

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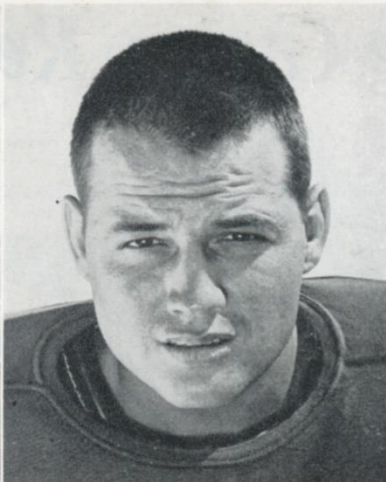

In the Center of Things

In Six Years at Pivot Post, Ray Wietecha Has Missed Few Blocks, No Minutes

"THERE are three things you can count on—death, taxes and Ray Wietecha at center," a Giant fan observed recently.

To the concluding observation, Head Coach Jim Lee Howell, Offensive Coach Allie Sherman and Line Coach John Dell Isola utter a hearty "Amen."

The Giants have counted on Wietecha heavily since 1954 and Ray has not let them down, for a minute. The durable Northwestern graduate hasn't missed a single offensive play since he was installed at center as a pro sophomore six years ago.

The manner in which Wietecha has defied physical erosion at a position that demands toughness, speed and stamina is advancing Ray toward rank with such fabled "iron man" centers as the peerless Mel Hein, who played fifteen seasons with the Giants, and Bulldog Turner, who served thirteen campaigns with the Bears.

Big Ray, who stands 6 foot 1, weighs 225 pounds and moves with catlike grace, has done a lot more than just be around for a long time. He's one of the best—the Giants say the very best—at the pivot post and has so been recognized by being named three times to the All-League and having twice been selected to play in the Pro Bowl.

Says Howell, "In my book, Ray is tops. Among other things, he makes a play few other centers even dare to attempt. That is to

take out a defensive tackle alone on the side to which we are running. Most coaches consider this an impossible assignment because of the angle. But Wietecha is so quick and well-coordinated that he makes this block time and again."

Says Sherman: "A center doesn't catch the eye much but he's a key man in T formation football. The way the game is played today there's more pressure on him than ever before. His snap must be crisp and accurate, or the whole timing of a play will be thrown out of kilter. Against the standard 4-3 defense, there seldom is an opposing lineman playing head to head against him, so he's usually obliged to block a moving target from a difficult angle. Also, he's the apex of the protective pocket on pass plays."

Says Dell Isola: "Ray almost never makes a bad play. He always ranks at or near the top in the ratings for the weekly awards we give for blocking. I've never seen anyone who could match him for

steady, consistent effort. That's important because in football it's the mistakes, more than anything else, that beat you. He rarely makes one."

Drafted No. 12 as a "future" by the Giants in 1950, Wietecha joined the Giants for the 1953 season after service in the Marines. He was a handy-man as a rookie, being used as a linebacker, offensive and defensive end and defensive halfback, as well as an offensive center.

An All Big 10 baseball, as well as a football, player at Northwestern, Ray considered a baseball career for awhile. In fact, he signed a bonus contract with the Washington Senators as an outfielder. However, after spending the 1953 season in their farm system, he decided he could make the big leagues a lot quicker in football. How right he was!

Ray hails from East Chicago, Ind., and had been living there. However, since it's apparent that Yankee Stadium will continue to be his major place of business for some time, he and his bride of a few months have decided to become New York suburbanites. They recently purchased a home in Cranford, N. J. and this winter Wietecha will work out of there for a New Jersey drug concern.

His own robust resistance to illness and injury in seven stellar seasons with the Giants should be a strong selling point for the products he will be offering.

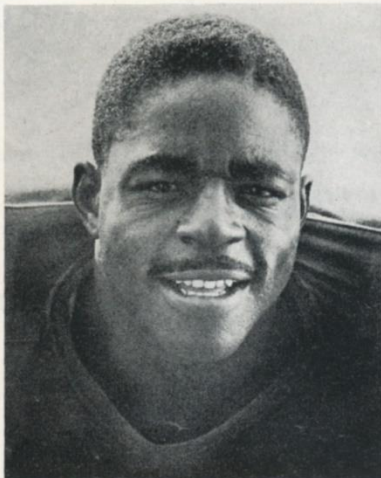

Giant Album



Harland Svare

Harland Svare (84), a 7-year pro from Washington State, who was acquired by the Giants in a 1954 trade with the Rams, has provided stalwart service to the defensive platoon as an outside linebacker. He's a superior play diagnostician and one of the league's fiercest tacklers. Under the Giants' varying defensive patterns, he often covers in the flat on passes. While so doing, he picked off one for a key 70-yard scoring interception against the Eagles.



