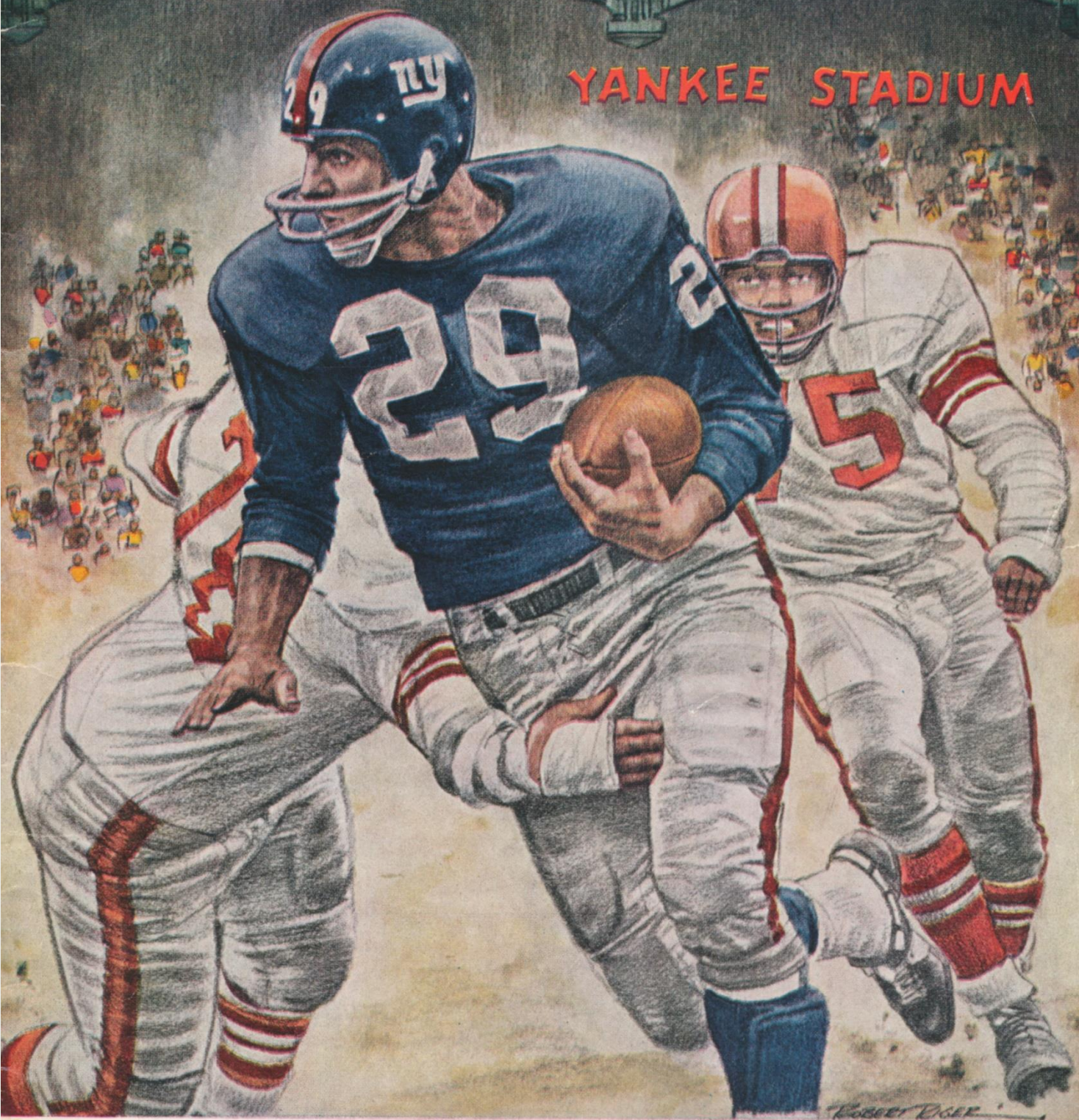

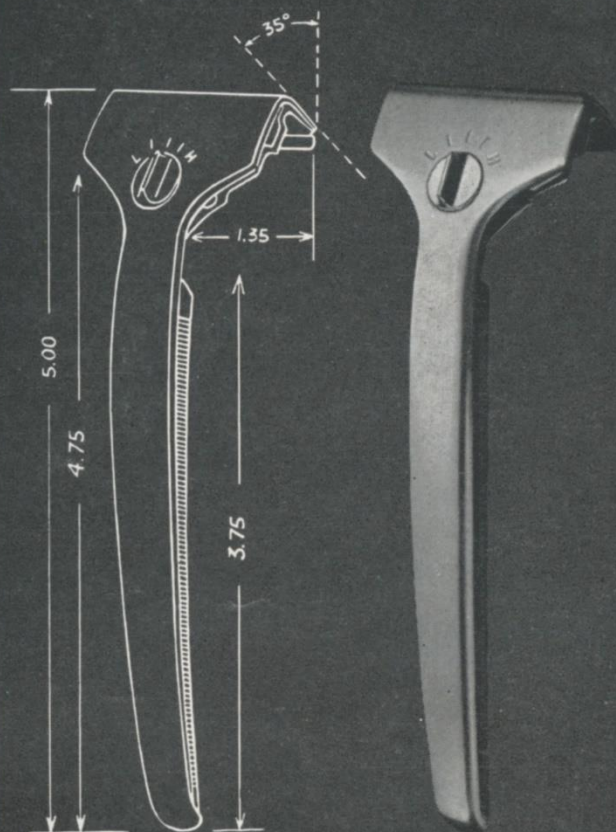

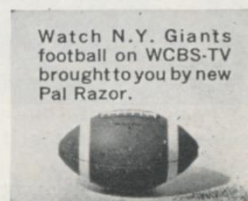

Playoff Ticket Plans

The National Football League has announced the following plans for the December 30th championship game at Yankee Stadium:

Price scale is \$12 for upper or mezzanine box seats; \$10 for upper or mezzanine reserved seats; \$10 for lower box seats and \$8 for lower or open stand reserved seats.

Sale opens 9 a.m. Monday, Dec. 17. The sale will be handled **only at the Yankee Stadium and only in person. No tickets will be sold at**

the Giants Office and no mail orders will be accepted.

Giant season subscribers, starting Dec. 10, will receive in the mail identity cards covering their regular season locations. Subscribers' reservations will be filed at Yankee Stadium alphabetically as the subscriber's name is listed on the Giant season subscription records. Season reservations must be picked up at Yankee Stadium at Gate No. 4 from 9 a.m. on Monday, Dec. 17, until 3 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 22.

Season subscribers need not be concerned if

they cannot be at Yankee Stadium when the sale opens Dec. 17—their tickets will be held until 3 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 22.

Public sale also will be at Yankee Stadium **only**, beginning on Monday, Dec. 17, and **also only in person. No mail orders will be accepted.** Public sale will be at Gate No. 6.

Payment must be in cash or by certified check or money order payable to the New York Football Giants, Inc.

Yankee Stadium parking lot will be available without charge for the purchasers' convenience.

THE Giants did it again! By their stirring 26-24 victory over the Bears in Chicago last Sunday, our boys clinched the National Football League's Eastern Conference title for the second straight year. The triumph earned them the right to play the Western Conference winner, as yet to be determined, for professional football's world championship at Yankee Stadium, the Home of Champions, on Sunday, Dec. 30.

To the everlasting credit of the Giants, they won their thirteenth Eastern crown like true champions. The clincher in Chicago was their seventh victory in a row, matching the record club streak first set in 1938. The string included conquests of two of the top

