



Play-Off Ticket Plans

The National Football League has announced the following plans for the December 30th championship game at Yankee Stadium:

Price scale is \$12 for upper or mezzanine box seats; \$10 for upper or mezzanine reserved seats; \$10 for lower box seats and \$8 for lower or open stand reserved seats.

Sale opens 9 a.m. Monday, Dec. 17. The sale will be handled **only at the Yankee Stadium and only in person**. No tickets will be sold at the Giants Office and no mail orders will be accepted.

Giant season subscribers have been mailed identity cards covering their regular season locations. Subscribers' reservations will be filed at Yankee Stadium alphabetically as the subscriber's name is listed on the Giant season subscription records. Season reservations must be picked up

at Yankee Stadium at Gate No. 4 from 9 a.m. on Monday, Dec. 17, until 3 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 22. Yankee Stadium ticket office hours Monday through Friday are 9 A.M. to 5 P.M.

Season subscribers need not be concerned if they cannot be at Yankee Stadium when the sale opens Dec. 17—their tickets will be held until 3 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 22.

Public sale also will be **at Yankee Stadium only**, beginning on Monday, Dec. 17, and also **only in person**. No mail orders will be accepted. Public sale will be at Gate No. 6.

Payment must be in cash or by certified check or money order payable to the New York Football Giants, Inc.

Yankee Stadium parking lot will be available without charge for the purchasers' convenience.



Giant Trouble-Shooter: Joe Morrison

ONE good reason why the Giants qualify as the football team "that has everything" is the presence on their roster of a young man named Joe Morrison.

Joe's name rarely appears in the starting line-up but before any game ends the chances are he'll have been in action at half a dozen positions.

The 24-year-old University of Cincinnati graduate, now in his fourth season with the Giants, is a coach's dream of a football player. He runs, he passes, he catches passes, he blocks, he tackles, he's a fine kick-returner and, though he hasn't taken a shot at this line of work, anyone who knows him wouldn't want to bet that he wouldn't do a good job of kicking, too.

"There's no doubt about it," says Coach Al Sherman. "Joe comes as close to being the complete football player as you can come."

Paradoxically in this era of super-specialization in pro football, all-around players of Morrison's stripe have added value. His ability to do so many jobs so well creates room on the roster for extra specialists who provide the depth a championship team needs to withstand the rigors of the long pro schedule.

During his career with the Giants, Morrison has played at both half-backs, fullback, flanker back and at both ends on the offensive unit; at left halfback and both safety spots on the defensive unit and at a variety of positions on the special units used for kicking off, receiving kick-offs, punting, receiving punts and place-kicking.

Joe doesn't care what position he plays as long as he's in the ball game. As far as he's concerned, playing football is fun, rather than just a job. This attitude shows in his work. He plays with obvious relish.

While Morrison is no speed merchant (his best time for 100

yards is 10.2 seconds), he has the quickness which is the hallmark of a good open-field runner. He takes short, choppy strides; can change direction on a dime and has splendid balance.

A solidly-built athlete, who packs 212 pounds on his 6-foot 1-inch frame, Morrison also has good blasting power straight ahead. This stands him in good stead when he plays fullback and helps him make his blocks and tackles stick.

As a pass receiver, he has good moves, sure hands and a nose for the ball. He has the strength to fight clear of rival linebackers on short passes over the line and is fast enough to go deep for long ones.

Morrison was the No. 3 draft choice of the Giants in 1959 after having been a three-season all-Missouri Valley Conference selection at Cincinnati. As a junior and a senior, he was named the most valuable player on the Bearcats and, among other records, he set Cincinnati marks by scoring 128 points and 21 touchdowns during his varsity career.

Joe was a versatile player at Cincinnati, too. He put in his first two seasons with the Bearcats as a T-formation quarterback. As a senior, he was shifted to halfback to give wider scope to his varied talents. The move paid off handsomely. As a halfback, Morrison led his team in scoring and ground-gaining and was the No. 1 man in three other statistical departments.

At Cincinnati, Joe also starred in baseball and basketball. He still dabbles in those sports when he isn't occupied with his Giant duties.

