

SHUFFLIN' THE CARDS

The Cards Get The Bonus Pick This Year

Eleven years ago, in 1947, the Bonus Pick became a feature of each National Football League meeting. The reason for the Bonus Pick was to give all teams a chance at a top choice, regardless of where they finished in the standings. It was sort of an equalizer, it gave a team that finished on top a chance to move in on a first choice — instead of waiting until 12 players had been drafted.

Down through the years, from 1947 thru 1949 there were 10 teams, in 1950 there were 13 teams, from 1951 thru 1956 there were 12 clubs in the NFL. Last December there were two teams who hadn't reached in and grabbed the Bonus Pick, the Cards and Green Bay, and, as you know, the Packers came up with Notre Dame's Paul Hornung.

This Year The Cards Get The Bonus Pick

Who will it be? That's a great big fat question which Coach Ray Richards and Managing Director Walter Wolfner haven't decided on as yet. A week ago, when the Cards had an off-day in the schedule Richards and Assistants Bob Nowaskey, Chuck Drulis, Tom Keene and Charley Trippi went to see college games in various sections of the country and see talent first hand.

They were out looking again yesterday and are comparing notes. Will they select a lineman, a back, or an end; will they go for offensive or defensive standouts?

Here's hoping that we have a bit of luck with 1958 draft choices. The Cards this year retained No. 1 choice Jerry Tubbs. Four others were traded due to players received in 1956. One — Tom Maentz, Michigan end — retired, another went to Canada and ten, drafted as futures in the '57 draft, are due to report at camp next year. Others just didn't make it. The Cards went thru 1957 with four rookies — Paul Larson, California quarterback was drafted in 1954; Tackle Dave Lunceford was a "future" choice in 1956, the aforementioned Tubbs, and Tackle Earl "Tiny" Putman, a rookie because of the fact that he hadn't played a league game, although he had been the N.Y. Giants 5th draft choice in 1954.

A year ago at this time the Cards had five victories and two defeats. Going into today's game against the New York Giants the standing is reversed with two wins and five losses. The Cards finished the '56 season with seven wins and five losses.

The reason for the reversal from last season can be traced to the slump in defense. Last year seven opponents could score only 100 points against a stout Cards defense. This year — in the same number of games — the Cards defense has allowed 172 points. On offense the Cards scored 147 points in seven games last season. This year the Cards have scored 140 points, a difference of only seven points.

Last year in seven games — which included splitting even in two games with the Giants, the Cards had a total of 1,268 yards on 315 rushing plays, and a total of 804 yards (net) on 56 pass completions (109) attempts. This year the Cards have 990 yards on 221 rushing plays, and 1,024 yards (net) on 61 pass completions (144 attempts). There is not too much difference in net yards — 2,014 this year and 2,072 last year but there is considerable difference in ball control, time element, etc., with the Cards rushing 94 more times in 1956 first seven contests.

Individually the difference lies with Ollie Matson who carried the ball 116 times for 576 yards and Johnny Olszewski who went 364 yards in 90 carries a year ago. To date this season Ollie has 436 yards in 89 carries and Johnny O has 190 yards in 58 carries. A quick bit of subtraction shows that Ollie and Johnny O have totaled 314 yards less than they did a year ago. Ollie has averaged about the same on each attempt but Olszewski had a four-yard average last season and now has 3.3. Ironically, Matson has seven TD's at present — six on rushing plays and one on a pass, while last year he didn't have any TD's rushing, had one on a 16-yard pass play and another on a 105-yard kickoff return for a total of two for the seven games.

Everybody has been saying it's a funny season. Well, the Cards will second that.

MEET THE CARDINALS

LINDON CROW, Defensive Halfback, U. Southern California, 3rd season with Chicago Cardinals. Was top man in National Football League in pass interceptions last year with 12. Lindon was a great player on offense at USC and regarded as the top collegiate pass defense man. Born April 4, 1933 in Denison, Tex. Was an all-round athlete in high school at Corcoran, Calif., picking up 13 letters in four sports. Has ran the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds and the 220 in 22.4. At USC, in three years, he carried the ball 149 times for 666 yards, caught 13 passes for 412 yards, intercepted 8 for 237 yards return, returned 15 punts 100 yards and 13 kickoffs 340 yards, and scored 12 TD's. Twice selected to All-Pacific Coast Conference team and also many All-America teams. Played in two Rose Bowl and one Senior Bowl games. Outstanding college game was a 60-minute affair against California in which he scored three TD's. Co-Captain at USC in '55. Cards 2nd draft choice in '55 and has played defense only. Married Maureen McMasters, they have one child and make their home in Encino, Calif. Is 6-1, weighs 187.