Western powers — the Detroit Lions, as well as the Bears.

Hail to Allie Sherman, the Little General, his staff and his troops for a fine job well done! This was a team victory, if there ever was one.

Ken Kavanaugh, Ed Kolman, Kyle Rote, Andy Robustelli, Jim Patton and Ken Strong contributed inspired coaching assistance, as Sherman has been the first to say all along. All-out backing from Jack Mara, Wellington Mara, Tim Mara, Ray Walsh and Jim Lee Howell of a dedicated front-office made the coaches' job easier.

So did Em Tunnell's incisive scouting reports, the medical and dental care of Dr. Francis Sweeny

and Dr. Arthur Croker; the soothing ministrations of trainers Johnny Johnson, Sid Moret and John Dziel and the cheerful service of Pete Sheehy and Pete Previte in the clubhouse.

And the deepest bow of all to the combatant Giants—of the offensive platoon, the defensive platoon and the special platoons (we can't name them all here, so we won't name any, but just refer you to the Giant roster on page 20 and the center line-up spread).

In the final analysis, it was these players who put the Giants over the top. All Giant-dom wants them to know their valiant efforts have been appreciated. New York loves the Giants—with reason.

Giant With A Kick: DON CHANDLER



CHANDLER . . . Place-Kicking

DON Chandler, long one of pro football's premier punters, is well on the road to establishing himself as one of the game's best place-kickers, too.

The 27-year-old ex-Florida star from Tulsa took over the added chores of booting extra points, field goals and kicking off for the Giants only this season, when Pat Summerall decided to shift his base of operations from the field to the TV booth.

The results have been spectacular. Through the Giants' first 12 games, the Babe, as his mates call Chandler, made good on 40 of 41 extra points tries (one was blocked) and 18 of 25 field goal attempts (his .720 average of success is tops in the NFL).

Two Giant victories—over the Eagles and over the Browns last Saturday—are directly attributable to Don's place-King. He booted four field goals in each of these triumphs.