Off-season, Morrison works for the Ohio Steel Foundry Company. He's married to the former Barbara McDorman. They have a son, Ricky Joe, now one-and-a-half years old.







Frank Gifford

Back in Giant harness after a year's absence is **Frank Gifford** (16). This handsome young man from Bakersfield, Calif., in nine brilliant seasons with the Giants, established himself as a complete football player. Used mainly as an all-purpose half-back before he quit in 1960, Giff, this second time around, will play mostly on the flank. Few can play it better. But it won't be a shock if he bobs up somewhere else. He can do it all.

Giant fans are seeing **Don Chandler** (34) in a new role this season. Besides handling the punting assignment, which he has done admirably for six years, the strong-legged Florida graduate has taken over the place-kicking chores abandoned by the retired Pat Summerall. Don is doing better than just all right at his additional new job. He's getting both distance and direction on his placements.

In their quest for added line depth, the Giants made **Ken Byers** (60) their No. 7 choice in last winter's draft. The 240-pound Cincinnati graduate has proved to be a valuable acquisition. Primarily a tackle in college, Ken is serviceable anywhere on the defensive rushline and also can be used as a linebacker or up front on offense.



Jimmy Patton

When **Jimmy Patton** (20) tried out with the Giants in 1955 as an 180-pound rookie out of Mississippi, sideline observers said: "He'll never make it; he's too small." Jimmy made his critics eat their words. Not only did he make it but he made it big from the start and for the last 5 years has been the NFL's acknowledged top all-around safetyman. Patton not only knows how to make all the plays but knows why and when to make them, for which reason he has served as a playing coach the last three seasons.



Allan Webb

Signed last year as a free agent, **Allan Webb** (21) has done a terrific job for the Giants, as a spare running back, a reserve defensive back and now as the defensive unit's regular left safetyman. Like Andy Robustelli a graduate of little Arnold College, now defunct, Webb kept active in football as a sand-lotter waiting for the big chance that finally came in 1961. During the off-season he serves as recreation director for the Connecticut State prison.






Y. A. Tittle

Y. A. Tittle (14) is the NFL's senior quarterback at 35 years old, but one would never guess it to watch him in sprightly action. Acquired from the 49ers in a pre-season 1961 trade, Y. A. paced the Giants to the Eastern title with his thread-needle passing and fiery leadership. Going into his 14th pro season, he had completed 1,859 passes—tops in the game.




No center in football, say the Giants, can execute the blocking assignments that **Ray Wietecha** (55) carries out with practiced ease. The rugged 225-pound Northwestern graduate has fantastic lateral range. Ray also is the iron man of the Giants. Going into this season, he had played in 118 consecutive games and never had missed a minute of offensive play because of injury.

For insurance against injuries to Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, their prime deep pass receivers, the Giants got big **Aaron Thomas** (88) from the 49ers early this season in exchange for Bob Gaiters. The 6-foot-3, 208-pound Oregon State graduate, who hauled down 15 passes for 301 yards as a 1961 rookie with San Francisco, can go get 'em.

Charlie Janerette (72) has served the Giants well the past two seasons as a swing lineman. He fills in capably at either tackle on defense and offense and, in fact, can do a sound job just about anywhere up front. The Giants got the 250-pound Penn State alumnus in a 1961 deal with the Vikings, who had claimed him from the Rams in the expansion draft.

When Green Bay, caught in a personnel squeeze, reluctantly let **Paul Dudley** (23) go in their final cutdown, the Giants joyously jumped at the chance of adding him to their roster. A star all-round performer at Arkansas, the fleet, wiry 185-pound Dudley has the makings of a topnotch running back and pass-receiver. He also knows the ropes on defense. The Giants rate him highly.

presented Webster with an 18-foot outboard runabout at his testimonial dinner. With his brand


new 24-foot Owens inboard skiff, Admiral Alex will be the owner of a cumulative 42 feet of assorted boats.


Dick Pesonen

The Giants acquired **Dick Pesonen** (25) last spring from the Minnesota Vikings in exchange for Cliff Livingston. A 24-year-old graduate of the University of Minnesota's Duluth Branch, he was signed by the Packers as a free agent in 1960. He went to Minnesota in the players' stocking pool made available to the new NFL entry in 1961. Serviceable at all defensive backfield positions, Dick provides valuable protection.



