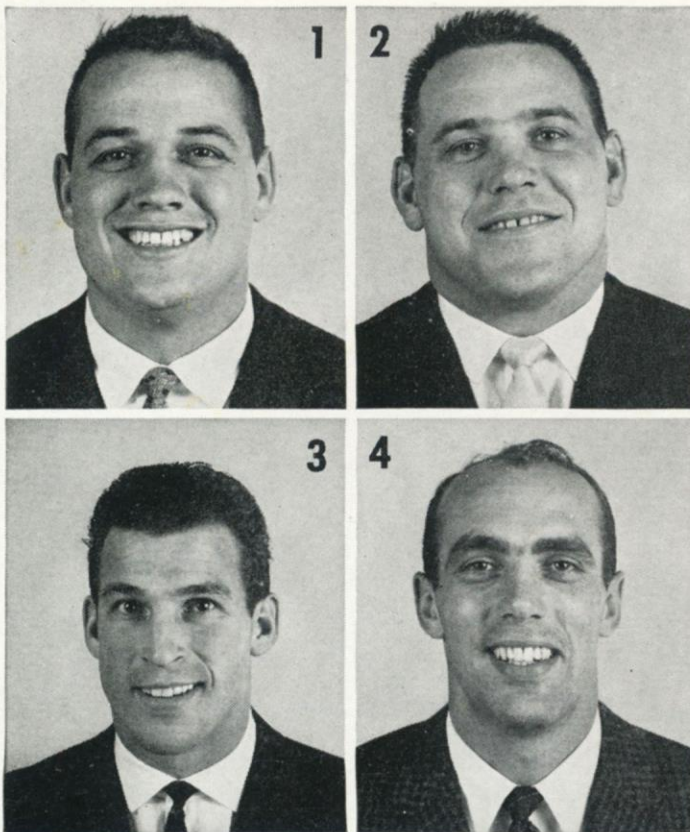

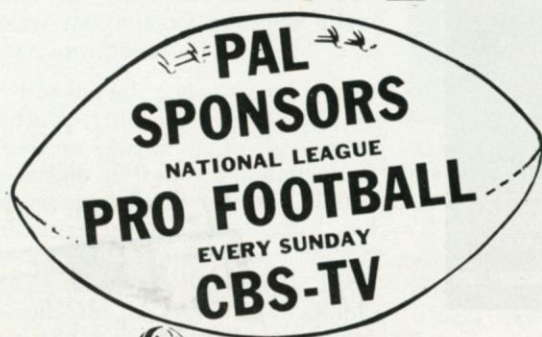

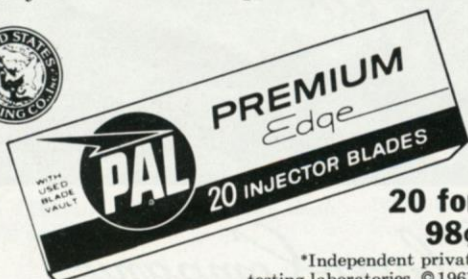

Four In A Row— How About That?

HAIL to Coach Allie Sherman and his Giants, of both platoons and the special units, for their gallant work in reeling off four straight victories on the road!

Let's be honest about it. Few Giant fans were impressed with what they saw in the team's home opener at the Stadium against the Cardinals back on Sept. 17. The Giants performed so falteringly in that 21-10 defeat that Sherman and his squad must have had grave misgivings themselves about their prospects.

But though unquestionably perturbed, Allie and his charges refused to lose heart. In the face of a string of injuries that made it necessary to junk carefully plotted offensive plans, they scraped and scratched and improvised to victories over the Steelers in Pittsburgh, the Redskins in Washington and the Cardinals in St. Louis.

Despite assorted individual heroics, they hardly were dazzling as a team in these victories. But they won and, as they won, they improved.

The Giants who walloped the beefed-up Dallas Cowboys so con-

clusively in the Cotton Bowl last Sunday at last were a team of which Giant fans could be proud. Jumping to conclusions about anything in the topsy-turvy National Football League is a risky business, but one left the TV set with the feeling that the Giants had jelled in that explosive second half at Dallas.

This was a rough, tough football game for thirty minutes. The Cowboys, primed by Tom Landry and playing before a record home crowd, were wheed up, and the ball bounced right for them in the first half, which ended in a 10-all tie.

In the face of disaster, the Giants pulled themselves together and took charge. The turning points were Don Chandler's on-his-own end run in a punting situation—a stunt he's pulled before—and Erich Barnes' record-tying 102-yard interception return.

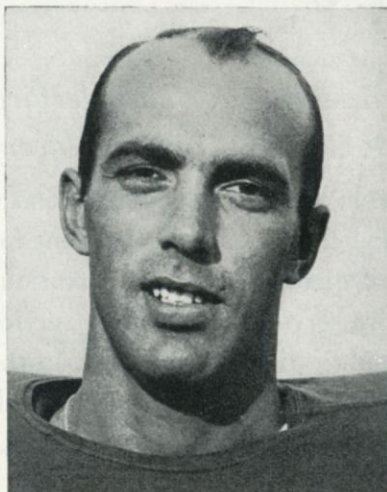
The surprise 30-yard dash by Chandler set up the Giants on the Dallas 25 for the touchdown that put them ahead to stay. The electrifying gallop by the rangy Barnes completely shattered the resistance of the still truculent Cowboys.

But even more than by these spectacular items of opportunism, the Giants carried the day by dedicated attention to down-to-earth football.

Not only did the defensive unit do its usual devastating job but the offensive platoon caught fire, too. With the line opening big holes, the Giants for the first time this season mounted a real running attack. Fleet Bob Gaiters, who may have come of age with this game, ran wild. So did Alex Webster, who again looks like the wonderful Webster of old.

Without this ground support, Y. A. Tittle, ingenious as he is, may never have been able to get the Giants untracked. The Cowboys had his receivers thoroughly blanketed most of the game, although Kyle Rote contrived a couple of stirring breakaways.

All in all, it was most encouraging. As a result, the Giants return home for a five-game Stadium stand in hot contention for the lead. The season still has a long way to go, but things certainly look much brighter.

