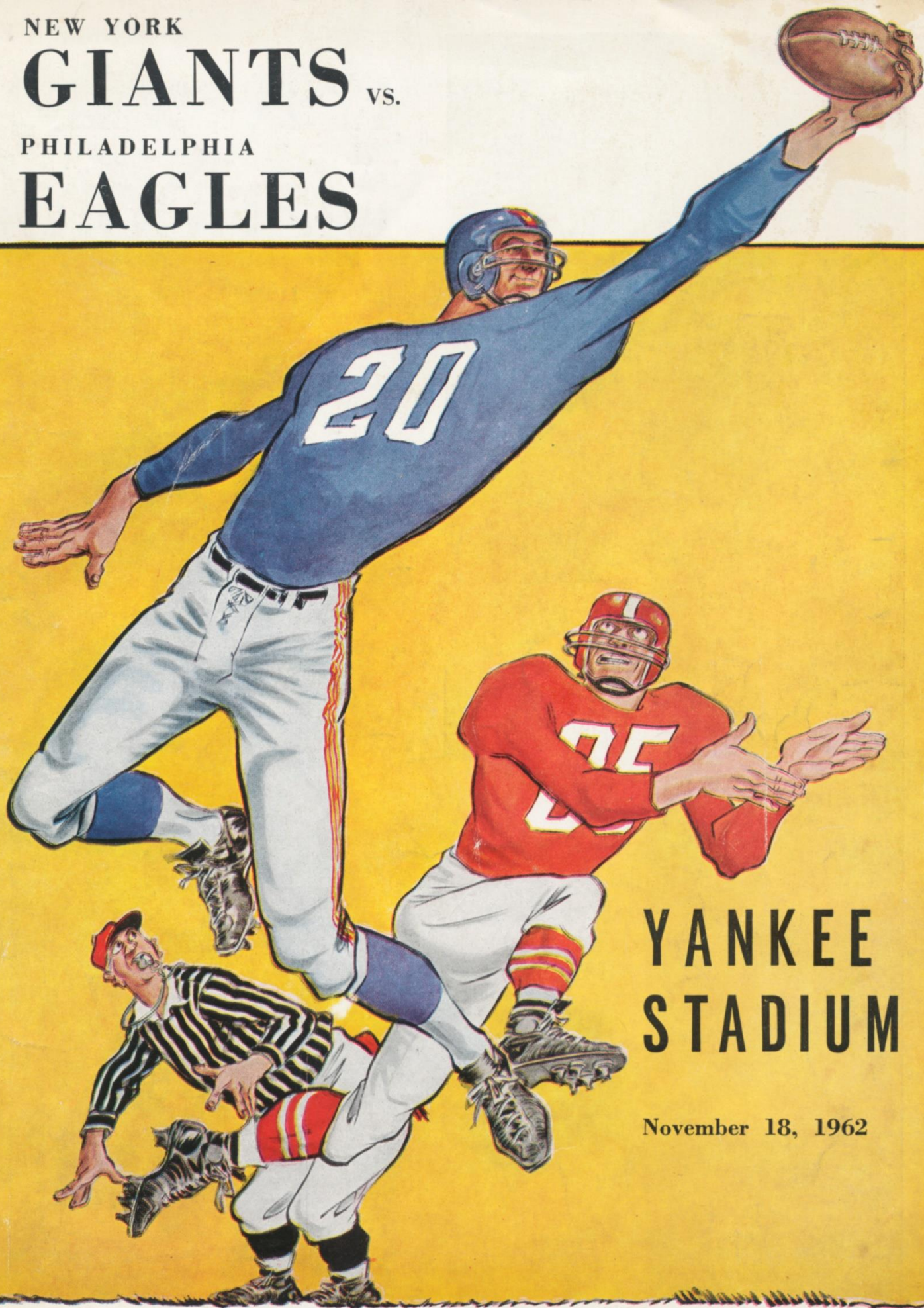

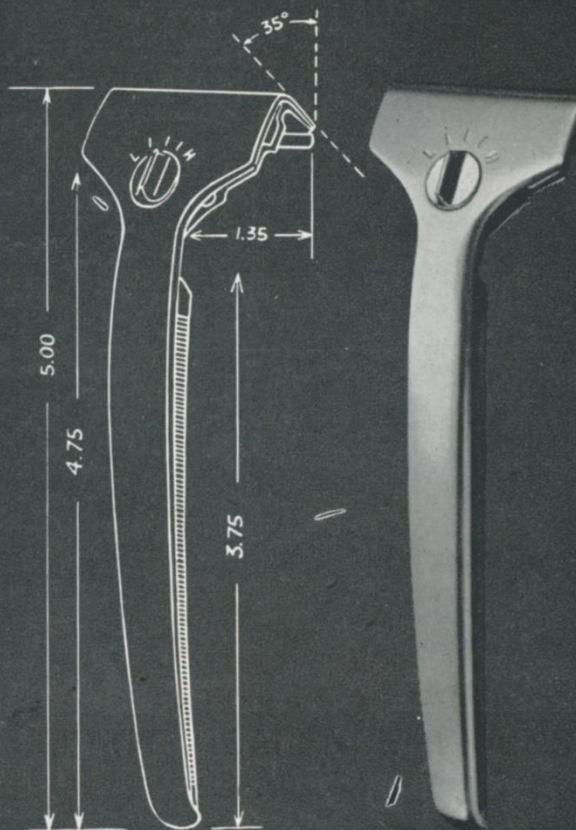
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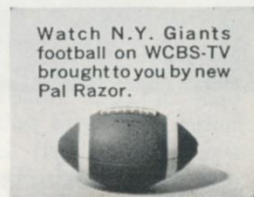
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Chalk Up Another One for New York's Old Pros

A Runner Again.

FOR the second time in three weeks, the Giants' old pros last Sunday cooled off a hot young contender. Coach Allie Sherman's lads hung a real good one on Dallas' hopeful Cowboys. Beating this rising young team as handily as they did has to be considered one of the best Giant jobs of the year, comparable to their whacking of the Washington Redskins, another upstart.

Despite the conclusive final score, it wasn't an easy game. With a whistling wind out of the open end of the Cotton Bowl at their backs, the Cowboys gave the Giants fits through the first period. Containing the Giant attack and striking forcefully themselves on occasion, Tom Landry's vastly improved team had three shots at scores in the first 15 minutes.

But Sam Baker missed field goal tries of 57 and 42 yards, the shorter attempt after a 15-yard penalty had pushed the Cowboys back from the Giants 22. And a goal-line rebound interception by Allan Webb checked another Dallas advance deep into Giant territory.

Channel 2 viewers here had resigned themselves to an unhappy afternoon when the tide suddenly changed. Early in the second pe-

riod, the Giants got untracked. Starting from their 25, they made first downs on their 45 on a power thrust by Phil King, who ran furiously all afternoon, on the Dallas 18, on Y. A. Tittle's 38-yard pass to Aaron Thomas, who substituted valorously at tight end for the bruised Joe Walton, and on the Cowboys' 7, on pile-driving rushes by King and Alex Webster.

Then Coach Sherman made his master move. Handyman Joe Morrison was sent in to replace King. Obviously, he brought a play with him. Though Joe wasn't personally involved, it was a dilly.

Tittle fed the ball to Webster on what appeared to be a typical Giant power sweep to the right. It only appeared to be, though. Instead of smashing at the Cowboys' left tackle sector, Alex slipped the ball to Frank Gifford, circling back from his right flanker post.

