For the Whole Ball of Wax

THE long pro season comes down to one game today for the Giants and the Steelers. This afternoon New York and Pittsburgh have it out for the National Football League's Eastern Conference title.

If the Giants win or tie, they will be Eastern champions for the third straight year and two weeks hence will square off against the Western winner — the Chicago Bears or Green Bay Packers—for the league title.

There's only one way the Steelers can capture their first Eastern crown. That's by beating the Giants.

The situation is this: The Giants are on top of the Eastern standings with a 10-3 record that gives them a won-lost percentage of .769. The Steelers rank second at 7-3-3, for .700. NFL titles are decided on percentage, with ties disregarded in the calculation.

So, a New York victory would put the Giants at 11-3, .786 and the Steelers at 7-4-3, .636. A tie today would put the Giants at 10-3-1, .769, and the Steelers at 7-3-4, .700. A Pittsburgh victory would put the Steelers on top at 8-3-3.

.727, and the Giants at 10-4, .714.

The Giants got to this title showdown with the Steelers by routing Washington last Sunday, 44-14. Pittsburgh kept alive by edging Dallas, 24-19, as Detroit eliminated Cleveland, 38-10.

Despite the one-sided score, the Giants' victory over Washington wasn't one of the season's gaudier efforts by General Sherman's forces.

Still, it typified why the Giants have been so successful in recent campaigns. That's team effort. The offensive platoon stuttered against the Redskins. So the defensive unit stepped into the breach, scored three touchdowns on two pass interceptions and a fumble recovery and took Washington right out of the game.

This is the way it has been for several years now with the Giants. When one unit has faltered, the other most always has saved the day. And, it might be added, when both units have been shaky, Don Chandler and his mates of the kicking unit on occasion even have managed to tip the balance.

In the cruel, hard competition of the pros, this type of teamwork

is the way of victory. The platoons may mingle only in the dressing room. They may receive, and jubilantly accept, credit for unit performance. But they still are just parts in a bigger group—the team.

Today, in this title showdown, the Giants have an eagerly awaited opportunity to redeem the most grievous whole-team breakdown they suffered this season. That was in the 31-0 loss to the Steelers in Pittsburgh, when the offense, with Y. A. Tittle and other key operatives on the sidelines, was stagnant and the defense got stomped on.

If there ever was a time to fit all the pieces together, today is it. We're confident this game and gallant Giant team will find a way to do it again. But if our boys can't pull it off, all hail to them anyway—for a valiant effort and another rousing season of the best football anyone could hope to see.

Whatever happens, all the Giants hail all you Giant fans, too. Your keen interest and loyal support has been a vital factor in making this showdown possible.

