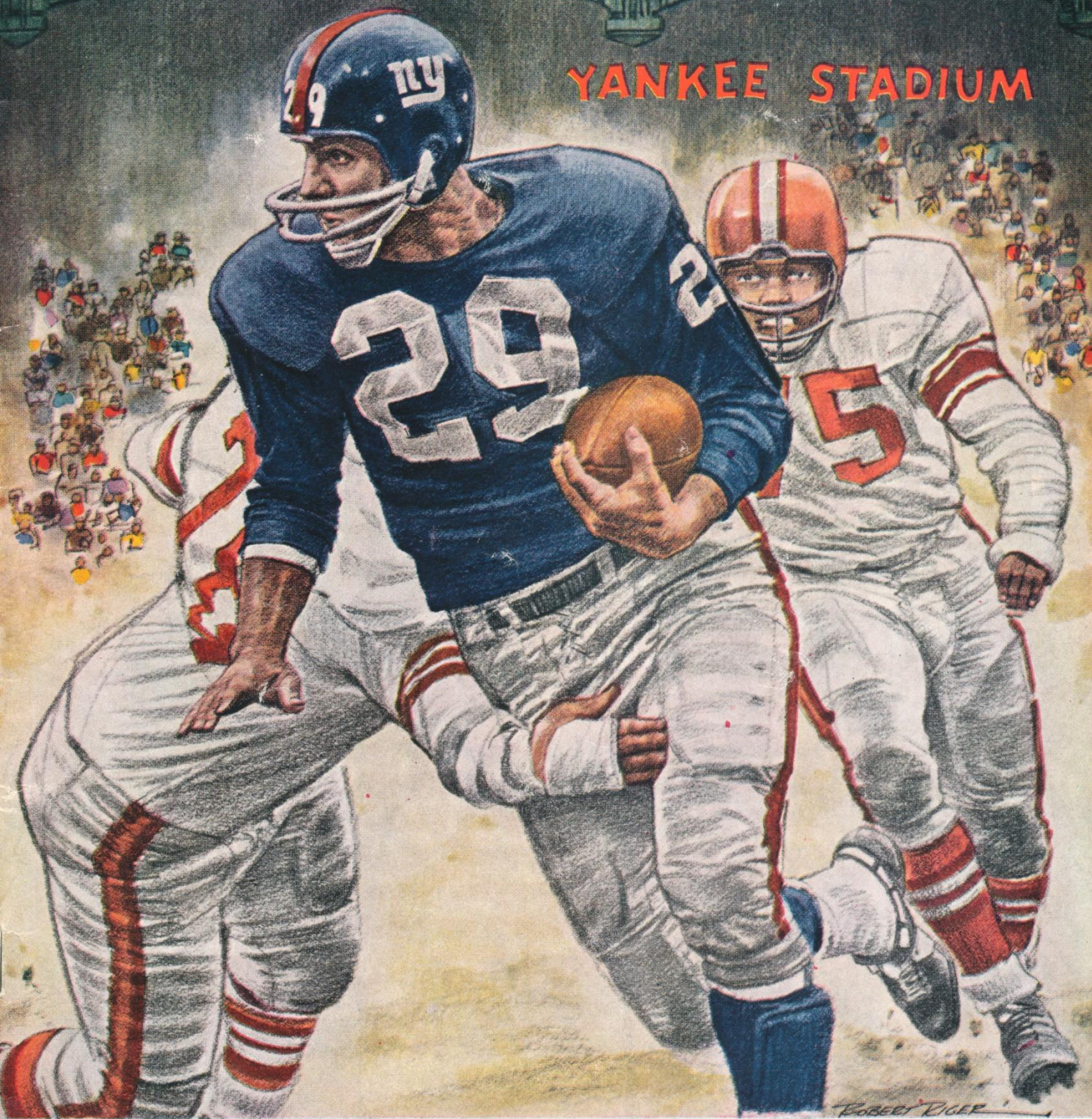

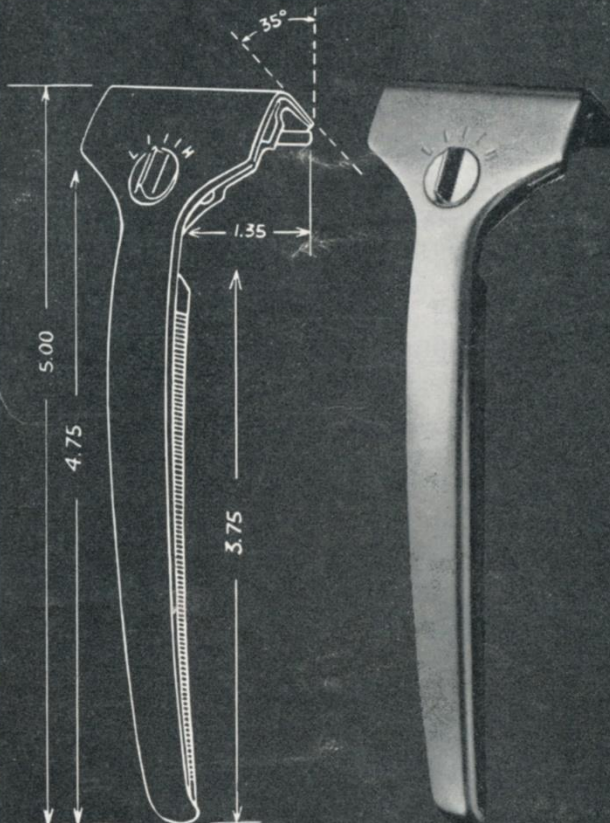

And Now, The Redskins

ARE the Redskins for real? The Giants will probe this portentous question today. The answer should be interesting.

It hardly seems possible that Washington—first in war, first in peace and last in the American Baseball League and National Football League for 10! these many years — all of a sudden should bob up again as the stalking horse for the NFL's Eastern title.

Implausible as it may seem, this is the fact. The Redskins, tail-enders in 1961, arrive for today's renewal of their old rivalry with the Giants as the undisputed leader of the East. They haven't even lost a game, though they have been tied twice.

Meeting this capital squad from the Capitol City would have been a grim assignment for the Giants—it's still a darned rough one—if it hadn't been for last Sunday's victory over the Lions.

Beating Detroit 17-14 was a tremendous accomplishment for our boys. In thirty years of walking down the exit ramps at the Polo Grounds and Yankee Stadium after Giant games, we've seldom encountered a more exhilarated company of recessionists.

This was a classic football game—on good authority one of the best that has been played in the NFL in years. It matched two good, rugged teams that wanted desperately to win and were ready, willing and able to pay the high price in effort that it takes to bag the big one.

Jim Lee Howell, who has held a gun many times before in such Giant shooting matches, was out of the line of fire in the mezzanine box seat he occupies in his present capacity of Giant personnel director.

But he thrilled to the elemental contest, as did all the rest of the

63,000 witnesses at Yankee Stadium.

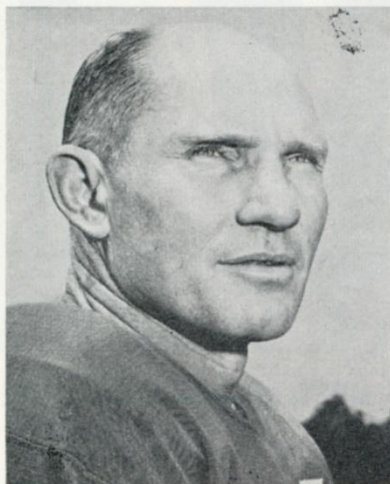
"Wasn't that a football game!," Big Jim exclaimed exultantly afterward. "That's the fiercest hitting I've seen in years. I'm sure glad our boys got in the last licks."

The combatant Giant players and coaches were physically and emotionally drained, too, when the final whistle blew. They really flaked out in the dressing room.