So, for the first time in two years, Giant fans had the thrill of watching Giff as a ball-carrier. The old master never had it so good. Without need for any personal hipper-dipper—the Cowboys were completely fooled — Frank ambled across the goal-line untouched.

Dallas never recovered from the shock. On the first play after the ensuing Giant kick-off, the Cowboys fumbled. Andy Robustelli, another of the 36 Giant participants who played an outstanding game, pounced on the errant pigskin on the home 17. Showing no mercy to the now-bewildered opposition, Tittle immediately went overhead and drilled a pay-off pass to Del Shofner.

Almost right away, the Giants had another scoring chance, thanks to a bad-bounce punt by Sam Baker that boomeranged from midfield all the way back to the Dallas 32. A pass interference penalty, for hampering Gifford, who was about to break away, put the ball on the 8. After Giff

narrowly missed connections with Shofner in the end zone on a passing variation of the end-around sweep that had clicked before, Don Chandler booted a 16-yard field goal.

Still hungry, the Giants scored again a couple of minutes later when Tittle, after hitting Shofner for a 50-yard gain, hung one on a peg for Gifford on a touchdown play that covered 24 yards.

The 24 points they scored in this devastating 10-minute second-period outburst settled things for the Giants. But they kept the heat on. Chandler booted a 37-yard field goal in the third period. In the fourth quarter Ralph Guglielmi, who had just relieved Tittle, fired a 40-yard scoring pass to Shofner, after Y. A. had hit Del with a 22-yard bell-ringer.

New York's rounded display of mastery squelched Dallas' burgeoning title hopes, temporarily at least.

But that was last Sunday . . . and this Sunday is what counts. Today the Giants meet a good Eagle team that has to be rather petulant after the clobbering it took from the Packers a week ago. It will be interesting to see what develops.