LAMAR McHAN, Quarterback, U. of Arkansas, 4th year with Chicago Cardinals. Born Dec. 16, 1932 in Lake Village, Ark. Cards 1st draft choice in 1954 and was immediately given assignment as a "T" starting quarterback. Had three-year total offense record at Arkansas, ringing up a total of 3,578 yards while playing the "T" and also tailback in the Single Wing. Receiving Home Coming Award two years in succession, led the Conference in scoring and received the Southwest Sportsman Award and the Heisman Trophy after the '53 season. In three years with the Cards Mac has completed 254 of 614 passing attempts, good for 3,719 yards and 27 TD's. Has carried the ball 148 times for 507 yards and 8 TD's. Last year was his best. Coach Ray Richards used the Split T as a basic offense and Mac passed 152 times, completed 72 for 1,159 yards and 10 TD's. Carried the ball 58 times for 161 yards and scored 5 TD's. Mac's 4 TD tosses against the Philadelphia Eagles was tops in the NFL last year and his percentage of touchdowns per completion—one out of every seven, was also an NFL best. Is 6-1, weighs 197. Still makes his home in Lake Village.

RAY RICHARDS, Head Coach

Quiet, mild-mannered, soft-spoken Ray Richards is starting his third season as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Was assistant coach in 1954 and became head man in 1955. Since then the Cards have moved upward. In 1954 the Cards won 2 and lost 10. In '55 the Cards won 4, lost 7, and tied one. Last year the Cards won 7, lost 5 and a spread of 16 point would have made the record read — won 10 lost 2.

Richards, has been in football — high school, college and pro ball, since he was 16 years old. A bit of quick mathematics reveals that the new Cards head man has been active as a player and coach for 34 years, inasmuch as he is now 50 years old.

In 1930 he started his pro career playing with the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets in the National League. In 1933 he was with Chicago, with Detroit in 1934 and was back the following two years.

Late in the 1936 season he joined the newly-formed Los Angeles Bulldogs team as player-coach. He went back to college in 1938, taking a job as Line Coach at UCLA and remaining there for ten years during which time two of his teams went to the Rose Bowl. The latter was considered quite a feat inasmuch as UCLA was growing up and not in a class with USC and other schools in the Pacific Coast Conference.

He moved to Pepperdine College in Los Angeles as line coach in 1948 and was head coach the following two years. In 1951 he got back into pro ball as Line Coach for the Los Angeles Rams.

Richards did a terrific job with the Los Angeles line, moving nine rookies into the offensive and defensive combinations which went on to win the world's championship in 1951 and lost to Detroit in a divisional playoff in 1952.

There isn't any question but what Richards should be a great success as a head coach in professional ball. He has the right philosophy, temperament and has the ability to coordinate the efforts of his players and assistant coaches.

BOB NOWASKEY, End Coach

Nowaskey starts his fourth season as an assistant coach with the Chicago Cardinals. Bob was born in Everson, Pa., February 8, 1918; moved to Scottdale, Pa., where he attended high school and starred in basketball and football. Was given a basketball scholarship at George Washington U. and then proceeded to be one of the collegiate world's outstanding defensive ends. In 1940-41-42 he played here in Chicago. In 1943 Bob started a three-year hitch in the Navy. With the Los Angeles Dons in the All-America

Conference in 1946 and 1947, traded to the Baltimore Colts in 1948.

CHUCK DRULIS, Line Coach

Chuck is in his second season as an assistant coach with the Cardinals but is a familiar face in Chicago due to gaining All-Pro guard honors in 1948 and 1949 while playing here in Chicago from 1945 thru first half of the '50 season when he retired because he was in the automobile business. Chuck was born March 8, 1919 in Girardville, Pa. All-Eastern guard at Temple U. in 1941. In Service 1942 until 1945. Returned to pro ball, following retirement mid-season 1950, with Green Bay Packers as assistant coach, with Packers through 1953 and joined the Philadelphia Eagles as assistant in 1954, and remained through the season.

