THE Giants won another battle in the strenuous campaign to capture a third straight NFL Eastern title by overwhelming San Francisco last Sunday. General Sherman's forces laid down their heaviest barrage of the season in blasting the 49ers, 48-14.

This fifth straight success put Allie's Army on top of the Eastern standings in solitary splendor because, out in Cleveland, the Cardinals knocked off the Browns, with whom the Giants had been tied for the lead.

So now, at long last, the Giants are in position to take the flag on their own, without dependence on outside developments. The formula is simple—keep winning—even though not easy of accomplishment.

We're sure General Sherman and the troops are well aware of all the ins and outs. They fought like demons to charge from two games behind Cleveland to where they are. But they know that, while gaining this vantage hold

was a great triumph, it represents only an intermediate advance toward the goal of total victory.

The ranks must hold firm and march unwaveringly past four more resistance points—the Cardinals, who have moved up into a second-place tie with the Browns; the Cowboys, out to round up their lost prestige; the Redskins, in an ambushing mood, and the Steelers, very much in the title fight themselves.

It all points to a highly exciting stretch drive. Certainly, it will be one in which there is no place for faint hearts—on the field or in the stands.

On their winning streak, the Giants have generated momentum, to be sure. But with each success, the pressure grows, too, and tension inevitably mounts. After all, it's men, not machines, who play this game and even the football supermen who compose the Giants are not super-human.

In this sticky situation, the

Giants are fortunate in having so many tried-and-true pros. Over the last few seasons, particularly the ball has not bounced just right, too much of a point has been made of the Giants' "maturity," to sugar-coat that athletically-unpalatable word "age."

The Tittles, the Websters, the Giffords, the Browns, the Strouds, the Robustellis, the Huffs and the Pattons of the Giants are good men to have on one's side at a time like this. They've run the gauntlet before and come through it with flying colors. You can bet your bottom dollar that, at least, they won't run scared.

Thanks to the practiced skills of these hash-marked gridiron warriors and their steady influence on the younger rank-and-file, we look for the Giants to play their best game the rest of the way. That's all any one can ask for.

And, if that's not good enough to win, well then, hats off to the team that's good enough to top it!

THE Giants in recent years have been air-oriented on attack, thanks to the passing virtuosity of Charlie Conerly and, more recently, Y. A. Tittle and the availability of a corps of good pass-receivers. But the Giant approach to offense, under Allie Sherman, as it was under Steve Owen and Jim Lee Howell before him, always has been to stress balance. This season, more than in the last few years, the Giants are equipped with a ground threat calculated to keep the defense honest. They are three deep at both running positions. Old pros Alex Webster, that bread-and-butter first-down maker and touchdown-scorer, and dynamic Phil King, who has come into his own this year, are backed up by the mercurial Hugh McElhenny and Joe Morrison, a model football player who does everything well. And behind the top quartet of Giant ball-carriers is Charlie Killett, an up-and-coming young pro. Never have the Giants been so deeply manned with capable leather luggers.






PRO offensive linemen carry the heavy burden of having to rout out king-sized defensive linemen on running plays and shield their quarterback from enemy assault on passing plays. It takes size, speed, agility and a lot of know-how to discharge these duties effectively. The Giants' offensive line is anchored at the tackles by two great old pros—trigger-quick Roosevelt Brown on the left side and deep-chested Jack Stroud on the right. Between them are Darrell Dess, who in the last two seasons has developed into one of the league's best left guards; Greg Larson, a rising youngster who was shifted to center this season with the departure of Ray Wietecha, and Bookie Bolin, a sophomore pro who has taken over at right guard after sitting out most of his rookie season with injuries. Available for fill-in duty at guard are a couple of other upcoming young players—Ken Byers and Mickey Walker. The rookies, Leo Kirouac and Lane Howell, also figure in the picture as spare tackles.







