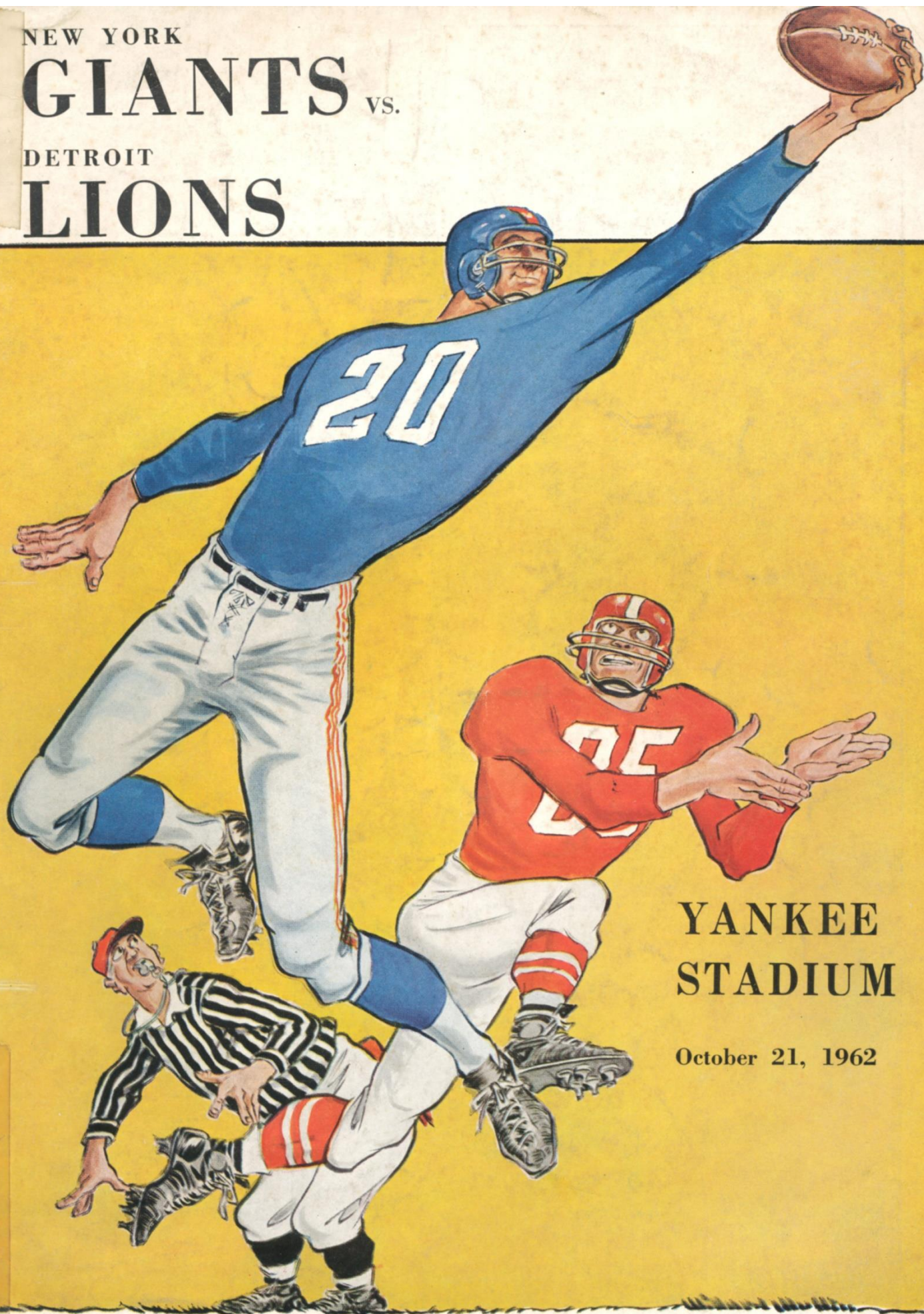

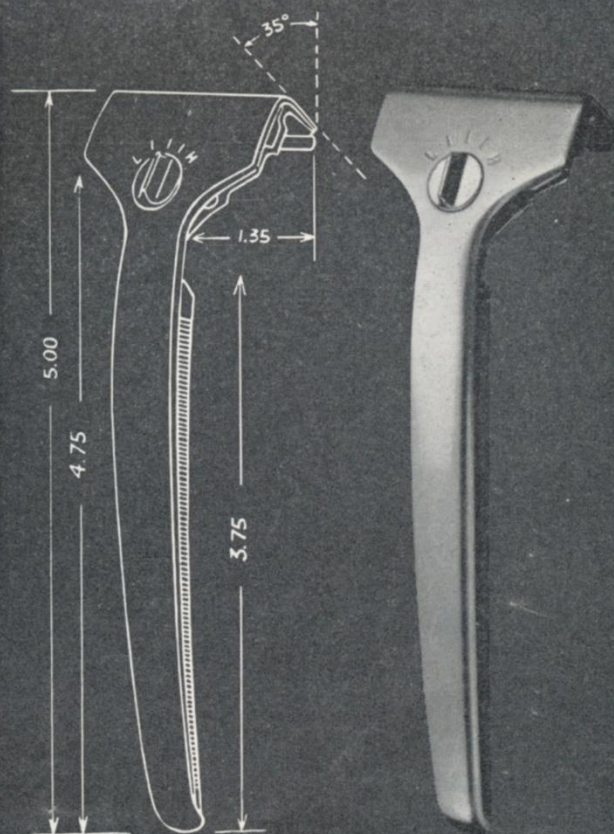

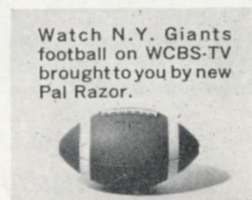

No Margin for Error

LAST Sunday's loss to the Steelers puts the Giants in a bit of a spot today. The setback makes the game with the Lions pretty much of a "must" contest for Coach Allie Sherman's squad.

