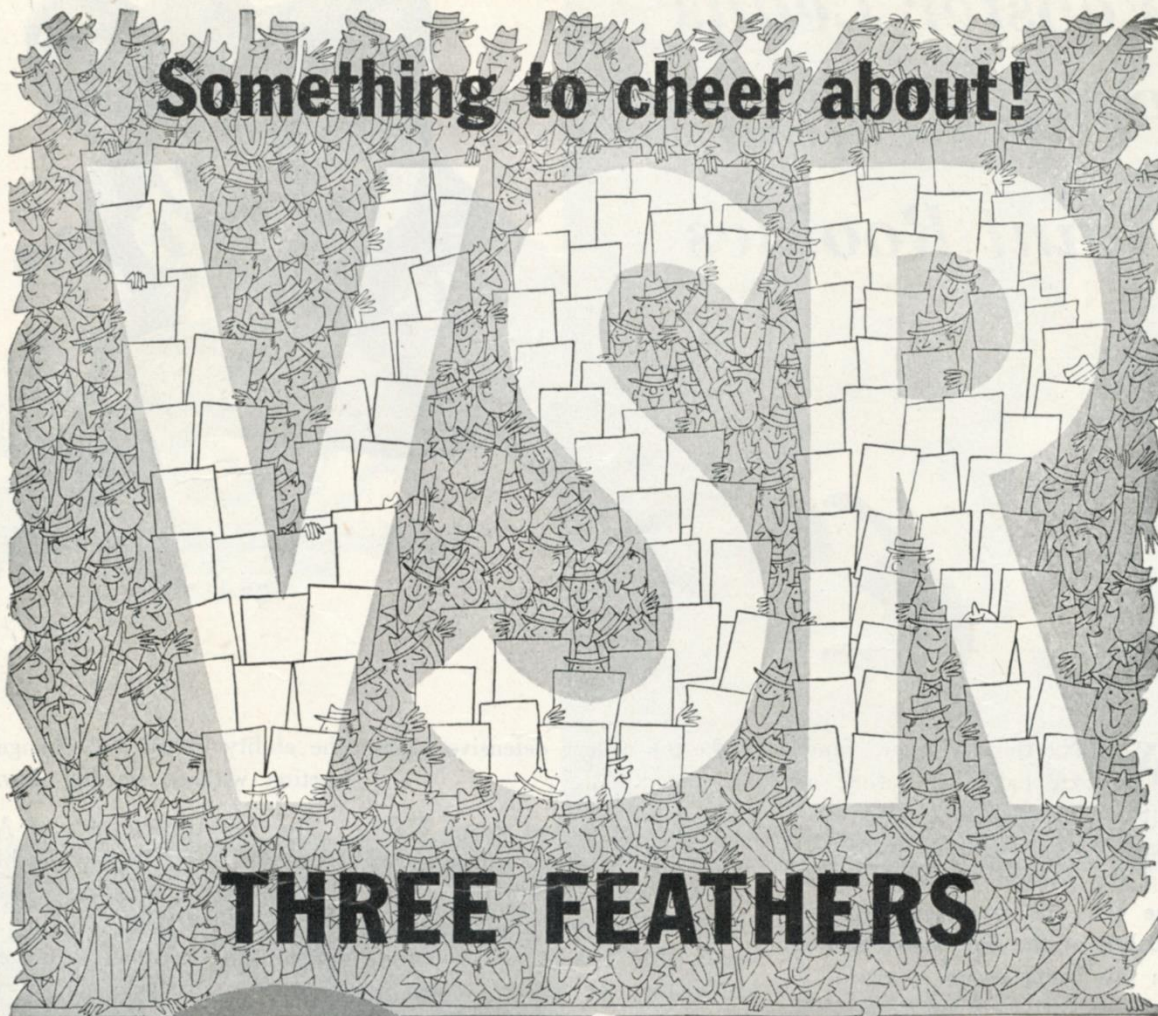
Other observers have called him a "slasher." One thing is certain, he is a terror in an open field. Unlike most halfbacks, he is a good plunger in short yardage situations, too.

A quiet, soft-spoken young man, who shies away from the spotlight off the field, Webster has tremendous determination.

In one game he was clipped on the side of the knee and had to be helped from the field. It looked like a serious injury. Dr. Francis Sweeny, team physician, decided to tell newspapermen that Webster would be "questionable" the following week.

"Don't tell them anything," said Alex, "I'm playing next week. He did."