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SIZE ISN'T EVERYTHING —

What Counts is That Johnny Has Speed and Heart

GIANT rookie halfback Johnny Counts, a slightly-built 170-pounder, thinks he's found a way to survive in a big man's game.

"I figure if I run fast enough I can keep away from them," says the ex-Illinois speedster who is getting his first taste of NFL championship play with the Maramen this season.

By "them," Counts means the burly 270-pound defensive linemen who seem to lurk on every side when he carries the ball for the Eastern champs.

Mopping his brow after the Giants' final pre-season game against the Eagles at Princeton, the wiry 5-10 newcomer remarked, "Man, I've never seen as many big guys as they have in this league."

Then he smiled and added:

"But I like to think a lot of them are on my side, too. That helps us little fellows."

However, Johnny Counts hasn't needed much help; he's making the grade on his own—thanks to a pair of flying feet and gobs of resolution.

Appearing only briefly in five pre-season games, Johnny ran the ball 24 times for 129 yards, making him the club's third best ground-gainer. He also caught three passes for another 57 yards. Coach Allie Sherman's decision to go with the "Elephant Backfield" that features Alex Webster and Phil King in the running spots has side-tracked Johnny since the regular season started.

But he has been an important Giant addition as a kick-off and punt return man. He gives the

Giants blinding speed in the open field, the kind of speed they've lacked for some time. Counts has been averaging 35 yards, give or take a few, on kick-offs and frequently has gone from the end zone up past the 40-yard line. Similarly, on several occasions he has almost broken loose for long touchdown runs hauling in enemy punts. He runs kicks back with dash, daring and determination.

The word already is circulating around the NFL that Counts is a guy you have to watch, like you watch Bobby Mitchell and Jon Arnett and some of the other mercurial halfbacks who pose that long-ball threat.

It's quite a tribute for the skinny rookie who joined the Maramen this summer after laboring two seasons on the semi-pro gridirons of New York and Connecticut.

When Johnny first reported to camp, someone took a quick look at his under-sized frame and cracked, "He may be fast but he'll

never stand up to the pounding in this league."

Up to this point, though, Counts not only has survived the physical punishment—he's actually thriving on it. There's no doubt in anyone's mind that he's going to make it, and big!

A high school football and track star at New Rochelle, Counts played for the University of Illinois in 1959 and was named Sophomore of the Year in the Big Ten. Then he flunked a course and left school to accept a handsome offer from the Toronto Argonauts.

"But I hurt my leg in the first exhibition game," he says, "and that was it. They cut me. That was two years ago. I came back and played semi-pro ball with the Stamford (Conn.) Bears."

Guido Cribari, a close personal friend of Johnny and sports editor of a chain of Westchester newspapers, notified Giant general manager Ray Walsh that Counts was available. Walsh immediately signed him as a free agent.

It could be one of the wisest moves Walsh—and the Giants—ever made. If Johnny continues at his present pace, he could become a ranking star in the National Football League.

Meanwhile, Counts is adhering closely to his new philosophy. "When I see that hole open," he says, "I'm really goin'. I'm not waiting to look at any of those big guys." They've been getting only fleeting glances of him, too.

That's fine with the Giants. They hope Johnny doesn't wait for anyone on his way to the end zone.

It's always nice to see a local boy make good, particularly with the Giants.

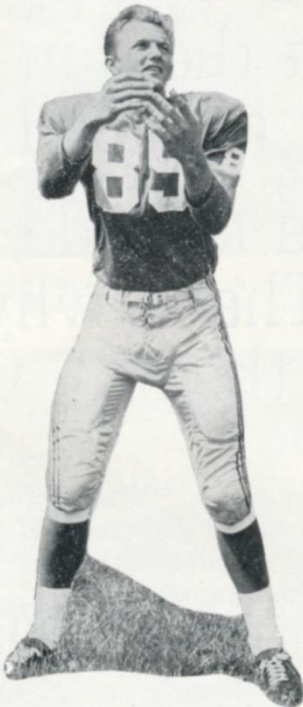
Y. A. Tittle

Y. A. Tittle (14) is the NFL's senior quarterback at 35 years old, but one would never guess it to watch him in sprightly action. Acquired from the 49ers in a pre-season 1961 trade, Y. A. paced the Giants to the Eastern title with his thread-needle passing and fiery leadership. Going into his 14th pro season, he had completed 1,859 passes—tops in the game.