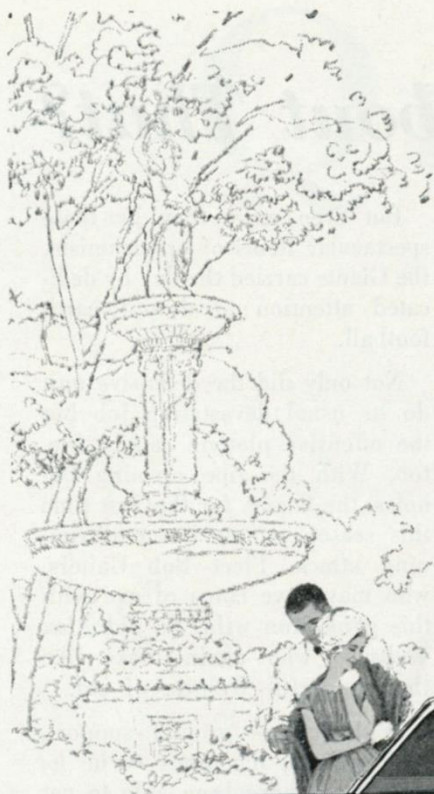


DON CHANDLER: *His daring dash tipped the scales.*

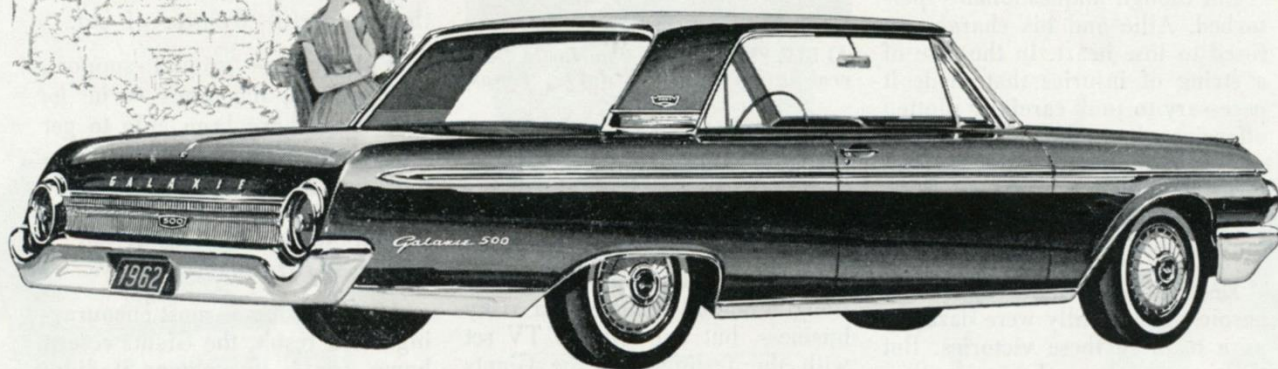


ERICH BARNES: *Applied the crusher with his record-tying run.*

The Best Offense...

THE mighty Giant defensive platoon is up to its old tricks. With no disparagement of the offensive unit, whose development has been retarded by the necessity of making constant emergency adjustments to offset injuries, the defenders have carried the major share of the load to date.

Through the second game with the Cardinals, the Giants led the National League in five defensive statistical categories. They had allowed the fewest total yards—796; the fewest yards by passing—439; the fewest passes completed—39; the fewest total first downs—47—and the fewest first downs by passing—24. Only four teams had yielded fewer points than their 65.

Off last year, it had been feared that the vaunted Giant defense was beginning to crack. It was not up to snuff in 1960 and on a couple of occasions toward the end of the campaign, it got trampled on.

How come the resurgence, particularly since there have been only two personnel changes—Tom Scott for Swede Svare at right linebacker and Erich Barnes for Lindon Crow at left wing?

To our way of thinking, the key to the improvement rests in the decision by Allie Sherman and Svare that Swede should retire completely as an active player and concentrate on his coaching duties.

Don't misunderstand this viewpoint as implying the slightest criticism of Svare as either a player or a coach. Even last year, when he suited up again just to help the club, which had no qualified replacement ready, Swede was close to being at his deadly best as a linebacker. As a coach, he immediately showed promise of being superior and continues to gain stature every day.

It's just that the dual assignment was too heavy a cross to bear. Modern NFL football is too complex and competitive for a man to double with full effectiveness as a player and coach.

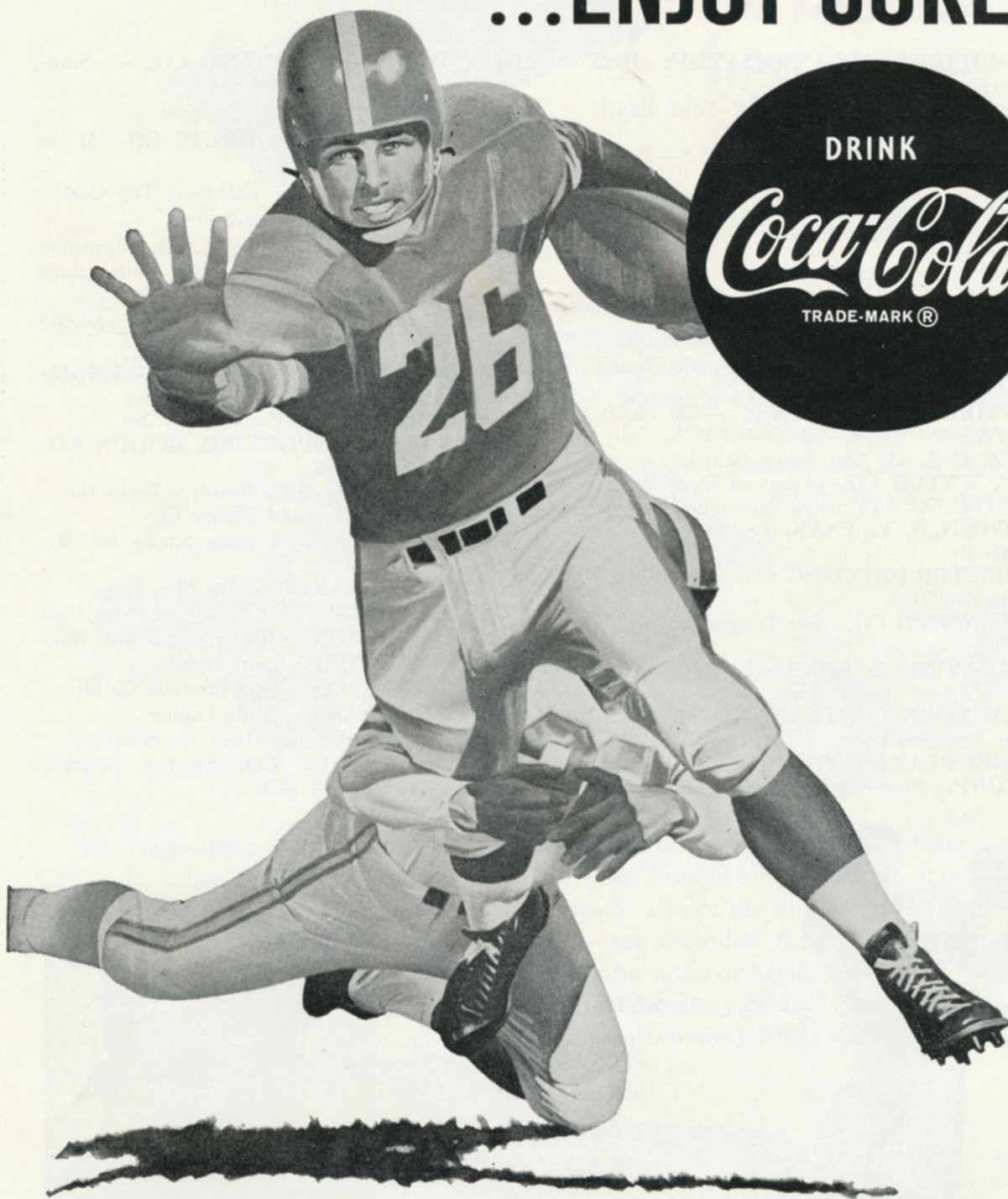
Remember that in 1960 Andy Robustelli and Jimmy Patton also were saddled with dual chores. That meant that three key defenders had to be concerned in the thick of combat with other things than their own important positional jobs.