Rosey Brown

Back in 1952, the Giants took a flyer on the twenty-seventh round of the draft and picked a 19-year-old tackle from Morgan State College named **Rosey Brown (79)**. Someone in the Giant office must have had a crystal ball. Within a couple of years, Rosey was the best offensive tackle in the league. Lighting fast and 245 pounds, he blocks with crisp decisiveness. He also pitches in on defense, as middle guard, in short-yardage situations.



Jim Patton

Jim Patton (20) was almost turned down by the Giants when he came out of Mississippi five years ago. He weighed only 180 pounds and the feeling was that he'd never be able to stand the gaff of pro football physically. But Patton, all whalebone and whipcord small as he is, soon proved otherwise. His speed, alertness and wonderful anticipation have won him all-league rating at safety for the last two years.



Cliff Livingston

For the first time in his six years with the Giants, **Cliff Livingston (89)** is playing regularly. He has been starting at left linebacker on the defensive platoon. Up to this season, Cliff was a valuable jack-of-all-trades who filled in anywhere he was needed on the defensive unit and was a key member of the special duty platoons. Like his brother, Howie, a star Giant end of the past, Cliff attended U. C. L. A.



Dick Modzelewski

Dick Modzelewski (77), who came to the Giants in 1956 by way of Maryland, the Redskins and Packers, has been a tower of strength at defensive left tackle ever since. Little Mo, so-called because his older brother, Ed, a fullback with the Browns, is known as Big Mo, is an indomitable charger who puts his 260 pounds to effective use. Built close to the ground, he's hard to block out.



Lindon Crow

Lindon Crow (41), a No. 2 draft choice of the Cardinals in 1955, was acquired by the Giants in a 1958 trade. Fast, rugged and knowing, he has turned in a solid job as left corner man in the secondary defense. The league-leading pass interceptor in 1956, the U. S. C. graduate has made some important steals for the Giants, notably the end zone grab that helped beat the Browns a few weeks back.