Exhausted as they were, the Giants were buoyant. Beating the Lions by virtue of a concerted team effort in which the offensive, defensive and special-purpose units all distinguished themselves did wonders for team morale.

This, as was pointed out in this space a week ago, was a "must" game. Winning it, after the Pittsburgh debacle of the Sunday before, banished gnawing doubts and restored confidence that the 1962 Giants have title potential, when they play their game.

As a result, they face the big showdown against the rampant Redskins with lighter hearts — also with wide-eyed realization that they must do it all over again today.

A Player Who Does Everything

**Giant End Joe Walton
Isn't Very Big Or
Very Fast . . .**

FUTURE football historians may well overlook the contributions of Joseph Frank Walton to the New York Giants' cause. Joe does not attract great attention; nor does he stand out among the super-stars of the game.

But those who labor alongside the former Pittsburgh All-America each Sunday are acutely aware of his value. To the rest of the Giant players, Walton is worth his weight in gold.

Joe arrived on the New York scene in 1961 via a trade with the Redskins. It was said he was a player who could do everything.

The handsome, dark-haired Walton soon proved that his reputation as a complete player was well-founded. He landed the regular tight end spot with the Maramen and went the route as they won the Eastern title.

Walton truly did do everything. He caught passes. He blocked lethally. He hustled and drove every inch of the way, a throwback to the old-time hard-nosed football player.

It was difficult to play a starring role against the competition provided by Del Shofner (68 catches for 1,125 yards) and Kyle Rote (53 catches for 805 yards), but this mattered little to Walton. He plugged along week after week, catching passes in the clutch and clearing the way for Giant ball-carriers with crisp blocking.

