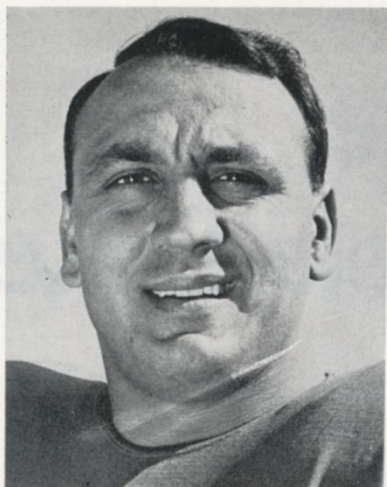

... Stopped the Browns

THE percentages probably are against the Giants beating the Browns again today. Who in this league ever beats a rival three times in a row? For that matter, how often does a club get a chance to beat anyone three times in a row? It takes a play-off like today's to create such an opportunity.

However, good things, like bad things, have a way of coming in threes, which creates a little percentage in favor of the Giants. And . . . so much for percentage and numerology.

It seems more apropos to base hope on the unquenchable spirit and great resourcefulness of this Giant team that has accomplished so much in the face of such great adversity.

These qualities that have made the unsung 1958 Giants a beyond-the-wire contender for football's world championship never were in more glowing evidence than at the snow-whipped Stadium last Sunday.

When Cleveland popped Jimmy Brown up the middle for 65 yards and a touchdown the first time it swung into action from scrimmage, only the diehards in the assemblage of 65,000 gave our boys a chance.

Pat Summerall's 46-yard field goal in the second period supplied only slight encouragement. The Giants, with only four sound legs among its three running backs, could gain ground only in nibbling bites. The Browns were gobbling it up in big chunks. It

seemed only a matter of time before the dam would break.

However, the hard-bitten Giant defensive team valiantly held the dike. All that Cleveland could net out of its offensive domination was a 22-yard field goal by Lou Groza four minutes before the intermission.

The turning point came when the Giants spilled Bobby Freeman on his attempted sweep off a faked field goal after the Browns had

driven from the second-half kick-off to a first down on the 18.

The Giant offensive unit then seizes the initiative. A 35-yard march pushed the Browns deep into their own territory as the third period ran out and, when Andy Robustelli and Co. jolted Cleveland loose from the ball at the start of the fourth period, the Giants struck.

Two dazzling running passes by Frank Gifford—to Kyle Rote for 38 yards and to Bob Schnelker, all alone in the end zone, for 9 put the ball over and the score was tied.

However, in their dormie situation, a tie was no good to the Giants. There still was work to be done and resolutely they bent to the task. They marched smartly to Cleveland's 25 on their next time with the ball. Then, as the stands groaned, Summerall narrowly missed a 32-yard field goal.

But five minutes still were left. Inside of two, the Giants had the ball again in Cleveland territory, on the 41. Charley Conerly tried to pass into striking range but two accurate tosses through the swirling snow glanced off numbed fingers and on fourth down the Giants still were on the 41.

That left it up to Summerall. Gritting his teeth against the pain of a badly bruised kicking leg, Pat got off the boot of his life, sending the ball high and far over the crossbar from 49 yards.

You have to respect a team that does things like that. Go, Giants, Go!

GENIUS takes many different forms. Jim Lee Howell is a master of at least two of them. He gets things done—and well. In a highly public walk of life, he also contrives to keep himself in the background. In his case, that takes an exceptional brand of genius.

The Giant head coach is a big man—and it's not his 6 feet 6 inches and present noncombatant weight of 240 pounds that prompts that statement. At the University of Arkansas, Jim was a brilliant end, a crackerjack basketball player, an honor student and a campus leader of the Class of '36.

After graduation, he contributed six seasons of solid blocking, tackling and clutch catching of Ed Danowski's passes as a Giant player and, while doing so, found time to instruct the ends of Manhattan College's squads.

Between seasons, Jim went home to Lonoke, Ark., where he grew cattle and cotton with such success and, when consulted on local problems (as, soon, he often was), gave such sage counsel that his impressed fellow-citizens sent him up to the Arkansas state senate when he still was in his twenties.

During World War II, he served with distinction in the combat

branch of the Marine Corps. After being mustered out, he played some more for the Giants, became their end coach and also put in several years as head coach at Wagner College, during which the Staten Island School became the scourge of its football set.