The Giants are doubly appreciative of Chandler's effective efforts in his new capacity. Over the long, hard NFL schedule, with rosters restricted to 36 players, teams frequently get into personnel binds because of injuries.

In this situation, it's a definite bonus value to have a man capable of handling both the punting and place-kicking. It makes room for an extra all-purpose player.

Actually, Chandler is a talented all-purpose player himself. Don is a strong, clever runner who has made some vital gains for the

Giants on fake-punt "enterprise" dashes around end and also catches passes well. But a shoulder injury, a carry-over from his collegiate days, precludes his use as a heavy-duty performer.

"Chandler could play almost anywhere if his shoulder would stand up to punishment," notes Allie Sherman, the Giant coach. "But he's much too valuable as a punter and place-kicker for us to risk losing him."

For six years, Chandler's booming punts have been a Giant trademark. He won the NFL title in 1957 with an average of 44.6 yards (which is just about his lifetime mark).

An even more impressive statistic is Don's average of 51 yards

per punt when kicking from behind his own goal line. Few punters can match his performance under pressure.

"I can think of a dozen games over the years that Don has won, or at least saved, with his punting," says Sherman.

Don uses a punting style that has been called the Oklahoma roll. He faces the line of scrimmage with his body turned slightly toward the right. As he kicks, he rolls to the left and cuts across the ball with his foot.

"Actually, I cut across the ball too much and have a bad slice," observes Don. "It was pointed out to me when I was a rookie. But

they decided not to change me, because I was getting good results."

He attributes his unique style to his boyhood idol, Glen Dobbs of Tulsa, and later of the Brooklyn Dodgers. "Glen lived in Tulsa, too," says Don, "and I used to watch him practice for hours. I once saw him stand on his own goal line and kick the ball clear through the other zone."

Chandler is too modest to mention that he has gotten off similar boomers—in competition. Most notably, there was his gargantuan kick of the 1961 pre-season game against Green Bay. Standing two yards behind his own goal, Don knocked the ball a mile into the air and put it five yards in the Packer end zone. From take-off point to touch-down, it traveled 107 yards!

This demonstrated leg drive makes him a threat to the place-kicking distance records, too. There are still rough spots in his place-kicking technique but, under the knowing tutelage of Ken Strong, Chandler is ironing them out with amazing rapidity.

"Don has the potential to be the greatest combination kicker yet," says Strong. "Don't forget, he's still young at this game. He has ten good years ahead of him, more if he wants to stick at it."

In modern pro football, where there are so many specialized jobs to fill and, with rosters so tightly restricted, so few men to fill them, players like **Joe Morrison (40)** are worth their weight in gold. This stalwart Cincinnati graduate, a No. 3 draft choice in 1959, does everything well. Offensively, he can play behind the ball, on the flank and as a relief end. He finished last season as a defensive regular. And he's a crack kick returner. A good man to have around.

Baby-faced **Sam Huff (70)** speaks softly and has a deceptively roly-poly appearance. His large and vociferous—Yankee Stadium claque is not deceived. Huff fans know and love—Sam for what he really is—a rough, tough football player who asks and gives no quarter. An honored tackle at West Virginia, Huff was a No. 3 draft choice in 1956. He quickly won a job as a middle linebacker and for the last four seasons has been all-league.

Giant Close-Ups



Dick Modzelewski

Rugged, relentless **Dick Modzelewski (77)** has been a regular giant defensive rushliner ever since his 1956 acquisition from the Steelers. He had put in two years with Washington before switching to Pittsburgh. Little Mo, so called because an older brother, Ed, preceded him into pro football, was an All-America at Maryland. A highly combative player, Dick is both an irresistible force and an immovable body.



Erich Barnes

The Giants struck oil in 1961 when, in an involved pre-season deal with the Bears and Rams, they acquired **Erich Barnes (49)** from Chicago. The rangy 198-pound Purdue graduate, a No. 4 draft choice of the Bears in 1958, fitted right into the picture as a defensive backfield cornerman. His great speed, coordination and alertness make Barnes an outstanding pass-defender.

