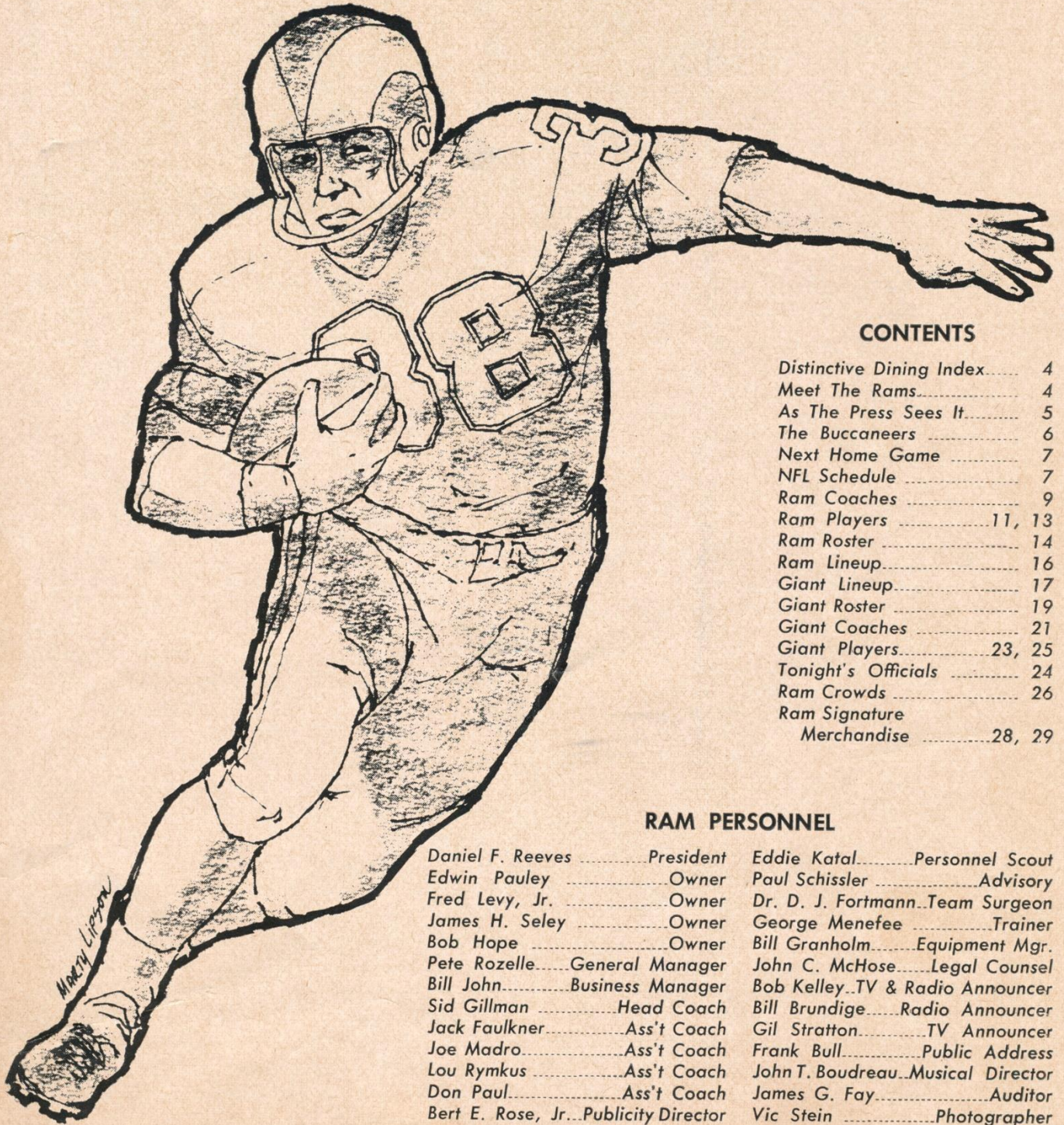

Despite the fact that he ranks among the lightest offensive tackles in the NFL, Fry has been a starter all four years he has been on the Ram squad. He made the grade as a rookie in 1953, spent the next two years in the service, but took up right where he left off in 1956. Speed, mobility and great blocking techniques make up for what Bob lacks in size, although he often is required to give up as much as 25 pounds to his opponent of the day. Tackle competition was the greatest in years in the LA camp, but when the offensive team takes the field for this opening game, Fry undoubtedly will be back at his same old stand. Married. Frank Ryan

Quarterback

Rice

Like all rookie quarterbacks, Ryan played only briefly last season as veteran Bill Wade directed the Ram attack. In his infrequent appearances, however, Frank showed definite NFL ability. Fine signal caller and possesses the arm to throw deep. Threw for one touchdown on final play of second 49er game. Over-all his record included five completions in 14 attempts with three passes intercepted.