Shofner and Rote got the headlines; Walton got the job done, more quietly but with equal efficiency.

Joe is 26 years old. He weighs 205 pounds and he stands a shade under six feet. He lacks the size to block on big defensive linemen, but he flattens them anyway. He

also lacks speed and quickness, but still he outmaneuvers swifter defensive halfbacks.

Rival teams which ganged up on Shofner and Rote in 1961 learned to their dismay that Walton could not be disregarded. Joe saved more than one game with timely catches when the opposition was double-teaming the other Giant receivers.

His dogged receiving accounted directly for one touchdown and set up another in New York's key 28-24 victory over Philadelphia in their showdown at Franklin Field. And in several other games it was Walton who made face-in-the-dirt catches for vital first downs en route to winning scores. All told, Joe nabbed 36 aerials for 544 yards and two TDs, the most productive of his five years in the big time.

But what the statistical record does not disclose are the games Joe Walton has won with his block-

ing, his competitive drive and his all-around football savvy.

Coach Al Sherman says, "Joe is the kind of a fellow who will find a way to beat you no matter what you do."

Making the big play always has been Walton's forte. As Pitt captain in 1956, Joe led the nation in touchdown catches and hauled in the winning TD aerials in victories over Syracuse, Duke and Oregon.

Pittsburgh coach John Michelosen called him, "one of the finest all-around football players I've ever coached."

The Redskins took note of this appraisal and made Walton their No. 2 draft pick for 1957. He clicked from the start—first on defense, then on offense.

Walton comes from a football family. His dad, the late Frank (Tiger) Walton, was one of the Redskins' greatest guards (1934-35 and 1944-45) and later coached the Washington line. A younger brother, Frank, currently is a junior griddier at Pitt. Like Joe, he's an end.

Joe played his scholastic football at Beaver Falls, Pa., High, where his dad was head coach. He won a scholarship to Pittsburgh, where he earned a BA degree in history along with his All-America honors. At Pitt, Joe played in the 1956 Sugar Bowl, the 1957 Gator Bowl and the College All-Star game.

Now a resident of Stamford, Conn., Joe is employed off-season by the Eazor Express Co., a trucking firm. He is married to the beautiful former Virginia Pailles, who represented Washington, D. C., in the 1959 Miss America contest.

Y. A. Title

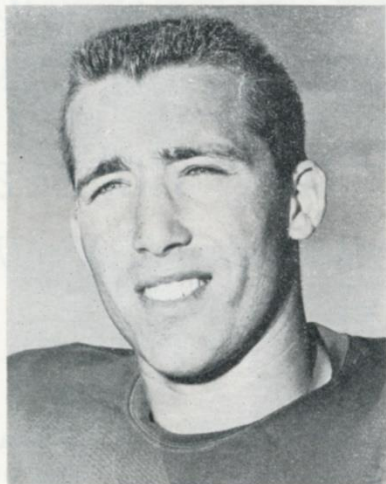
Y. A. Title (14) is the NFL's senior quarterback at 35 years old, but one would never guess it to watch him in sprightly action. Acquired from the 49ers in a pre-season 1961 trade, Y. A. paced the Giants to the Eastern title with his thread-needle passing and fiery leadership. Going into his 14th pro season, he had completed 1,859 passes—tops in the game.



Tom Scott

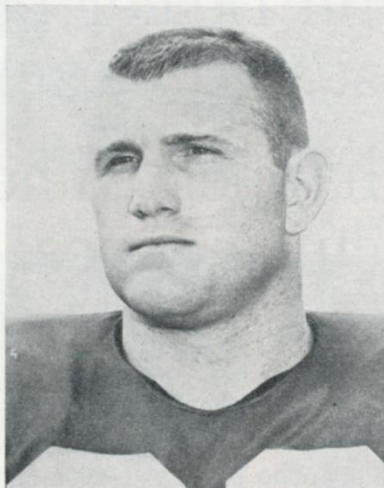
Tom Scott, an All-American selection in lacrosse as well as in football at the University of Virginia, is a battle-tempered gridiron pro who has done a tremendous job for the Giants since his acquisition from the Eagles in 1959. One of the NFL's top defensive ends when the 5-man line still was in vogue, Tom performs equally well on the flank and as a corner linebacker. He has taken over at the latter spot as a regular this year.

Aaron Thomas

For insurance against injuries to Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, their prime deep pass receivers, the Giants got big **Aaron Thomas (88)** from the 49ers early this season in exchange for Bob Gaiters. The 6-foot-3, 208-pound Oregon State graduate, who hauled down 15 passes for 301 yards as a 1961 rookie with San Francisco, can go get 'em.



Bookie Bolin

The Giants got early delivery on **Bookie Bolin (63)**, drafted as a "future" last winter, when the N. C. A. A. ruled him ineligible for further play at Mississippi. The rugged, mobile 235-pounder was a pre-season sensation but had to sit out the early part of the regular campaign with a leg fracture. Now that he's healthy again, he's in line for heavy duty at guard.