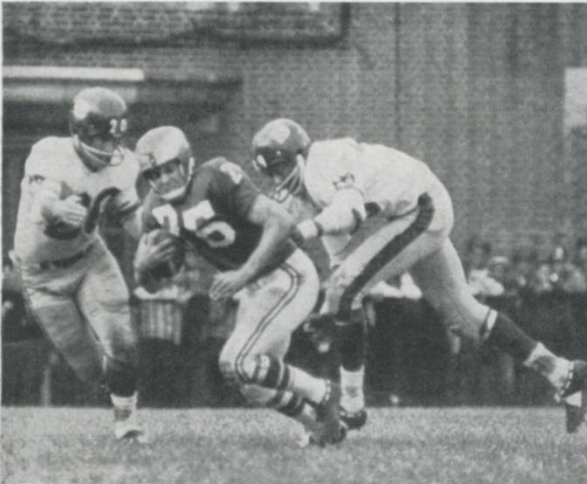

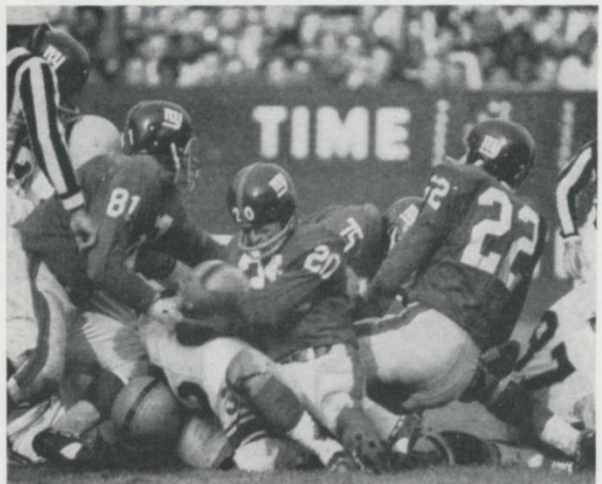
BLOCKED KICK—Dick Lynch (22) blasts in from the right corner to smother Khayat's field goal try against the Redskins.



PASS THAT FAILED—Washington's Bobby Mitchell (49 in white) thought he had this pass but Erich Barnes flung up an arm just in time.