Under the new set-up, Svare is better situated on the bench to see that his master plan is properly executed. And with Swede in charge on the sidelines, Robustelli and Patton, who continue to help him map strategy and do instructional work during the week, can concentrate on their field duties.

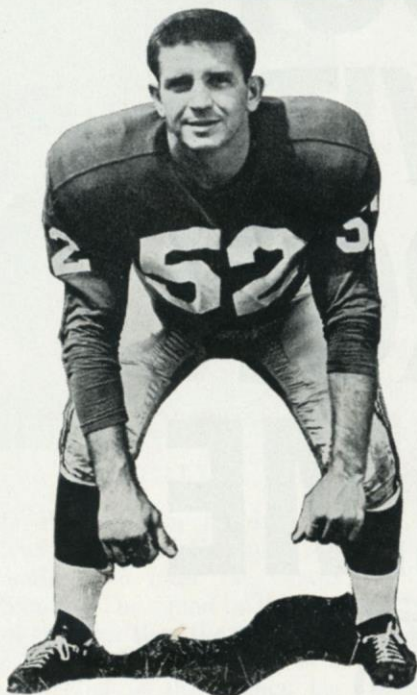
For these reasons or not, the Giant defense is vehemently vibrant again. Up front on the rushline, Jim Katcavage, Ed Modzelewski, Rosy Grier and Robustelli have been putting relentless pressure on enemy passers and holding firm against enemy rushers, Middle linebacker Sam Huff and his flanking close-supporters, Cliff Livingston and Scott, have been raising ructions on both sides of the scrimmage line. The fleet Barnes and the sharply improved Dick Lynch have been keeping the halfback zones inviolate and Dick Nolan and Patton have been emphatically locking the door at safety.

It's an electrifying eleven—this recharged Giant defensive unit.

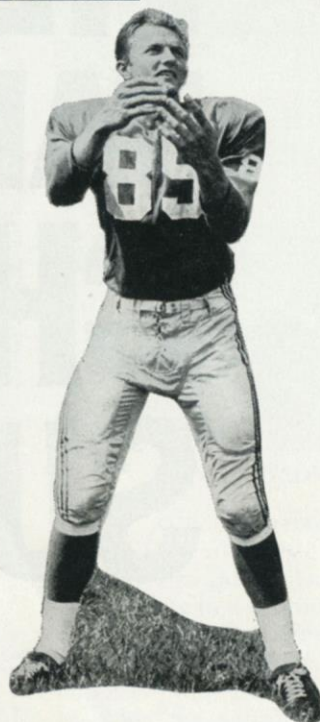

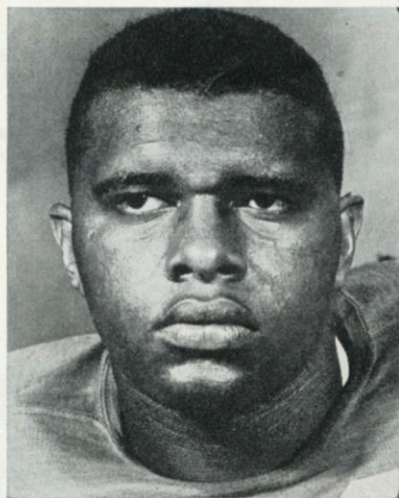
LARRY HAYES

The Giants, who have had good luck over the years with free agents, signed **Larry Hayes (52)** on that basis this season and are happy with the results. The 230-pound Vanderbilt graduate made the team as a spare linebacker and special unit man. A teammate of Phil King at Vanderbilt, Larry put in three seasons in Canada.



DEL SHOFNER

For years the Giants suffered for lack of deep pass receivers. They remedied this situation radically by obtaining **Del Shofner (85)** from the Rams in exchange for surplus talent. The fleet, rangy Baylor graduate has few equals in shagging long tosses downfield and has dazzling evasive moves on short patterns. In addition, Del is a superior punter and proven defensive back.



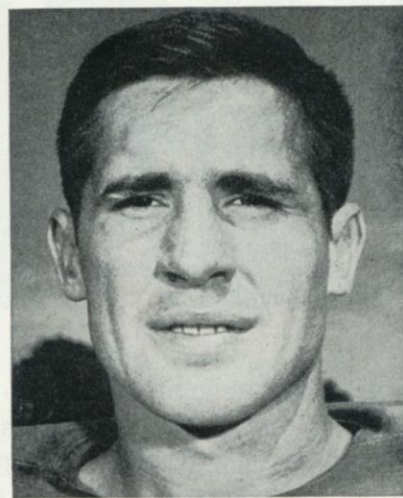
CHARLIE JANERETTE

The Giants believe they have come up with a major new addition in **Charlie Janerette (72)**. They obtained the 255-pound Philadelphian in a pre-season deal with Minnesota, which had acquired him from Los Angeles. A fifth draft choice of the Rams in 1960, Janerette made the team but did not play much. He's slated to see plenty of action with the Giants as a swing tackle. Penn State was Charlie's college.