Normally, it's not a matter of life or death to beat a team from the other division. But having lost two games to divisional rivals, the Giants can ill afford to drop a decision to the Lions—particularly with the surprising Redskins, who still are unbeaten.

Detroit, covered in detail on page 27, will be hard to shave, as the Giants well know. The Lions have a stonewall defense and sharpened claws on offense with Milt Plum at quarterback.

The Giants have a good record for rising to the occasion but, to win this one, they'll have to play their best.

To date, their performance has been spotty. Their running game has clicked only sporadically and sloppy pass-protection blocking has reduced the normal lethal

effectiveness of their passing. Fumbles have been damaging, too.

They cannot afford to repeat these misfeasances and malfeasances against a team of the stature of the Lions.

The unfortunate loss of Del Shofner in last Sunday's game with the Steelers puts added pressure on the Giants today. The rangy end was headed toward one of his greatest seasons.

It would be foolish to say that Shofner will not be missed but, looking at things from the bright side, the Giants are better fixed for pass-catchers than they have been for several years.

Frank Gifford, slow to start after laying out of football for a whole season, now is beginning to look like his old mercurial self. Joe Walton has been solid and steady at the tight end. The rookie Jim Collier has displayed professional qualifications. And the current situation underlines the foresightedness of the Giant

front office in obtaining Aaron Thomas, an experienced flanker, from the Forty-Niners a couple of weeks ago.

Then, too, Joe Morrison is available as a stand-in for Shofner. The versatile Cincinnati, who plays well almost anywhere, has been an invaluable trouble-shooter through his four seasons with the Giants.

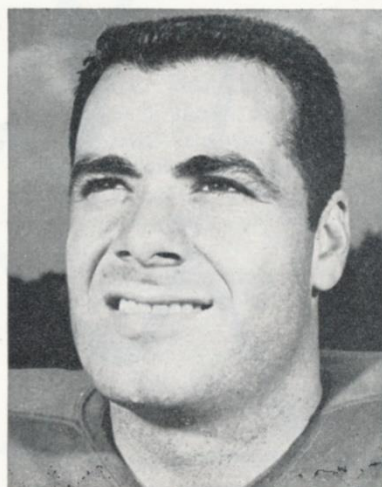
With these five targets available to Y. A. Tittle, the Giants still should be able to keep the aerial phase of their three-end attack going. But only if the offensive line holds firmer than it has been doing.

It would be nice, too, if the men up front would knock down more people to give Alex Webster, Johnny Counts and Co. more running room than they have been getting.

To carry the day against the Lions, all components of the Giants must do their bits. An all-out team effort is needed today. Go, Giants, go!

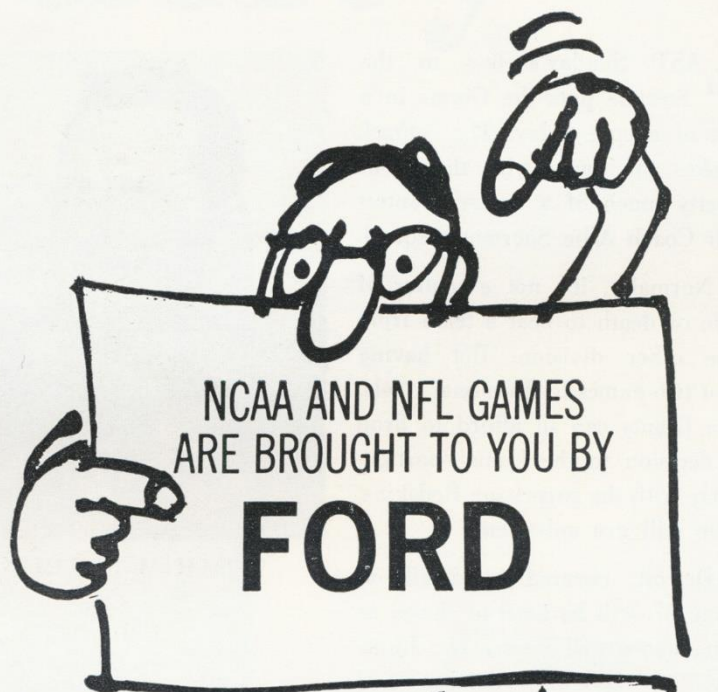

He "Moves" The Giants

ONCE again, as they did for so many years with Charlie Conerly, the Giants boast the dean of quarterbacks in Y. A. Tittle, whose supple and tireless right arm has earned him a distinguished place among the elite forward passers of pro football history.

With the retirement of teammate Conerly at 40, former San Francisco 49er star Tittle, now a spry 35 years old, holds senior status in the NFL by a whisker or, more precisely, by 56 days. The balding "Old General" of the gridiron was born on Oct. 24, 1926, and his fellow Texan and arch-rival, Bobby Layne of Pittsburgh, on Dec. 19 of that year.

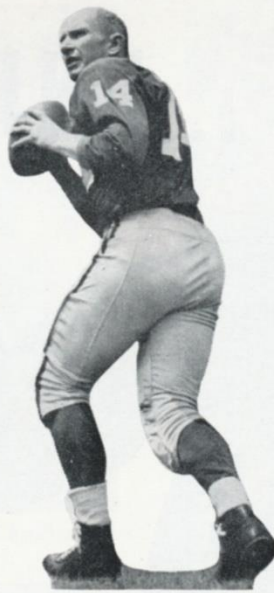
Tittle, Layne and the recently retired Conerly all came up as rookies together in 1948.