For a fellow still in his thirties, this added up to a strikingly varied list of achievements. Still people generally were not prepared for the news when Jim was named head coach of the Giants, soon after the close of the 1953 season. However, it was a calculated move by the Giant front office, which was fully aware of Howell's capabilities.

Big Jim wasted little time in justifying the confidence that had been placed in him. The 1953 Giants had a 3-9 record. Under him in 1954, they improved to 7-5. Every season since has been a winning one and, of course, the Giants took it all in 1956, when they went on from a divisional victory to destroy the vaunted Chicago Bears, 47-7, in the world title game.

The Howell success formula—revolutionary in a field where personality tends to run rampant—is based on organization and teamwork. Jim's first move was to se-

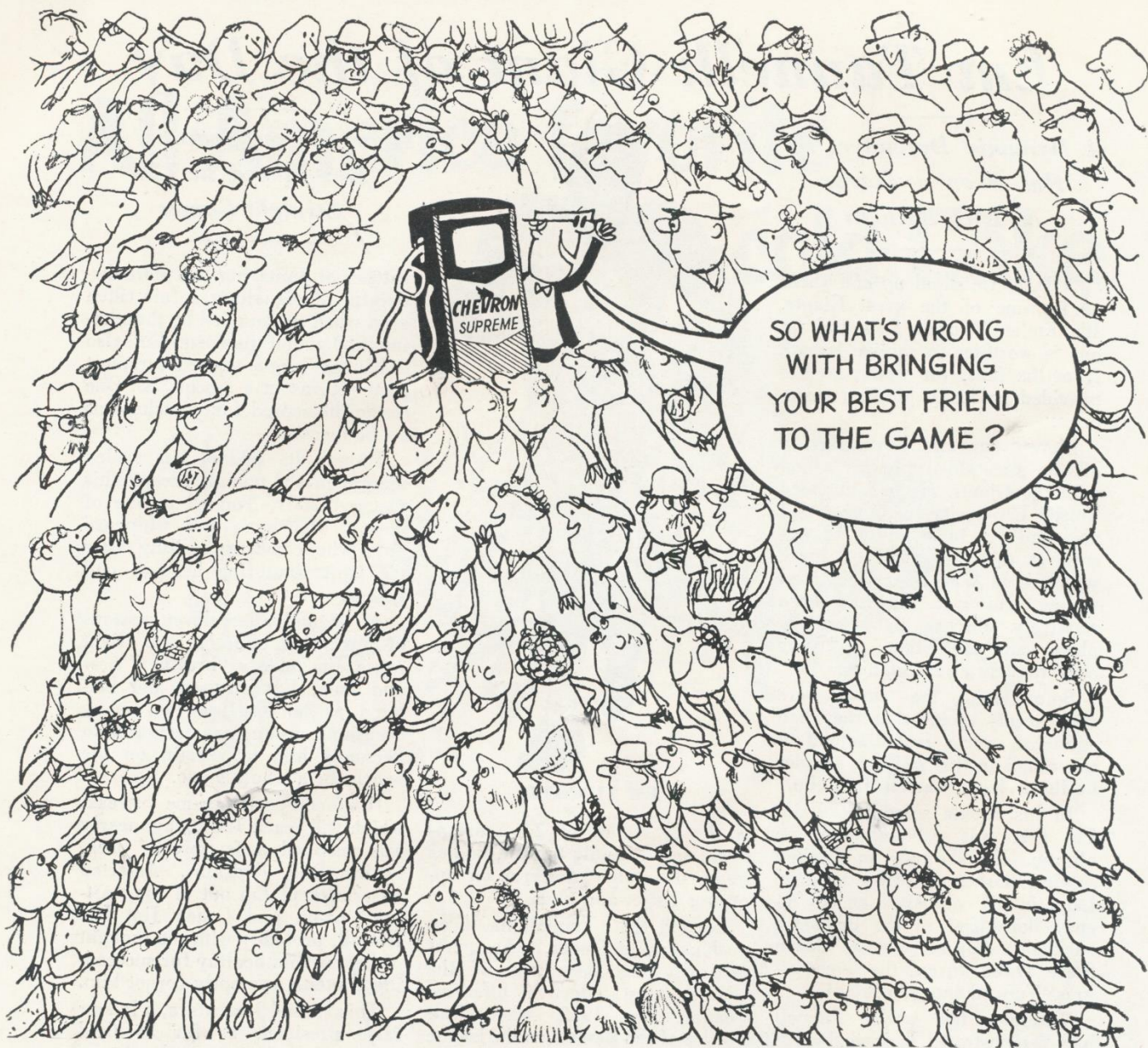
lect as aides a group of young, dedicated, knowing football men like himself and delegate to each full departmental responsibility.