JACK STROUD

Jack Stroud (66), now in his ninth year with the Giants, has been a mainstay of the offensive line since 1953. There are few better running guards in the business and, although relatively light at 235 pounds, he also does a bang-up job at tackle. Handicapped by knee injuries in 1957 and 1958, Jack made a complete recovery and had peak years in 1959 and 1960. He won All-America rating at Tennessee.



BOB SIMMS

Bob Simms (83), a Rutgers contribution to the Giants, has been cast in a new role this season. Used at offensive end as a 1960 rookie, he has been shifted to linebacker. Six-foot-two, 215 pounds and highly mobile, he has been shaping up well and his new post and figures to see a lot of service at the corners. Bob also is a key member of the various special units. He is a hard-hitting blocker and tackler.

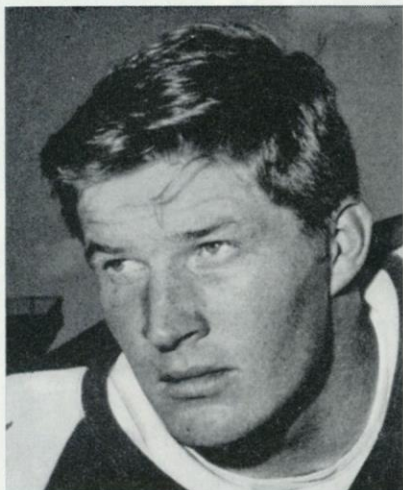

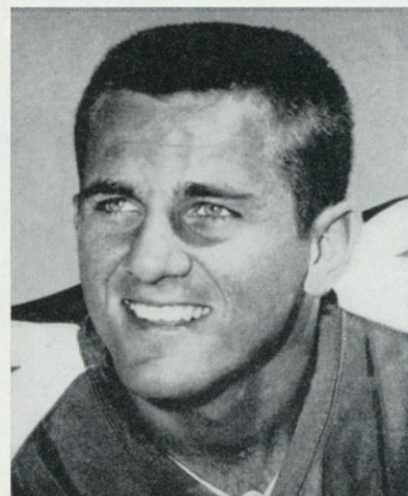
Still with the Cowboys are re-

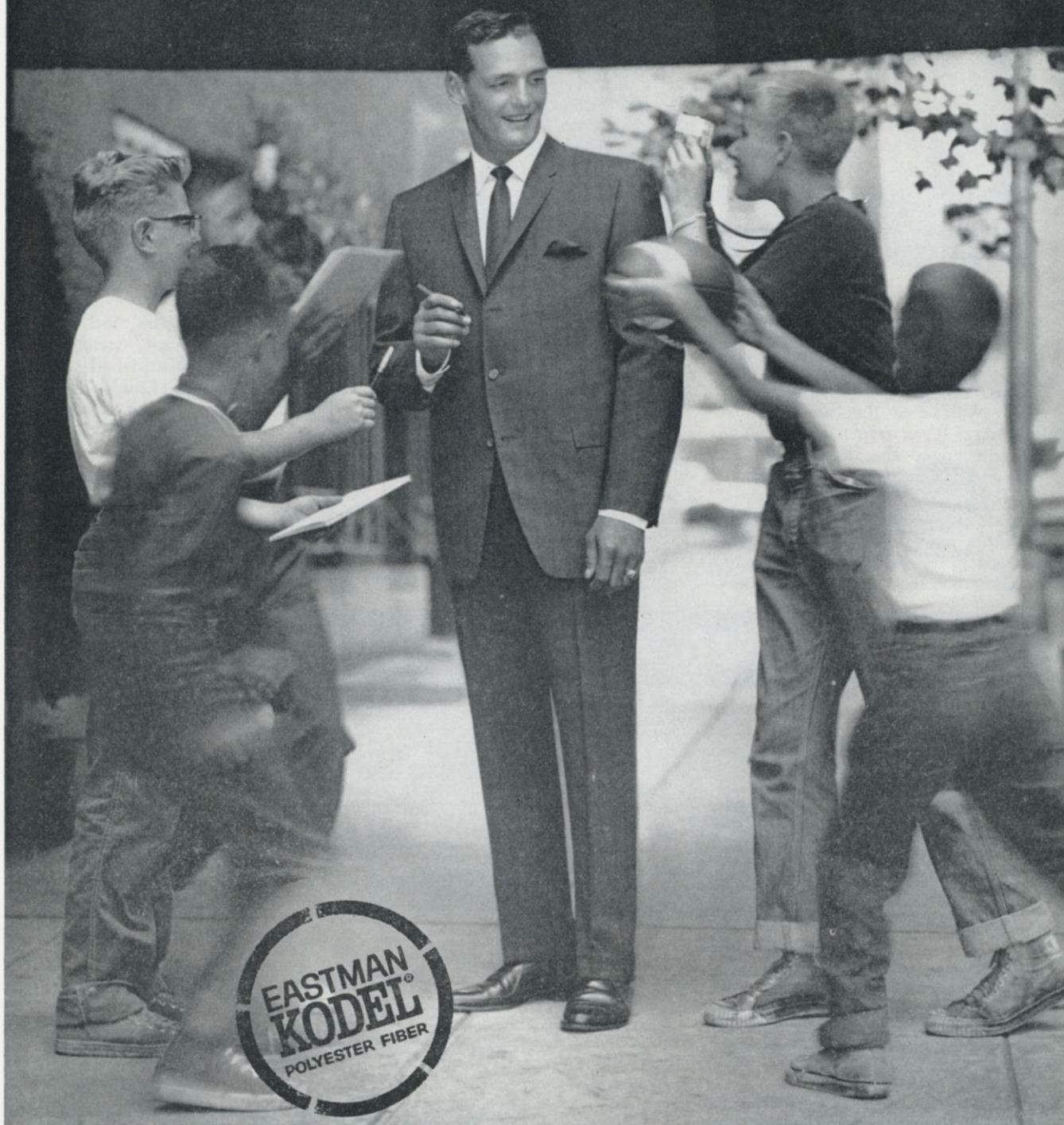

BOB GAITERS

The first player selected by the Giants in last winter's college draft, **Bob Gaiters (35)** has the look of a fellow who is going to make it big as a pro running back. He is one of the fastest Giants and, at 210 pounds, has the power to hit with authority. At New Mexico State last year, Bob led the nation in scoring with 145 points and rushing with 1,338 yards gained, averaging 6.7 yards per try.