The Giants consider themselves highly fortunate in having come up with since 1961 so well-qualified an alternate quarterback as **Ralph Guglielmi (9)**. This All-America from Notre Dame saw four years of service with the Redskins and also put in a season with the Cardinals. Goog knows the NFL ropes, passes and handles the ball expertly and is a strong, elusive runner. He'll put in a lot of playing time in support of Y. A. Tittle.

Del Shofner

Long noted as the most dangerous deep pass receiver in the NFL, **Del Shofner (85)** hit peak efficiency with the Giants in 1961. His 68 receptions were good for 1,125 yards, a total that led the league, and he scored 11 TDs. The Giants snagged Del, a 1957 Baylor graduate, in a pre-season deal with the Rams. In combination with Y. A. Tittle, he gave them an offensive boost that helped them win the Eastern title.



Andy Robustelli (81), the Giants' defensive coach, has established himself as one of pro football's greatest defensive ends in 12 seasons of brilliant play with the Los Angeles Rams and the Giants, who acquired him in 1956 in exchange for a future draft choice. Strong, quick and blessed with an uncanny sense of anticipation, Robustelli specializes in harassing enemy passers and in piling up running plays in their inception. A native of Stamford, Conn., where he still makes his home, Andy attended Arnold College, now defunct.

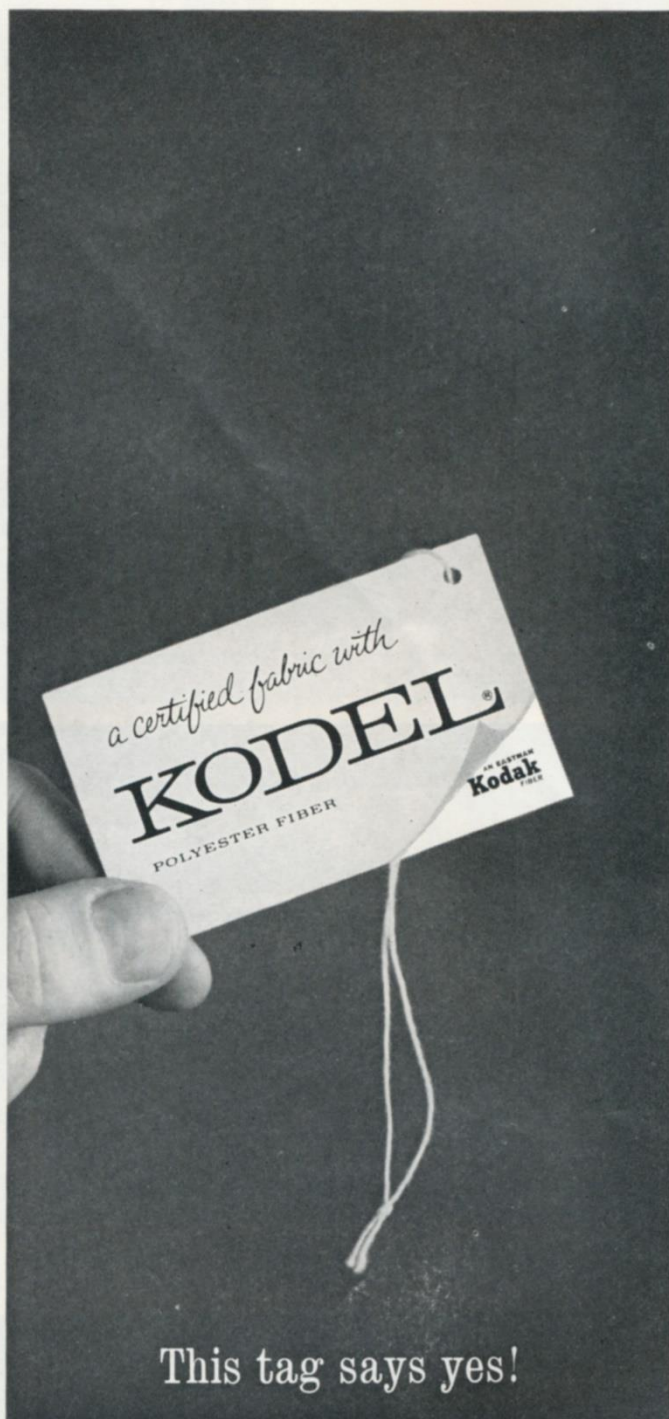

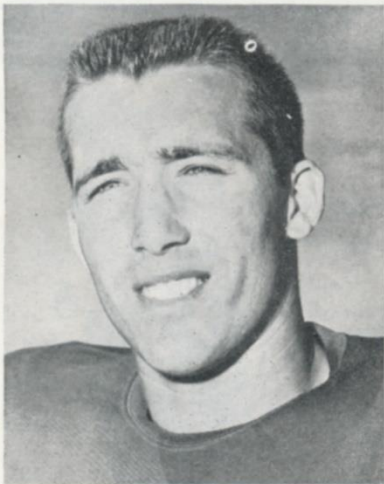

Tom Scott, an All-American selection in lacrosse as well as in football at the University of Virginia, is a battle-tempered gridiron pro who has done a tremendous job for the Giants since his acquisition from the Eagles in 1959. One of the NFL's top defensive ends when the 5-man line still was in vogue. Tom performs equally well on the flank and as a corner linebacker. He has taken over at the latter spot as a regular this year.