Tittle's career has encompassed three separate eras. As a sharpshooting young passer out of LSU in 1948, Y. A. began a three-year hitch with the Baltimore Colts, two of them in the All-America Conference and one in the NFL when the Colts switched over. Then he was acquired by the San Francisco 49ers and was a mainstay at that far western outpost from 1951-60. In 1961, Tittle was traded to New York, where he now labors as Conerly's successor.

Although a world championship has eluded Tittle over the years, his accurate and durable right arm has propelled him high on the list of quarterback greats. He stands fourth among the all-time passers in completions, percentage and yardage. He has, at various times, led the NFL in completions, percentage, touchdown passes and low percentage of interceptions.

Y. A.'s statistics are based on only 12 seasons because he played his first two years in the AAC with Baltimore before the Colts joined the NFL. Nevertheless, it is on the record that "Yat," in two leagues, has completed more passes than any other quarterback in professional football history. His 14-year total is 1,859.

During his NFL tenure, the bald-pated Texan has gained 21,381 yards with his aeri-als, and he is likely to surpass Sammy

Baugh's 22,085 for 16 years. However, Layne is far ahead with 25,082 and Norm Van Brocklin, now retired, is second at 23,611.

Only in touchdown passes does Tittle lag. He has 142, and is out of range of the leaders, Baugh and Layne (187), and runners-up Van Brocklin and Conerly (173).

The "Old General," as former San Francisco coach and teammate labeled Tittle, suffered statistically in 1960 when a chronic groin injury held him to four TDs and a secondary role behind young John Brodie.

But Y. A. made a marvelous comeback in 1961 after being traded to the Giants for guard Lou Cordileone. In a glittering performance, he had 163 completions (sixth in the NFL); a completion mark of 57.2 (third); 2,272 yards (seventh); 17 TDs (fifth); 4.2 per cent intercepted (second), and 7.97 yards per completion (eighth).

Despite his successes, Tittle's case history shows a constant struggle to keep his station.

When he joined Baltimore as a rookie in 1948, he had to beat out two well-known pros, Bud Schwenk and Charlie O'Rourke, for the quarterback position.

In 1950, when the Colts migrated to the NFL, "Yat" held off prize rookie Adrian Burke of

Baylor. Then the Colts folded and Y. A. moved to San Francisco, where he was a reserve behind the classy southpaw, Frankie Albert.

By 1952, Tittle had taken over for Albert. But there always seemed to be a new threat to the "Old General." One by one such talented quarterbacks as Jim Powers of USC, Maury Duncan of San Francisco State, Earl Morrall of Michigan State and Brodie of Stanford challenged "Yat" for the starting job. And, one by one, they were repulsed.

Injuries, and an improved Brodie, moved Tittle out of a first-string role in 1959—finally. But the old boy got a new lease on life with his transfer to New York.

What followed was an eastern division championship for the Maramen with Tittle performing at the peak of his artistry.

Tittle was born in Marshall, Texas, on Oct. 24, 1926. Yelberton is an old family name, and Abraham was dropped in because his parents believed a Biblical appellation was necessary. As a result, Y. A. has acquired such nicknames as "Yat," "Ya-Ya," "Colonel Slick," and "Bald Eagle."

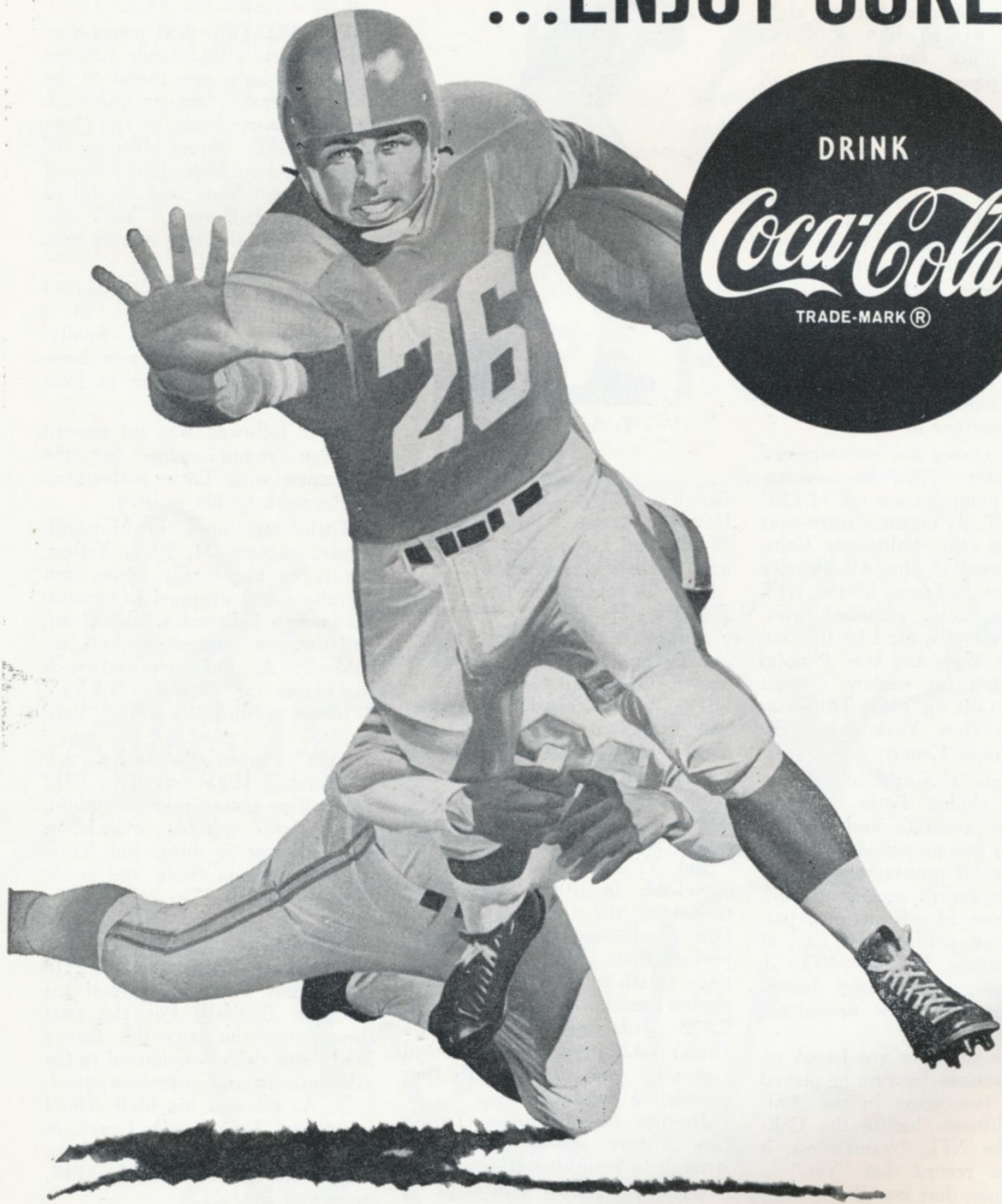
"Yat" was an all-state halfback at Marshall High School in 1943 and college scouts, especially those from Texas schools, evinced a keen interest in him. But Tittle chose Louisiana State and made the varsity as a 17-year-old freshman.