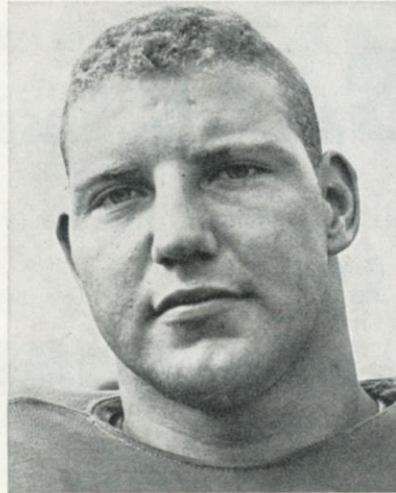
GREG LARSON

Greg Larson (53), who played center on Minnesota's national collegiate champions of 1960, is one of the best-endowed rookie linemen the Giants have signed in years. The 6 foot 3 inch, 235-pound Golden Gopher stood in brilliantly for Ray Wietecha in a couple of pre-season games and more lately has taken over at offensive right tackle. Greg has all the attributes to become an NFL star.



CHARLIE CONERLY

Although at 40, **Charlie Conerly (42)** is the oldest active player in the NFL, his zest for combat remains undiminished. This great, game performer has been the key cog in the Giant attack since 1948. His 1,374 pass completions have been good for 18,854 yards and 166 touchdowns. In addition, his inspirational value has been incalculable. The Ole Man from Ole Miss is one of the all-time greats.



MICKEY WALKER

Another of the rising young players who have given the 1961 Giants a fresh look is **Mickey Walker (64)**. This stalwart rookie from Michigan State has the makings of a crack offensive guard. At 225 pounds, he's a bit light for the position but he minimizes this handicap by his speed and the tigerish intensity with which he carries out his blocking assignments. He was signed as a free agent.



ALEX WEBSTER

One of the brightest Giant developments to date has been the apparent return of **Alex Webster (29)** to his former effectiveness as a running back after two injury-ridden seasons. When sound, Alex has few peers at getting the last inch a play has to offer. He was one of the Giants' prime movers on attack from 1955 through 1958. A North Carolina State product, Webster came to the Giants via Canada.

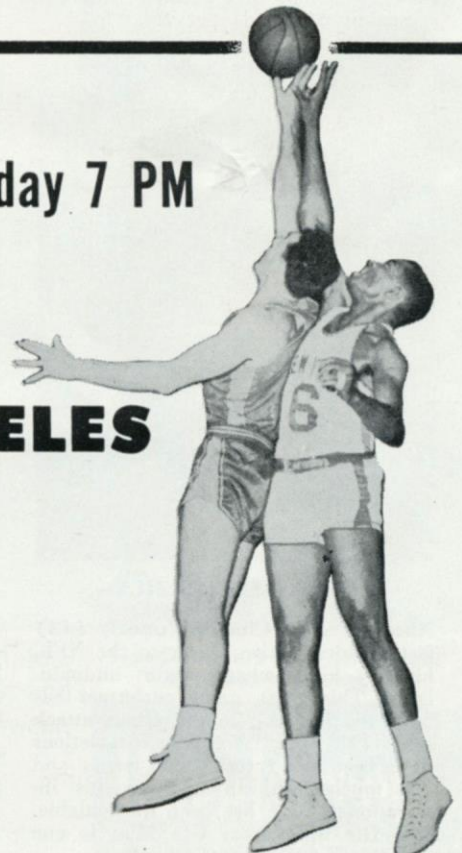

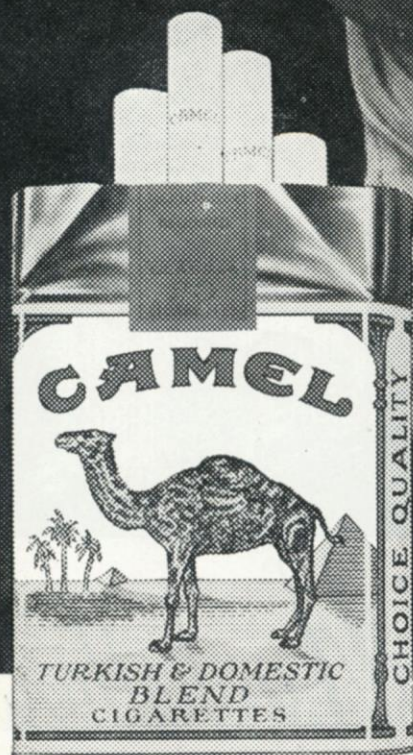

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Series Review

THIS will be the eleventh meeting between the Giants and the Rams. The Rams have a decisive edge in the series, having scored seven victories, as against three for the Giants.

The rivalry began in 1938, when the Rams still were located in Cleveland. The Giants won the opening contest, 28-0, but the Rams were triumphant in three of their next four visits to the Polo Grounds. They won 13-0 in 1940 and, after a 49-14 Giant victory in 1941, repeated 21-17 and 31-21 in 1945 and 1946. Old-line Giant fans undoubtedly will recall how Bob Waterfield, now the coach of the Rams, harried the New Yorkers with his deceptive bootleg runs, as well as with his passing, punting and place-kicking.

In 1947, the Giants paid their first visit to Los Angeles, to where the Rams had moved in 1946. The New Yorkers lost again, 34-10. Three more Ram victories followed (52-37 here in 1948, 21-7 at Los Angeles in 1953 and 17-16 here in 1954)

before the Giants finally snapped their six-game streak, 23-21, at Los Angeles in 1959.