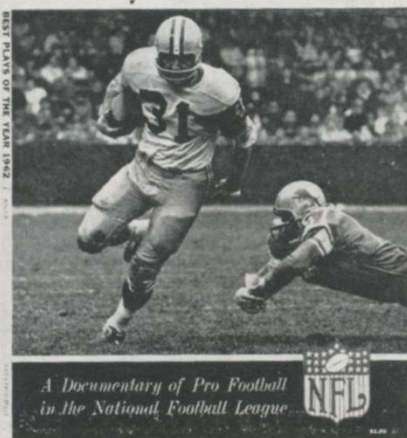

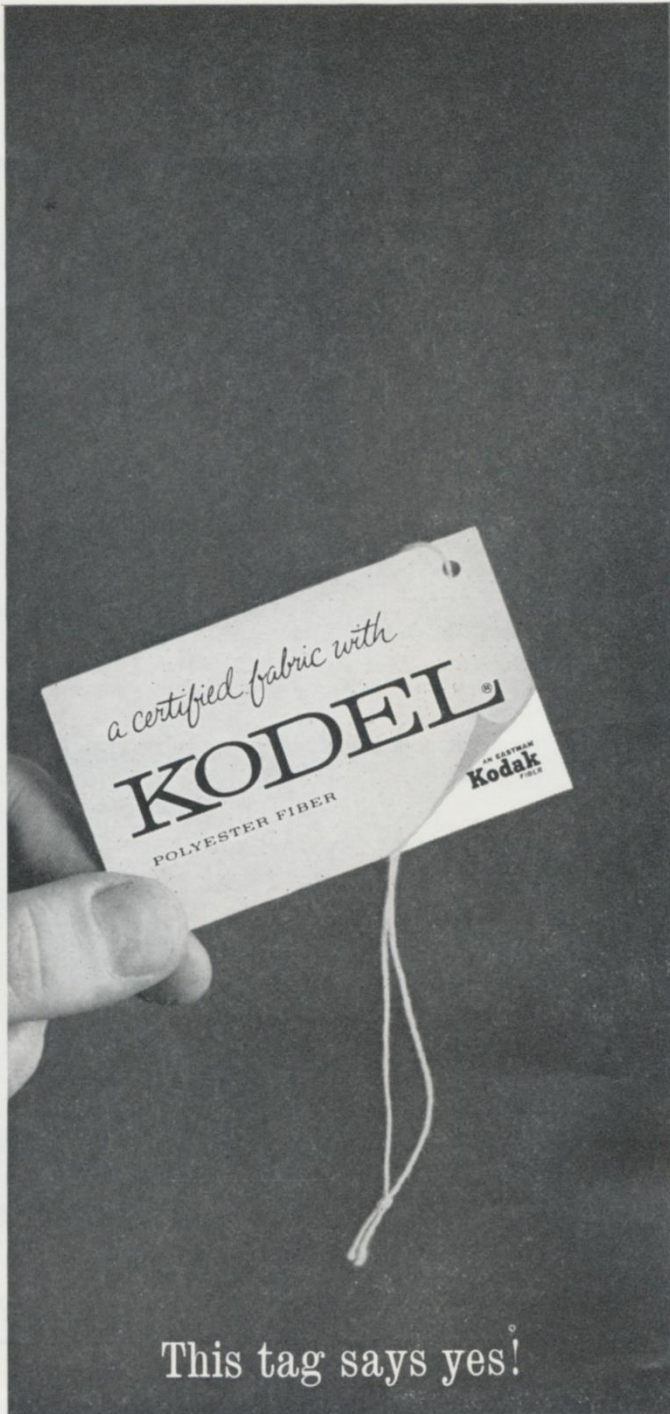

Frank Gifford

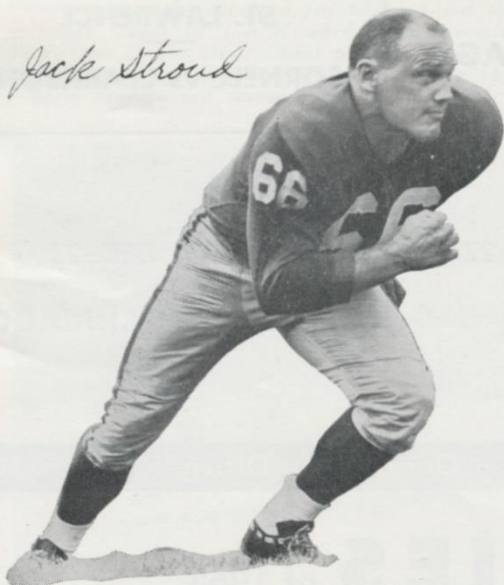
Back in Giant harness after a year's absence is **Frank Gifford (16)**. This handsome young man from Bakersfield, Calif., in nine brilliant seasons with the Giants, established himself as a complete football player. Used mainly as an all-purpose half-back before he quit in 1960, Giff, this second time around, will play mostly on the flank. Few can play it better. But it won't be a shock if he bobs up somewhere else. He can do it all.



Alex Webster

All but written off in 1960 after injuries had resulted in a second straight sub-par season, **Alex Webster (29)** had his best all-around year as a Giant in 1961. The big redhead from East Brunswick, N. J., hammered rival lines for 928 yards, to finish third in the NFL rushing totals. As in 1955-58, he once again was the Giants' bread-and-butter carrier. That goes for this year, too.

Giant Close-Ups



Jack Stroud

For all-around serviceability, there are few, if any, offensive linemen who can match **Jack Stroud (66)**. At various stages in his stellar 10-year career with the Giants, this deep-chested, powerfully-built Tennessee graduate has played regularly at both guards and both tackles. He also is used as a goal-line defender. Pulling or firing straight out, Jack is a lethal blocker.



Darrell Doss

Darrell Doss (62) came to the Giants in 1959 via the Washington Redskins and Pittsburgh Steelers. Since joining the club, the stocky 235-pound graduate of North Carolina State has been a starter more often than not at left guard on the offensive unit. A wrestling star in college, he has the strength and weight to make his blocks stick and the speed of foot to get out ahead of the ball-carrier on wide plays.

Howard Award-'63 Owens Cruiser To Be Presented To Giant MVP

One of six other Giant nominees will perform the same happy task next Sunday, when the 1962 contest results are announced.

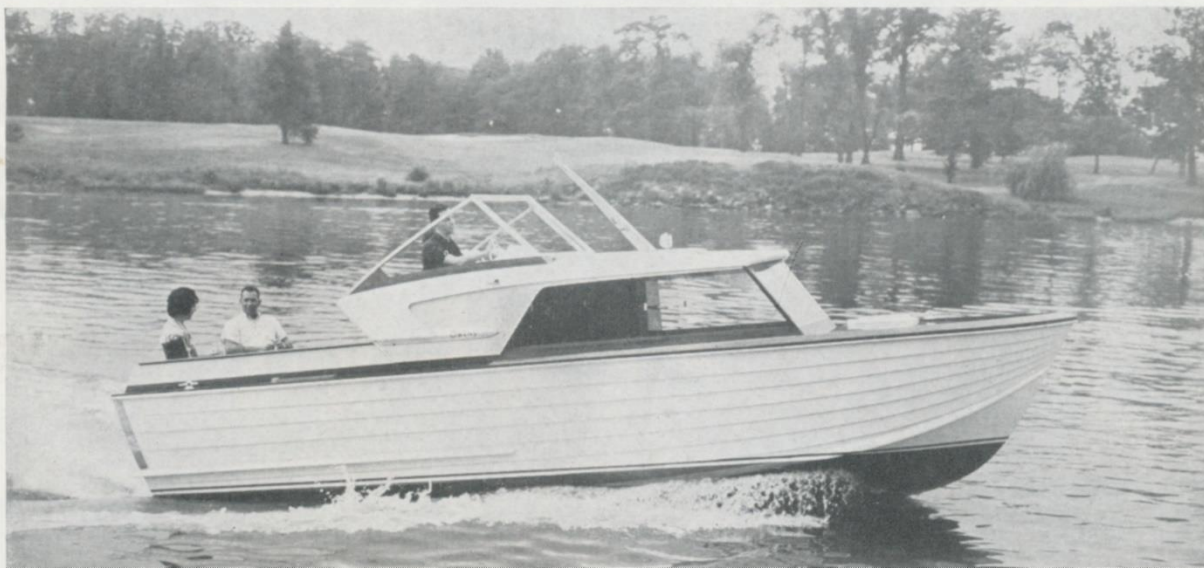
THE annual Howard Award will be presented to the Giant "Player-of-the-Year" before next Sunday's game with the Dallas Cowboys. If the award isn't the richest in professional sports, it's easily the bulkiest—over 5,000 pounds and 24 feet, seven inches long! The award, of course, is a 1963 Owens "Commando" Sea Skiff, a fully equipped inboard power cruiser valued at more than \$5,000.