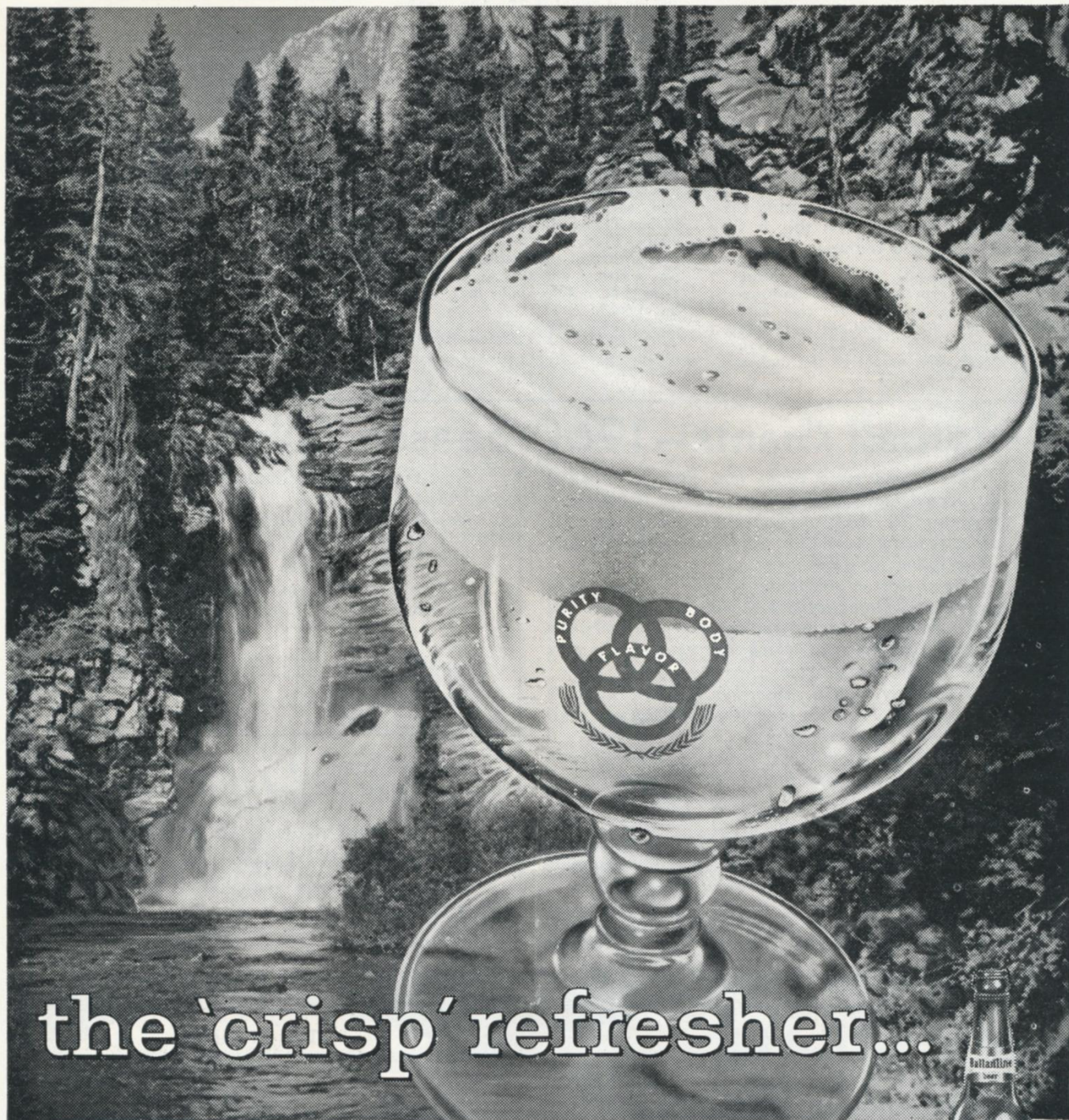

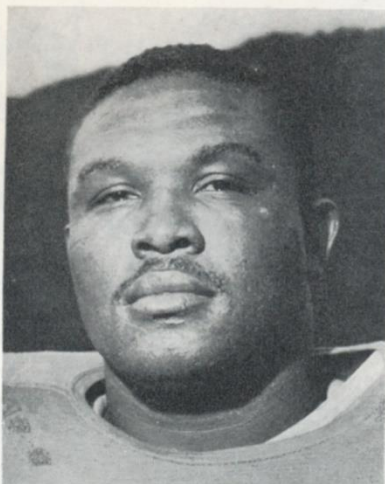




Jack Stroud

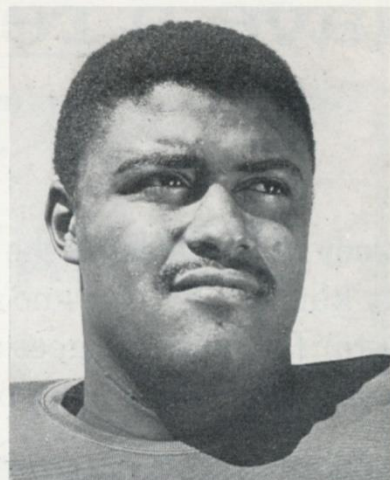

Looking Over the Browns

HERE they are again—the Big, Bad, Browns from Cleveland!

Don't get the wrong idea about the "Big, Bad" prefix. It carries no sinister connotations. Rather, it reflects a deep, sincere respect for a team whose "Big" game of football has been "Bad" news to rivals for the greater part of fourteen years.

Over this span, the Browns have compiled a fantastic record. From their organization in 1946 through 1949, they ruled the All-America Conference without serious challenge. As a National League member since 1950, they have captured seven divisional titles and three world championships in nine completed seasons and are in a position to gain added honors in this unfinished campaign.

All the original Browns except time-defying Lou Groza, the place-kicking tackle, have faded from the scene. But Paul Brown, founding father and chief architect of the Cleveland entry, is well on the way to erecting another monument to his genius as a coach and organizer.