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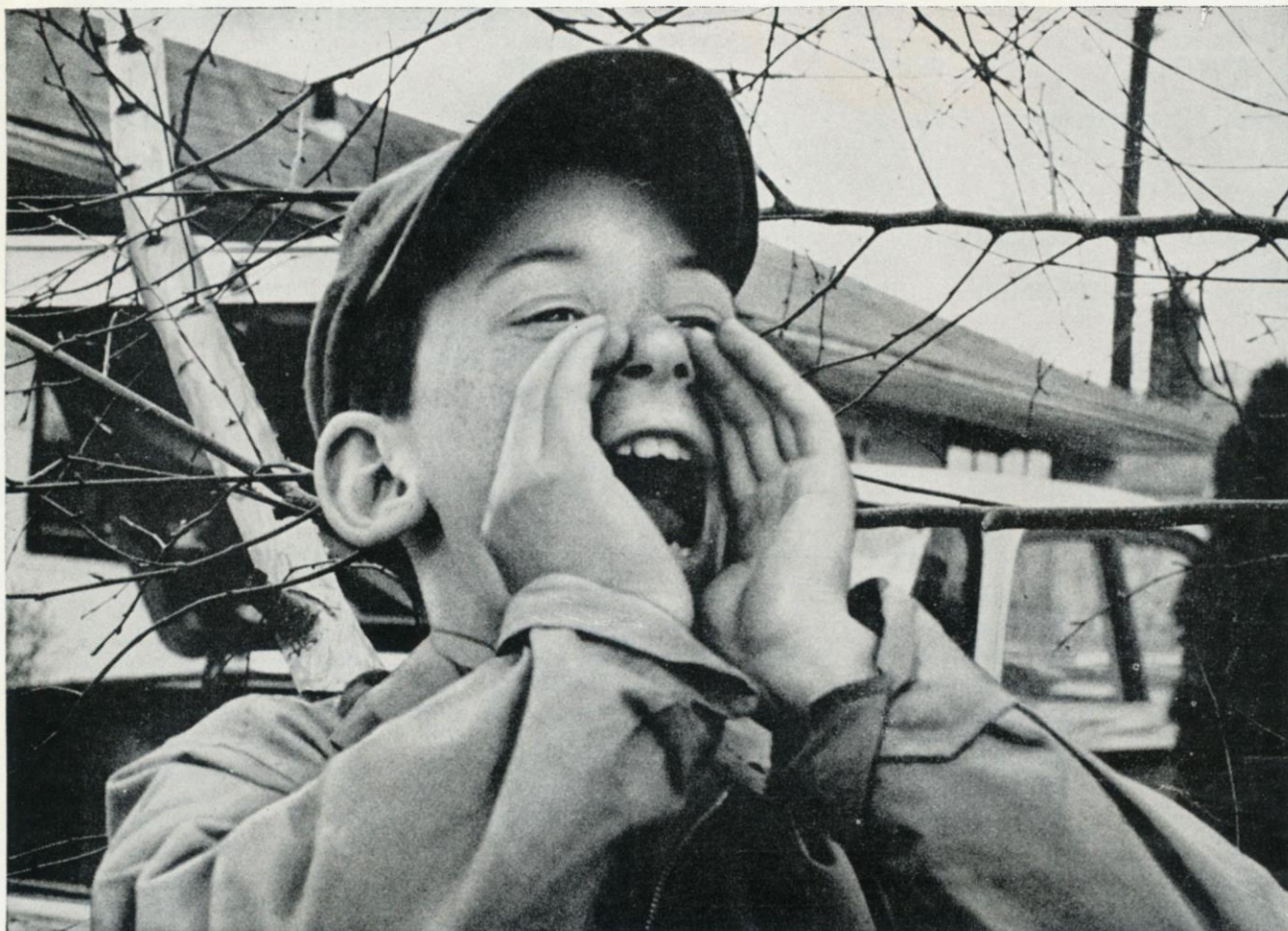

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Looking Over: *The Rams*

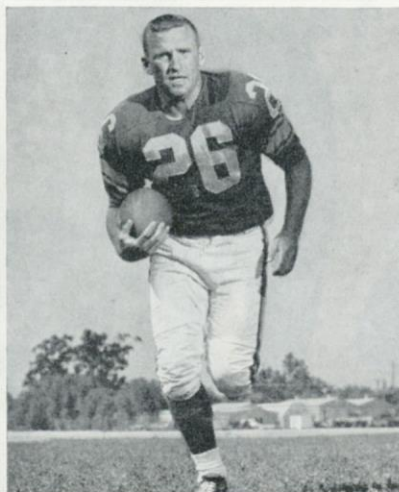
UNDER the coaching direction of Bob Waterfield, their great quarterback of a decade ago, the Rams have begun to climb back up the National Football League ladder, from whose top rungs they fell, with a 2-10 thud, in 1959.

With a big assist from rookie players, rookie coach Waterfield boosted the Los Angeles entry to a 4-7-1 record last season. With aid from another bumper crop of newcomers, Bob is confident that his 1961 squad will register further progress toward respectability.

It would be gilding the picture to describe the current Rams as one of the top N. F. L. powers but they definitely qualify as a rising force. With ten rookies and six pro sophomores on their roster, they have one of the youngest squads in the league.

These bright new faces are beginning to make their presence felt—two rookies and four second-year men customarily start on the two Ram platoons. However, until the rest of the wunderkind are ready to step out on their own, a surviving crops of solid old pros carries the brunt of the burden.

Traditionally explosive on attack, the Rams have half-a-dozen

running backs who possess the speed and elusiveness to go all the way. Foremost among them is Jon Arnett, one of football's most exciting open field runners—from scrimmage, on the receiving end of passes and on kick returns.

As running-mates in the starting backfield, Arnett has quick-hitting Tom Wilson, who operates from fullback, and fleet Ollie Matson, stationed on the wing or in the slot in the revised Ram attack.

Behind this high-gear trio, there's a full set of capable replacements. Dick Bass supports Arnett, the rookie Pervis Atkins understudies Matson and bruising Joe Marconi backs up Wilson.

Zeke Bratkowski, obtained from the Bears in the deal that shipped Billy Wade to Chicago, is the No. 1 quarterback, with Frank Ryan in reserve. Bratkowski, a rubber-armed thrower who specializes in the long ball, has swift receivers in Jim (Red) Phillips, Carroll Dale and Duane Allen, a 6 foot 4 inch rookie jumping jack from Santa Ana J. C.