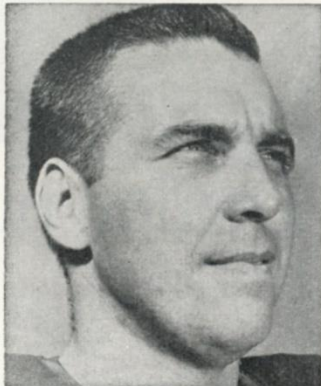

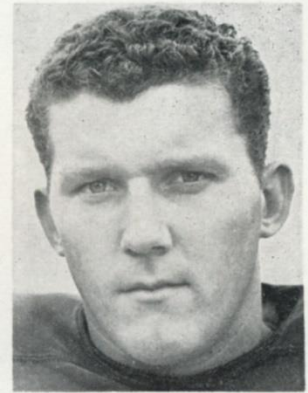

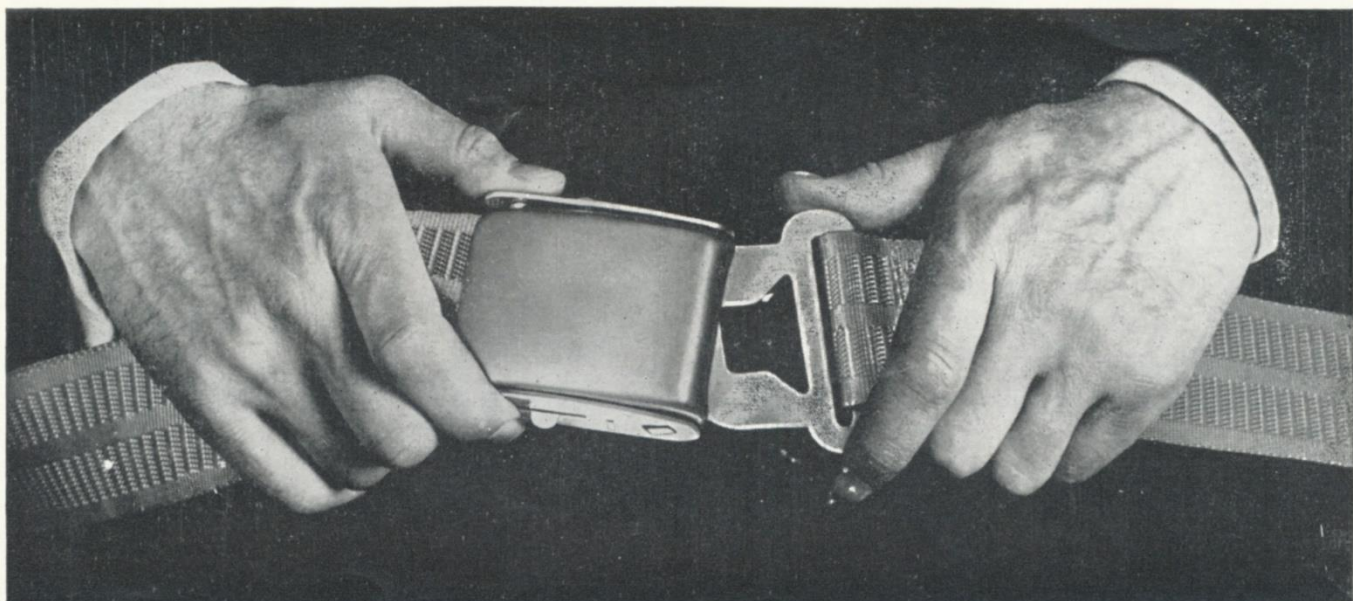

THE way defense is played today in pro football, linebacker is a key position. Certainly, a wider range of responsibilities falls on the linebacker than any other defensive man. He must have the size and power to smash through on "red dog" assignments, the strength and determination to stand up under massive head-on assaults and the speed and range to cover pass-receivers in the flat zones. The Giants are fortunate in having men who possess these qualifications. Their close-support trio is composed of Jerry Hillebrand, Sam Huff and Tom Scott, reading from left to right as they line up on the field. The 240-pound Hillebrand, the No. 1 draft choice of 1962 who spent last season on the taxi squad, cracked the line-up just recently, and has been sensational. Huff, 230, is an eight-year pro who has won all-league rating several times. Scott, a topnotch end in the days of the five-man rushline, was acquired from the Eagles in a 1959 trade. In the bullpen is Al Gursky, a rookie from Penn State who was activated when Bill Winter recently underwent a knee operation. And, if further help is needed, handyman Mickey Walker pitches in.