Giant fans are seeing **Don Chandler (34)** in a new role this season. Besides handling the punting assignment, which he has done admirably for six years, the strong-legged Florida graduate has taken over the place-kicking chores abandoned by the retired Pat Summerall. Don is doing better than just all right at his additional new job. He's getting both distance and direction on his placements.

For insurance against injuries to Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, their prime deep pass receivers, the Giants got big **Aaron Thomas (88)** from the 49ers early this season in exchange for Bob Gaiters. The 6-foot-3, 208-pound Oregon State graduate, who hauled down 15 passes for 301 yards as a 1961 rookie with San Francisco, can go get 'em.

Signed last year as a free agent, **Allan Webb (21)** has done a terrific job for the Giants, as a spare running back, a reserve defensive back and now as the defensive unit's regular left safetyman. Like Andy Robustelli a graduate of little Arnold College, now defunct, Webb kept active in football as a sand-lotter waiting for the big chance that finally came in 1961. During the off-season he serves as recreation director for the Connecticut State prison.

In their quest for added line depth, the Giants made **Ken Byers (60)** their No. 7 choice in last winter's draft. The 240-pound Cincinnati graduate has proved to be a valuable acquisition. Primarily a tackle in college, Ken is serviceable anywhere on the defensive rushline and also can be used as a linebacker or up front on offense.