TOM KEANE, Assistant Coach

It was inevitable that Tom Keane would become a coach. During his eight seasons of competition — he was injured prior to the start of the '56 schedule which would have been his ninth year, he was one of the National Football League's top defensive stars. Born in Bellaire, O., Sept. 7, 1926. Quarterbacked Ohio State to a National championship (Win 9, lost 0) in 1944. Also played at West Virginia U. Started with Los Angeles Rams in 1948. Played with Dallas Texans and Baltimore Colts. Cards got him from Colts in player deal in 1955. Best season as pass thief was 1953 when he intercepted 11, while with the Colts. First season as coach. Married and has a daughter five years old and a son who is one year old. Makes his home in Chicago.

CHARLEY TRIPPI, Assistant Coach

The name "Charley Trippi," one of the most famous in the history of football since he first hit the headlines nationally as a member of U. of Georgia's Rose Bowl team in 1941, was the Chicago Cardinals first draft choice in 1945. Joined the Cards in 1947 and sparked the team to a world's pro championship. Now, after nine seasons as one of the top players in the National Football League, he continues his association with the Chicago Cardinals as an assistant coach. Trippi was born in Pittston, Pa., Dec. 14, 1922, and started football career as a center at Pittston high. Started collegiate career at Georgia but was interrupted for Service with the Fourth Air Force. Returned to Georgia after his discharge and was an All-America selection during the '45 and '46 seasons. Has a record for playing with the Tribune College All-Stars which will probably never be equalled. He competed as a player in four games and was voted the Most Valuable Player Award for the 1945 game.

LEO SANFORD, Linebacker-Center, Louisiana Tech., 7th season with Chicago Cardinals. Leo is one of the greatest linebackers in the history of the National Football League. Leo was born Oct. 4, 1929 in Dallas, Tex., and the Sanford family moved to Shreveport, La., where Leo starred in football at Fair Park High. Earned four letters in football at Louisiana Tech, captained the team in his senior year and was All-Conference center and made Tommy Harmon's All-America team. As far as the Cards are concerned he's been an All-America every one of the six seasons since the Cards made him their 7th draft choice in 1951. Proudest moments were scoring touchdowns against the SF 49ers and Chicago Bears in 1953. Is sporting goods salesman for Griffin Sports Goods Co. in Shreveport. Married Myrna Mims of Shreveport and they have a four-year old son. Has B.S. Degree in Business Administration. Is 6-1, weighs 230.

BOB KONOFSKY, Guard, U. of Wisconsin, 2nd year with Chicago Cardinals. Bob's dad is Chief of Police of Cicero, Ill. Bob was born in Chicago, August 19, 1934, and starred in football and wrestling at Morton High in Cicero, captaining both teams. At Wisconsin, in addition to being a great football player, was the Big Ten Conference wrestling champ three times and NCAA champion twice. Credits his dad, who played semi-pro ball for ten years, as being most helpful in his football career. Bob has played center, end and guard and is particularly proud of scoring three touchdowns while playing end in a college freshman game at Wisconsin. Has B.S. Degree in Economics. Frat: Phi Gamma Delta. Married Joan Hasel of Lyons, Ill., a cheerleader at Morton High, and they have a youngster. Is 6-2, weighs 246.

TONY PASQUESI, Defensive Tackle and Middle Guard, Notre Dame, 3rd year with Chicago Cardinals. Born June 13, 1933 in Chicago, where he attended St. Philip High and was picked All-City and All-State. Enrolled at Notre Dame and was an outstanding defensive lineman in his freshman and sophomore years. However, when the single platoon system was introduced Tony didn't see too much action. The Cards had great reports on his defensive ability and he was

a 3rd draft choice in 1955. Seemed to be headed for "Rookie of the Year" honors in '55 when he became the Cards starting middle guard, but he suffered a knee injury in the fourth game of the season and was out until near the end of the season. Still makes his home in Dundee. Has been back at Iowa State, seeking his degree and helping coach his Alma Mater.



Was All-America and All-Southern in football and All-State and All-Southwest in basketball while in high school and was All-Southwest Conference and picked on Chicago Tribune All-America second team in football while in college. 

Washington high and was a four-sport star, the same as he was at Sam Huston. Great pass receiver in high school, caught 110 for 30 TD's, and in college, caught 134 for 16 TD's. Scored 5 TD's in first game with St. Louis (Mo.) semi-pro team. Has run the 100-yard dash in 9.5 seconds. Signed with the Cards as a Free Agent. Despite the fact that his forte in high school, college and semipro ball was offense, Jim has played defense exclusively since joining the Cardinals for the 1955 season. He is 6-2, weighs 190.