Ken Byers

In their quest for added line depth, the Giants made **Ken Byers (60)** their No. 7 choice in last winter's draft. The 240-pound Cincinnati graduate has proved to be a valuable acquisition. Primarily a tackle in college, Ken is serviceable anywhere on the defensive rushline and also can be used as a linebacker or up front on offense.

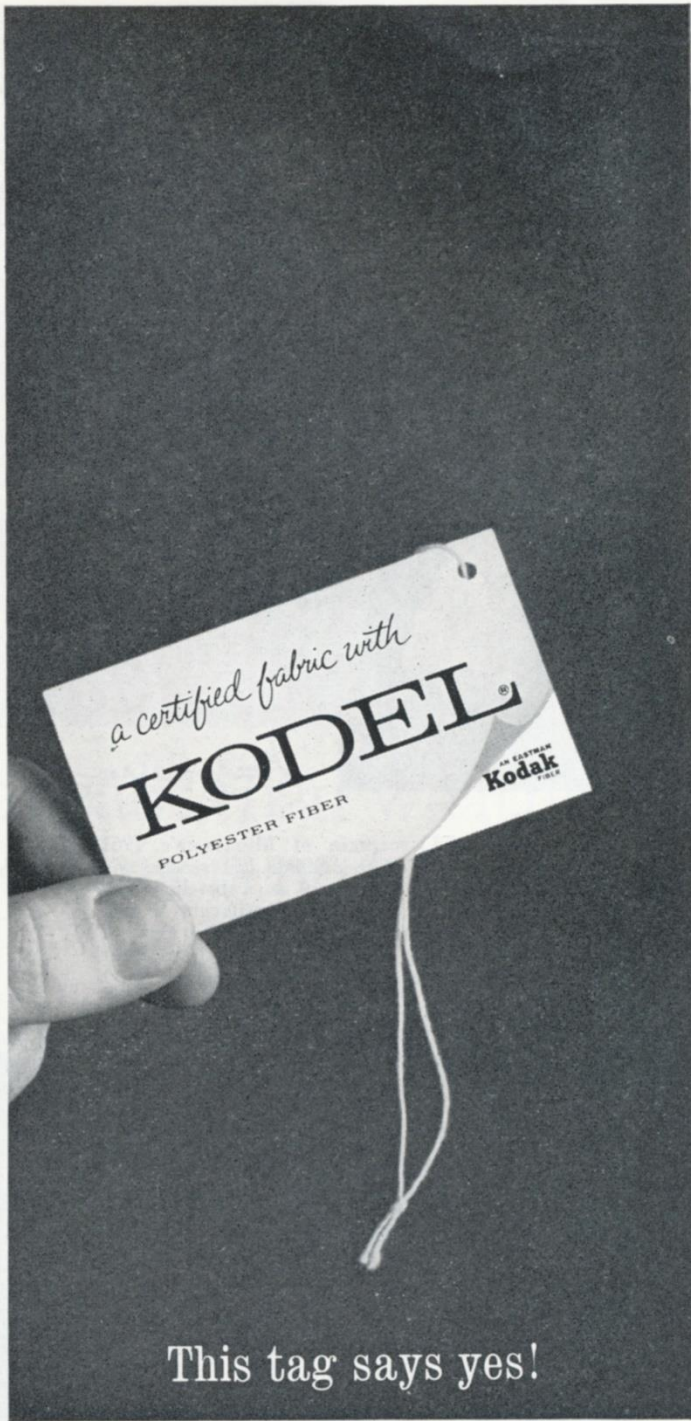

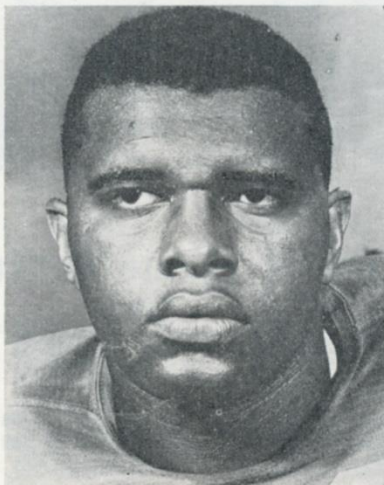

Paul Dudley

When Green Bay, caught in a personnel squeeze, reluctantly let **Paul Dudley (23)** go in their final cutdown, the Giants joyously jumped at the chance of adding him to their roster. A star all-round performer at Arkansas, the fleet, wiry 185-pound Dudley has the makings of a topnotch running back and pass-receiver. He also knows the ropes on defense. The Giants rate him highly.