When he was a sophomore, LSU shifted from the single wing to the T and Tittle had found his place in football. For the next three years he was the team's MVP, and twice was named to the all-Southeastern Conference squad.

Y. A. married his high school sweetheart, Minnette De Loach, as a pro rookie. Today they have three children—Dianne, 11; Mike, nine, and Pat, six.

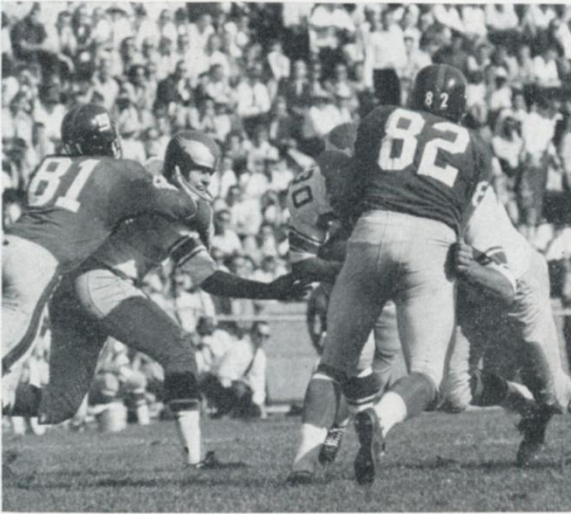
Tittle is in the insurance business in San Francisco, and his Palo Alto brokerage is now one of the most successful in the Bay Area. He and his family live in the swanky suburb of Atherton in a new \$75,000 home.

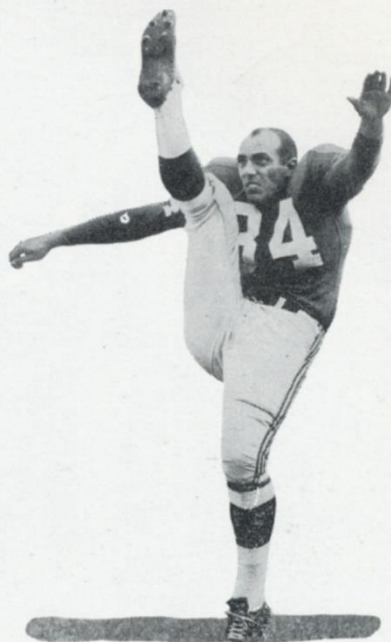

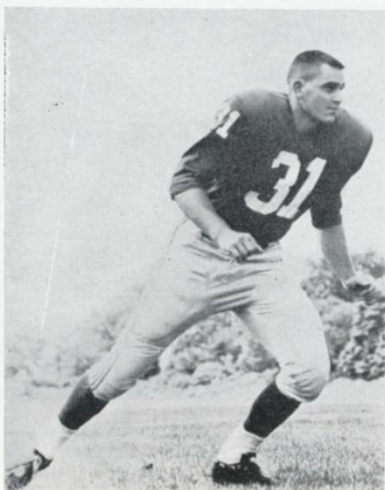
Greg Larson

Greg Larson (53) captain of Minnesota's 1961 Rose Bowl team, joined the Giants last season and immediately established himself as a bright offensive line prospect. A center and linebacker in college, he was a starter at right tackle for most of his rookie season. This year, he has filled in at right guard as well as at tackle. He's also the No. 1 replacement for Ray Wietecha at center.