PAT GEORGE SUMMERALL, Defensive End and Placement Kicking Specialist, U. of Arkansas, fifth year with Chicago Cardinals, sixth in National Football League. Was Detroit Lions second draft choice in 1952. Born May 10, 1930 in Lake City, Fla. where he attended Columbia high and came up with 13 letters, four each in basketball and tennis, three in football and two each in track and baseball. In pro ball Pat has been a defensive end exclusively despite a great record as a pass receiver in high school and college. Pat married Katharine Jacobs of Lake City, his high school sweetheart. Has a Masters and Bachelors degree in Physical Education. Is 6-4, weighs 230.

PAUL LARSON, Quarterback, U. of California, 1st year with the Chicago Cardinals. EARL PUTMAN, Center-Tackle, Arizona State at Tempe, 1st year with Chicago Cardinals. At 6-6 and weighing 300 pounds will be heaviest man in National Football League. Born Jan. 10, 1932 in Cincinnati where he attended Hughes High and competed in football and track. Earned two football letters at Arizona State and also in track. In Service at Fort Ord, Calif., competed in football and track. Tossed shot 54' 1" and discuss 166' 7". New York Giants 5th draft choice in '54. In Service last two years. Played in Canada last year. Married Vivian Stocks, Tuba City, Ariz., and they have a boy and girl. Lives in Tempe, Ariz.

DAVE MANN, Offensive End and Right Halfback, Oregon State, third year with Chicago Cardinals. Born June 2, 1932 in Berkeley, Calif. 

Jim Lee Howell, Head Coach

The Giants' Jim Lee Howell is a modest, soft spoken man who gives so much credit to others, there is little left for himself. If you ask him the secrets of his success as coach of the World Champions, he will laugh in a friendly way and tell you: "A famous coach once told me that the job of a head coach is to keep order and see that the balls are pumped up!"

Then he will tell you what fine players he is fortunate enough to have and will begin to speak of the contributions of his assistants.

Modesty is genuine with Howell, as is his booming laugh. But he is an intelligent, hard working man. A careful observer will note the qualities which make Howell successful; executive ability, a technical mastery of football, and a facile handling of men. It was Eddie Price, one of the Giants' all time great backs, who said a few years ago: "You can say this, we'd do anything for Jim!"

Not only players, but assistant coaches too are giving all they have for this once lanky end from Arkansas. The results: in three seasons Howell has rebuilt a fifth place team into one which trampled the mighty Chicago Bears 47-7 last December, to win the World Championship.

The winning football coaches are generally humorless, hand wringing types, with little interest in anything but football. Howell resembles these men only in results.

Howell's interests are wide. As a politician he was once elected to the Arkansas state legislature. As a soldier he was a Marine company commander in the South Pacific during the war. Currently he raises rice and beef cattle in Arkansas and flowers, as a hobby, in Englewood. He is the father of two boys.

The Assistant Coaches

Head Coach Jim Lee Howell has chosen his staff for very particular jobs. The four assistants, Vince Lombardi, Ken Kavanaugh, Tom Landry and John Dell Isola are alike in their technical mastery of the game based on experience as former great players; in their careful study of the constantly changing maneuvers of modern football; and in their executive ability as handlers of men. But to each of them Coach Howell has delegated widely distinct areas of responsibility.

Lombardi, once one of Fordham's famed Seven Blocks of Granite and now the Giants' offense coach, is Howell's No. 1 aide. Howell may be considered as commanding

officer, with Lombardi as his Executive officer both on the practice field and on the bench during games.

Basically, it is Lombardi who designs those intricate plays which result in long runs on Sunday afternoons. He not only plots and diagrams the movements of the offense, he teaches it in blackboard sessions and on the practice field, occasionally sharpening a particular play right up to game time. He also gives attention to the blocking, faking, timing and conditioning of offensive backs.

Kavanaugh, the End Coach, has charge of the passing attack. In concert with Lombardi he designs many of the pass patterns and teaches them to ends and backs. Ken also reveals to his players, some of the tricks he picked up at L.S.U. and in eight seasons with the Chicago Bears. He ought to know a few. He is the fourth most effective pass catcher in League history, making a touchdown with approximately every third ball he caught.



Landry, Coach of Defense, directs primarily the defensive backfield and secondarily the defensive line. In the old days, Landry's task was somewhat easier because one of his players always understood instructions perfectly—Landry himself. Tom retired as an active player prior to last season, but proved himself an effective a teacher from the bench as he had been from halfback. The Giants' defense seemed smotheringly effective, as always.

