The Big Push

IT has been an eventful fortnight since the Giants last were in the Stadium. Two weeks ago, our boys won their "must" game in Cleveland, big. And last Sunday in St. Louis, they plucked the Cardinals, down to the last feather.

Without being pollyannish, we feel that somewhere along the line the Browns will slip up a time or two and give the Giants a whack at the big prize—perhaps via a play-off.


Of course, there's always the danger that the Giants may slip up, too. But off their most recent outings, General Sherman's troops seem more likely to keep marching.

He Stands Tall




IN the photograph above, John V. Mara, the president of the Giants, and two famed Giants of the modern era — flanker back Frank Gifford and Kyle Rote, now a Giant coach — examine with interest the Robert Riger drawing of a great Giant of the past—Timothy J. Mara, the founding father of the Giants in 1925 and the president of the New York club until his death in 1959.

The life-sized portrait of

Tim Mara is one of several such drawings executed by Riger, a noted football artist whose work frequently appears on Giant program covers, for the National Football Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio. The Mara portrait was recently exhibited at the Bankers Trust Building, 280 Park Avenue, in a show of Riger work entitled "The Pros." The Riger exhibition will have a three-week encore at the Bankers Trust Whitehall

Street office, starting Monday.

One of the 17 pro football personalities honored in this year's first election for enshrinement in the Hall of Fame, Tim Mara (as the portrait so strikingly conveys) did indeed stand tall in pro football. The stature of the Giants today is a tribute to his faith in, enthusiasm for and unflagging devotion to the sport that all America has come to love so well.


THE Giants in recent years have been air-oriented on attack, thanks to the passing virtuosity of Charlie Conerly and, more recently, Y. A. Tittle and the availability of a corps of good pass-receivers. But the Giant approach to offense, under Allie Sherman, as it was under Steve Owen and Jim Lee Howell before him, always has been to stress balance. This season, more than in the last few years, the Giants are equipped with a ground threat calculated to keep the defense honest. They are three deep at both running positions. Old pros Alex Webster, that bread-and-butter first-down maker and touchdown-scorer, and dynamic Phil King, who has come into his own this year, are backed up by the mercurial Hugh McElhenny and Joe Morrison, a model football player who does everything well. And behind the top quartet of Giant ball-carriers are two up-an-coming young pros who also have what it takes—sophomore Johnny Counts, who rejoined the team recently, after a stretch in the navy, and Charlie Killett, a “sleeper” rookie from Memphis State. Never have the Giants been so deeply manned with capable leather-luggers.





DEFENSE, the coaches will tell you, is the sine qua non of success in pro football. Reliable defensive performance is particularly important in the back line of the secondary, where there is no margin for error and where any mistake almost has to be fatal. On the corners and in the safety slots, the Giants have men who commit a minimum of errors. Erich Barnes, on the left corner, and Dick Lynch, on the right, are vigilant, far-ranging pass defenders with the speed and savvy to keep pace with the most artful dodgers of the flanker set. At safety, player coach Jimmy Patton, on the right side, has been the league's best at that position for his nine years as a Giant and Allan Webb, on the left, has learned fast since breaking in as a regular last year. Supporting this starting quartet are two seasoned pros, Dick Pesonen and Eddie Dove, both fast and knowing, too. Individually and as a unit, the Giant deep defenders leave little to be desired.



THE next visitor to Yankee Stadium will be the San Francisco 49ers. The squad from the Golden Gate will be here to play the Giants next Sunday.

Beset by injuries to key personnel, the 49ers have been having a bad year. But don't let that delude you. They're a ruction-raising team. Witness their 20-14 victory of Oct. 20 over the Chicago Bears. That result, which

knocked the Bears out of the unbeaten ranks, qualifies as the most shocking of the NFL season to date.

An explosive team, with possibly the most speed in the whole league, the 49ers have the potential to upset any foe. And being out of the title running themselves, Coach Jack Christiansen's men will take the field free and loose.

Among the San Francisco threats to Giant peace of mind during the coming week are Lamar McHan, a much-traveled quarterback who has taken a new lease on life with the 49ers; J. D. Smith, a mercurial running back, and Bernie Casey, a fast-stepping pass-grabber who plays on the flank.

This shapes up as another typically thrilling NFL game.

Tonight's Section Five Club Dinner Honoring Sherman Also is a Sellout

GIANT coach Allie Sherman will play to two sellout crowds today—this afternoon here at Yankee Stadium against the Philadelphia Eagles and tonight, when the Section Five Club honors him at its annual dinner-dance in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Astor.

While the Hotel Astor crowd won't approach today's Stadium turnout of 60,000-plus, Section Five Club chairman William Tolany reports a standing-room-only audience of 1,100 will be present to honor the youthful Giant field leader.

This is by far the largest crowd in the series of Section Five dinners which have honored in recent years such Giant stalwarts as former coach Jim Lee Howell, Charlie Conerly, Kyle Rote, Alex Webster and Andy Robustelli.