Charlie Janerette

Charlie Janerette (72) has served the Giants well the past two seasons as a swing lineman. He fills in capably at either tackle on defense and offense and, in fact, can do a sound job just about anywhere up front. The Giants got the 250-pound Penn State alumnus in a 1961 deal with the Vikings, who had claimed him from the Rams in the expansion draft.



Frank Gifford

Back in Giant harness after a year's absence is **Frank Gifford (16)**. This handsome young man from Bakersfield, Calif., in nine brilliant seasons with the Giants, established himself as a complete football player. Used mainly as an all-purpose halfback before he quit in 1960, Giff, this second time around, will play mostly on the flank. Few can play it better. But it won't be a shock if he bobs up somewhere else. He can do it all.

Allan Webb

Signed last year as a free agent, **Allan Webb (21)** has done a terrific job for the Giants, as a spare running back, a reserve defensive back and now as the defensive unit's regular left safetyman. Like Andy Robustelli a graduate of little Arnold College, now defunct, Webb kept active in football as a sand-lotter waiting for the big chance that finally came in 1961. During the off-season he serves as recreation director for the Connecticut State prison.



Dick Lynch

Dick Lynch distinguished himself by scoring the touchdown that broke Oklahoma's record 47-game winning streak. The handsome Irishman, a product of New York's Long Island suburbs, has been adding to his fame every Sunday as a hard-tackling, ball-hawking defensive halfback for the Giants. They wangled him away from the Redskins, for whom he played as a rookie, in a 1959 spring trade.



Darrell Doss

Darrell Doss (62) came to the Giants in 1959 via the Washington Redskins and Pittsburgh Steelers. Since joining the club, the stocky 235-pound graduate of North Carolina State has been a starter more often than not at left guard on the offensive unit. A wrestling star in college, he has the strength and weight to make his blocks stick and the speed of foot to get out ahead of the ball-carrier on wide plays.

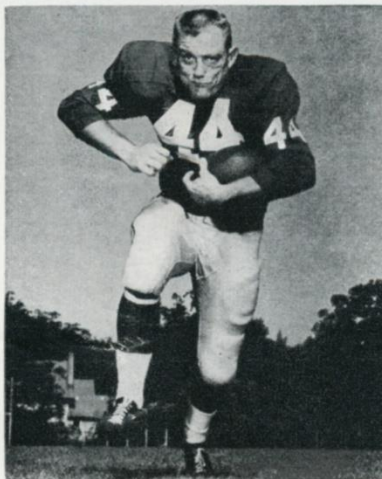

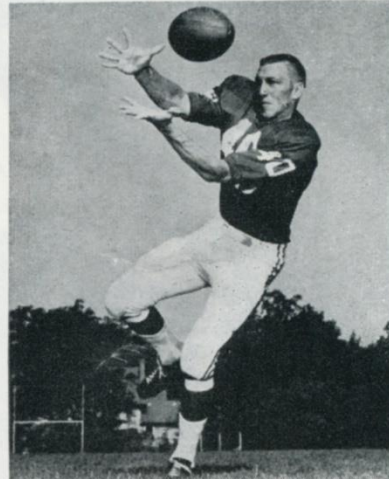
Cardinals Here Next Sunday

THE colorful St. Louis Cardinals will provide the opposition for the Giants at Yankee Stadium next Sunday.

The Cardinals, making their first appearance here under the coaching of Wally Lemm, have a powerful running game and a rugged defense that features "red-dogging" linebackers.

John David Crow, Prentice Gautt, Joe Childress and Mel

Hammack are the principal St. Louis runners. They are all big, strong, stomping carriers who have the speed to go all the way and they operate behind an offensive line that is rated as one of the best.

Sam (The Rifle) Etcheverry, the repatriated Canadian star, and Charlie Johnson alternate at quarterback for the Cardinals. They have an exceptionally gifted

pair of pass-receivers in Bobby Joe Conrad and Sonny Randle.

The hard-hitting St. Louis defensive unit features Frank Fuller and Don Owens up front, Bill Koman and Dale Meinert at linebacker and Billy Stacy and Larry Wilson in the deep secondary.

The Cardinals handed the Giants a surprise 21-10 defeat here last year. It could happen again.

JIM KATCAVAGE

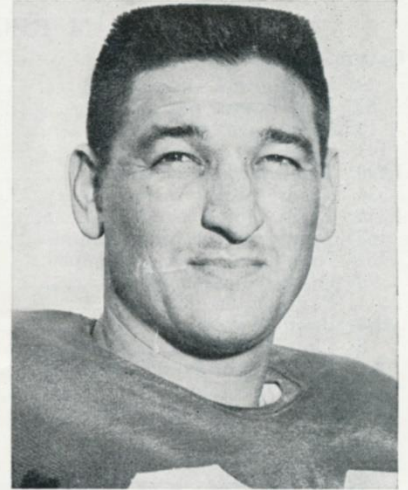
JIM Katcavage, the stalwart left end of the Giants' defensive unit, scored a "double" last Sunday against the Lions. Kat won the Kinney Award (one year's free use of a Kinney rental

car) as the outstanding Giant player and also, for the second successive week, was the defensive unit choice for the J. P. Stevens Award (a wardrobe of sports clothes). Phil King won the Stevens Award for offensive play.