With Jimmy Brown, Bobby Mitchell and Milt Plum as prime movers, this new Cleveland team is beginning to develop the awesome efficiency on attack that Otto Graham, Marion Motley and Company gave to the Browns of old.

Jimmy Brown, of whose incipient greatness New Yorkers have been aware since his fabulous four-sport exploits at Nassau County's Manhasset High, is knocking over National League rushing records like tenpins. This nimble, indestructible giant won the ground-gaining title by pounding out 942 yards as a rookie out of Syracuse in 1957. In so doing, he set a single-game rushing record of 237 yards against the Rams.

Last season, Jolting Jim stepped up the pace to 1,527 yards, which set a league mark, and equalled another record by scoring 18 touchdowns. He's moving at close to that clip again this season.

It's terrifying to consider that Jimmy, born on Feb. 17, 1936, is only 23 and just beginning to get his full strength.

In Mitchell, Cleveland has an ideal running mate for Brown. The fleet 187-pound Illinois graduate is a constant outside threat. A couple of weeks ago, when the Redskins stacked their line to stop Brown, who was held to 40 yards, Mitchell ran wild around the ends for 232 yards, just five short of Jimmy's league record.

After a sophomore sinking spell in 1958, Plum is providing Cleve-

land with the type of quarterbacking it has lacked since the retirement of Graham. Otto's greatness will cast a shadow for years, but Plum's increasing brilliance as a passer and runner is beginning to pierce the pall.

As a flanking backfield companion, this terrific trio has Ray Renfro, one of the most feared deep pass receivers. Cleveland's ends, Preston Carpenter and Billy Howton, acquired this year from Green Bay, also can latch on to a flying football with the best.

Mike McCormack's return to soundness at right tackle and the development of Jim Ray Smith, Gene Hickerson and John Wooten at guard has solidified an offensive line that had begun to wear thin.

Defensively, the Browns remain as tough as ever. Their huge rush-line features 259-pound Bob Gain at left end. Galen Fiss, Vince Costello and Walt Michaels are destructive line-backers. Their deep secondary, where Bernie Parrish has joined Jim Shofner, Warren Lahr and Junior Wren, is fast and far-ranging.

This is one whale of a football team. It's highly complimentary that, just as our Giants respect the Browns, these mighty Browns respect our Giants.



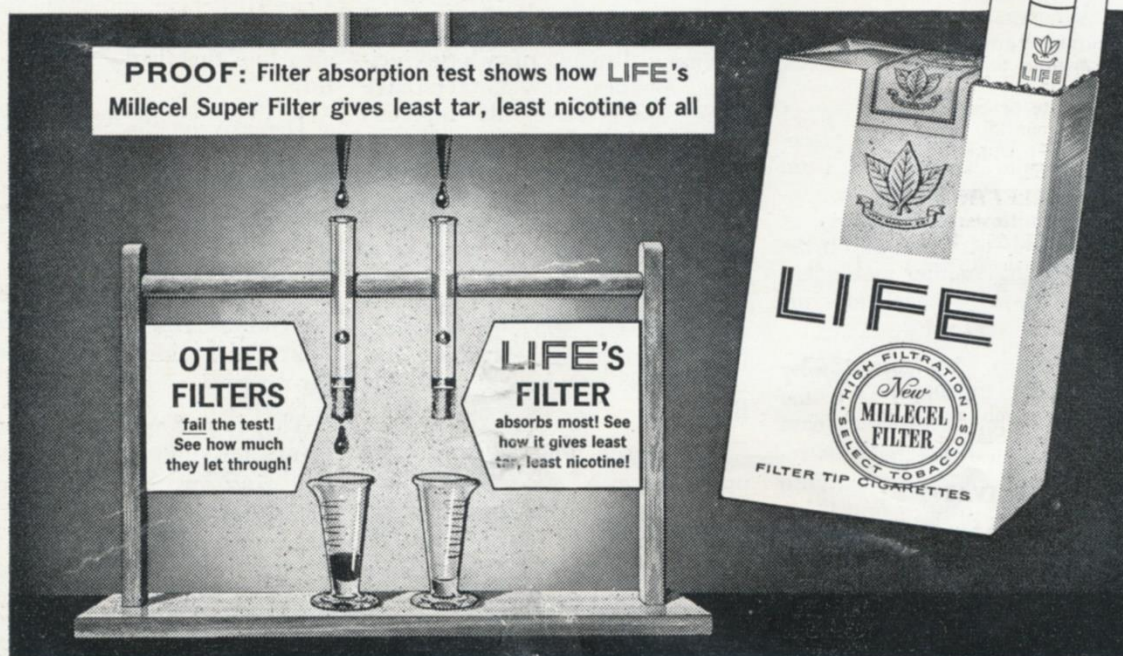

Series Review:

GIANTS vs. BROWNS

THE Giants carry a string of four victories over the Browns into this twenty-second meeting with the perennial contenders from Cleveland. That represents a pinnacle of achievement for the New Yorkers.

On top of beating the Browns 21-17 and 13-10 in last season's regularly-scheduled contests and 10-0 in the play-off for the Eastern Division title, the Giants won this season's first game between the teams at Cleveland by a 10-6 score.

The series between the Giants and the Browns dates back only to 1950, when Cleveland first was admitted to the league, but it already rates as one of pro football's classic rivalries.

The Giants scored a tremendous coup in 1950 by beating the Browns twice, 6-0, and 17-13. The defeats were the first suffered by Cleveland in the National League and its only setbacks of that title-winning campaign in which the Browns gained a measure of revenge by edging the Giants, 8-3, in a divisional play-off.

Again in 1952 and last year, the Giants scored sweeps. The Browns won both games in 1951, 1953, 1954 and 1957. The teams split in 1955 and 1956.

From the start, it has been a series of surprises and stirring, hard-hitting football. You're always sure to see a good game when the Giants and Browns get together.

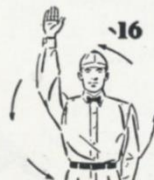

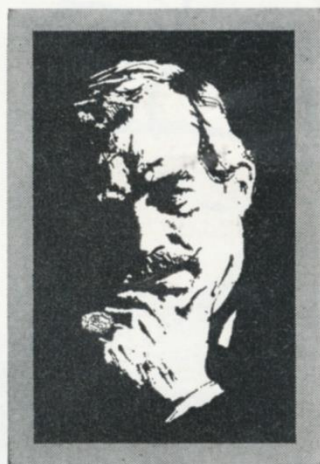

Giant Blackboard: About "Automatics"

From time to time in accounts of football games, you hear a lot about "automatics."

"Automatic" is the football trade name for the extemporaneous changing by the quarterback on the line of the play he had called in the huddle.

The "automatic" is designed primarily to counter defensive overloading that threatens the effectiveness of the original play.

In modern football, most teams change defenses from play to play. The offensive quarterback has no sure way to knowing in advance what particular defense he must attack at any given time.

From the habit patterns indicated in scouting reports and by studying films of previous games, he may have a fair idea of what to expect.

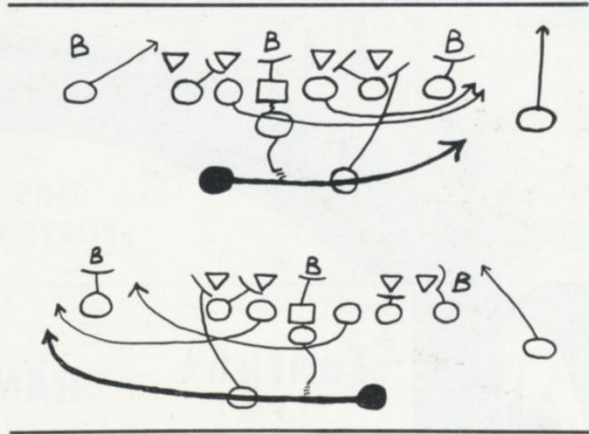
However, it's too easy to get caught in the switches to proceed inflexibly with any plan.

So, on taking his position under center, the first thing a quarterback does is to inspect the defense.

If he judges that the deployment presents abnormal obstacles to the play he had first called, he signals an "automatic" that he believes has a better chance against the defense he is facing.

It's part of a team's offensive organization to have several "automatics" ready for use. The word as to the alternative play to be run is passed by the barking of a key number, letter, color or even by a change in intonation as the quarterback rattles off his signals.