Co-MCs for this evening's affair are sportscasters Marty Glickman (WNEW Radio) and Chris Schen-

kel (CBS-TV), the official "voices" of the Football Giants.

Also in attendance will be the entire Giant squad, the coaches, their wives and members of the press, radio and TV.

For the 40-year-old Sherman, a native son of Brooklyn, this is

but another honor in a brilliant two-year career as head man of the Giants.

Allie won NFL eastern division titles in his first two seasons as coach of the Maramen and was named NFL Coach of the Year in 1961 and 1962, the first time any coach ever gained this notable distinction in back-to-back seasons.

Since taking over the Giants after Howell's retirement in 1960, Sherman has guided New York to a record of 28 wins, seven losses and one tie, not counting today's game with Philadelphia.

Allie, a graduate of Brooklyn College, played pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles (1943-47), was an assistant Giant coach under Steve Owen from 1949 through 1953, coached with Winnipeg in the Canadian league for three seasons and then returned to the NFL as a Giant scout and offensive coach under Howell.

Wherever he's gone, Allie has always been a winner.

THE way defense is played today in pro football, linebacker is a key position. Certainly, a wider range of responsibilities falls on the linebacker than any other defensive man. He must have the size and power to smash through on "red dog" assignments, the strength and determination to stand up under massive head-on assaults and the speed and range to cover pass-receivers in the flat zones. The Giants are fortunate in having men who possess these qualifications. Their close-support trio is composed of Bill Winter, Sam Huff and Tom Scott, reading from left to right as they line up on the field. The 220-pound Winter, who hails from little St. Olaf College, cracked the line-up as a rookie last year. Huff, 230, is an eight-year pro who has won all-league rating several times. Scott, a topnotch end in the days of the five-man rushline, was acquired from the Eagles in a 1959 trade. In the bullpen is 240-pound Jerry Hillebrand, the No. 1 draft choice of 1962 who spent last season on the taxi squad. And, if further help is needed, handyman Mickey Walker pitches in.






FOLLOWERS of the Giants are poignantly aware that the pass is the New York team's most lethal offensive weapon. But, although from what you read you might sometimes think it, the Giants don't get their aerial touchdowns simply as the result of Y. A. Tittle's launching spirals into the empty air. As he would be the first to admit, the admirable YAT has an admirable set of receivers. Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, the Giant flankers, are geniuses at getting loose for breakaway gains down the deep middle and on those short but vital first-down tosses to the sidelines. Joe Walton, the unsung Giant tight end, also has a rare knack of getting to the right spot at the right time and Aaron Thomas, who spells all three, is developing the same instincts. The Giant inside backs—Alex Webster, Phil King, Hugh McElhenny and Joe Morrison, who also plays on the flank when needed—are gifted receivers, too. As much as any team in football, the Giants are equipped to inundate the defense with flood pass patterns.

NICK SKORICH, the personable coach of the Philadelphia Eagles, wouldn't be human if, now and then, he didn't wonder why in blazes he didn't get into some other line of work.

Since his rookie head coaching season of 1961, when the Eagles missed the divisional play-off by a half-game, Skorich has had nothing but hard luck.

In 1962, the Philadelphia entry was beset by an unprecedented siege of broken bones, including three fractured arms and one fractured leg. At one time, all four of Nick's offensive ends were hors de combat. The result was that the Eagles, from being a hot contender for divisional honors, chuted into the Eastern cellar.

Don't try to tell Skorich that lightning never strikes twice in the same place. This has been another nightmarish season for the Eagles. Injuries, illness and assorted other casualties have largely nullified the big effort they have made to patch up their weaknesses.

There have been Sundays when Skorich has practically had to choose up sides to fill out his two platoons.

With all their mishaps, the Eagles of 1963 are a stronger team than the Eagles of 1962.

Because of injuries and turnover of personnel, the Eagles have soft spots on their offensive unit and certain areas of the defense are exploitable by an analytical

quarterback, such as the Giants' Y. A. Tittle.

But they also have enough long-range striking power to send chills of fear up a rival's back. You can't afford to relax against this Philadelphia team. When they score, they score in a hurry.

In flanker back Tommy McDonald, the Eagles have the NFL's most respected breakaway pass-catcher, and Pete Retzlaff, his running mate on deep patterns, also is no slouch.

At running halfback, they have Timmy Brown, whom many regard as football's most exciting runner. Lightning fast and possessed of the ability to turn on a dime, Brown is a threat to go all the way every time he lays his hands on the ball.

Ted Dean, when he is sound,


provides much the same type of performance at fullback and also is a kick-returning demon. Clarence Peaks is another solid performer at fullback and Paul Dudley, the former Giant, does a capable job of spelling Brown.

Attrition has been so heavy among the Eagle quarterbacks that it's hard to say who will carry the chief load against the Giants. It could be Sonny Jurgensen, who throws the bomb; King Hill, a probing short passer, or Ralph Guglielmi, who would have special incentive against the Giants.


