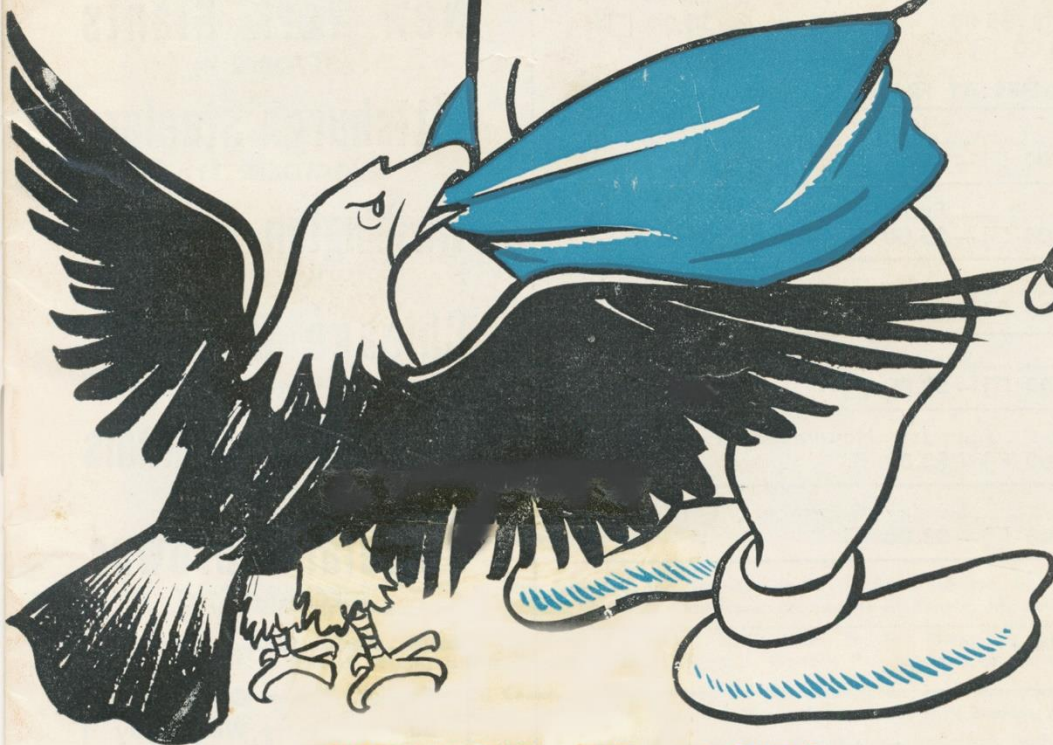

NEW PLAYERS—NEW SPIRIT—NEW EAGLES

A year ago when Lawrence T. "Buck" Shaw took over as Eagles' flightmaster he admittedly knew next to nothing about the club's personnel in particular and not too much more about the National Football League in general.

Shaw had been away from the pro football wars for three years and, as he states, the game as well as the players change yearly. It is a case of "What have you done for me lately."

But today, Shaw is hep. He has caught on again and the Eagles have shown the results. The squad you will see out on the Hershey Stadium turf tonight is by far a wiser,

sounder and a more spirited aggregation with a whole raft of highly promising new players.

Take it from the head man, this 1959 squad of Philadelphia Eagles' football players, "has a great potential."

"We can't at this time tell how far we're going," enthused Shaw, "but we're going to make some teams unhappy in this league. This is a tough, hard-bitten team of hungry players. We have only 22 veterans back from last year's 35-man squad and that means at least 13 spots are up for grabs by the new players.

"The competition for these vacancies makes for spirited practices and bristling scrimmages. Our first test will be against the New York Giants, second best in the world by a matter of a few minutes. You know, they lost to the Baltimore Colts in that great sudden death playoff but in getting to that playoff they had to beat the Cleveland Browns three times and any team that can do that is worthy of the name 'great.'"

"So we'll know far more about these young, brash Eagles after tonight's battle. This game could be a barometer."

In last year's Hershey game program story, we stated, among other things, "... the word is out all over the National Football League: Give Buck Shaw time and he'll have the Eagles soaring."

Well, Shaw and the Eagles are on their way. It isn't a job that can be done overnight. Shaw and general manager Vince McNally did a major overhauling job on the 1958 squad and results are already apparent.

Writers who have watched the Birds in their Hershey aerie for the ninth year—we first encamped here in 1951—are convinced this year's team is more spirited than any other. Getting ready for tonight's scrap, the first of six pre-season encounters, Shaw and his staff mapped a plan of campaign designed to give the new men all the attention possible.

"We can't afford to overlook any possibilities," commented Shaw, "particularly among the linemen. And all of the new men will get their test under fire, for playing an outside opponent is the only way we can tell their true worth."

Quarterback Norman Van Brocklin again will trigger the fuse, backed up by the three-year vet Sonny Jurgensen and a sprightly looking rookie with remarkable poise for one lacking game experience, Dick Jamieson from Bradley. Completing the QB corps is Villanova's own Jim Grazione who'll also play on defense tonight.

For two years the running game, the power arm of the attack, was in the hands of two stellar performers, Billy Ray Barnes and Clarence Peaks. Well, they're in prime condition for another season but backing them up you'll see another sterling twosome, rookies

Theron Sapp out of Georgia and Joe Pagliei, Clemson.

The pass receiving department is loaded with newcomers, John Bredice, Ken MacAfee, a former Giant; speed merchant Art Powell; Gerry Schweitzer and Harold Dukes to complement the holdovers Tommy McDonald, Pete Retzlaff, Bobby Walston and Dick Bielski.

But the story of the new Eagles is concentrated in the line. Two rookies probably will start on the offensive line. They are Darrell Aschbacher, 6'1, 220, Oregon, left guard; and J. D. Smith, 6'5, 250, Rice, right tackle.

In back of them will be Jim Padgett, 6'1, 230, Clemson; John Burroughs, 6'4, 225, Iowa; Jim Bowie, 6'4, 240, Kentucky, and the biggest man in pro football, Jim Griboski, 6'9, 295, from Phoenixville. Rookies all, they will give a good account of themselves.

Newcomers on defense will be linebackers John Nocera, 6'1½, 215, Iowa; Bill Striegel, 6'2, 230, College of The Pacific; Jim Sellars, 6'2, 230, New York State Teachers and Dick DeSimone, 5'11, 220, Clemson. In the secondary scrapping for jobs are Al Miller, Boston College; Joe Gattuso, Navy; Gene Johnson, Cincinnati and Art Powell, the all-around man from San Jose State.

Also an important chapter in this year's Eagles' story is the hard core of veterans headed up by such greats as Chuck Bednarik, now in his 11th season and playing center; Sophomore tackle Proverb Jacobs, more confident than ever; two-way back Walt Kowalczyk; the defensive line of Jess Richardson, Ed Meadows, Don Owens and Marion Campbell and the secondary defenders of Tom Brookshier, Jerry Norton and Lee Riley and the only returning linebacker, Bob Pellegrini.

Two of the off-season trades appear to be paying dividends. Chuck Weber from the Chicago Cards for Bill Koman, has a strangle hold at middle line backer, and Ken MacAfee, who along with guard Gerry Huth came to the Eagles from the Giants for Tom Scott, looks like a fixture as the closed or right end.

So things are looking up for the Eagles. Time will tell just how far they can go in 1959.