FOLLOWERS of the Giants are poignantly aware that the pass is the New York team's most lethal offensive weapon. But, although from what you read you might sometimes think it, the Giants don't get their aerial touchdowns simply as the result of Y. A. Tittle's launching spirals into the empty air. As he would be the first to admit, the admirable YAT has an admirable set of receivers. Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, the Giant flankers, are geniuses at getting loose for breakaway gains down the deep middle and on those short but vital first-down tosses to the sidelines. Joe Walton, the unsung Giant tight end, also has a rare knack of getting to the right spot at the right time and Aaron Thomas, who spells all three, is developing the same instincts. The Giant inside backs—Alex Webster, Phil King, Hugh McElhenny and Joe Morrison, who also plays on the flank when needed—are gifted receivers, too. As much as any team in football, the Giants are equipped to inundate the defense with flood pass patterns.



NEXT Sunday, the Washington Redskins will be here to do battle with the Giants. This is another one of those booby-trap games that make title-contending coaches grow grey before their times. The Redskins, out of the race themselves, will come here dedicated to the purpose of derailing the Giants.

Like every other team in the NFL, the Redskins are perfectly capable of accomplishing such a

result, if they put all the pieces together. Coach Bill McPeak has a talented young squad at Washington — it carried the rugged Steelers down to the wire a week ago—and it could jell at any moment.

Washington's passing attack is particularly dangerous. It features Norman Snead and Bobby Mitchell. Snead is one of the NFL's rising young passers. Mitchell, who captured the NFL receiving title last

year, is ahead of his 1962 pace with 48 catches for 1,017 yds. Bobby, a running back-turned-flanker, is one of the most elusive broken-field runners in football, a threat to go all the way any time he handles the ball.

Other Washington worthies include Billy Barnes, an indomitable runner, and Pat Richter, a big pass-catching end and punter who is a candidate for rookie-of-the-year honors.

Stevens Awards (wardrobes of sports clothes) went to Joe Morrison, for offense, and Dick Modzelewski, for defense.

Before today's game, Y. A. Tittle will receive the Catholic Youth Organization Award as the outstanding Giant of 1963. The presentation will be made by Jack Lavelle, Jr., son of the late Giant scout and C. Y. O. field director.

. . . Incidentally, Tittle is well within reach of the NFL season record of 33 touchdown passes he set a year ago. With four games to play, Y. A. has rung the scoring bell 27 times. The Giant quarterback needs just three more TD passes to tie Bobby Layne's NFL career record of 196.

Today's between-the-halves entertainment will be provided by the Ithaca High School Band of Ithaca, N. Y. Frank L. Battisti is the director of this crack upstate organization, which will be making its first appearance at the Stadium . . . That handsome blue and red banner that flies from the center field flagpole at Giant games is the emblem of the 1962 NFL Eastern championship. It was donated to the Giants by Bruno Bernabo, the director of Mamma Leone's Ristorante.



DEFENSE, the coaches will tell you, is the sine qua non of success in pro football. Reliable defensive performance is particularly important in the back line of the secondary, where there is no margin for error and where any mistake almost has to be fatal. On the corners and in the safety slots, the Giants have men who commit a minimum of errors. Erich Barnes, on the left corner, and Dick Lynch, on the right, are vigilant, far-ranging pass defenders with the speed and savvy to keep pace with the most artful dodgers of the flanker set. At safety, player coach Jimmy Patton, on the right side, has been the league's best at that position for his nine years as a Giant and Allan Webb, on the left, has learned fast since breaking in as a regular last year. Supporting this starting quartet are two seasoned pros, Dick Pesonen and Eddie Dove, both fast and knowing, too. Individually and as a unit, the Giant deep defenders leave little to be desired.