In fairness to everyone, and to keep the record straight, Sam Huff, rather than Katcavage, was selected by the voting panel of sportswriters as the Stevens defensive winner. But since he works for Stevens, Sam disqualified himself.

There certainly could be no quarrel with the selections. Katcavage, as well as Huff, played a leading role in spiking the Lions' defensive guns. Jim contributed one of the key plays when he spilled Milt Plum late in the game for a 15-yard loss that kept the Lions from getting a relatively easy shot at a field goal.

In what many observers thought

was his greatest game as a Giant, King ran and blocked powerfully and scampered 31 yards with a screen pass en route to the second Giant touchdown, which he scored from the 2.

Looking Over:

The Redskins

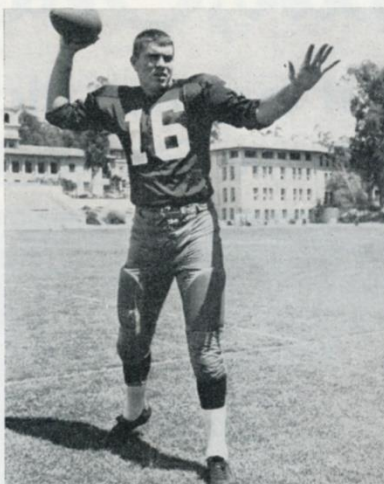
BEYOND question, the Washington Redskins are the most improved team in the National Football League. Dead last in the 1961 Eastern standings, with only one victory and one tie against twelve defeats, the Redskins enter midseason the divisional title.

Patient development of rookies by Coach Bill McPeak and an inspired series of trades explain this meteoric rise. The Washington squad that appears here today probably is the youngest in the league. It includes six first-year pros, nine second-year men and six third-year players.

Of this younger group, the prize performer is Norman Sneed. The 23-year-old Wake Forest graduate, Washington's No. 1 draft choice in 1960, stepped right into the line-up at quarterback last year and set all-time NFL rookie records for most games, most passes, most completions, most yards.

The 6 foot 4 inch, 215-pound Sneed spent a large part of the season on his back, snowed under by rival lines. But even though much of it was painful, Norm acquired experience that is paying off handsomely now that he has acquired a stronger supporting cast.

A key man in the bolstering has been Bobby Mitchell. The

Redskins, looking for backfield speed, gave up their draft rights to Ernie Davis of Syracuse, the 1961 college player-of-the-year, to get Mitchell and Leroy Jackson, a 9.4-second sprinter from Western Illinois, from the Browns.

Mitchell, a dazzling open field runner and talented pass receiver who combines effectively with Sneed, has given the Redskins the tack that they had lacked.

Other deals brought to the Redskins a bread-and-butter runner in Bill Barnes (Eagles), a top-drawer guard in John Nisby

(Steelers), a pair of regular linebackers in Gordon Kelley (49ers) and Bob Pellegrini (Rams) and a seasoned safetyman in Bob Freeman (Eagles).

The younger set mans many other key positions. Two second-year men — Fred Hageman at center and Riley Mattson at left tackle — are established on the offensive line. Two others — Joe Rutgens at right tackle and Rod Breedlove at right linebacker — are defensive regulars. Bob Khayat, ill as a rookie, is providing reliable place-kicking.

The rising contingent also includes three solid senders who are in their third pro seasons—Vince Promuto, at left guard; Andy Sychula, defensive right end, and Dale Hackbart, right safety.

As a steadying influence, there remain on the scene such older reliables as John Paluck and Bob Toneff of the defensive rushline; Fred Dugan and Bill Anderson, two slippery ends; Fran O'Brien, hard-blocking offensive tackle; Don Bosseler, a six-year regular at fullback, and the versatile Dick James, now playing corner back on the defensive unit.

This rundown of personnel suggests that Washington is going to keep very much in the picture—not only this year but for years to come.

Series Review

THE Giants have not lost to the Redskins since 1957, when Washington scored by 21-14 at Yankee Stadium. Since that setback, the New Yorkers have won seven games and played one tie with their old rivals from the Capitol City.

Over the full series, which began in 1937, the Giants hold a 33-16-2 edge and have scored an even 1,200 points to 799 for the Redskins.

Most of this advantage has been piled up since 1950. Prior to that, the teams, more often than not, were battling it out for the Eastern title and swapped victories and defeats on a more even basis.