The Eagles have other good men and true, and several blue-chip rookies, scattered through their platoons. Their offensive line presents rookie Dave Graham; Ed Blaine, acquired from the Packers; Jim Schrader, once an all-league center for Washington; Pete Case, a rising second-year pro, and J. D. Smith, a 5-year regular at right tackle.

On the defensive rushline, 242-pound Jerry Mazzanti, a rookie from Arkansas; Bill Quinlan, a Green Bay regular last year, and Frank Fuller, a long-time star of the Cardinals, have joined the veteran Riley Gunnels.

Lee Caffey, a rookie from Texas A. & M., backs up the line, with holdovers Maxie Baughan and Bob Harrison. Rookie Nate Ramsey, from Indiana, teams with the experienced Jimmy Carr, Don Burroughs and Irv Cross in the deep defense.





Sizing Up Today's N.F.L. Games

The following NFL release points up the issues at stake, the potential high spots and other interesting facets of today's NFL games.

PHILADELPHIA AT NEW YORK

The Giants hold five straight victories over the Eagles in regular season play, and that means Nick Skorich has never beaten Al Sherman . . . Both started as head coaches in the NFL in 1961 . . . But the Eagles, despite a heavy list of injuries, have given both the Bears (16-7) and the Browns (23-17 last Sunday), rugged, although losing battles . . . In their September meeting, the Giants won 37-14 as Y. A. Tittle threw three TD passes (he now leads league with 20), Dick Lynch intercepted three passes, and Joe Morrison, playing in place of the then injured fullback Alex Webster, scored three TDs . . . Giants took over sole possession of second in East by beating St. Louis 38-21 last Sunday.

CLEVELAND AT PITTSBURGH

Rematch of one of season's most thrilling games . . . Cleveland stadium record crowd of 84,684 watched first Saturday night in October when Browns won 35-23, and this one will probably draw Steeler record crowd to Pitt Stadium . . . Teams were both unbeaten at time of first meeting, now Browns have lost one (to New York) and Steelers three (Cleveland, St. Louis and Green Bay) . . . Lead changed hands seven times in October game, and Steelers went into final period leading 23-21, but Frank Ryan threw two TD passes in final period for Cleveland victory . . . Browns' Jim Brown gained 175 yards rushing in that one, now leads league with 1,194. . . . Steeler fullback John Henry Johnson didn't play against Browns and twice Steelers had to settle for field goals after being in close . . . Cleveland must win to be sure of remaining on top in East . . . Browns now have as many wins as had all last season.

MINNESOTA AT GREEN BAY

Teammate Hank Greminger picked up the loose ball and raced 80 yards for a TD and 37-28 GB win, one of seven

Los Angeles has won two of last three games as Roman Gabriel has taken over as No. 1 QB . . . However, in last week's 21-13 loss to Vikings, Gabriel was thrown seven times attempting to pass, and neither Jon Arnett or Dick Bass (both injured) carried the ball at all . . . Meanwhile, the Bears, in 17-7 victory over Baltimore displayed their best rushing attack of season (164 yards split up among six ball carriers) . . . Chicago QB Bill Wade continues very accurate with short passes.

WASHINGTON AT ST. LOUIS

Despite last Sunday's loss to New York which dropped Cardinals to

third in East behind Browns and Giants, St. Louis is still very much in Eastern race . . . Cards have another shot at NY and two games with Cleveland, just enough opportunities to really snarl the conference . . . But those chances don't mean a thing unless the Cards can hold up in their other three remaining games . . . St. Louis beat Washington two weeks ago on road, but Redskins lost three fumbles . . . Cards' Charley Johnson threw three TD passes and St. Louis had 21-7 win . . . But last week, in turn, St. Louis had trouble holding on to ball against New York . . . Skins hoping to break out of sixth place tie with Dallas.

DETROIT AT BALTIMORE

Lions need victory to square season's series with Colts and to get above .500 in standings . . . Colts beat Lions 25-21 earlier in Detroit, coming from behind with 15 second-half points while shutting out Lions after intermission. . . . That gave new Colt Coach Don Shula first blood against club he formerly served as assistant . . . Colts were .500 after that one but have lost to co-leaders Green Bay and Chicago since . . . In last two Lion victories, Earl Morrall has emerged as strong QB, while Milt Plum has been confined to place-kicking duties . . . Morrall threw four TD passes and Terry Barr had 10 receptions in Lions' 45-7 win over San Francisco last week. . . . Jim Martin, ex-Lion, kicked four field goals for Colts last time teams met.

DALLAS AT SAN FRANCISCO

The East ran off five straight victories in inter-conference meetings at the start of the season, but now the West—thanks to Green Bay and Chicago—has had three straight . . . Now it's up to the 49ers to keep the West rolling in this ninth East-West battle of year . . . This is only second regular season meeting between teams since Cowboys came into league and first ever in SF . . . 49ers won 26-14 at Dallas in '60 . . . Dallas won pre-season game this year at Bakersfield, 37-24. Linebacker Mike Dowdle of 49ers and defensive back Jim Ridlon of Cowboys each face old teammates, the Packers have now run off in suc-