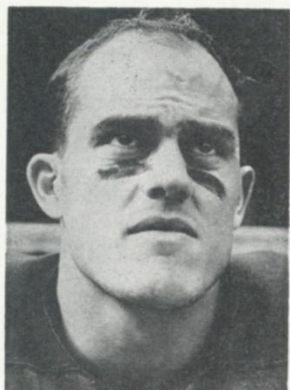
DON CHANDLER

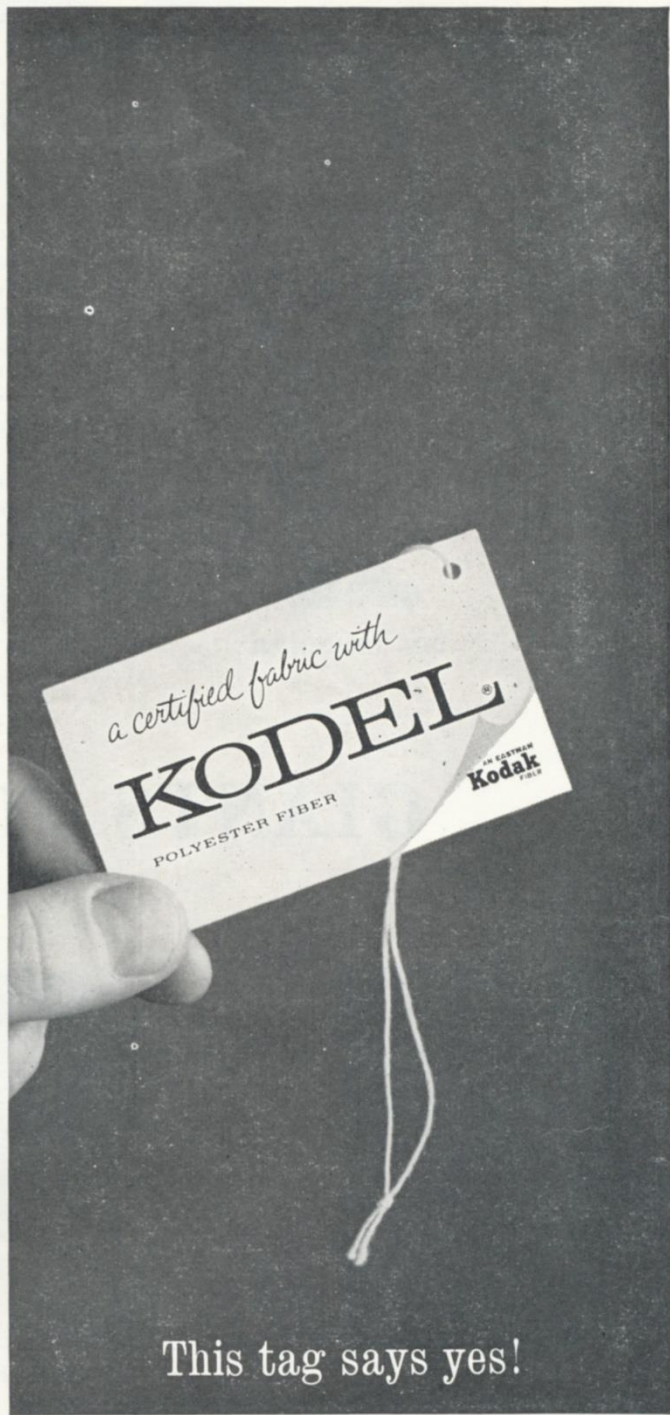

JOE Don Looney, the big running back from Oklahoma who was the Giants' No. 1 draft choice, visited New York last weekend and signed a contract. He's a handsome young fellow and an impressive physical specimen who packs 220-plus pounds on his 6-foot 3-inch frame. Said Jim Lee Howell, the Giants' director of playing personnel, who scouted Looney several times: "Joe Don was far and away the best college running back I saw in the last few seasons. I'm sure he has what it takes to make good up here."

Jim Lee confided that the Giants had at least half a dozen other draft selections pretty well lined up. "But the announcements can't be made yet," said Howell. "Some of the boys won't actually sign until after they play in bowl games; others want to preserve their eligibility for spring sports." Negotiations are in progress with several other players. Seven more were picked as "futures" and won't be approached until next year.

Inevitably, a few selections have been lost—for instance, Matt Snell, No. 4, to the Jets, and Jim McNaughton, No. 12, to Canada. "You've got to expect that," Howell said philosophically. "Everyone is offering these kids a lot of money and so it generally comes down to whether they think they

can make your roster, or play for you if they do make it. The way I feel about it is that if a boy isn't sure enough about himself not to worry about picking spots you're probably better off without him."

Hail to Ken Kavanaugh, the Giant end coach and designer of those ingenious pass-patterns with which Y. A. Tittle and his batterymates have been deviling the opposition all season! Tall, dark and handsome Ken was formally enshrined last Tuesday night as a member of the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. This honor was bestowed on Kavanaugh for his collegiate exploits at Louisiana State. Before long, he's also a cinch to be enrolled in the National Football League Hall of Fame, for his feats of derring-do for the Chicago Bears, before he turned to coaching.