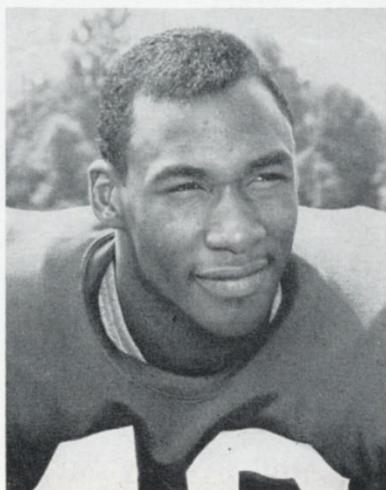
Don Chandler

Besides handling the punting assignment, which he has done admirably for six years, the strong-legged Florida graduate has taken over the place-kicking chores abandoned by the retired Pat Summerall. Don is doing better than just all right at his additional new job. He's getting both distance and direction on his placements.



Bill Winter

The Giants think they have come up with a real "find" in **Bill Winter (31)**. Although he was only on 18th round choice in the 1962 college draft, Winter won regular rating in pre-season training and has firmly established himself at left linebacker. A hard-hitting 220-pounder, who moves fast, Bill won eight major letters in football, baseball and basketball at little St. Olaf College.



Johnny Counts

Johnny Counts (46) was signed as a free agent by the Giants last June. But he wasn't exactly a "sleeper." The Giants were aware of his talents ever since his high school days at New Rochelle, where he starred in track as well as football. They would have signed him sooner but they had to await the graduation of his entering class at Illinois, where Johnny was named the Big Ten "sophomore of the year" in 1960.

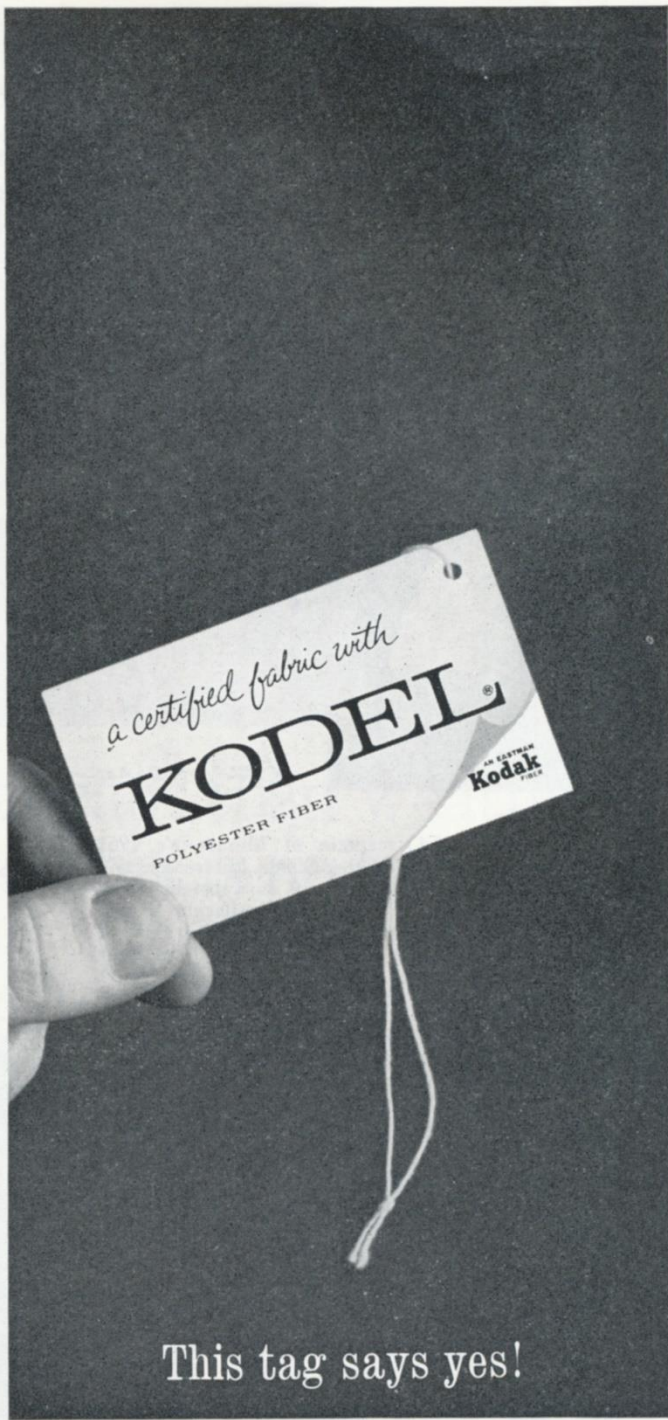


Dick Pesonen

The Giants acquired **Dick Pesonen (25)** last spring from the Minnesota Vikings in exchange for Cliff Livingston. A 24-year-old graduate of the University of Minnesota's Duluth Branch, he was signed by the Packers as a free agent in 1960. He went to Minnesota in the players' stocking pool made available to the new NFL entry in 1961. 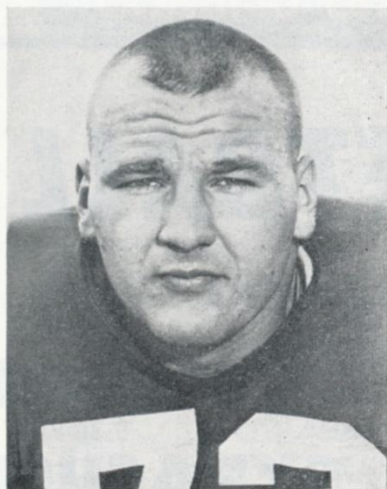
Andy Robustelli

No center in football, say the Giants, can execute the blocking assignments that **Ray Wietecha (55)** carries out with practiced ease. The rugged 225-pound Northwestern graduate has fantastic lateral range. Ray also is the iron man of the Giants. Going into this season, he had played in 118 consecutive games and never had missed a minute of offensive play because of injury.