At Rice Institute, where he was a physics major, Ryan shared quarterbacking time with King Hill, who became the Chicago Cardinals' bonus pick. His expressed interest to pursue a master's and doctorate in his field made many NFL teams wary of his interest in professional football but the Rams selected him on the fourth round of the 1958 draft and then proceeded to establish a scholastic curriculum which would enable him to attend UCLA on a part-time basis during the season and carry a full load during the winter and spring months.

Played brilliant football in the 1958 Cotton Bowl game against Navy, completing 13 of 22 passes in the

As the PRESS sees it!



On a day in May, in 1952, Frank and Maxine Gifford walked out of a Hollywood Hills mansion after having turned down ten \$100 bills, the promise of a check for \$5000 additional the next day and a guarantee of \$12,000 for the season if the University of Southern California star would play football for Edmonton in the Canadian League.

It wasn't an easy thing to do, for that very afternoon they had to borrow 50 cents to get by until the following day when Frank's check from a school job was due. Maxine had quit her job because she was expecting her first baby.

Frank turned down the Canadian offer because he had set his mind on playing professional football in his own country. He viewed it as a challenge to find out whether he could make good in the NFL.

Well, he turned out—and so did every club in the league. Drafted No. 1 by the New York Giants, and here tonight to open the 1959 season against the Los Angeles Rams, the handsome athlete-actor-model from Bakersfield, who also used to carry the mail among the executive offices of the Hollywood Park Race Track, has been one of the most versatile players in NFL history.

Gifford has followed Bob Waterfield of the Rams in the art of being able to do more things well with a football than anyone in the league. As he says himself, "I do some of this and some of that."

Gifford is not the greatest contemporary runner, but he is close. He is not the best passer or the best receiver, but he ranks up there among those that are. He has kicked field goals and extra points, run back punts and kickoffs and proved himself to be one of the game's most alert and able pass defense men. He is a clutch player.

He combined his talents so well in the 1959 Pro Bowl game that he was voted that game's most valuable

player. He was a Pro Bowl defense specialist in 1953 and on the offensive platoon the following year. In the past three years he has gained more ground rushing, catching and passing than any other player excepting quarterbacks.

In last year's playoff with Cleveland for the Eastern Conference he gained 95 yards on the ground, more than the great Jim Brown. In a game vs. the Colts he passed to Bob Schnelker for 63 yards to set up the first touchdown. He circled end for a score. Against the Lions he drove over the middle for a touchdown. In the championship game vs. the Colts he ran for 38 yards to set up a score, and he caught a 15-yard pass from Chuck Conerly for the 17-14 lead that nearly won the game.

In seven seasons with the Giants he has scored 45 touchdowns and thrown passes for a dozen more—a total of 57 touchdowns "responsible for."

Of these touchdowns, 26 were rushing, 19 receiving and 12 throwing.

He has kicked two field goals and two extra points.

In 1953 he was No. 7 in the NFL in kickoff returns and No. 8 running back punts. He ranked third in receiving in 1956 with 51 catches for 603 yards and four touchdowns. A year later he finished fourth with 41 catches for 588 yards and, again, four touchdowns.

He was fifth in rushing in 1956 with 819 yards in 159 attempts, scoring five touchdowns and averaging 5.2.

He is the league's most dangerous halfback in the option play, the keep or throw, as is attested by the fact that of the 19 passes he has completed, 12 went for touchdowns.

All of which led to Frank's trial this season as a quarterback. He didn't do badly, but decided he was of greater value as a running back than as QB. After all, Gifford couldn't throw to himself.

When was Los Angeles first represented in the National Football League?

That question led off Paul Zimmerman's Sportscripts column in last Monday's Los Angeles Times. And the answer, which Zim also supplied, was a surprising one to all but the possessors of keen sports memories.

The date was not 1946, but 20 years earlier, 1926. And the team was not the Rams, but the Los Angeles Buccaneers, a hardy group of 15 gridirons who spent that season as a band of gridiron gypsies, roaming the nation as strictly a road team in the National Football League.

Zim stumbled upon the story in some casual correspondence with a couple of the old-timers involved. Rather startled at his discovery that this city had, indeed, not only been in major league pro ball before the Rams, but also had shown a fine season's record, the Times Sports Editor asked the question of his staff members who had been actively engaged in sports writing in 1926. Not a one of them recalled the team.

There was good reason for this. All the games were played elsewhere. With the pride of California's grid history as its come-on, the team got backing from Lew Cody, Fritz Burns and others and proceeded to take off on a tour of the NFL cities.

(In those days, obviously the great travel involved kept the eastern teams from even considering sched-

uling games in California during the league season. It would have taken quite a gate to put the trip in the black, and who'd have thought that California fans would ever support NFL football.)