Inaugurated last season by Howard Clothes, the award goes to the Giant nominee with the most number of votes registered in the 40 Howard stores in New York and New Jersey. In his first season as a Giant, Y. A. Tittle won the 1961 award with a clear-cut plurality of the more than 200,000 ballots cast by the public. Tittle took delivery of his Owens cruiser three months after the presentation ceremony and promptly developed into an enthusiastic "YATsman" with the first boat he's ever owned.

There's no chance that YAT will become a two-boatman this year. He has been ruled ineligible for the 1962 award. Only one boat to a customer, the award sponsors specify. That leaves the award up for grabs among the six candidates nominated in a press-box poll of sportswriters and broadcasters. The eligibles are:

Erich Barnes, Sam Huff, Jim Katcavage, Del Shofner, Joe Walton and Alex Webster.

The voting to date is considerably heavier than it was at a corresponding time last year. With four days remaining to cast ballots for the Giant Player-of-the-Year, well over 200,000 votes have been registered. Free ballots will be available in Howard stores through Thursday, December 13, so there's still plenty of time to help your favorite Giant nominee win the coveted Howard Award.

Series Review

IF the series between the Giants and Browns was much closer, these fierce rivals would be in a flat dead heat. The 13-year ledger shows 13 victories for Cleveland, 12 for New York and 2 ties. The Browns have scored 475 points, the Giants 440.

For most of their rivalry, which began in 1950, the Giants and the Browns have been the dominating

Eastern powers of the National Football League. Because of this, their meetings generally carry more than ordinary significance. Twice they played unscheduled extra games to decide the divisional title. The Browns won such a test, 8-3, in 1950. The Giants paid back in kind, 10-0, in 1958.

The Giants have the longest skein of victories in the series,

having won six straight times in 1958-60. The Browns clicked off five victories in a row in 1953-55.

Most Giant-Brown games have been close, low-scoring affairs. But there have been sensational departures from the usual pattern, e.g. Cleveland's 62-14 triumph of 1953 and New York's 48-7 romp of 1959.

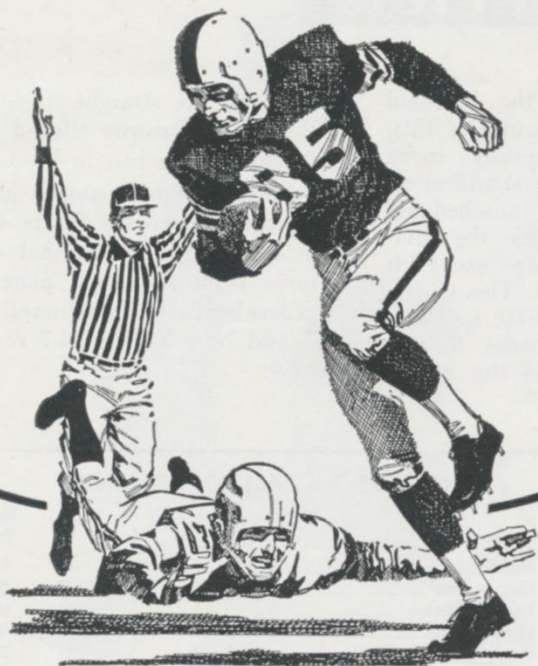

Giant Jottings

BECAUSE of their exalted position in the standings, the Giants did not get a crack at the top talent in last Monday's NFL draft. Having traded their first-round choice to the Cardinals for Ralph Guglielmi, the New Yorkers did not get to name a player until 25 had been selected.

When they got around to making their first choice, the Giants picked Frank Lasky, a 260-pound tackle from Florida. He classifies as a "future," having another year of varsity eligibility.