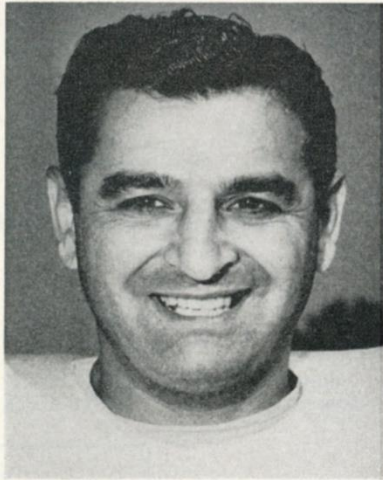

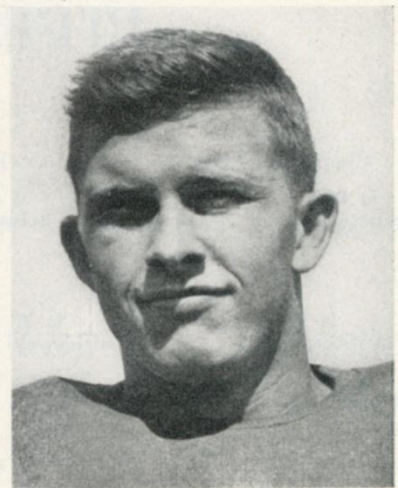
Meet the Giants



Ben Agajanian

Back again to boom kick-offs far down the field and split the uprights with conversion and field goal placements is **Ben Agajanian (8)**. Bootin' Ben scored 75 points last year on 35 extra points (without a miss) and 13 field goals (a Giant record). Agajanian, who lost four toes in an elevator accident, wears a size 10 shoe on his left foot, size 7 on his right. A New Mexico graduate, he hails from Long Beach, Calif., where he operates a sporting goods store off season.

Ray Beck (61), a smashing success as a rookie in 1952, is back with the Giants after two years in military service and seems to be better than ever. The 220-pounder from Georgia Tech is highly prized by Coach Jim Lee Howell for his versatility. He's already this season seen service as an offensive guard, a defensive middle guard and a defensive end. Smart, fast and hard-hitting, he does a good job anywhere along the line.



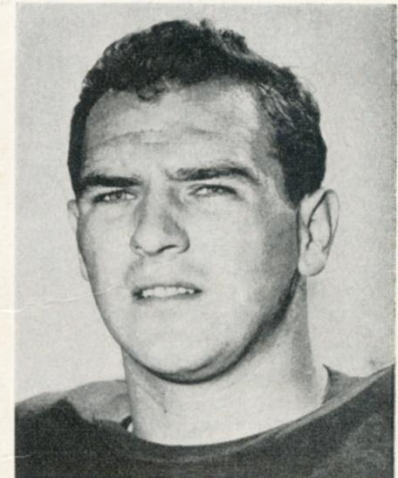

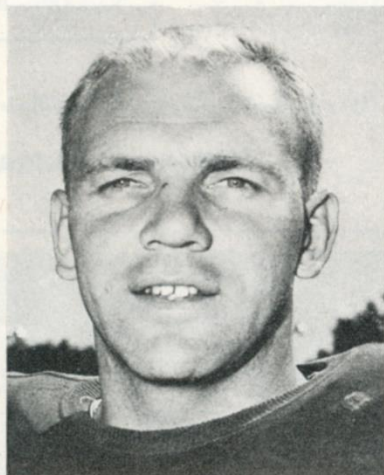
Tom Landry

Tom Landry (49) has the toughest job of any Giant. As a member of Jim Lee Howell's coaching staff, it's his task to set the defensive patterns. As a spoke in the umbrella secondary, he has to translate his plans into action. The 30-year-old Texan seldom can be faulted on either score. A far-ranging pass defender and deadly tackler, he has been one of the grid-iron's best defensive backs for years. He's also the Giants' No. 1 punter.

Ray Wietecha (55) was the iron man of the 1954 Giants. As regular offensive center, occasional line-backer and a member of all the special units that are used in place-kicking, punting and kick-off situations, he played more minutes than any other Giant player. The Northwestern graduate, a Marine officer, can run like a halfback despite his 225 pounds. His speed helps him make his blocks stick. This is his third season at the Polo Grounds.