Dell Isola, one of the great pro linemen of all time, played with the Giants as a running guard from 1934 to 1940. He was small, scarcely more than 200 pounds, but he was chunky, rough, and fiercely competitive. He came out of Fordham as center and MVP in '33, only to find Mel Hein a fixture at center with the Giants. So Dell shifted to guard. He was All-League in 1939, and in those days only 11 All-League players a year were chosen.

He was a fiery type player, always being assigned to handle the other teams' tough guys. There are many funny anecdotes about the way Dell kept enemy linemen "respectful," and the way he watched out for his rookie teammates as they learned the ropes.

As the Giants' new line coach in '57 (he replaces Ed Kolman who resigned because of press of business) Dell Isola is charged with maintaining a mobile and fluent line. In practice he drills his offensive linemen at moving sharply, with the snap of the ball and in blocking effectively.



MEET THE CARDINALS

WOODLEY LEWIS, Defensive Halfback and Kickoff Return Specialist. Was Los Angeles Rams 8th draft choice in 1950. Obtained last year (1956) for draft choice. 2nd year with Chicago Cardinals. Born June 14, 1925. Attended L. A. City College and U. of Oregon. In seven seasons in NFL Lewis has returned 110 kickoffs for 2,624 yards, an average of 23.8 yards for each return. He also set two league marks — most KO Returns with 34 and Most Yards KO Returns, 836, in 1954. Lewis best season as a defensive back, as far as interceptions are concerned, was 1950, his first, when he stole 12 enemy passes which he returned for 275 yards — high for the '50 season. In seven years he has returned 111 punts for 839 yards. Lives in Los Angeles. Is 6 feet, weighs 195.

OLIE MATSON, Left Halfback and greatest ball carrier in National Football League. U. of San Francisco, 5th season with Chicago Cardinals. 1st draft choice in 1952. Born May 1, 1930 in Trinity, Tex. Lived in Houston for awhile and then moved to San Francisco where Olie was a track and football star in high school, scoring 17 TD's and running the 100-yard dash in 9.6 seconds and the 220 in 21.4. Moved into U. of San Francisco and his ball carrying feats have become a legend. School gained national attention and Matson became a unanimous All-America selection. In three years at USF Olie carried the ball 547 times for 3,166 yards and 41 TD's. Matson had devoted his time to football but decided after the '51 season that he would join the U. S. Olympic track team. Due to the fact that he hadn't been serious as far as track was concerned and that he had confined his running to the football field, many people including Dick Templeton, the U. S. track coach, tried to discourage Olie, figuring he didn't have a chance to make the team and that he would feel

badly if he tried and failed to make the grade. Determination prompted Olie to say—"I'll be on the boat." He worked hard, was "on the boat" and was one of the stars of the U. S. team at Helsinki, Finland in the '52 games. Last year was Olie's best in the NFL. Despite the fact that he had more than 350 yards taken away from him—including 83 and 65 yard touchdown runs in the 10-3 "loss" to the Bears—due to offsides or backs in motion, Olie managed to pick up 924 yards on 192 running attempts to finish second in the league and set a new Cardinal record for one season. In four seasons Olie has carried the ball 497 times for 2,249 yards, caught 77 passes for 1,234 yard returned 38 punts for 470 yards, 65 kickoffs for 1,802 yards and scored 186 points via 31 TD's. Has played in four Pro-Bowl games. Is 6-2, weighs 210.

MAL HAMMACK, Fullback, U. of Florida, 2nd year with Chicago Cardinals. Regarded one of the outstanding prospects in the National Football League. Born June 19, 1933 in Roscoe, Texas where he attended high school and still makes his home. Mal played baseball, basketball and football in high school but confined his efforts to the latter two sports in college. Mal enrolled at Arlington (Tex.) Jr. College and transferred to U. of Florida where he became a great offensive and defensive player. Described as "savage linebacker and outstanding blocker." Was the Cards 3rd draft choice in 1955 and proceeded to prove that the Cards didn't make any mistake drafting him that high. He's a rough competitor, is in good shape all the time, and is fired with the ambition to be the best fullback in the NFL. In 1955, playing for the Cardinals he carried the ball 51 times for 160 yards and two TD's, caught five passes for 13 yards and returned two kickoffs 32 yards. Was All-Service fullback last year. Frat: Phi Delta Theta. Is 6-2, weighs 205.


