
GIANT OFFENSIVE ACES: Frank Gifford, Charley Conerly, Kyle Rote, Alex Webster.

All Set for the Big One

TODAY the Giants get their long-awaited return shot at the Cardinals. The Chicago Southsiders are the one foe to have taken the measure of the New Yorkers this season. Catching the Giants by surprise, perhaps, the Cardinals won the first game between the teams by a 35-27 score in Chicago on Oct. 7.

Leadership in the National Football League's Eastern Conference hinges on this battle. The Giants and Cardinals swing into action tied for first place with identical records of five victories and one defeat for the first half of the campaign.

In view of the all-around excellence of the Cardinals, who patently are where they are on merit, this obviously is not a game that the Giants can take lightly.

Coach Jim Lee Howell's squad will need all the offensive finesse and all the defensive stoutness it can muster to pass this searching test.

However, it's comforting to know that the 1956 Giants do possess both these gridiron virtues. This Giant team has been the most exciting and most solid New York pro entry in years.

As the saying goes, "This is a team that can beat you in a lot of ways."

With Frank Gifford and Alex Webster carrying the mail behind the crisp blocking of a quick, young line, it has an inside-and-outside running punch that has earned deserved respect.

With Charley Conerly and Don Heinrich throwing to a swift corps of receivers led by that brilliant clutch catcher, Kyle Rote, it has a highly efficient passing game.

It runs a wide variety of play sequences and pass patterns from its basic T-with-flankers formation. Ben Agajanian and Don Chandler provide sound kicking in support of the running and passing attack.

When the Giant offense stalls, which has to happen now and then in playing a twelve-game schedule against foes of National League caliber, the defense has picked up the slack. You will recall that it was the defensive platoon that dominated in the victory over Philadelphia in the last Giant appearance here.


Andy Robustelli, Dick Modzelewski, Jim Katcavage and Sam

Huff have stiffened a powerful defensive line that includes an outstanding young tackle in huge Rosy Grier. Harland Svare and ball-hawking Bill Svoboda are quick-reacting line-backers who raise havoc with their gap-shooting sallies into opposing backfield.

The back line led by Emlen Tunnell is vigilantly resistant to passes and comes up fast against running plays.

This recital of Giant virtues does not necessarily spell out a victory over the Cardinals, whose own assets are striking. But it emphasizes the fact that this Giant team is eminently qualified to be participating in this key contest of the Eastern Conference race.

Win, lose or draw, it's the best Giant team of the past decade—and maybe longer.

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Two Ways to Reach Same Goal

FOOTBALL experts have begun to wonder out loud when a team has had a pair of halfbacks as talented as the Giants' Frank Gifford and Alex Webster. There's no question about it, this tandem ranks among the best of our time.

How do you defend against fast, elusive guys, 205 and 212 pounds respectively, who have the power to drive for first downs inside tackle and the speed to go all the way outside? To complicate matters, both are talented pass-receivers and Gifford has been known to throw a pass here and there.

With all their points of similarity, there's a world of difference in the ways that Gifford and Webster reached their present lofty stature. Gifford was born with a silver football in his mouth, as it were. Webster had to work long and hard to convince people he wasn't football pewter.

At Bakersfield (Calif.) High, Gifford was so good that college scouts flocked from all over. Frank chose Southern Cal. As a sophomore, he played defense. As a

junior and senior, he moved in as tailback or T quarterback on offense. He was a good one. He had only three of 111 passes intercepted in three varsity seasons.

He was gifted, good looking—and lucky. U. S. C. was to play California. The game would be nationally televised. Journalists flocked to the Cal campus. Magazine picture stories on the Cal team were planned. No one considered S. C.

But Gifford gained 165 yards and raced 69 yards for a touchdown to give the Trojans an upset victory over the Bears. The plotted stories were hastily revised into paean of praise for the handsome, talented Gifford, and Frank became everybody's All-America.

"You have to be lucky to make All-America," Frank says. Having a good season isn't enough. I got a good break on those stories. The following week S. C. came to New York to play Army. I had another good day. Those two games did it."

That was by no means the end of Gifford's triumphs. He played sixty minutes in the East-West game, the All-Star game and was the Giants' No. 1 draft choice. He was a star immediately in pro ball, too, feeling his way as a rookie in '52, playing both offensively and defensively the following year and as an offensive halfback since.

Meanwhile, Webster had journeyed south from Kearny, N. J., to play North Carolina State. He was good, if not polished, but he hit State at a low point in its fortunes. Alex's class was not apparent in the final scores. He remembers more than one game spent "standing in the end zone catching kick-offs."

In 1952 Webster was drafted twelfth by the Washington Redskins. Even players drafted that low get every chance to make the pro teams. But Curly Lambeau, who expected nothing from Webster, tried him on defense and saw nothing. Before the season opened, Alex was cut.

He was discouraged, jobless and broke. His wife was expecting a baby. So he took his family home and wired Peahead Walker, coach

of the Montreal Alouettes: "Cut by Redskins. In good shape. If you need a halfback, can give recommendations."

Walker once coached Wake Forest, remembered Webster, and wired him to come ahead. As an offensive back, Alex tore the Canadian League apart. In 1954 he led in touchdowns, ball carrying, scoring, was named most valuable back and most popular Alouette.


Last year the Giants persuaded him to play closer to home. He promptly led the Giants (in a tougher league) in almost as many departments.

Eventually the Redskins came to New York. Webster was ready—or was he? The week before he had been nailed hard at the line of scrimmage. Helped from the field with a concussion, he was hospitalized for four days. Dr. Francis J. Sweeny listed him as "doubtful" against the Redskins. "Nonsense," scoffed Alex, "I'm not going to miss this one."