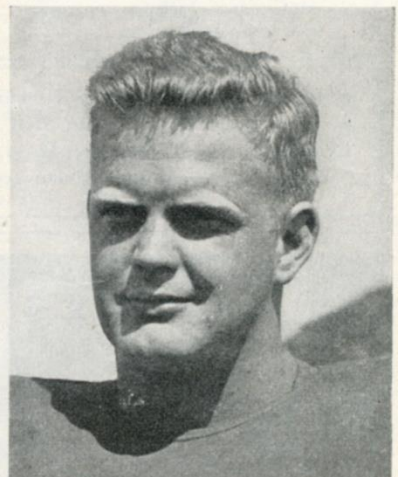

Bill Austin

Bill Austin (60) was one of the youngest players ever to qualify for a regular berth on a National Football League team. The blond Bomber from Oregon State still was short of voting age when he stepped into the Giant line-up at guard in 1950. Only Uncle Sam has been able to displace him. Two years in service interrupted his career. A lot of close observers maintain Bill is the best offensive guard in the NFL. Coach Jim Lee Howell is among his boosters.

Dick Yelvington (74) has been rooting opposing forwards out of the path of Giant ball-carriers for four seasons. The 235-pound Georgia graduate gets off the mark with a sprinter's speed and has the leg drive and strength to keep the door of a hole open once he gets it swinging his way. He is one of the key men in a Giant offensive line that has earned increasing respect around the pro circuit in the last couple of seasons.

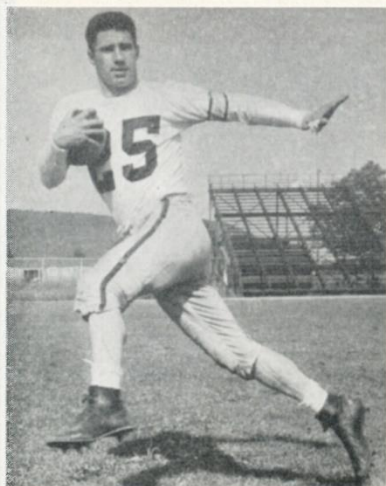

The Pittsburgh Steelers, today's opponent of the Giants, feature a fast backfield and a rugged defensive line.

Their two principal offensive threats are **Lynn Chandnois (49)** and **Ray Mathews (25)**. These veteran halfbacks have bedevilled the Giants—and the rest of the NFL on many occasions.

With another tried-and-true vet-

eran, **Fran Rogel (33)**, at full-back, the Steelers also pack a good punch up the middle. They fortified themselves further at this position by their recent acquisition of **Marion Motley (36)**.

Jim Finks (77), who started in pro football as a defensive half-back, again is running the team. He's a nervy and resourceful signal-caller.

Pittsburgh's pass-catching corps has been bolstered by the addition of **Ed Bernet (83)**, a prize rookie from Southern Methodist. He pairs well with the slick veteran, **Elbie Nickel (81)**.

Fred Broussard (56), a 230-pound rookie from Texas A. & M., has been doing a good job as replacement for **Dick Walsh**, the perennial all-league offensive center who retired to join the Notre Dame coaching staff. **Bob Gaona (72)** and **Frank Varrichione (74)**, the rookie from Notre Dame, stand out at tackle.

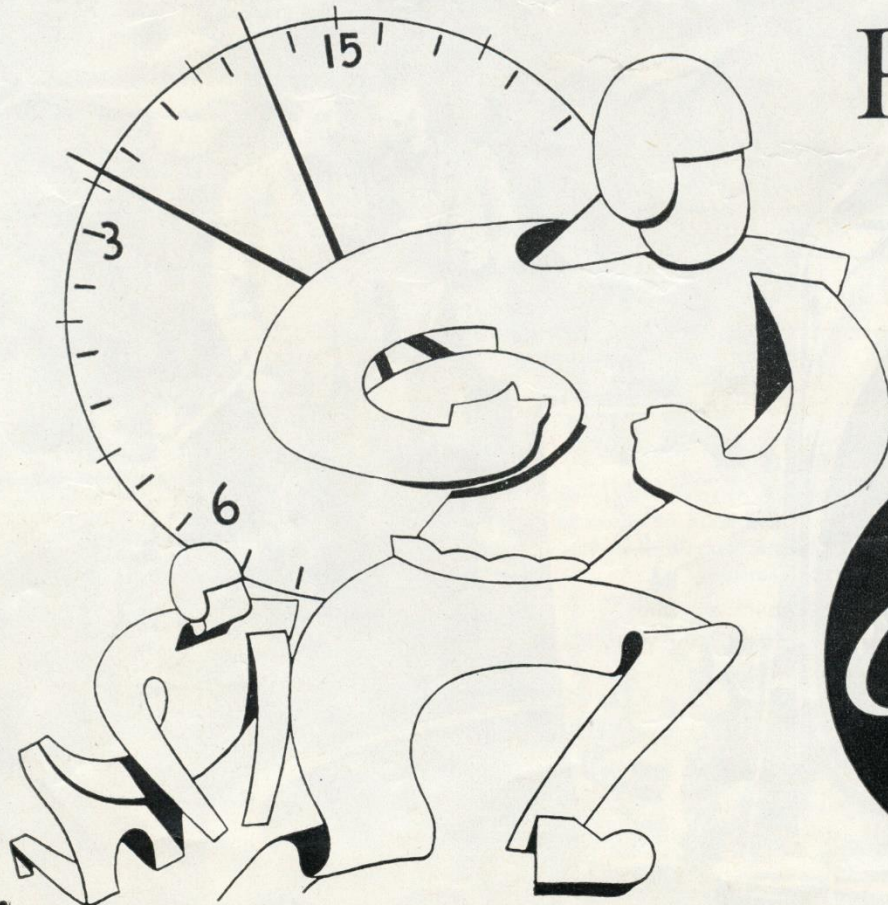
Among the Steelers' defensive stalwarts are **Bill McPeak (84)**, a devastating end; **Dale Dodrill**