Jim Kateavage

In 1961, **Jim Kateavage** (75) won all-league acclaim as a defensive end from both the AP and UPI. He thereby gained public credit for an honor Giant insiders felt he has deserved for several years. A Philadelphia native who attended Dayton University, the Big Kat was a No. 4 draft choice in 1956. He won a starting job almost immediately, was a big factor in helping the Giants win the world championship and has been a key rusher ever since.



Jim Collier

Among the several fine rookies the Giants have added to their roster this season is **Jim Collier** (84). This swift, rangy end from Arkansas has displayed rare first-year ability to go and get that football. As he gets to know the Giant pass patterns better, you'll be seeing more of him. Jim has all the requisites of a good pro end—size, speed, and good hands, desire and intelligence.





DON Chandler is closing in on a couple of all-time Giant records. The Bootin' Beauty needs to score only four more points to surpass the Giant one-season mark of 102 points set by Gene (Choo Choo) Roberts in 1949. One more field goal would put Don in a tie with Pat Summerall for the Giant one-season record of 20 fielders.

Andy Robustelli, the Giants' playing defensive coach, did a little counting on his fingers the other day and discovered, somewhat to his surprise, that he had played in 133 consecutive NFL games. This includes his service with the Los Angeles Rams, for whom Andy played five years before being traded to the Giants for a future draft choice in 1956. The Giants, therefore, have two of pro football's outstanding "iron men." Snapper Ray Wietecha has played 131 straight games—all for the Giants.

Roosevelt Brown, the Giants' superlative offensive tackle, has been enshrined in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics' football Hall of Fame. Rosy received his scroll at the Stadium last Sunday from Henry Schmidt, the NAIA chairman from this district. Copies of the scroll will be presented to Morgan State University of Baltimore, where Brown played his college football, and to the Giants, with whom Rosy has added no little to his fame.

The full Giant draft list wasn't yet available when last week's program went to press. So, to bring you up to date, the choices after round nine were as follows: 10th round, Mike Taliafero, Illinois back; 11th round, Don McKinnon, Dartmouth center; 12th round, Ed Adamcik, Pittsburgh guard; 13th round, Jim Moss, West Virginia back; 14th round, Joe Williams, Iowa back; 15th round, Lane Howell, Grambling center; 16th round, Charles Killett, Memphis State back; 17th round, Robert McAdams, North Carolina College tackle; 18th round, Bill Pashe, George Washington back; 19th round, Junius Buchanan, Grambling tackle; 20th round, Homer Jones, Texas Southern.

Several of these boys are worthy of special mention. McKinnon, whose linebacking and blocking at center contributed importantly to Dartmouth's undefeated, untied record, made several All-America teams. Williams, a New Jersey boy, was one of the most devastating runners in the Big Ten in 1960 and 1961 and performed well in Canada this season after being ruled scholastically ineligible by Iowa. Jones is a 9.3-second 100-yard dashman who ran on the United States' winning 400-meter relay team in last summer's dual meet with the Soviet Union. Jones, and Buchanan, admittedly are speculative choices as they have indicated their intention of signing with the Houston Oilers.

Today's between-the-halves entertainment will be supplied by the crack marching band and Pershing Rifle drill team of the New York State Maritime Academy of Fort Schuyler.

Looking Over:

The Cowboys



EDDIE LeBARON

OUR old Giant friend, Tom Landry, has done a tremendous job of making the Cowboys competitive in his three years in charge of this new National League entry.

In Dallas' first season of 1960, Tom suffered through a winless 0-11-1 campaign (the tie was with the Giants). Last year, the Cowboys improved to 4-9-1. This season, with final returns still to come, they are going to do a lot better.

There still are holes to fill in the Dallas roster, but nevertheless Landry has come up with an offensive unit that gives fits to its opponents and a defensive eleven that, while still vulnerable, isn't easy to trample on.

At the key quarterback position, the Cowboys are fortunate in having two effective operatives. Alternating there are Eddie LeBaron, one of the NFL's established stars, and Don Meredith, a rising great. Landry has been running them in and out of the line-up, carrying plays from the bench, in the manner of Cleveland's shuttling guards. The system has worked.