So it is that Vin Lombardi directs the Giant attack; Tom Landry sets the defenses; Ken Kavanaugh instructs the ends and devises the pass patterns and Johnny Dell Isola drills the linemen in their varied chores. The board of strategy also includes Ed Kolman and Allie Sherman, who double as talent scouts and game-day consultants. Until his unfortunate death, Jack Lavelle was a key man, too, for his clairvoyant reports on rival strengths and weaknesses.

Working with a man like Howell, there's extra incentive for every staff member to do better than his best. If the Giants execute a particularly dazzling play or put on a stonewall defensive stand, Jim will say "Ask Lombardi—or Landry—about that. He worked it out. Wasn't it great?" and so on down the line.

It's a system that reflects high credit on the fellow who installed it as well as the gifted colleagues to whom he passes the ball of well-deserved praise at every opportunity. Hat's off to this sturdy staff!

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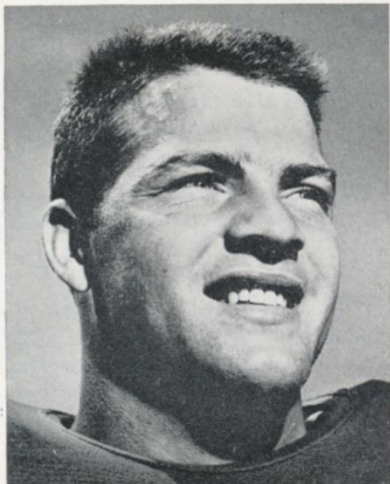


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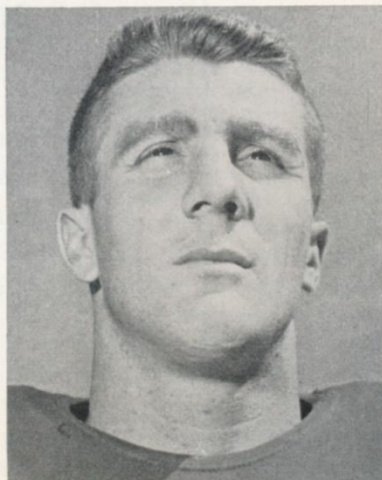