Brick Muller, the great-all timer from California, became the club's manager shortly after its organization, and he doubled as a starting end and an alternate everything. He was the co-coach of the squad, along with Tut Imlay, California back.

Don Thompson, one of the team's members and now a CBS executive, recalled for Zimmerman some of the story-book activities of the club, as it defeated Ernie Nevers' Duluth Eskimos, Jim Thorpe's Canton Bulldogs, the Detroit Panthers with Gus Sonnonberg, Harry Stuhldreher and the Brooklyn Horsemen, and Steve Owen's New York Giants.

Thompson, a lineman, remembered making TD runbacks of interceptions two weeks in a row, and he told how the team, down to twelve men because of injuries, hired some men off the street to wear uniforms on the bench so that the opposition wouldn't know how depleted they were.

The Rams of 1959 salute these hardy pioneers of our present National Football League. Many of the squad members are here tonight, and will be introduced at halftime.

Welcome, men. We salute you.

second half after the Middies had assumed a 20-0 half-time lead. Married. Born, July 12, 1936.

Ed Meador Halfback Arkansas Tech

One of nation's finest "small college" players and a Little All American selection. Meador established a fantastic record during his four years of competition at Arkansas Tech. He gained a total of 3,747 yards, 3,540 of this by rushing. He scored a total of 266 points, 84 of them in 1958 and another 85 in 1957. Last fall he gained a total of 1,080 yards carrying the ball on an average of 135 yards a game. Received an award as the Most Valuable Back in the 1959 Optimist Bowl—an honor achieved primarily through his brilliant defensive play. Married. Born, August 10, 1937.

Del Shofner End Baylor

A capsule description of dazzling Del's 1958 (and first) season as a Ram offensive end would read something like this: League leader in yards gained (1097); 3rd in receptions (51); Unanimous All-Pro; Western Division Pro Bowl squad.

Because the Rams were paper-thin in the defensive

backfield in 1957, Shofner spent his first year with the club as a corner man although he had been drafted as an offensive end. However, with reinforcements on hand last season, he was moved to the left end position and was one of the principal reasons the team finished in a second place tie with an 8-4 record. His overall performance chart showed a record of 51 catches for 1097 yards, eight touchdowns and an average of 21.6 yards per reception.

Much of Shofner's ability lies in his knack of running with the ball after the catch, a carry-over from his halfbacking days at Baylor. As a three year regular there, he became the most versatile back in the school's history, leading the club in every department of play in his senior year except passing. He likewise was a three-year regular on the basketball team, anchored the 440 and 880 yard relay teams (his best time in the hundred is :09.8s) and was named to the Conference All-Scholastic team.

Perhaps his most unusual day occurred in the second 49er game when he played only briefly because of a stomach ailment. Two passes were thrown to him, he caught both, each went for touchdowns on runs of 64 and 72 yards or a total of 136 yards on his pair of chances. Single Born, December 11, 1934.