A STALWART defense has been the bedrock of the current era of Giant ascendancy in the National League's Eastern Conference—an era which began back in 1956. It was in that season that the great Giant rushline was formed. Three original members of the fearsome Front Four remain—Andy Robustelli, now defensive captain and a player coach; Dick (Little Mo) Modzelewski and Jim Katcavage, initially a handyman reserve. These hardy pioneer survivors of one of the gridiron's most formidable frontal firing lines have been joined this season by John LoVetere, a 285-pound passer-rushing terror who was acquired from the Los Angeles Rams in exchange for Roosevelt Grier, and Lane Howell and Bob Taylor rookies who, as spares, have exhibited the same destructive instincts as their seasoned fellow Giant frontiersmen. Big, strong, fast and knowing, these intractable Giants of the rushline relentlessly carry the fight to the foe. To them belongs much of the credit for the success the Giants have enjoyed over most of the past decade.

THE Cardinals have been one of the surprise teams of the 1963 season. The St. Louis entry commanded initial respect for its potential but when John David Crow and Prentice Gautt, its two top running backs, were rendered hors de combat, the Redbirds were more or less written off.

However, Coach Wally Lemm's squad refused to throw in the sponge and enters the closing phases of the campaign still a prime contender for the Eastern Conference title.

The chief factor in the St. Louis rise, perhaps, has been the development of Charlie Johnson into a full-fledged star quarterback. Many observers hail this young man, a third-year pro who cracked the starting line-up late last sea-

son, as the "NFL quarterback of the future."

Johnson has amazing poise and a fine grasp of strategy. He also has a slingshot arm that gives the Cardinals one of the league's most potent aerial threats. With break-away receivers in Sonny Randle, Bobby Joe Conrad and the rookie Billy Gambrell, the Redbirds have impressive long-range scoring punch. Jackie Smith, their rookie tight end, is another competent receiver, as is the veteran fullback, Joe Childress.

The St. Louis defense is formidable, too, even though this unit includes three rookie starters. Em Tunnell, the Giant scout, rates the Cardinal deep secondary of Pat Fischer, the rookie Jerry Stovall, Larry Wilson and Jimmy Hill as the best in the league. It has been


highly resistant to passing assault, or was, until the Giants' Y. A. Tittle operated on it for four touchdowns a few weeks back. But when Tittle is on his game, no defense can stop him.

The rookie Larry Stallings, Dale Meinert and Bill Koman have been providing solid linebacking and there has been little fault to find with a rushline that deploys Joe Robb, Tom Redmond, Luke Owens and the rookie Don Brumm from left to right.



Sizing Up Today's N.F.L. Games


The following NFL release points up the issues at stake, the potential high spots and other interesting facets of today's NFL games.

ST. LOUIS AT NEW YORK

Cards have given up only eight TD passes in 10 games, and N. Y. Quarterback Y. A. Tittle threw four of them on the afternoon of Nov. 3 at St. Louis . . . The Giants won that day 38-21 and broke a second-place tie with the Cards . . . Now St. Louis has battled back into a second-place tie with Cleveland and the Giants lead the Eastern Conference . . . St. Louis' title hopes rest on one simple fact: If they win their remaining four games, the Cards can do no worse than tie for the Eastern crown . . . Tittle is the league's top-rated passer and has 27 touchdown passes . . . Johnson is second in TDs with 20 (a club record) and between them the veteran Y. A. and Johnson, the third-year man, lead in virtually every passing category . . . Bobby Joe Conrad of Cards leads NFL receivers with 56 catches . . . Cards big problem in first meeting with N. Y. was giving up the ball—four times on interceptions, three times on fumbles. . . . N. Y. beat S. F. 48-14 last week, Cards topped Cleveland 20-14 . . . Giants played 49ers without fullback Alex Webster but got best rushing of season (207 yards) from Joe Morrison and Phil King.