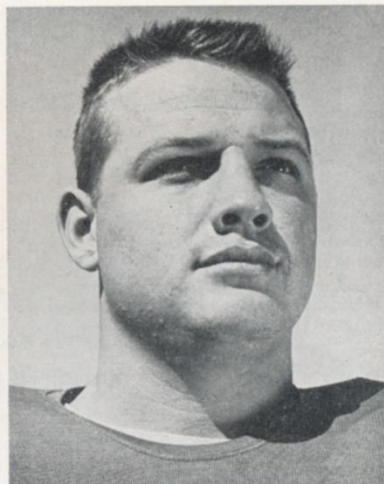
Frank Gifford

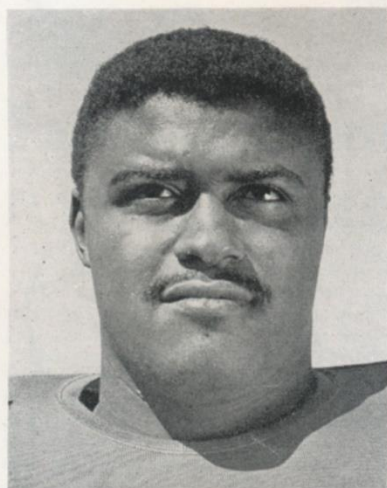
Alex Webster

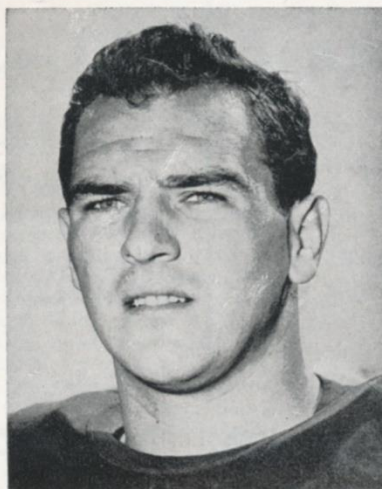
Sam Huff

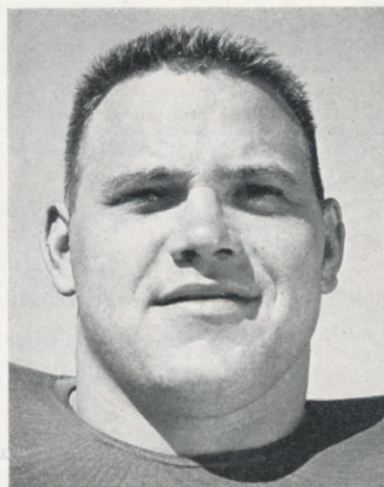
Rosy Grier

Ray Wietecha (55), who played half a dozen positions well for the Giants as a rookie in 1953, was installed as offensive center the following year and has since been a fixture there ever since. The Giants rate him as the best pivotman in the NFL. At Northwestern, Ray also was an outstanding baseball player.

Dick Modzelewski (77), joined the Giants in 1956 after dividing three previous pro seasons between Washington and Pittsburgh. A rugged, willing 260-pounder, he's a fixture on the defensive rush line. THE Giant front office, a loyal and confident body, just happens to have had a band all lined up for today's added attraction of this wild and wonderful Giant season. Those youngsters you will see and hear out there before the game and between the halves hail from Midland Park High School in New Jersey. Give them a rousing Stadium welcome—and don't spare the decibels, either, for the Giants, who "made this occasion necessary," as Yogi Berra would put it.

A week ago yesterday, just twenty-four hours before the Giants went into last Sunday's Win-or-out game with the Browns, Pat Summerall's injured right leg was so stiff and sore that he didn't even dare to attempt a practice place-kick. So what did he do Sunday—just kick 46 and 49-yard field goals, his longest as a Giant. The big boomer from Arkansas is getting to be one of the best three-point men on the circuit. His record now shows 12

hits in 21 tries, most of them from well out. Pat's seven-point contribution against the Browns established him as the scoring leader of the Giants with 64 points.

There probably wasn't a happier group of fans anywhere than the large contingent that came by bus, by car and by train to last Sunday's game from Manhasset on Long Island's fashionable north shore. They were on hand to pay tribute to Jimmy Brown, a distinguished fellow townsman, but, for the most part, they also were Giant fans. As things turned out, they had it both ways. The Giants won and their boy Jimmy had a great day. It made an extra day's commuting, to the detriment of pressing pre-holiday do-it-yourself chores, well worth while.

This extra game gives you an extra chance to reflect on the availability of a number of the Giants for off-season employment here in New York. If you have a

job that's too tough for anyone else to tackle, why don't you offer it to a Giant? After this season, you can be sure it won't make him quail. These young men shape up well in grey flannel suits, too, and a button-down collar makes a fine frame for an eighteen-inch neck. For you who must have the upper or mezzanine we refer you to sections such as 25, 23, 21, or 19 for reserved seats. For upper or mezzanine boxes we recommend the sections which look directly up the field from the end zone as the best available locations.