The current show of strength by the Redskins promises to kindle new fires under one of the NFL's historic rivalries. The complete series record:

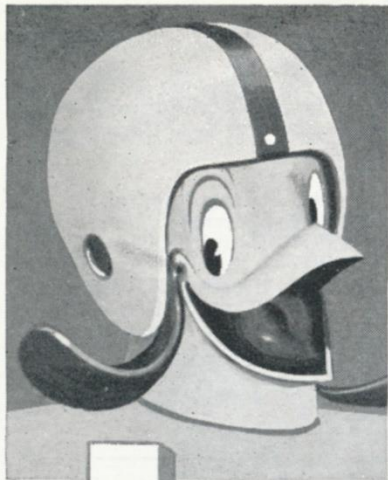

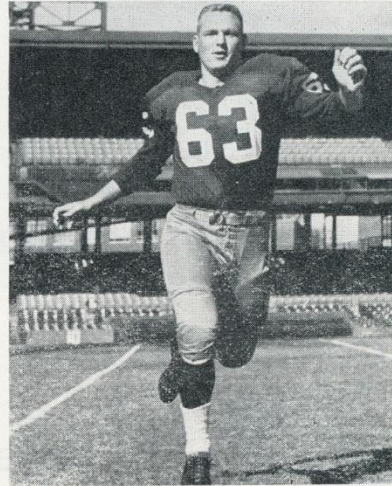

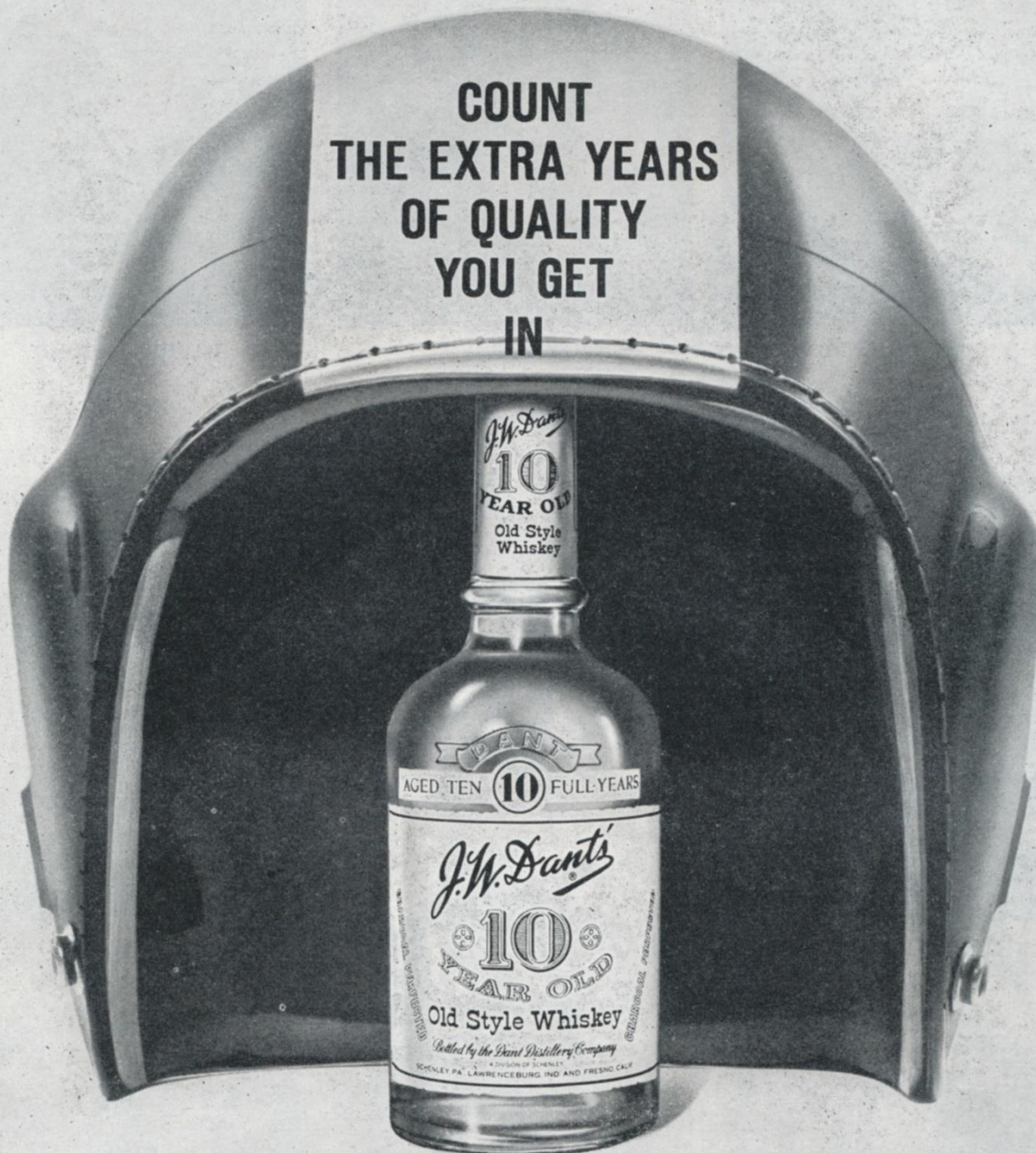

Phil King (24), first choice of the Giants in the 1958 draft, had an outstanding rookie year, gaining 316 yards rushing and 132 yards on pass receptions as a backfield swing man. Mainly because of injuries, he was largely by-passed the next three seasons. Now he is very much back in the picture. The Chief, as Phil is called because he has some Indian blood, has power and speed. Vanderbilt was his school.

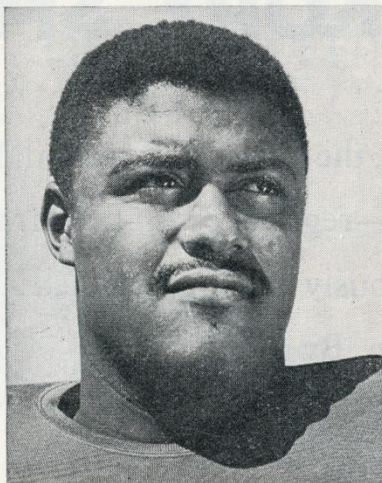
Back in 1953, the Giants took a flyer in the 27th round of the NFL draft on a rawboned young tackle from little Morgan State College named **Roosevelt Brown (79)**. History has proved the selection to be inspired. By 1954 Rosie was solidly entrenched as an offensive starter at left tackle and since 1955, he has been an all-league. A fast-moving 260-pounder, Brown blocks dynamically, on the line and down-field. He also pitches in on goal-line defense.

Rugged, relentless **Dick Modzelewski (77)** has been a regular Giant defensive rushliner ever since his 1956 acquisition from the Steelers. He had put in two years with Washington before switching to Pittsburgh. Little Mo, so called because an older brother, Ed, preceded him into pro football, was an All-America at Maryland. A highly combative player, Dick is both an irresistible force and an immovable body.



Rosy Grier

Big **Rosy Grier**, a third-round draft pick in 1955, has been a Giant defensive mainstay at right tackle even since his rookie season. For all his 290 pounds, Rosy is as quick as a cat on his feet. Out of Linden, N. J., he played his college ball at Penn State, where he also excelled as a shot-putter and discus-thrower. A man of many talents, Grier also has a rich baritone voice and is making his mark as a concert and recording artist.