The other top Giant selections were: 3rd round—Dick Skelly, Florida halfback; 5th round—David Hill, Auburn tackle (by trade from Dallas) and Lou Slaby, Pitt linebacker; 6th round—Bob Petrich, West Texas tackle; 7th round—Dave Hoppmann, Iowa State halfback (by trade from Dallas) and Burt Petkus, Northwestern guard; 8th round—Dave Herman, Michigan State guard; 9th round—Bob Taylor, Maryland State tackle.

Although these names, except that of Hoppmann, one of the nation's total offense leaders for the past two years, won't ring many bells, there are good players on this list whom you are quite likely to see at the Stadium next season. The Giants, at least, are satisfied they did as well as could be expected.

Besides these 1962 draft choices, the Giants have a couple of red-hot 1961 "futures" on their negotiation list in Glynn Griffing, Mississippi quarterback, and Al Gursky, Penn State halfback.

* * * * *

It's always interesting to learn how the keen-eyed pro scouts rate the top collegians. In terms of playing ability, their draft choices constitute the most authentic All-America team. This year's Draft All-America, with order of selection in parentheses after each player's name, is as follows:

Ends—Pat Richter, Wisconsin (7) and Tom Hutchinson, Kentucky (9). Tackles—Jim Dunaway, Mississippi (3) and Ed Budde, Michigan State (4). Guards—Bob Vogel, Ohio State (5) and Rufus Guthrie, Georgia Tech (10). Center—Lee Roy Jordan, Alabama (6). Backs—Terry Baker, Oregon State (12), Jerry Stovall, LSU (2), Kirk Alexander, UCLA (8) and John Mackey, Syracuse (19).

To fill out the team within the first two rounds, Vogel, the third-named tackle, was placed at guard, and Mackey, drafted as an end but used at halfback near the end of the season, was added to the backfield.

In fairness to players who didn't make the Draft All-America, it necessarily is limited to seniors or fourth-year collegians not previously picked as "futures." Then, too, players who have declared themselves as not interested in or available for pro football naturally are passed over in the high rounds.

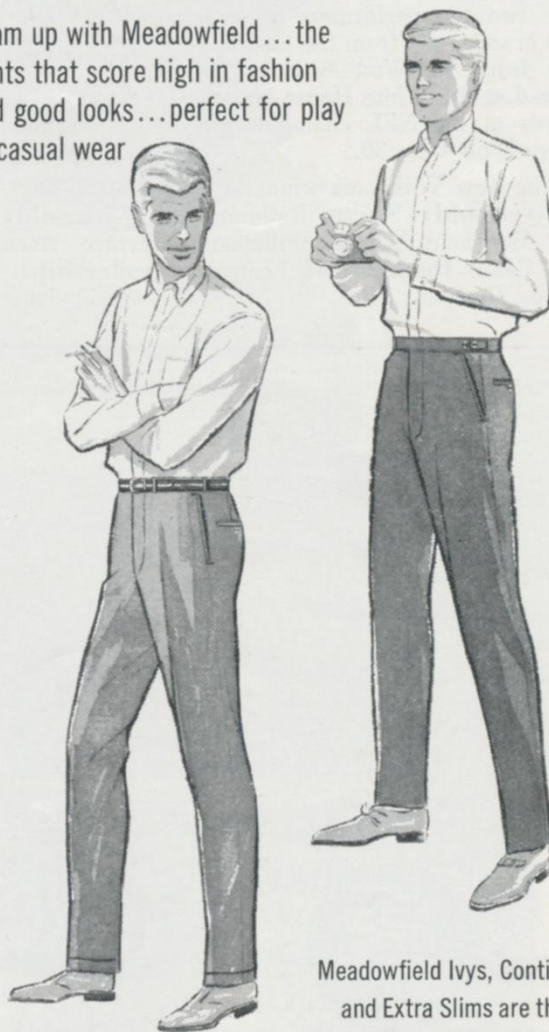

Punt, Pass & Kick Contest

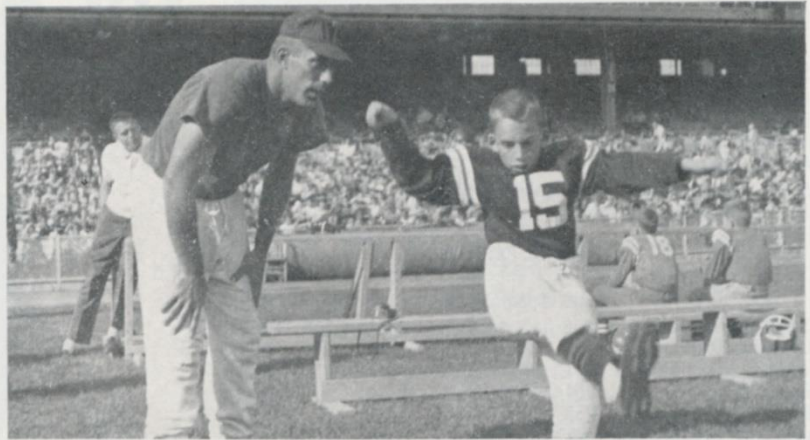

Looking Over:

The Browns



COACH PAUL BROWN

ON the word of Coach Paul Brown, the Cleveland Browns here today to play the Giants constitute a stronger squad than the one that dealt the New Yorkers a 17-7 setback in Cleveland on Opening Day.