The accompanying diagrams give a rough idea



as to how an "automatic" might work. The Giant quarterback has called for a sweep to the right from balanced formation. The expectation had been that the defense would line up and that the play would be run as shown in the top diagram.

On the line, the quarterback discovers that the defense has overshifted to the side to which the play was to have been run (note in the lower diagram how the defensive left tackle and end are playing wide to the left).

So an "automatic," sending the same type of sweep to the left against less concentrated defensive opposition, is called.

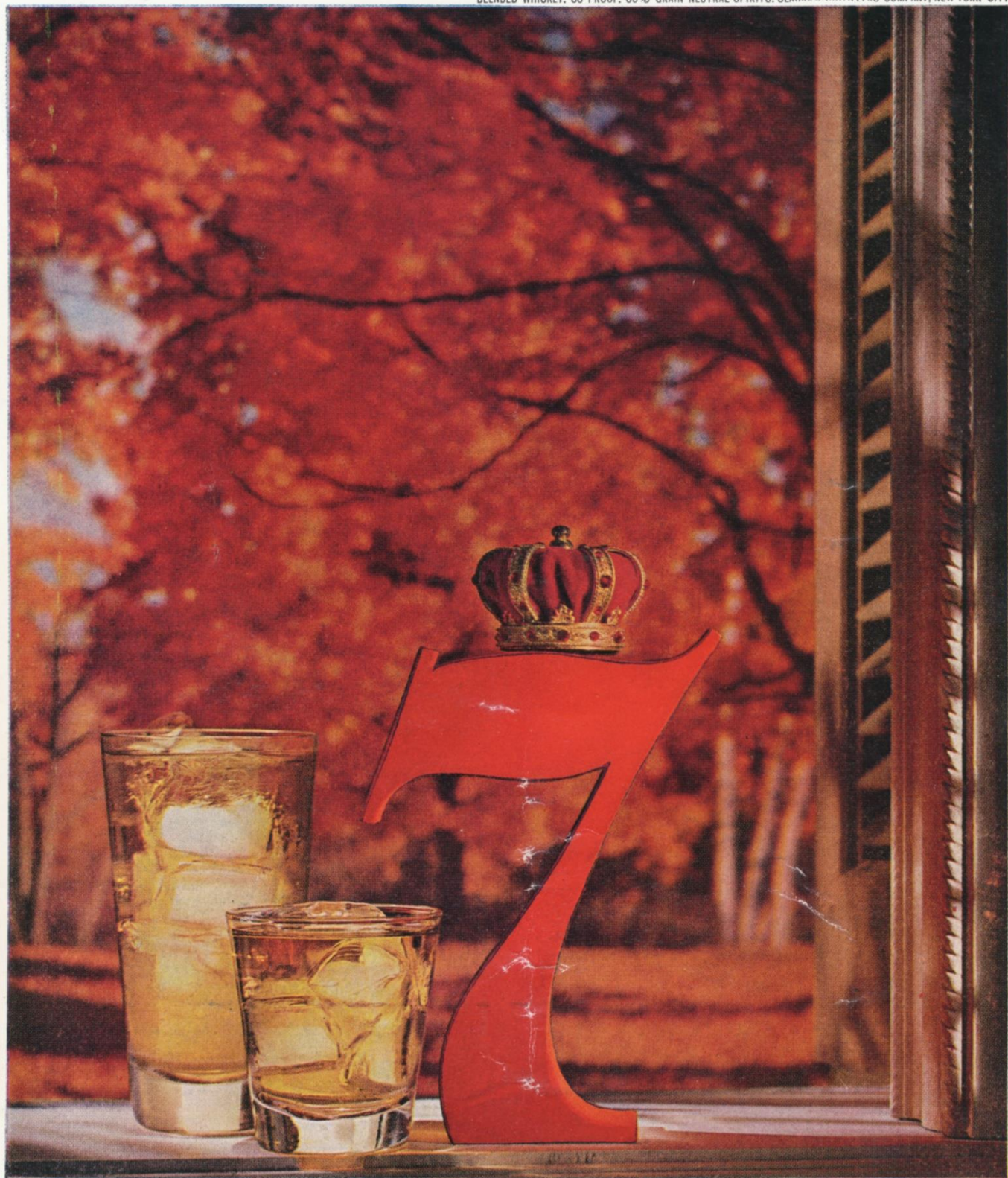