Last Sunday's award winners: Dick Lynch, who set an NFL season record by making his third touchdown interception against the Redskins, received the Kinney Award (one year's free use of a Kinney System rental car). Joe Morrison, for offense, and Andy Robustelli, for defense, received the Bulova Awards (Caravel-by-Bulova wrist-watches). Frank Gifford, for offense, and Jimmy Patton, for defense, received the Stevens Awards (wardrobes of sports clothes) . . . Don Chandler

has received a certificate of achievement from the National Junior College Association for bringing "honor and stature" to the junior college program at Bacone (Okla.) J. C. in 1952-53.

Y. A. Tittle's two touchdown passes against Washington tied his 1962 record total of 33 six-pointers. Colonel Slick has the league passing title just about locked up. . . . Don Chandler has moved into a tie with Jim Martin, Baltimore's kicker, for the NFL scoring lead. Each has 97 point. . . . Dick Lynch is deadlocked for the NFL interception lead with Pat Fischer of the Cardinals, Richie Petitbon and Roosevelt Taylor of the Bears and Clendon Thomas of the Steelers. Each has latched on to eight enemy passes. However, if the tie persists, the title will go to Lynch, who has a substantial edge in yardage on his returns. . . . The eleven interceptions (seven by the Giants, four by the Redskins) last Sunday tied the NFL record for interceptions in a single game. . . . Talking about interceptions, big Jerry Hillebrand has made five in the six games since he took over as left-side linebacker from the injured Bill Winter. . . . Winter, incidentally, has undergone corrective surgery on his damaged knee and is out for the season. . . . To replace Bill, the Giants have activated Al Gursky, a rookie taxi-squadder from Penn State.

Today's between-the-halves entertainment will be provided by the drill team and marching band of the United States Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, L. I. The precision routines of the midshipmen have been an unflinching hit with Stadium fans. . . . Coincidence: The paid attendance of 62,992 for the Redskins game was exactly the same as for the game with the Cardinals.

FOLLOWERS of the Giants are poignantly aware that the pass is the New York team's most lethal offensive weapon. But, although from what you read you might sometimes think it, the Giants don't get their aerial touchdowns simply as the result of Y. A. Tittle's launching spirals into the empty air. As he would be the first to admit, the admirable YAT has an admirable set of receivers. Del Shofner and Frank Gifford, the Giant flankers, are geniuses at getting loose for breakaway gains down the deep middle and on those short but vital first-down tosses to the sidelines. Joe Walton, the unsung Giant tight end, also has a rare knack of getting to the right spot at the right time and Aaron Thomas, who spells all three, is developing the same instincts. The Giant inside backs—Alex Webster, Phil King, Hugh McElhenny and Joe Morrison, who also plays on the flank when needed—are gifted receivers, too. As much as any team in football, the Giants are equipped to inundate the defense with flood pass patterns.