Redskins Here Next Sunday

The Washington Redskins, probably the most improved team in the NFL's Eastern Division, will be next Sunday's visitor to the Polo Grounds.

On the basis of a 3-9 record in 1954, the Redskins were not taken seriously in the NFL's 1955 size-

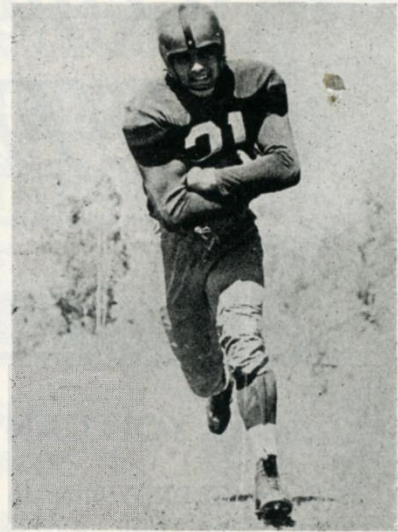
ups. Joe Kuharich's charges proceeded to confound the experts by defeating Cleveland, 27-17, in their opener. They upset Philadelphia, 31-30, the following weekend.

These triumphs stamp the Redskins as a serious challenger for the title in the wide-open Eastern Division race.

The Redskins have three fine quarterbacks: daring Eddie LeBaron, slick Al Dorow and Ralph Guglielmi, the 1955 college player-of-the-year from Notre Dame.

Their running backs include versatile Vic Janowicz, Leo Elter, fleet Bert Zagers, a rookie from Michigan State, Dale Atkeson and Rob Goode, battering 230-pound fullback. They have good pass-receiving ends in Johnny Carson and Ralph Thomas.

A couple of rookies have stiffened the defensive line, a weak spot last year. These newcomers are J. D. Kimmel, 245-pound tackle from Army and Houston, and Ron Marciniak, scrappy 208-

pound middle guard from Kansas State.

From the days when they were the Eastern Division's dominant powers, the Giants and Redskins have specialized in staging thrillers. They promise to carry on this tradition next Sunday.

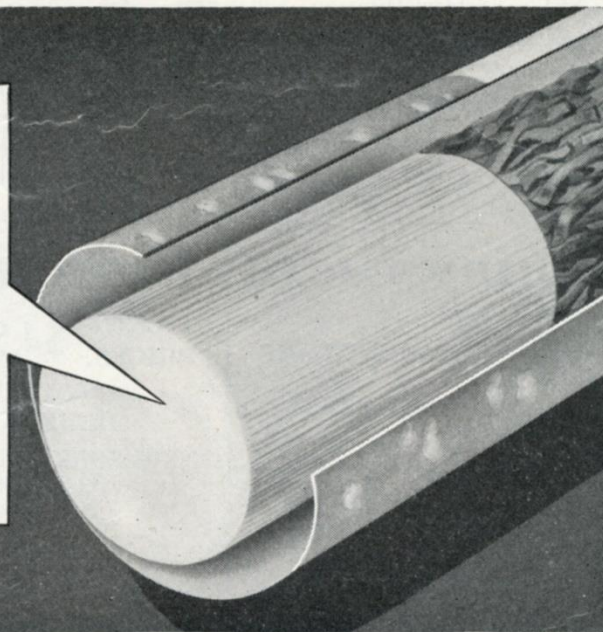