Andy Robustelli (81), the Giants' defensive coach, has established himself as one of pro football's greatest defensive ends in 12 seasons of brilliant play with the Los Angeles Rams and the Giants, who acquired him in 1956 in exchange for a future draft choice. Strong, quick and blessed with an uncanny sense of anticipation, Robustelli specializes in harassing enemy passers and in piling up running plays in their inception. A native of Stamford, Conn., where he still makes his home, Andy attended Arnold College, now defunct.



Reed Bohovich

Giant insiders believe that the New Yorkers have mined a diamond in the rough in big **Reed Bohovich (73)**. This young Giant from Lehigh, who hadn't attained voting age when the season began, has started several games at right tackle on offense and also is being groomed for service at guard. There are rough spots in his work, of course, but he has impressed as having the basic ability to develop into a pro star. His 260 pounds and speed afoot are other endorsements.



Jack Stroud

For all-around serviceability, there are few, if any, offensive linemen who can match **Jack Stroud (66)**. At various stages in his stellar 10-year career with the Giants, this deep-chested, powerfully-built Tennessee graduate has played regularly at both guards and both tackles. He also is used as a goal-line defender. Pulling or firing straight out, Jack is a lethal blocker.



Jimmy Patton

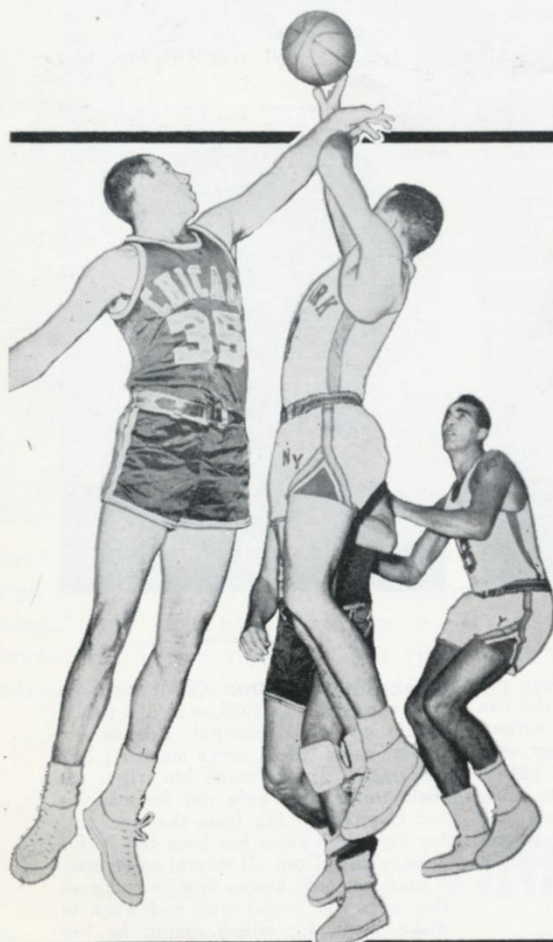
When **Jimmy Patton (20)** tried out with the Giants in 1955 as an 180-pound rookie out of Mississippi, sideline observers said: "He'll never make it; he's too small." Jimmy made his critics eat their words. Not only did he make it but he made it big from the start and for the last 5 years has been the NFL's acknowledged top all-around safetyman. Patton not only knows how to make all the plays but knows why and when to make them, for which reason he has served as a playing coach the last three seasons.

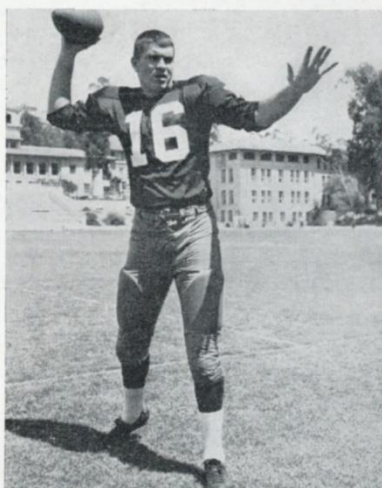
Next Sunday—The Redskins

THE Lions came in for a lot of criticism last winter from Detroit fans—general manager Edwin Anderson was even hung in effigy—when they were outbid by American League and Canadian League clubs for their top draft choices.

These slip-ups long since have been forgiven. A few months later the unjustly abused Detroit front office put over a coup that has made the Lions one of the most fearsome forces in the National League.

In a six-player exchange with the Cleveland Browns of the Eastern Division, Detroit obtained Milt Plum, Tom Watkins and Dave Lloyd for Jim Ninowski, Howard Cassady and Bill Glass.

All the players on each side of the trade were proven or potentially good pros but the Lions got the prize catch in Plum. They needed a quarterback desperately and in the husky Penn State graduate, they got a man who had led the N.F.L. passers for two straight years.

The acquisition of Plum gave Detroit an attacking balance that it had lacked. With him, the Lions are equipped to roar aloft as well as alow.

Milt, who had bridled at the bench dictation on play-calling he had had to accept in Cleveland, as a happier relationship in Detroit with Coach George Wilson. He also has a gifted trio of receivers in Terry Barr, Jim Gibbons and Dale Cogdill.

The Lions' strong running game has profited from having this added aerial threat. Defenses that used to be stacked against the power thrusts of Nick Pietrosante and slashing drives of Danny Lewis now must be deployed more conservatively. Watkins also has proved to be a valuable asset as a spare running back.

Defensively, the Lions measure up to the best. They have a time-tested, case-hardened defensive unit that can't be seriously faulted in any department.

Their mighty rushline is bul-

warked by two tackles of All-League stature—slick Alex Karras and 300-pound Roger Brown.