CHICAGO AT PITTSBURGH

The season's 11th interconference game and possibly the most important . . . Both Eastern and Western races will be affected strongly by outcome . . . Steelers are only game and a half behind Eastern-leading Giants and a mere half game back of both Cardinals and Browns . . . If St. Louis wins at N. Y. and Steelers could top Bears, Eastern race would really be snarled . . . Pittsburgh, only team in East which hold victories over Giants, Cards and Browns, cannot be taken lightly by Bears despite Chicago's 9-1 record that includes two victories over Green Bay. . . . With only four games to play, Bears are full game ahead of Packers in West and in excellent position to end GB's conference championship string at three, but Steelers present big roadblock . . . They are only team with winning record remaining on Bears' schedule . . . Steeler QB is Ed Brown who led Bears to their last conference title back in 1956 . . . East holds 6-4 edge in inter-conference games this year . . . Bears beat Philadelphia 16-7 and Steelers tied 21-21 with Eagles . . . Bears beat Packers twice (10-3 opening day and 26-7 last Sunday) while Pittsburgh lost to Green Bay 33-14 . . . Both Steelers and Bears like to keep ball on ground . . .

Bears had 55 rushing plays against GB, and Steeler fullback John Henry Johnson carried 34 times for 105 yards last week in Pitt's 34-28 win over Washington. Also, Steeler halfback Dick Hoak has carried 185 times in 10 games, the second most in the league to Jim Brown of Cleveland . . . Bears and Steelers have met 12 times and Pittsburgh has won only once, 24-10 in 1958 at Pittsburgh . . . Last meeting was in '59 at Chicago. Bears won 27-21.

DALLAS AT CLEVELAND

This could be day Cleveland fullback Jim Brown breaks the NFL one season rushing record he set in 1958 . . . Jim now has 1,447 yards, needs 81 to top mark of 1,527 . . . In meeting at Dallas in September, Jim gained 232—his '63 high—as Browns laced Cowboys 41-24. . . . Browns totaled 453 yards to Cowboys 307 as Frank Ryan threw two TDs and scored another . . . However, last week in loss to St. Louis, Cleveland used Jim Ninowski at QB . . . Dallas, winner in two of last three, is getting top passing from Don Meredith, now third in NFL . . . Cleveland victory coupled with St. Louis win over New York can create three-way tie for first place in East . . . Cowboys, after poor start, now in fifth place following 27-20 win over Eagles . . . Ray Renfro Day at Cleveland Stadium . . . Browns' final home game.

SAN FRANCISCO VS. GREEN BAY at Milwaukee

The Packers remember 1960 . . . In late afternoon of Nov. 24 they were

left for dead in Tiger Stadium, Detroit . . . The Lions had just beaten them 23-10 and the GB record was 5-4 with three to play . . . When those three had been played, GB was 8-4 and the Western Conference champion. . . . Now GB is 8-2, trails Chicago by a full game and needs at least one Bear defeat to make possible a fourth straight Western Conference title . . . Last week's loss to Chicago was the first time the Packers had been swept in a season's series since Baltimore did it in '59 . . . 49ers are only team to beat Bears this season and hold lifetime edge of 14-10 over GB, although Packers have won seven of last eight and swept S. F. 31-13 and 31-21 in '62.

BALTIMORE AT LOS ANGELES

Both have shown improvement in recent games . . . Colts have two straight wins, including 37-34 over Minnesota last week . . . Rams have won three of last five after breakthrough against Vikings in sixth game of season . . . L. A. strong showing due largely to passing of Roman Gabriel and receiving of Carroll Dale, a bench warmer early in season who got hot in fifth game and now has 25 catches for 497 yards and six TDs . . . Gabriel-to-Dale was good for three scores in L. A.'s 28-21 win over Detroit. Colts' QB Johnny Unitas threw for four against Vikings.

DETROIT AT MINNESOTA

Vikings can catch Lions in Western standings, but it will take first win over Detroit in three-year history of Vikings to do it . . . Lions won October game at Detroit with strong offensive show, 28-10, as Earl Morrall passed for three TDs and Tom Watkins rushed for 102 yards . . . Minnesota's Tommy Mason gets better each week. He carried 12 times for 146 yards against Colts and is now third leading rusher in league.