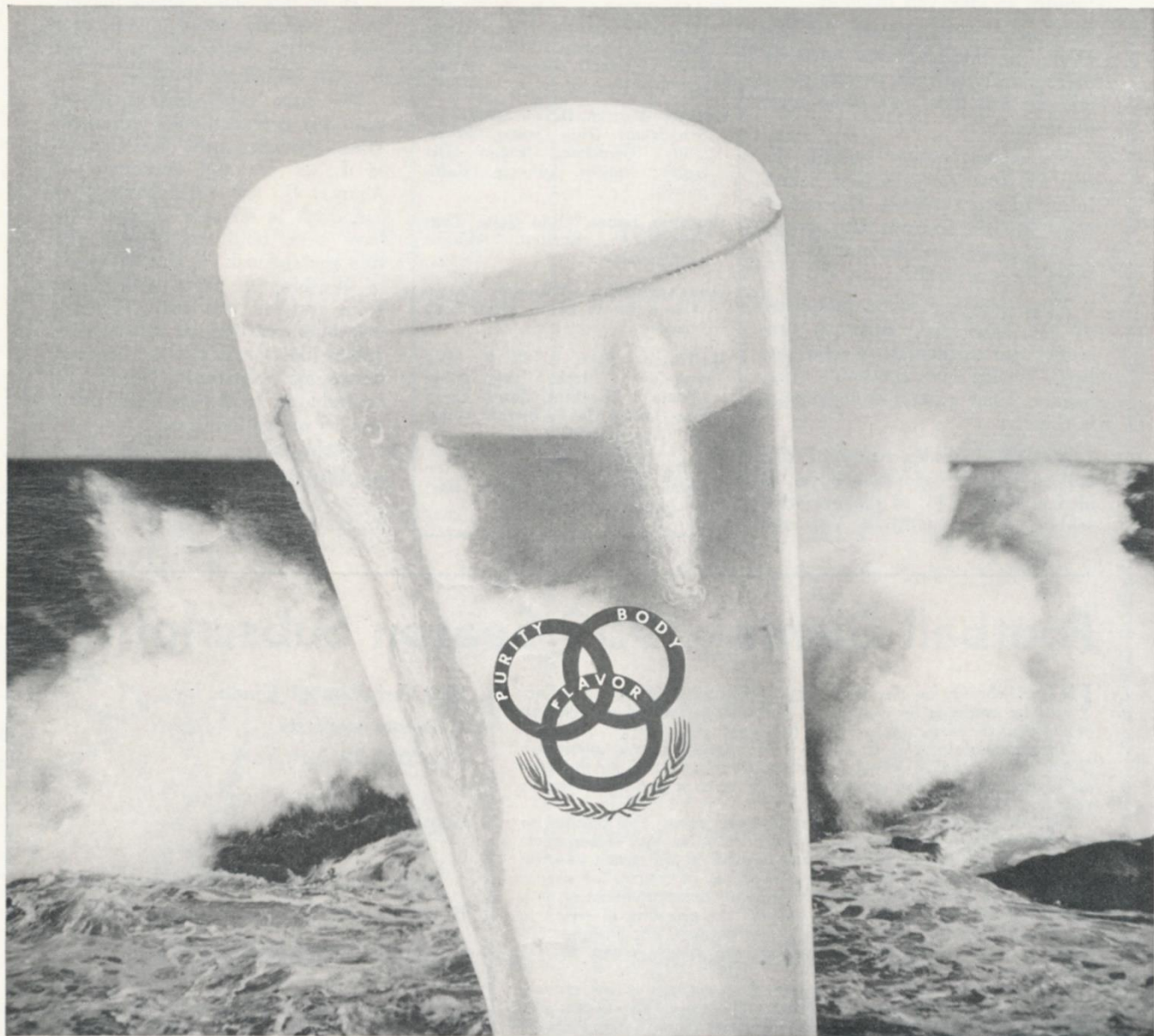

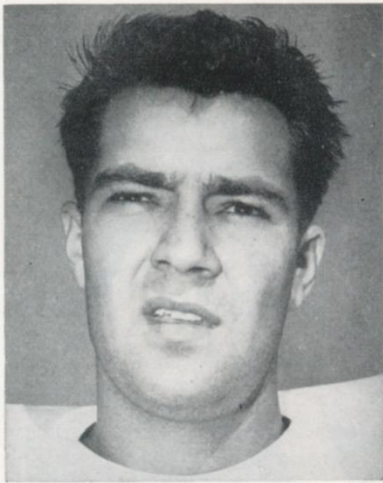


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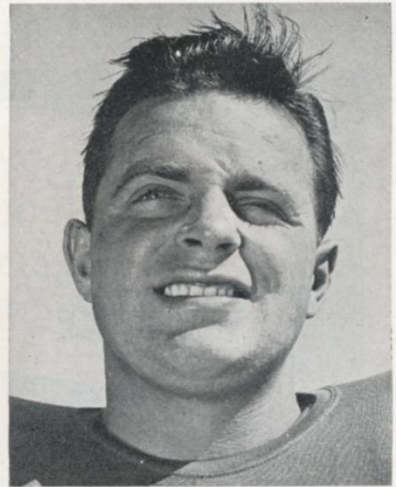
Don Heinrich

Looking Over the Browns

SEVEN divisional titles and three world championships in eight years! That's the remarkable record of the Cleveland Browns under Paul Brown in football's toughest competitive circuit—the National Football League. Add four All-American Conference titles in as many seasons to the list of Brown accomplishments and you have the salient details of the most remarkable saga of success in professional football history.

Perhaps the biggest feather in the elaborately decorated Brown headdress was Cleveland's sensational 1957 recovery from the 1956 crack-up that represents the only major blemish on Paul's shining coaching record.