Joe Schmidt, their defensive captain and middle line-backer, has been a perennial all-league selection.

Among other stalwarts, their deep secondary has Yale Lary, the slickest safetyman this side of the Giants' Jimmy Patton, and perhaps the most consistently good punter in all of the N.F.L.

Many experts rate the Lions second only to the Packers in basic talent in pro football's big league. Detroit, itself, makes no such concession.

In their head-to-head clash a couple of weeks ago, the Lions held the Packers to a 9-6 score, yielding nary a touchdown. They are confident they will reverse this outcome in the next meeting of the clubs.

Obviously, the Giants are going to have their hands full this afternoon.

Series Review

TODAY'S game between the Giants and the Lions is the first meeting between the clubs since 1958, when the New Yorkers scored a 19-17 victory in Detroit.

That was the Giants' second triumph in a row over the Motor City team, the New Yorkers also having won 24-19 in 1954, also in Detroit.

However, over the whole 29-year-old rivalry between the clubs, the Lions hold the edge. They have won eight games, as against five by the Giants. In 1943 the teams played to a scoreless tie.

By and large, the contests between the teams have been close. The biggest Giant margin was 35-14 in 1945. Detroit had its largest edge of 38-0 in 1936. The Lions recorded the series' highest scoring total in their 45-21 victory of 1949.

Perhaps the most famous New York-Detroit game was their 1935 play-off battle for the National League championship, played in bitter cold weather at the University of Detroit Stadium.

Dutch Clark, Ace Gutowsky, and Ernie Caddell, the key men in one of the greatest single-wing backfields ever put together, proved too powerful for a Giant team that included such great stars as Ed Danowski, Ken Strong, Kink Richards and

Mel Hein. The score in favor of the Lions was 26-7.

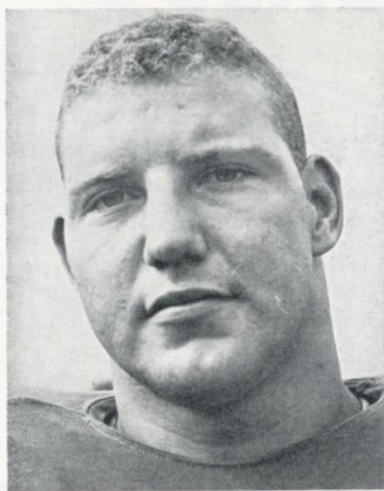
Rose Brown

Sam Huff

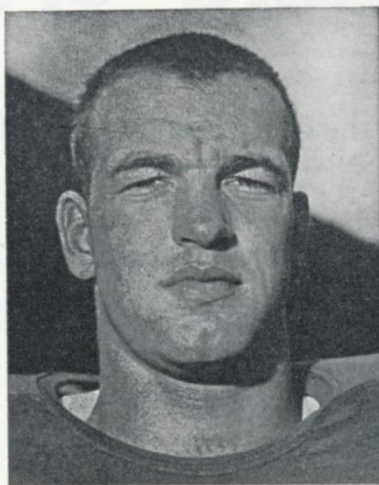


Baby-faced **Sam Huff (70)** speaks softly and has a deceptively roly-poly appearance. His large and vociferous Yankee Stadium claue is not deceived. Huff fans know and love—Sam for what he really is—a rough, tough football player who asks and gives no quarter. An honored tackle at West Virginia, Huff was a No. 3 draft choice in 1956. He quickly won a job as a middle linebacker and for the last four seasons has been all-league.

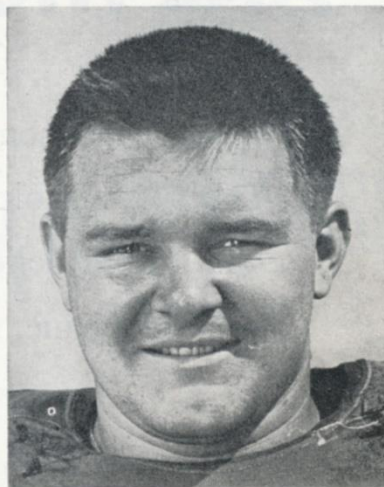
Back in 1953, the Giants took a flyer in the 27th round of the NFL draft on a rawboned young tackle from little Morgan State College named **Roosevelt Brown (79)**. History has proved the selection to be inspired. By 1954 Rosie was solidly entrenched as an offensive starter at left tackle and since 1955, he has been an all-league. A fast-moving 260-pounder, Brown blocks dynamically, on the line and down-field. He also pitches in on goal-line defense.

This season he is at linebacker again and doing a bang-up job in support of the starters. A rugged 230-pounder, he loves to get in there and mix it.

In modern pro football, where there are so many specialized jobs to fill and, with rosters so tightly restricted, so few men to fill them, players like **Joe Morrison (40)** are worth their weight in gold. This stalwart Cincinnati graduate, a No. 3 draft choice in 1959, does everything well. Offensively, he can play behind the ball, on the flank and as a relief end. He finished last season as a defensive regular. And he's a crack kick returner. A good man to have around.

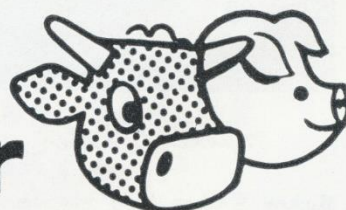
Darrell Dees (62) came to the Giants in 1959 via the Washington Redskins and Pittsburgh Steelers. Since joining the club, the stocky 235-pound graduate of North Carolina State has been a starter more often than not at left guard on the offensive unit. A wrestling star in college, he has the strength and weight to make his blocks stick and the speed of foot to get out ahead of the ball-carrier on wide plays.