WASHINGTON AT PHILADELPHIA

Rematch of October battle in which Eagles rallied from 17-16 halftime deficit to win 37-24 . . . Philadelphia QB Sonny Jurgensen, who has missed last four games, threw four TD passes that day against crippled Washington secondary . . . Jurgensen's sub, King Hill, threw three TDs in loss to Dallas last week . . . Redskins' receiver Bobby Mitchell red hot, had 11 catches against Steelers . . . Winner can land in fifth place in East if Dallas loses.

They Coach The Giants

THE Giant coaching staff is symbolic of the tremendous advances that pro football has made since World War II. From head coach Allie Sherman on down, the men who call the shots for the Giants are 100 percent NFL-trained. That is, they have come up through the NFL ranks as players and have done all their coaching in pro football.

In dedication and know-how, the Giant staff matches any in football and, in line with a long-standing Giant tradition, no group could be more tightly-knit or more mutually-respecting.

Head Coach Sherman's senior aides are Ed Kolman, Ken Kavanaugh and Kyle Rote, all great pro players of the past who are proving themselves as great pro coaches. Andy Robustelli and Jimmy Patton, two great pro players of the present, double up as player-coaches. And, available for consultation and special assignments, are two more great pros of the past, Emlen Tunnell and Ken Strong.

Big Ed Kolman, a Brooklynite who played varsity football at Temple University and earned post-graduate acclaim as a tackle for the Chicago Bears in their 1940-42 heyday, coaches the Giant line. He put in a seven-year term from 1950-56, retired for three years to enter private business, then returned to the Giants in 1960. Ed's enlightened, patient teaching has had much to do with the development of such outstanding Giant linemen as Rosey Brown, Ray Wietecha, Jack Stroud and Darrell Dess.

Ken Kavanaugh, another former Chicago Bears star, coaches the Giant ends and helps Sherman create the pass patterns that have worked so well in recent years. Ken, a college All-America at Louisiana State University who last winter was enshrined in the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame, has been on the Giant staff since 1955. To such current and recent Giant pass-catching stars as Del Shofner, Frank Gifford, Joe Walton and Kyle Rote, he has imparted the knowledge that enabled him to grab 55 touchdown passes for the Bears.


Kyle Rote retired as an active player at the start of the 1962 season, which would have been his 12th as a Giant. Al Sherman immediately appointed him offensive backfield coach. The Mighty Mustang, as Kyle is called in honor of his legendary varsity feats at Southern Methodist University, is exceptionally well qualified for his new role. He was a brilliant player, both as a halfback and an end; has a keen understanding of all phases of football and enjoys the sincere respect of all those who have played with and against him over the years. Rote's well on his way to high honors in other fields, too. He's the year-round sports director of Station WNEW and much in demand as a radio and TV performer.

Having been kingpins of the doughty Giants defense since it was put together in its basic present form in 1956, Andy Robustelli and Jimmy Patton are uniquely well-suited to direct it. They know from practice, as well as theory, what will work and, on the field, are in position to make adjustments as necessary. It's a tribute to both that they are able to maintain their personal high standards of play while carrying this added burden.

Em Tunnell's main duties with the Giants are scouting opposing teams and bird-dogging college prospects. But when he's in town, he pitches in and passes along to the active Giants the exhaustive knowledge he acquired in 14 seasons as a crack defensive back and kick-returner for the Giants and, at the end of his career, for Green Bay.

Ken Strong, one of the all-time titans of the pro gridiron, serves as Giant kicking coach. To him belongs much of the credit for Don Chandler's development into an outstanding place-kicker as well as an outstanding punter.

They would insist that the credit for any Giant success belongs to the players, but these men who coach the Giants unquestionably rate a generous share. Hats off to them!