Overloaded perhaps with players who had put in up to a decade of distinguished service on the lakefront, the Browns plummeted from a 9-2-1 1955 record and a 38-14 world championship victory over the Rams to a 5-7-0 1956 mark that left them in a fourth-place Eastern Division tie with the Steelers.

Not one to accept defeat complacently, Brown went back to

work with a vengeance and performed that miracle of miracles—recapturing divisional leadership while rebuilding.

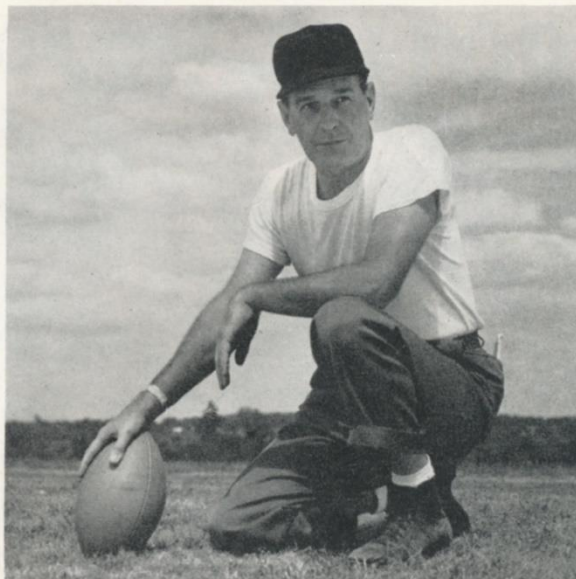
The rebuilding process, incomplete as a crushing 59-14 loss to the Lions in last December's world championship game indicates, continues apace. The current Browns, with six first-year players and other additions, are more closely akin to the great Cleveland machines of the not-so-distant past.

The spearhead of the Browns' resurgence is Jimmy Brown, from Manhasset, L. I., and Syracuse University. This immensely powerful and amazingly fleet 228-pound fullback led the league in rushing as a 1957 rookie, already this season has set a league ground-gaining mark and has a scoring record in reach.

Other key 1957 additions were Milt Plum, a quarterback out of Penn State whose name is beginning to be mentioned in the same breath with that of the great Otto Graham and a group of rugged young linemen headed by Henry Jordan, Bill Quinlan and Paul Wiggin.

Another fine group of newcomers has joined these prize sopho-

mores this season. It numbers three lightning-fast halfbacks, Bobby Mitchell, Leroy Bolden and Jim Shofner; Jim Ninowski, a spare quarterback, and Gene Hickerson and Willie Davis, a pair of linemen who have shown that they have what it takes to make the grade in football's big league.

A solid core of tried-and-true veterans remains on the scene. Lou Groza, in his thirteenth pro season, still is an unerring place-kicker and a devastating offensive tackle. Darrell Brewster, in his seventh year, continues to rank high among the league's pass-receiving ends.

Still very much in the picture, too, are such dynamic offensive platooners as Ray Renfro, Pres and Lew Carpenter, Art Hunter, Chuck Noll and Mike McCormack and such defensive stalwarts as Don Colo, Bob Gain, Walt Michaels, Don Paul, Ken Konz and Warren Lahr.

It's a somewhat different Brown team than New Yorkers are used to, a team that relies more on running than on passing, but it's a formidable team that has that long-time Brown knack of winning football games.

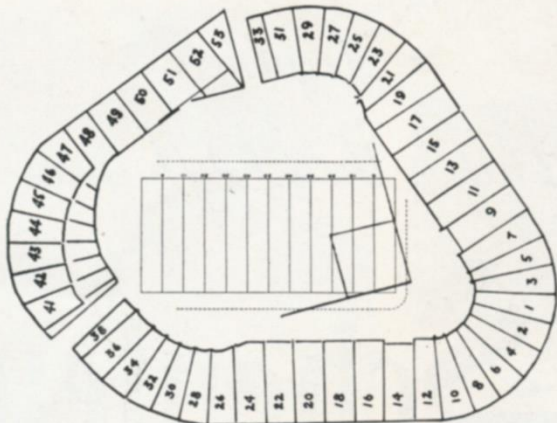

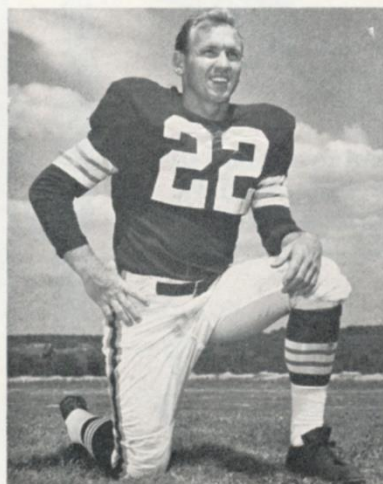

Last Sunday's thriller added another gripping chapter to a Giants-Browns rivalry that has been something extra ever since the teams started at each other in 1950.