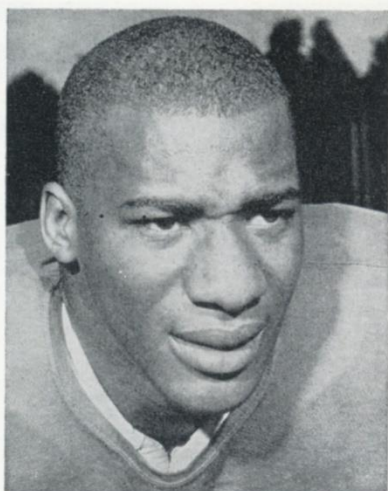

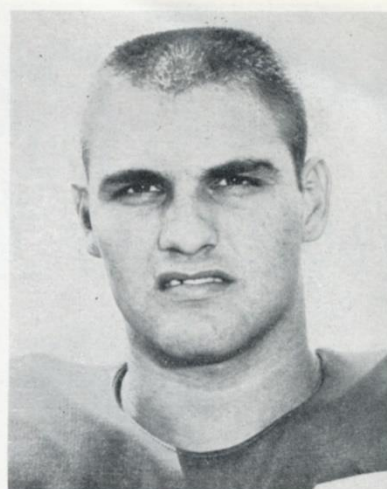
Erich Barnes

NFL Scoring Rules

As a matter of interest to Giant fans, excerpts from the revised 1962 scoring rules are presented herewith. They form the basis for the compilation of the official league statistics.

Yardage—

Yardage gained shall be determined from the line of scrimmage.

In computing final yardage tabulations for teams, only net yards gained shall be used.

Total yards gained shall be computed by adding net yards gained from scrimmage by either rushing or forward passes completed only.

First Downs—

A first down shall be credited on each scoring play regardless of distance covered, resulting from rushes or forward passes, from the line of scrimmage.

Forward Passes—

If a passer, attempting a forward pass, is thrown for a loss before he gets rid of the ball, it is classified as "Yards lost attempting to pass" with a separate category designated on the score blank. Should a passer complete a pass behind the line of scrimmage that results in a loss of yardage he shall be credited with a pass attempt and a pass completion and the yardage deducted from his *gross yardage gained*.

A forward pass ruled complete due to interference shall not be considered an attempt nor a completion but shall be reflected as a first down by penalty and the offending team shall be charged with a penalty and the yards involved in the play added to their "yards penalized" total.

When a passer intentionally grounds the ball he shall be credited with a pass attempt.

If, in the scorer's judgment, a passer attempts to run with the ball instead of passing, he shall be credited with a "Rushing" attempt and any gains or losses of yardage shall be credited in that category.

Lateral Pass—

In all returns (rushing, pass receptions, punt returns and other classifications) when a player laterals a ball to a teammate, the player receiving the lateral will be credited with the yardage gained from the point the lateral is completed.

Punts—

All punts shall be measured from the line of scrimmage. Touchbacks are not deducted from the yardage of punts. If a punt goes into the end zone it is measured from the line of scrimmage to the goal line. Blocked

punts shall be enumerated on the back of the score blank naming punter and opponent who blocked punt. The kicker is charged with a punt attempt on a blocked punt.

Punt Returns—

The distance of a punt return shall be measured from the point at which the receiver starts his FORWARD PROGRESS. For an example, a player takes a punt on his own 30, runs back 5 yards, then advances toward the opponents goal—his return is measured from the 25 yard line. There is no minus yardage in punt returns.

Kick-Off Returns—

Kick-offs returned from the end zone are measured from the spot in the end zone where the receiver gains possession of the ball.

Fumbles—

A fumble is any act, other than a pass or a legal kick, which results in loss of possession, either by the ball handler's action or an opponent's grabbing or striking the ball from a player's grasp.

Recovery out of the air, by an opponent, of a juggled ball shall be scored as a fumble, however, if a receiver juggles a pass reception and an opponent gains possession of it, that is considered a pass interception.

There shall be no fumble if a ball goes out of bounds but remains in possession of team fumbling it.

Touchdowns—

Touchdowns shall be scored as "Touchdowns Rushing" and "Touchdowns Passing."

The only touchdowns considered "Touchdowns Passing" in the general summary are those that result in a completed forward pass from a teammate. All other touchdowns are categorized under "Touchdowns Rushing."

Extra Points—

Players attempting conversions shall not be charged with an extra point missed when a bad pass from center, or a fumble by the ball holder, prevents an opportunity to kick. However, attempts at conversion which are blocked shall be scored as extra points missed.

Field Goals—

Field goals shall be measured from the spot of the kick.

Kicker is not charged with a field goal attempt if he does not actually kick.

Safeties—

Safeties shall be credited to individual scoring statistics of players downing an opponent behind the goal line, blocking a kick which results in a safety, causing a forward pass to become incomplete behind the passer's goal line, or otherwise causing a safety through an individual effort.

Qualifications for Individual Leaders—

RUSHING: Most net yards gained.

PASSING: Minimum average of 10 passes attempted per each of team's games.

PASS RECEPTION: Most receptions.

PASS INTERCEPTION: Most Interceptions.

SCORING: Most total points scored.

FIELD GOALS: Most field goals successfully made.

PUNTING: Longest average distance per punt (minimum average of 2 punts per each of team's games).

PUNT RETURNS: Most returns (minimum average of 1 return per each of team's games).

KICK OFF RETURNS: Most returns (minimum average of 1 return per each of team's games).

FUMBLES: Most fumbles. Most fumbles recovered.

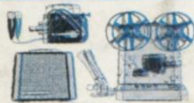