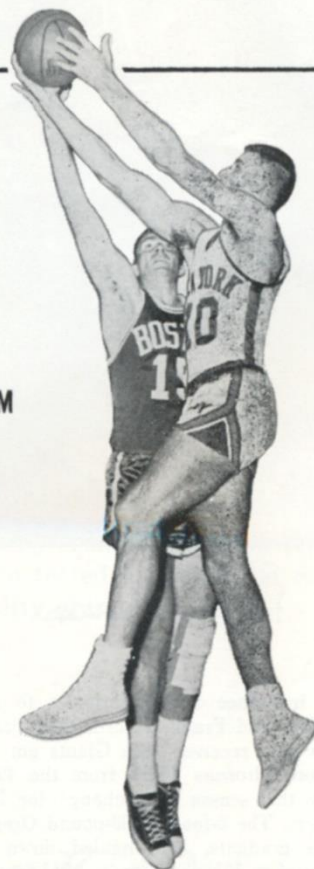

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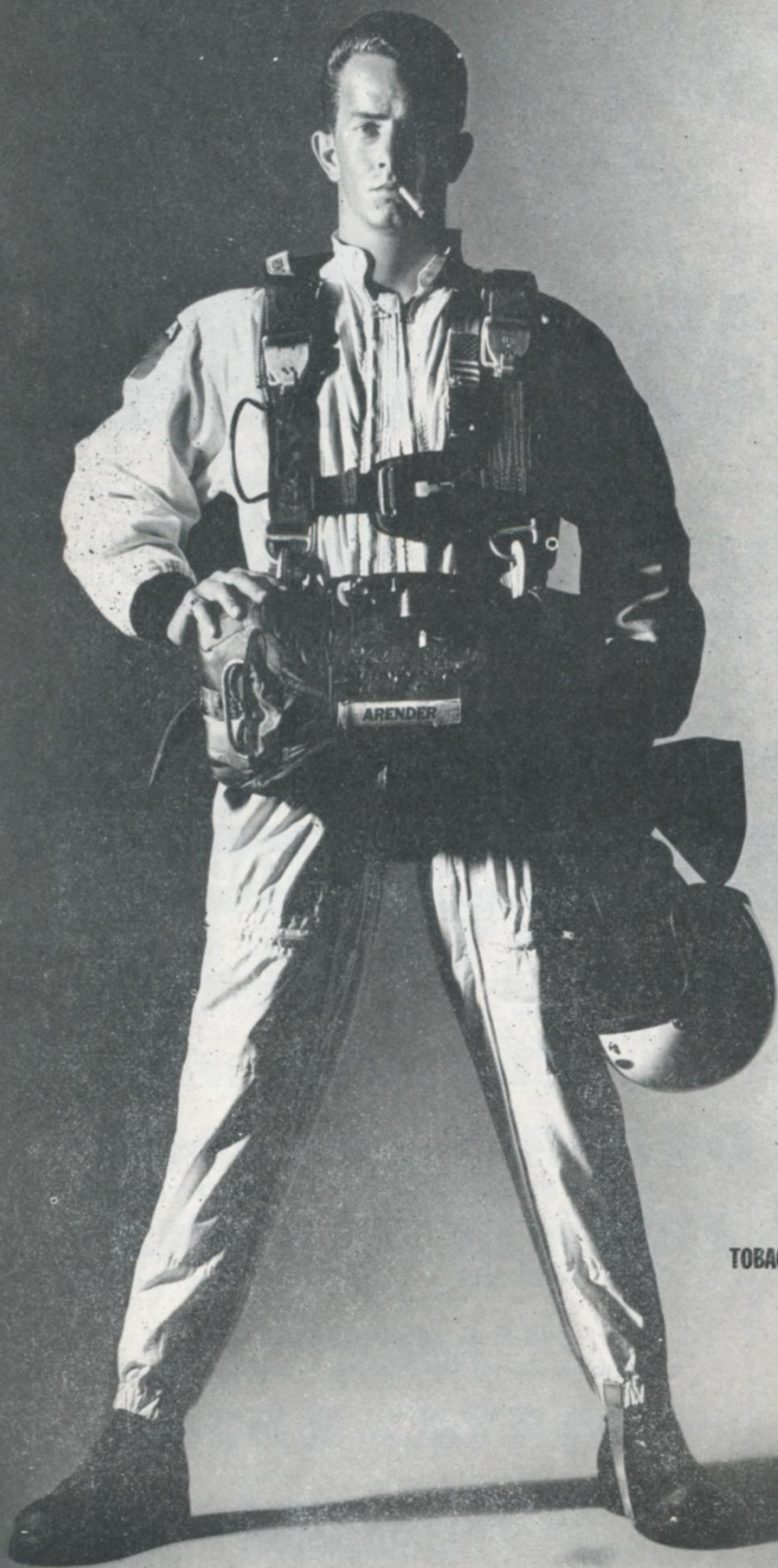
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Series Review

THE Giants will be seeking their fourth straight victory over the Eagles today. In a series that began in 1933, the New Yorkers hold a commanding 36-20-1 edge. However, the Eagles have had their innings along the way.

Greasy Neale's great teams of 1947, 1948 and 1949 swept the home-and-home series those years and, en route to their 1960 league title, the Eagles also defeated the Giants twice.

The Giants recorded sweeps in 11 years—1933, 1935, 1937, 1939, 1940, 1941, 1942, 1950, 1951, 1956 and 1961.