The Rams think so highly of these flankmen that they made the brilliant Del Shofner available to

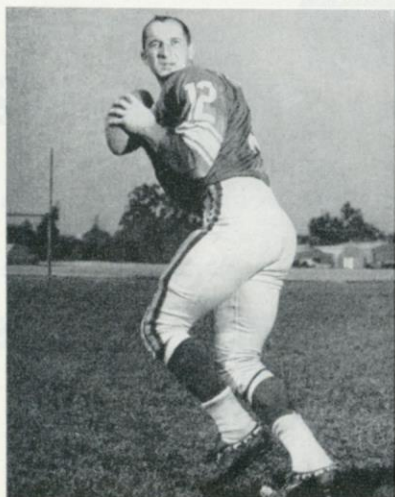
the Giants in exchange for a future draft pick shortly before the season started.

Art Hunter, at center, and Frank Varrichione, at right tackle, are the experienced anchors of an improving offensive line that includes two second-year pros—Jim Boeke and Roy Hord—on the left side and a rookie—Joe Scibelli—at right guard.

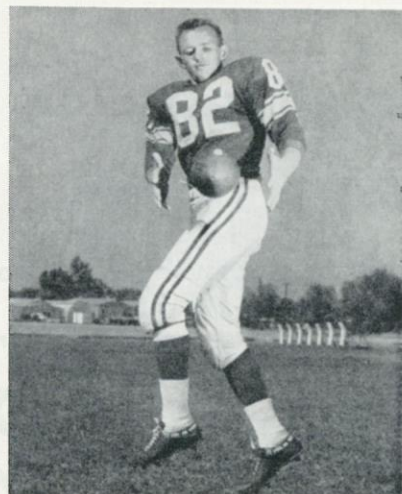
The defense, a perennial Los Angeles weakness even in the Rams' heydays, has been strikingly improved. The most notable advance has been made in the deep secondary. It now presents Eddie Meador and Lindon Crow, ex-Giant, on the wings and Charlie Britt and Clendon Thomas at the twin safety posts.

A beefy rushline deploys John Baker (275), rookie Urban Henry (265), John LoVetere (280) and Lamar Lundy (6-7 and 235) from left to right. Les Richter leads a hard-hitting line-backing crew that has profited by the enlistment of Marlin McKeever, the U. S. C. All-America, currently injured.

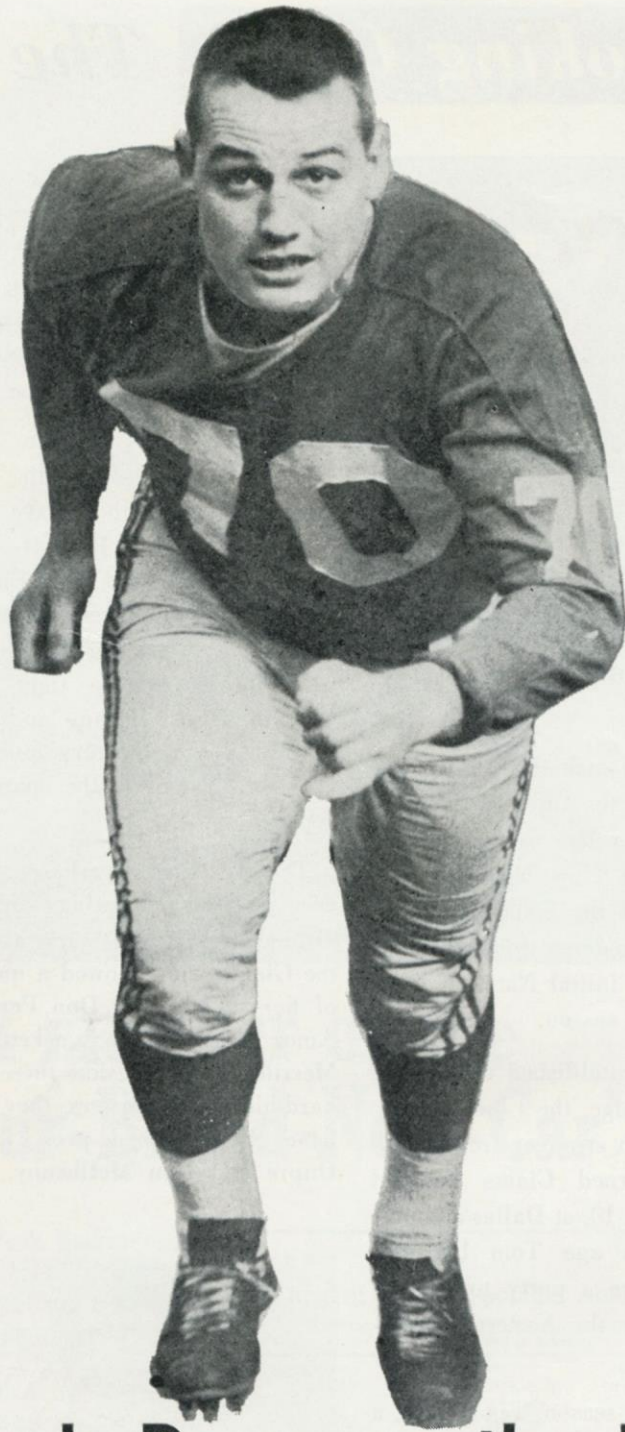
This is an up-and-coming Los Angeles team. The Giants could be in for real trouble today.

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NFL News and Notes

WITH total attendance running better than 300,000 for each seven-game Sunday schedule to date, the National Football League seems certain to break all previous turnstile marks. . . . Rookie quarterbacks—such as Bill Kilmer of San Francisco, Norman Snead of Washington, Francis Tarkenton of Minnesota and Sam Etcheverry, the vintage newcomer to St. Louis—are having quite a fling. Add such newly-installed regulars as Sonny Jurgensen of Philadelphia and Don Meredith of Dallas and such transfers as Y. A. Tittle of the Giants, Zeke Bratkowski of Los Angeles and Billy Wade of Chicago and you have the biggest turnover at this key position in years.

Top NFL individual performances through the games of Oct. 8: Longest scrimmage run, 58 yards, by Alex Webster of the Giants vs. Pittsburgh; longest passing gain, 98 yards, Billy Wade to John Farrington of Chicago vs. Detroit; most points in a game,

33, by Paul Hornung of Green Bay vs. Baltimore; longest punt, 71 yards from the scrimmage line, by Bobby Joe Green of Pittsburgh vs. the Giants; longest punt return, 72 yards, by Willie Wood of Green Bay vs. Baltimore; longest kick-off return, 105 yards, by Tim

Brown of Philadelphia vs. Cleveland; longest pass interception return, 50 yards, by Don Bishop of Dallas vs. Cleveland. (Ed. Note: Erich Barnes of the Giants, topped Bishop's mark by 52 yards at Dallas last Sunday.)