The Cowboys get good passing from both LeBaron and Meredith, mainly to Billy Howton, a long-time artful dodger on short-gainers; to Frank Clarke, one of the

league's top breakaway threats, and to Lee Folkins, a new, young tight end who shows great promise.

But, even more than their passing, the Cowboys' running commands respect. They have two real firebrands behind the ball in Don Perkins and Amos Marsh and a topflight relief for them in J. W. Lockett. These three guys all have speed and power.

In front of them is a young offensive line that improves every time out. Mike Connelly, at center, is as good as they come, in Landry's book. The guards, Dale Memmelaar and Andy Cverko, are rated superior, too, and the tackles, Monte Clark and Bob Fry get the job done also.

All in all, Dallas has an extremely well-balanced offensive unit. Rivals have to play honest defense against the Cowboys. They have a knockout wallop on the ground, pass well, and have a topflight combination kicker in Sam Baker.

As a player and as a coach with the Giants, defense was Landry's forte. Tom, a perfectionist, is far from being satisfied yet with

Dallas' ability to contain the opposition. But the Cowboys are getting there.

They have crackerjack defensive men in Bob Lilly at left end; Jerry Tubbs at middle linebacker; Jerry Norton at right safety and Don Bishop at right half.

The rookie George Andrie has had a fine season at right end and a couple of other first-year pros, Guy Reese and John Meyers, have added firepower to the rushline.

Mike Dowdle and Chuck Howley, both seasoned, provide line-backing support for Tubbs, who rates close to Detroit's Joe Schmidt, Chicago's Bill George and New York's Sam Huff as a middle linebacker.

In the deep secondary, the experienced Norton and Bishop, a rising star, have as companions two bright rookie prospects, Mike Gaechter, at left safety, and Cornell Green, on the left corner.

With five first-year starters on its defensive unit, Dallas makes errors here and there. And the offensive team could stand polishing in spots.


But the Cowboys have made sensational progress and definitely are a team to watch the next couple of years.

Series Review

THE Dallas Cowboys are the Giants' newest NFL foes, the teams first having met in 1960, but the young rivalry already has produced a full quota of excitement.

The series started off with a loud bang two years ago when the newly-organized Cowboys, who hadn't won any of their ten previous games, galloped into the Stadium breathing defiance and held the Giants to a shocking 31-31 tie.

In the second meeting between the clubs at Dallas last year, the Cowboys again had the Giants lassoed in a tie. Then the New Yorkers unleashed a couple of bolts out of the blue to make off with a 31-10 decision. Don Chandler hurled bolt No. 1 by breaking loose on a fourth-down fake-punt dash that set up the lead touchdown. Erich Barnes hurled bolt No. 2 by sprinting a record-tying 102 yards to a touchdown on a pass interception.

A couple of weeks later in the Stadium, the Cowboys caught the Giants off guard and nipped them, 17-16. This victory over the 1961 Eastern champions represented a high-water mark of achievement for the team from Texas.

The Cowboys had visions of making it two in a


row over the Giants—in fact, they had visions of spiriting away the Giants' title—when the teams squared off for the fourth time at Dallas last Nov. 11. The Texans were brought rudely back to reality. In their most devastating performance of the season, the Giants lowered the boom on the Cowboys, 41-10.

In the wake of this rout, the Cowboys can be counted on to arrive at the Stadium in a surly mood. Off past New York-Dallas developments, lively action is indicated on the field.

Strong, quick and blessed with an uncanny sense of anticipation, Robustelli specializes in harassing enemy passers and in piling up running plays in their inception. A native of Stamford, Conn., where he still makes his home, Andy attended Arnold College, now defunct.

Roose Brown



Back in 1953, the Giants took a flyer in the 27th round of the NFL draft on a rawboned young tackle from little Morgan State College named **Roosevelt Brown** (79). History has proved the selection to be inspired. By 1954 Rosie was solidly entrenched as an offensive starter at left tackle and since 1955, he has been an all-league. A fast-moving 260-pounder, Brown blocks dynamically, on the line and down-field. He also pitches in on goal-line defense.