Giff bagged two prizes. He received the Kinney Award (one year's free use of a Kinney rental car) as the outstanding Giant player of the game and the J. P. Stevens Award (a wardrobe of sports clothes) as the top Giant performer on offense. If you'll recall, Frank caught scoring passes of 39 and 33 yards from Y. A. 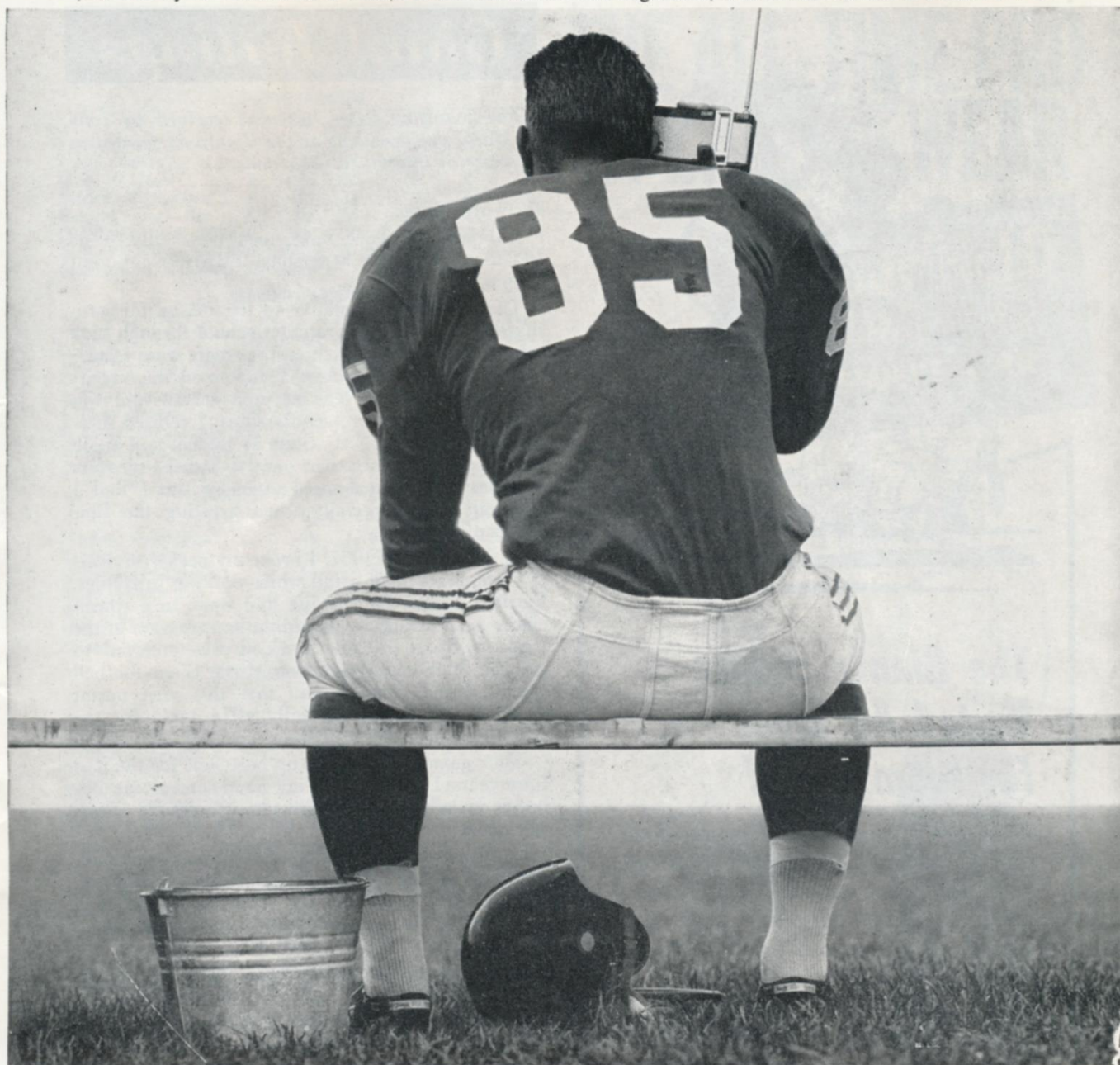

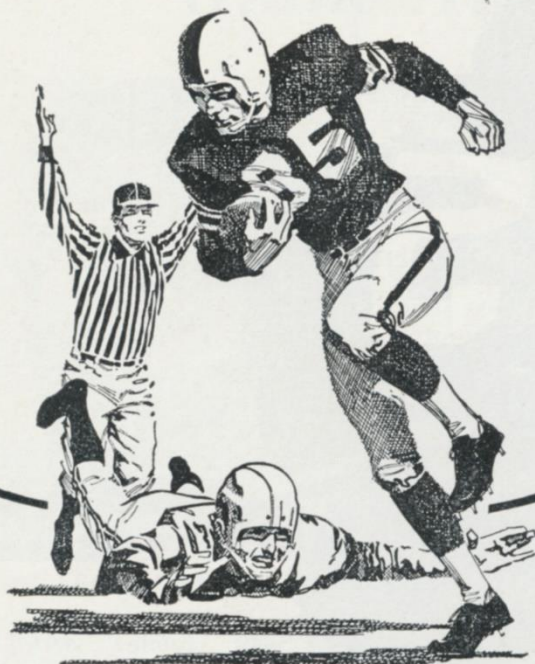

Giant Jottings

The following letter, recently received by John V. Mara, the president of the Giants, is printed as a matter of interest to Giant fans.

Dear Mr. Mara:

Although we have never met personally, I do feel that I owe you a personal THANKS for your hospitality.

The following is relative to the reason for writing this letter. From grammar school through high school, I played tail-back on the single wing offense and defensive line-backer. I captained the varsity squad in my final year at prep school and was offered several college scholarships. I refused these offers and entered N. C. State as student and Wolf-pack spectator. More than once, I had the pleasure of observing the hard-nosed antics by Alex ("Red") Webster . . . especially when greeting the Blue Devils of Duke.

In the spring of 1957, I broke my neck (cervicals 6/7) as a result of a fall while working in Naples, Florida. I now live my life and work in a wheelchair. . . . During my rehabilitation program at the Rusk Institute in New York, I was escorted to Yankee Stadium to view one of the Giant football games and I can tell you that this visit meant great deal to me. I felt fully alive again for the first time since the accident.