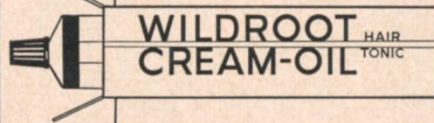

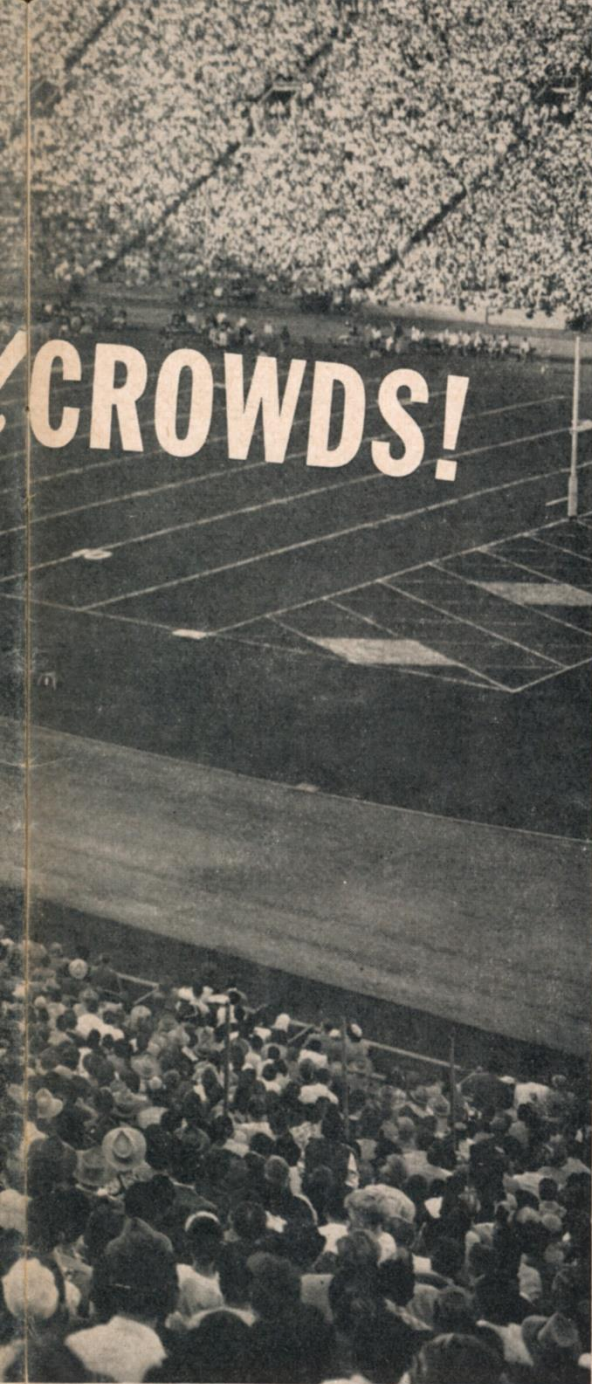
RAM CROWDS are *Record*

Reprinted from the 1959 Ram YEARBOOK. One of many interesting features in the annual publication now on sale at the Coliseum at all Ram games.

At precisely 4:07 p.m. last December 14, the curtain dropped on the Rams' 1958 football season. A crowd of 54,634 drifted toward the exits of the Coliseum, warmed by an afternoon in the sun and a 34-20 victory over a surprisingly stubborn Green Bay team. The win had matched another by the Chicago Bears earlier in the day, thereby assuring the Rams a second place tie in the Western Conference.

In the press box, high atop the rim of the stadium, reporters tapped out their final stories of the year. They paused now and then to jot down statistical notes delivered over the press box public address system.

The PA announcer's voice registered a tone of amazement as he interrupted them once more. "Gentlemen," he said, "we have some crowd figures which may be of interest to you. Today's attendance pushes the total for six Ram home league games to 502,084, an average of 83,680 persons per game. This exceeds last year's average by nearly 9,000 per game and, we believe, sets an all-time football record in this attendance category."



Also noted in the game stories was the fact that the Green Bay crowd increased the total Ram attendance for the year to 1,053,798, the second consecutive season the club had drawn more than one million fans.

An attraction of this magnitude, of course, doesn't just happen. It's the combination of a number of factors including coaching, scouting, top player personnel, public relations and promotion. Enveloping all of these is superior management under the direction of President Dan Reeves and his co-owners who have displayed they are as successful in the football business as in their varied enterprises.



DAN REEVES, President

President Daniel F. Reeves is entering his 19th year as an NFL club owner. He purchased the Cleveland Rams in 1941, served three years as an Air Force captain, and after the service developed a world title team in 1945. He opened the West Coast for major sports by moving the Rams to LA in 1946. Active in the Beverly Hills brokerage firm that bears his name. Lives in Bel Air with his wife, five daughters and son.

ED PAULEY

Edwin W. Pauley has been an active partner in the Los Angeles Rams since 1947, just a year after the club's arrival in Los Angeles. He participated in football as an undergraduate at Occidental College and on the crew at University of California. Mr. Pauley is president of Pauley Petroleum Inc., an oil exploration and production company, and also active in southland real estate development. He is a member and past chairman of the U. of California Board of Regents.

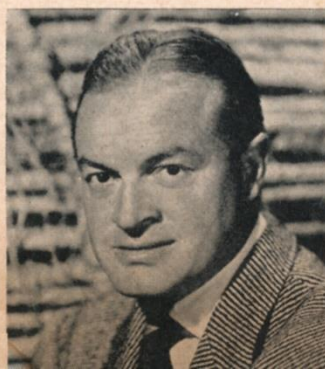


FRED LEVY

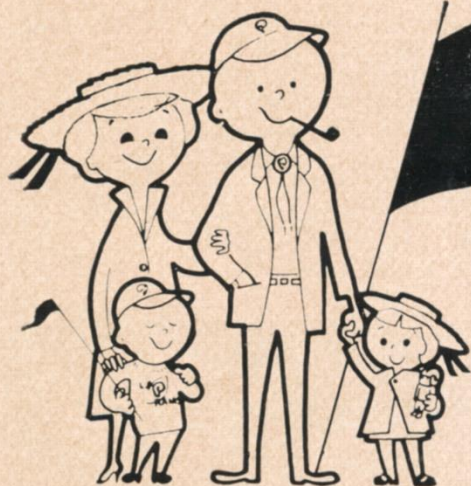
HAL SELEY