Recommended Reading: Vince Lombardi's cogent explanation, with Tim Cohane's collaboration, in the latest issue of Look Magazine on "Why The Pros Play Better Football." Vince cites five basic reasons in support of the title theme, as follows: (1) The pros are bigger and just as quick. (2) Pro rules permit two platoons—specialized units for offense and defense. (3) Football is the pro's business, so he gives it full-time concentration. (4) His playing time is not restricted to three varsity seasons. (5) The National Football League draft selects the best of the annual college crop. From this take-off point, Lombardi preaches a powerful sermon on why there's no football like NFL pro football.

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Giant Blackboard: Three Ends, etc.

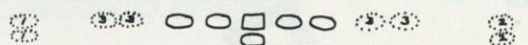
IT had been Coach Allie Sherman's intention to have the Giants attack this year from a new slot-wing "inside" formation that he worked long and hard to devise last winter. Alas! A rash of backfield injuries made it necessary to junk this master plan—or at least hold it in abeyance.

Long in pass-receivers, if short of running backs, Sherman hastily switched to alignments designed to make the most of the talent at his disposal. As you probably have noted on television, the Giants have been attacking mainly from a "three-end" formation, varying it occasionally with what might be described as a "saturation spread."

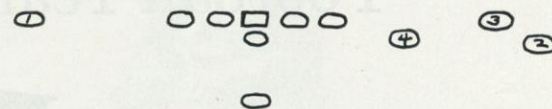
To help you get oriented, these formations are diagrammed in the adjacent column.

In the three-end formation, Del Shofner (1) and Kyle Rote (2) are flanked wide on opposite sides—on the line, or off it, depending on which side the third end, Joe Walton (3) lines up. The outside man on Walton's side has to drop back, or Joe, being flanked by another lineman, wouldn't qualify as an eligible receiver. Basically, three-man patterns are run off this formation, with the two deep backs held in the block. But the halfback, usually Joe Morrison (4), stationed opposite Walton, can swing out as an extra receiver.

In the saturation spread, which provides for four-man patterns, only the fullback (Alex Webster) is held in back of the ball. Halfback Morrison (4)

moves up into a slot position, off the line. On the same side, Walton (3) moves out wide, with Rote (2) winging him.

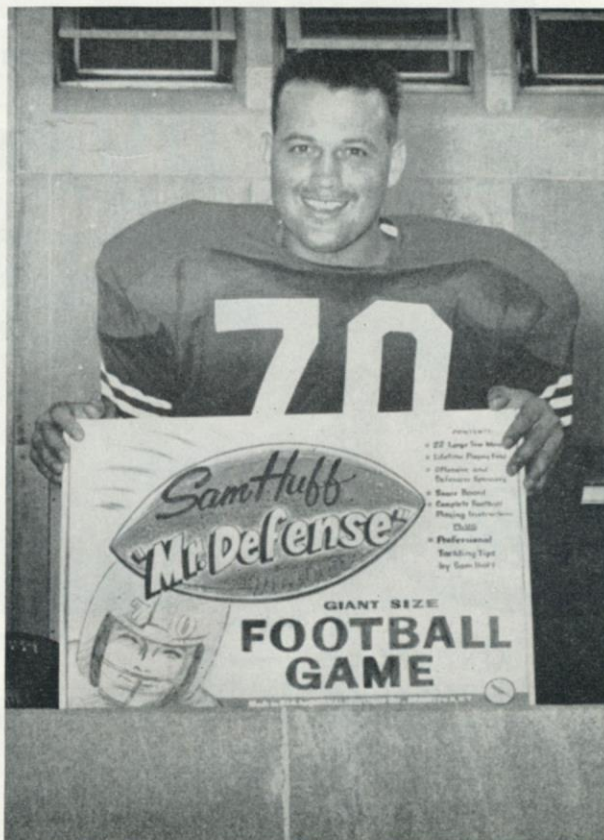
Setting out three eligibles on one side creates the saturation—of the defensive left zone. At the same time, it also virtually assures that Shofner (1), alone on the left flank, will have a man-on-man opportunity to break loose.

If the defense wants to double-team Del against this set-up, it can do so only by detaching the right-side linebacker. That cuts down on red-dogging firepower and also makes it unwise to have the right-side rushliners pile in too hard, because, with close linebacking support removed, they would be vulnerable to a quick fullback sweep or quarterback roll-out. Is everything clear?

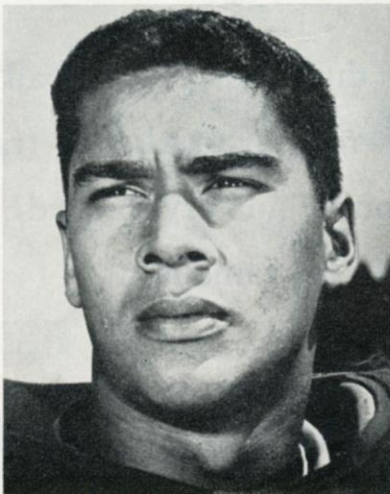
JOEL WELLS

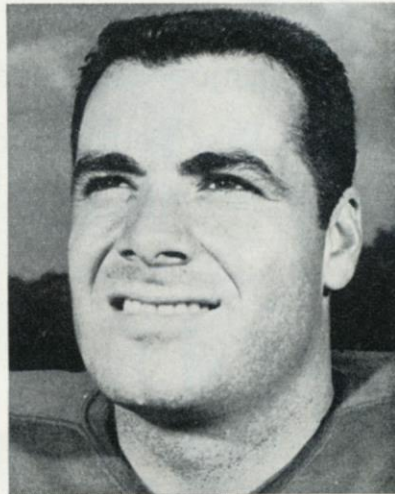
ZEKE SMITH

JOE WALTON

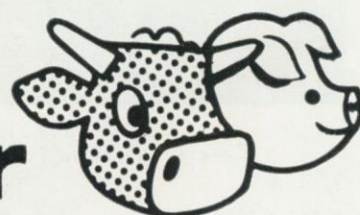