The Giants instigated things by smacking down the Browns twice that first year. Cleveland regarded the 6-0 and 17-13 New York victories as an extreme form of gaucherie. One just wasn't supposed to beat the Browns. In fact, no one else did it in that initial, title-winning first Cleveland season of National League membership.

Also, in fact, the Giants paid for their brashness by having to knuckle under, 8-3, in a grim, bitter play-off showdown at Cleveland.

Two years later the Giants again swept the home-and-home series. There followed a galling, five-year period of Cleveland ascendancy, relieved only by a 21-9 New York success in the first game of the Giant championship season of 1956. During this stretch, a 62-14 Brown runaway in 1953 distorted the series scoring table.

Never cowed by the Browns, even in defeat, the Giants bounced back this year to score another home-and-home sweep. Again the teams meet in a play-off. Who's to say what's going to happen between rivals that have split their last seven games, 3-3-1, and in ten of nineteen meetings have been separated by no more than six points?

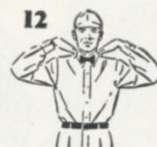

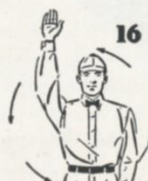

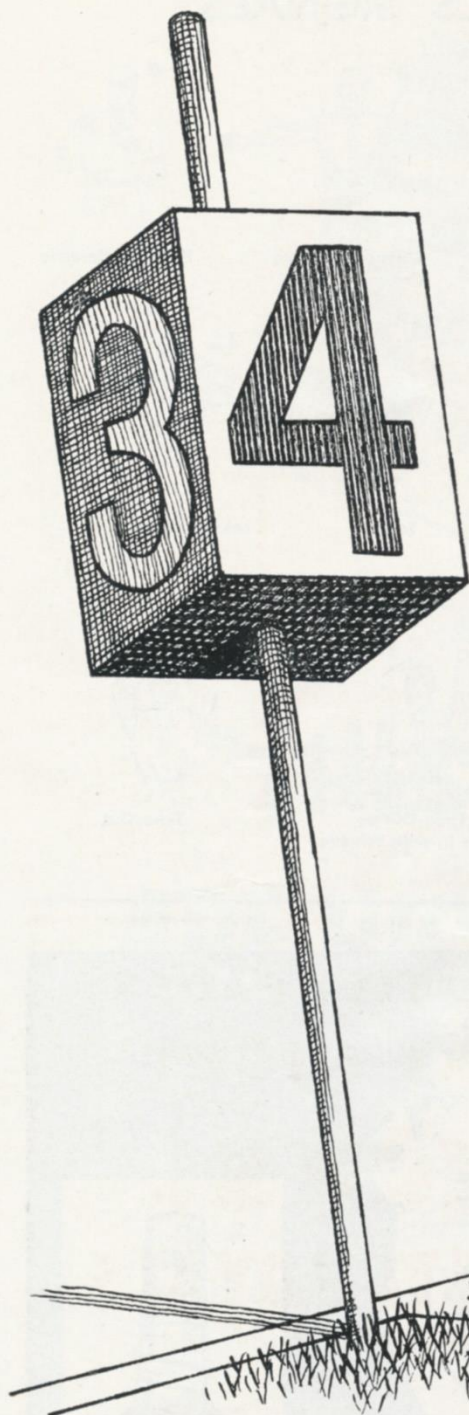

In Case of a Tie, It's Sudden Death

If the Giants and Browns are tied at the end of regulation playing time today, the winner and divisional champion will be determined on a sudden-death basis. In other words, play will continue until one team or the other scores, by any method. The team thus scoring will be the winner.

Sudden-death play will start with a kick-off, the kicking and receiving teams to be determined by a coin toss, as at the start of a game. It will proceed just as in a normal game, in fifteen minute periods, with the teams exchanging goals at the end of each period, until a decision is reached.