How so? Has Brown equipped Cleveland with some new wrinkles. The coach says not: "No, we aren't doing anything differently, just executing better. At last the runners are running, the blockers are blocking, the passers are passing and the catchers are catching."

When a perfectionist like Brown expresses satisfaction with the performance of his team, the inference is clear that the Giants will be in for a busy afternoon. No coach in football is more meticulous in his insistence on mastery of details. This has been the key-stone of Brown's fabulously successful coaching record—in high school, college, service and professional football.

There are many new faces on this Brown team, as a result of retirements, replacements and trades since Cleveland last appeared here.

But the kingpin of the well-oiled machine still is Jimmy Brown. Wheeling in high again after a slow start attributable to a persistent wrist injury, the great full-back from Manhasset is hitting the line, sweeping the ends and snagging passes as devastatingly as ever.

In line with Coach Brown's

post-1961 decision to emphasize power over speed in his running attack, Big Jim has a whole new set of muscular ball-carrying companions. His chief partner is Gene Green, a 210-pound newcomer from Louisville who is one of the rookie sensations of the season. Also available are two seasoned pros acquired in trades, 204-pound Tom Wilson and 215-pound Charley Scales.

Cleveland also will present a new quarterback. Frank Ryan, obtained from the Los Angeles Rams, has been under center since Jim Ninowski cracked up, and has done a whale of a job. Ryan's pinpoint passing has provided Cleveland's passing attack with a sting it has lacked for several years.

Capable receivers run the pre-

cise Brown patterns. Richie Kreitling now is entrenched at the split left end, with Bobby Crespino as his relief. John Brewer and Leon Clarke, both of whom weigh in at 235 pounds, share the tight end assignment. Ray Renfro, a constant breakaway threat, is the roving flanker back. Getting to see more and more action behind him is big Gary Collins, the 1961 All-America from Maryland, who also is a crackerjack punter.

All-leaguers Mike McCormack and J. D. Smith lead a hard-blocking offensive line whose other starters are Dick Schafrath, John Morrow and John Wooten.

A bolstered defensive unit includes two new starters—255-pound Bill Glass, obtained from the Lions, at right end, and Mike Lucci, a 223-pound rookie from Tennessee, at right linebacker.

Bill Winter

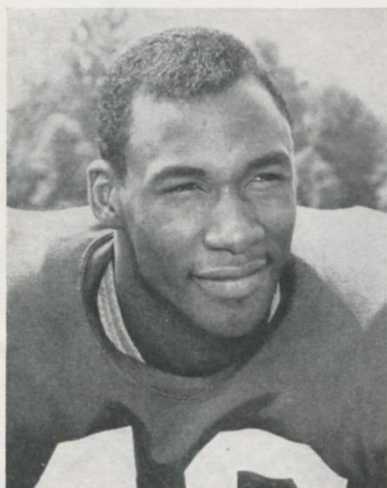

Joe Walton

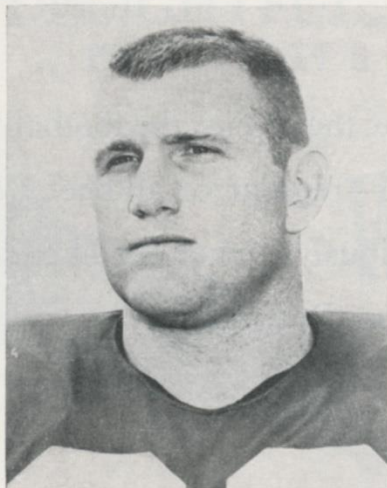

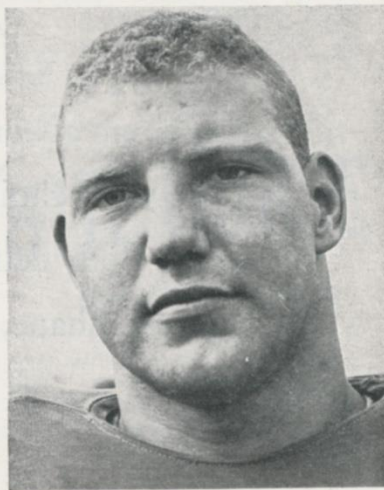
Johnny Counts