Jimmy Patton

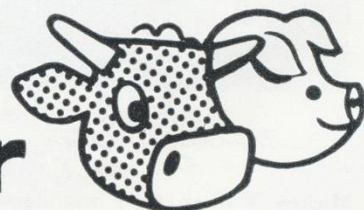
When **Jimmy Patton (20)** tried out with the Giants in 1955 as an 180-pound rookie out of Mississippi, sideline observers said: "He'll never make it; he's too small." Jimmy made his critics eat their words. Not only did he make it but he made it big from the start and for the last 5 years has been the NFL's acknowledged top all-around safetymen. Patton not only knows how to make all the plays but knows why and when to make them, for which reason he has served as a playing coach the last three seasons.

All but written off in 1960 after injuries had resulted in a second straight sub-par season, **Alex Webster (29)** had his best all-around year as a Giant in 1961. The big redhead from East Brunswick, N. J., hammered rival lines for 928 yards, to finish third in the NFL rushing totals. As in 1955-58, he once again was the Giants' bread-and-butter carrier.

Among the several fine rookies the Giants have added to their roster this season is **Jim Collier (84)**. This swift, rangy end from Arkansas has displayed rare first-year ability to go and get that football. As he gets to know the Giant pass patterns better, you'll be seeing more of him. Jim has all the requisites of a good pro end—size, speed, and good hands, desire and intelligence.

The Giants struck oil in 1961 when, in an involved pre-season deal with the Bears and Rams, they acquired **Erich Barnes (49)** from Chicago. The rangy 198-pound Purdue graduate, a No. 4 draft choice of the Bears in 1958, fitted right into the picture as a defensive backfield cornerman. His great speed, coordination and alertness make Barnes an outstanding pass-defender.

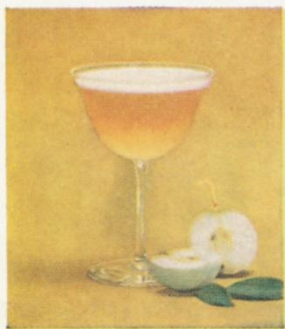