Your games are telecast up here, but for the past four years I have driven my hand-control car 2½ hours down and back in order to witness the Giants in action.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you, your staff, the players, and all those responsible for allowing me free admission and the privilege of watching pro football "at its best" from a position right on the field level.

With hopes that the Maramen whip the Packers for the world title,

Del Shofner has moved up to fifth spot among the league's pass-catchers, with 39 receptions good for 837 yards (the third highest total) . . . Don Chandler's place-kicking ledger shows 31 of 32 extra points and 10 of 16 field goals (his FG percentage of .625 is tops in the league) . . . The National League draft of 1962 college stars will be held in Chicago on Dec. 3. Making their selections in the reverse order of their percentage standings, the 14 NFL clubs each will pick 20 players.

THERE'S no way of glossing it over—particularly after their crushing 49-0 defeat of last Sunday by the Packers—the Eagles are having a bad year. But you'd have to be out of your mind to sell this football team short. It won't even qualify as a surprise if the Philadelphians suddenly get flying again and ground the Giants today.

In football, any team that can score has to be respected. The Eagles can do just that—early, often and from any range, when they are clicking.

They have football's most feared pass-receiver in Tommy McDonald, who in the last few seasons has left more opposing corner halfbacks flat on their faces beating the turf in frustration than any other N.F.L. flanker.

In a deal with the Browns, the Eagles recently picked up another breakaway ball-shagger of the same stripe in Howard (Hopalong) Cassady.

Dick Lucas, at right end, is a third deep threat and Coach Nick Skorich is carefully bringing along a young man named Frank Budd. Not having played football until this year since his high school days, Frank has lots to learn. But, as the world record-holder for the 100-yard and 100-meter dashes, he has the basic qualification of speed.

Philadelphia also has an artful angler and hooker in veteran

Bobby Walston, who has the additional virtue of being one of the best place-kickers in the business.

Pass-receivers don't mean a thing unless there are pass-throwers who can get the ball to them. Sonny Jurgensen has demonstrated that ability, to the extent that Eagle fans considered him in 1961 to be even an improvement on the great Norm Van Brocklin, who piloted the Eagles to the 1960 NFL championship.

Recently, King Hill, Philadelphia's nominal No. 2 quarterback, has been so effectively flapping his throwing wing, too, that he is challenging Jurgensen for the top spot.

The Eagles are most dangerous aloft but they have breakaway runners in Tim Brown, a will-o'-the-wisp on punt and kick-off returns, and Clarence (Hi) Peaks, a hard-nosed basher who can get up and go in the open.

There are competent pros up front in the offensive line—such as Jim Schrader at center, John Wittenborn and Roy Hord at the guards and Jim McCusker and J. D. Smith at the tackle. And Pete Case, a young tackle from Georgia, is considered to be a real comer.

Inexplicably, these demonstrated good players haven't clicked this year. But the dynamite still is there. The Giants' defensive platoon will be sitting on a powder keg this afternoon.

Defensively the Eagles are vulnerable. A particularly big blow was the loss of all-league halfback Tom Brookshier, who cracked up a leg so badly last season that he had to call it quits. But despite the Green Bay debacle, they're a long way from being push-overs.

On the rushline, Philadelphia presents Gene Gossage, Riley Gunnels, Joe Lewis and Bobby Richards, with Dick Stafford and John Kapele in reserve.

They have one of the NFL's most respected young linebackers in Maxie Baughan, who plays the right side, and another rising star on the left in John Nocera.

These capable junior operatives flank one of football's most distinguished senior citizens, the great Chuck Bednarik, still a destructive force at the admitted age of 37.

In the deep secondary, there are good men, too. Fiery Ben Scotti, acquired since last year from the Redskins, and Irv Cross, who has star potential, play the corners. Fleet Jimmy Carr and rangy Don Burroughs fill the safety positions, with rookie Mike McClellan as the back-up man at all spots.

Except for the strange bounces that footballs tend to take, there's no ready answer to why the Eagles have fared so poorly this year. All the more so for their lack of success to date, they could be a rough opponent for the Giants today.

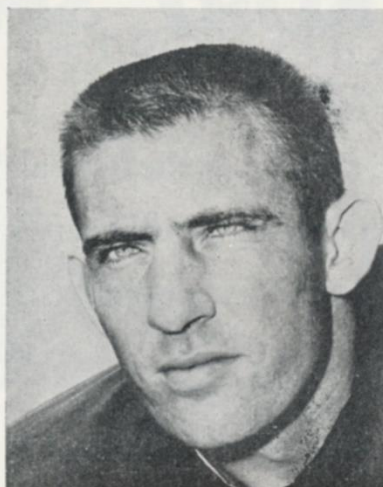