All he did was run 53 and 41 yards, for two touchdowns. The Giants won easily.





Meet the Giants

Sam Huff (70), whose proper given name is Robert Lee Huff, was the Giants' No. 3 draft choice last winter. His rookie showing indicates that the Giant selectors made no mistake. The stalwart West Virginia graduate, named as a tackle on four 1955 All-America teams, has done an outstanding job as an emergency replacement for Ray Beck as defensive middle guard. Fast afoot for a 230-pounder, Sam also is serviceable on offense.


Jim Katcavage (75) was such an eye-catcher at Dayton last season that the Giants named him as their No. 4 draft selection. A glowing recommendation from Hughey Devore, then coaching the Flyers, had much to do with his selection over more celebrated players. Devore, now in charge of the Eagles, undoubtedly now wishes he had not been so generous in his praise. Katcavage, a rawboned 225-pounder from Philadelphia, has performed impressively for the Giants as a defensive end and tackle.

Don Chandler (34) has made it plain to Giant followers why he was the nation's leading collegiate punter in 1955. The rookie from Florida certainly is one of the most graceful kickers ever seen in these parts. He sends the ball booming 60 or more yards down the field without apparent effort. He's also rapidly developing as a place-kicker under the tutelage of Ben Agajanian. Don is more than just a kicking specialist. He's a talented all-around offensive back, too, although there has been no occasion to use him that way yet.


Roosevelt Grier (76) is the biggest of all the Giants at 275 pounds—and he is just beginning to get his full strength. A rookie star in 1955, Rosy has developed into one of the NFL's top defensive tackles. As nimble as a ballet dancer for all his great bulk, Grier was a champion shotputter and discus thrower at Penn State. A resident of nearby Linden, N. J., Rosy has thoughts of becoming a professional entertainer. He is a highly talented jazz singer and pianist.

Ed Hughes (48), a three-year pro from the University of Tulsa, was acquired by the Giants from the Los Angeles Rams in a pre-season trade. He has proved an excellent addition to Jim Lee Howell's defensive unit. His vigilant coverage of pass receivers and sharp tackling from the left corner position of the defensive secondary has been a big factor in the general stiffening of the Giant defense.


Harland Svare (84), another Giant acquisition from the Los Angeles Rams, joined the New Yorkers in 1955. A four-year pro, from Washington State, he does a bang-up job as a defensive end and line-backer. Quick on his feet and a deadly tackler, he has been particularly effective at "shooting the gap" to smother rival ball-carriers behind the line of scrimmage. Svare is nicknamed "Swede" but it's a base canard. He's actually of Norwegian descent.



Looking Over the Cardinals

When you study their personnel closely, it isn't so much of a surprise that the Cardinals, who haven't had a real contender since their championship team of 1947-48, are keeping in the thick of the fight for the National League's Eastern Division title.

The Chicago Southsiders, capably coached by an "old pro" staff headed by Ray Richards, are loaded with talent. Their backfield is particularly impressive. In fact, many Cardinal followers rate the current backfield corps as superior to the club's famed 1947-48 "Dream Backfield" of Paul Christman, Charley Trippi, Marshall Goldberg and Pat Harder.

In **Ollie Matson**, 210-pound left halfback, the Cardinals have one of the authentic greats of this football era. The big fellow from San Francisco may be the fastest man in cleats. He was a sprinter on the 1952 Olympic team. Pairing with Matson at the other halfback is **Dave Mann**, another fleet runner and pass-catcher, and one of the league's best punters.

Lamar McHan, a rawboned former single wing tailback out of

Arkansas, is the quarterback and his development as a T formation signal-caller is perhaps the key to the Cardinals' rise. McHan is a running, as well as a passing, threat and the Cards occasionally use split T sequences to capitalize on his ball-carrying ability.

Fullback is manned by **Johnny Olszewski**, a riproaring runner from California who has showed well before here. There are ex-


cellent spare parts for this dynamic starting quartet. Among them are **Joe Childress**, Auburn's 1955 All-America fullback, and **Frank Bernardi**, a rookie speed demon from Colorado.

The Cardinals are well stacked with offensive ends, also. **Max Boydston**, the 1954 All-America from Oklahoma who was out with injuries last season, is back in action along with slick **Gern Nagler** and the veteran **Don Stonesifer**.

In **Dick (Night Train) Lane** the Chicagoans have one of the best defensive backs in the business. **Pat Summerall** provides them with dependable place-kicking.

Their king-sized lines are bolstered by such rugged operatives as **Jack Simmons**, **Len Teuws**, **Jack Jennings**, **Doug Hogland** and **Tony Pasquesi**.

No, come to think of it, it would be a surprise if this wasn't in the running. The Giants certainly have reason to respect the Cardinals. The New Yorkers, perhaps the unconvinced, ran into a 35-27 ambush at Comiskey Park.

Giant Jottings

Frank Gifford and Ed Modzelewski were the Longines Award winners in the Giants' last home game against the Philadelphia Eagles. Gifford was tabbed as the outstanding offensive performer, while Modzelewski was cited for his work on defense... Bobby Epps, who sparkled at fullback for the Giants last fall, has been discharged from the Army and may soon be bobbing up in football uniform. He has been working out with the Giants and looks as good as ever.

Ben Agajanian has place-kicking down to such an exact science that he changes his technique in accordance with the distance to be covered. On short kicks, Ben aims to hit the ball low, to raise it in a hurry and get plenty of backspin on it, which helps to hold a kick on line. On long boots, he hits the ball more squarely so, while it doesn't rise or rotate so fast, it will carry a greater distance.

The Golden Knights, representing the Blessed Sacrament Catholic Youth Organization of Newark, N. 


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