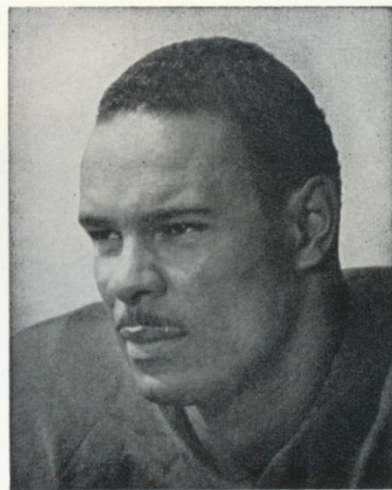

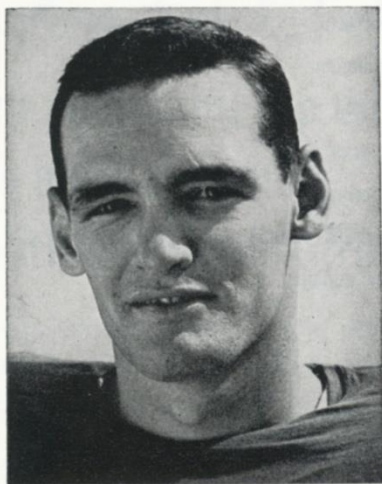

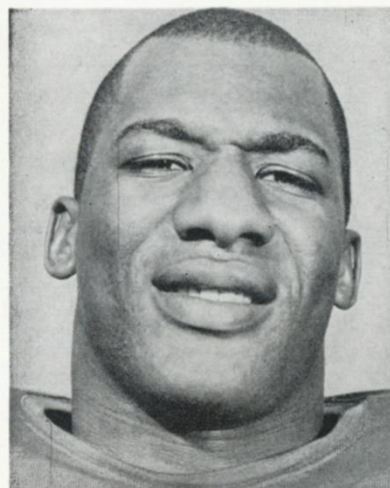

DEFENSE, the coaches will tell you, is the sine qua non of success in pro football. Reliable defensive performance is particularly important in the back line of the secondary, where there is no margin for error and where any mistake almost has to be fatal. On the corners and in the safety slots, the Giants have men who commit a minimum of errors. Erich Barnes, on the left corner, and Dick Lynch, on the right, are vigilant, far-ranging pass defenders with the speed and savvy to keep pace with the most artful dodgers of the flanker set. At safety, player coach Jimmy Patton, on the right side, has been the league's best at that position for his nine years as a Giant and Allan Webb, on the left, has learned fast since breaking in as a regular last year. Supporting this starting quartet are two seasoned pros, Dick Pesonen and Eddie Dove, both fast and knowing, too. Individually and as a unit, the Giant deep defenders leave little to be desired.

ONE thing you always can be sure of when you see the Pittsburgh Steelers is that you'll see a team that "came to play." Without ever yet having hit the top themselves, the Steelers for years have been the policemen of the National League. It takes championship football to beat this rugged outfit from the Smoky City.

From the days of the late, great Jock Sutherland, the Steelers have been justly noted for their hard-nosed, ask-and-give-no-quarter football. They have added to this tradition under the current coaching regime of Buddy Parker and, to complicate the problems of opponents, they have this season what many observers regard as their best team ever. Certainly, any team that can whomp the Giants, 31-0, as the Steelers did back on Sept. 22, rates the highest respect.

On attack, the Steelers rely chiefly on a grind-it-out running attack built around the mercurial John Henry Johnson and Dick Hoak, who has achieved star status in his third pro season. Behind

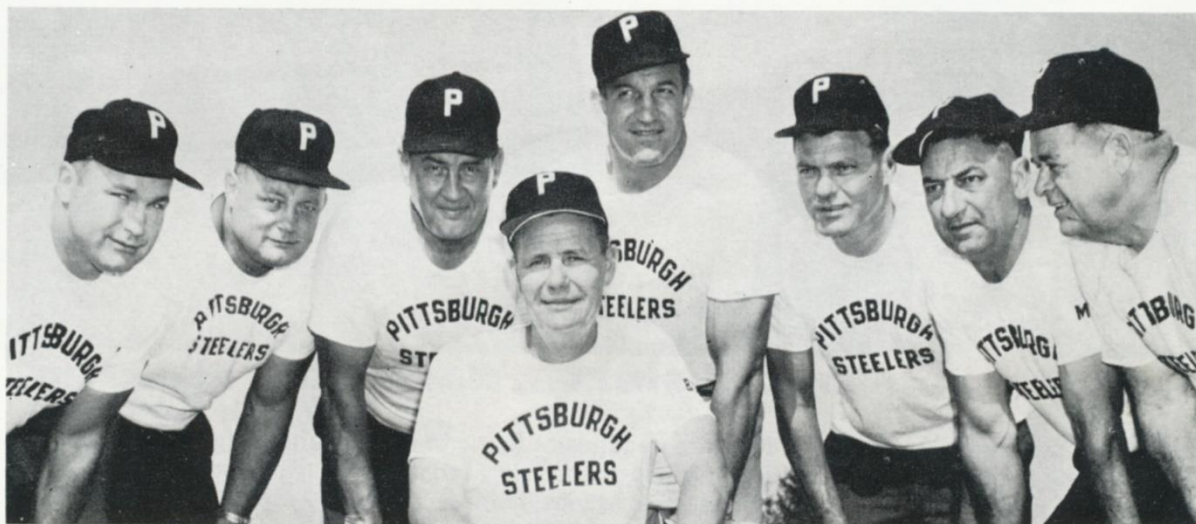
these starters, they have two other hard-hitting ball-carriers in Theron Sapp and Joe Womack.

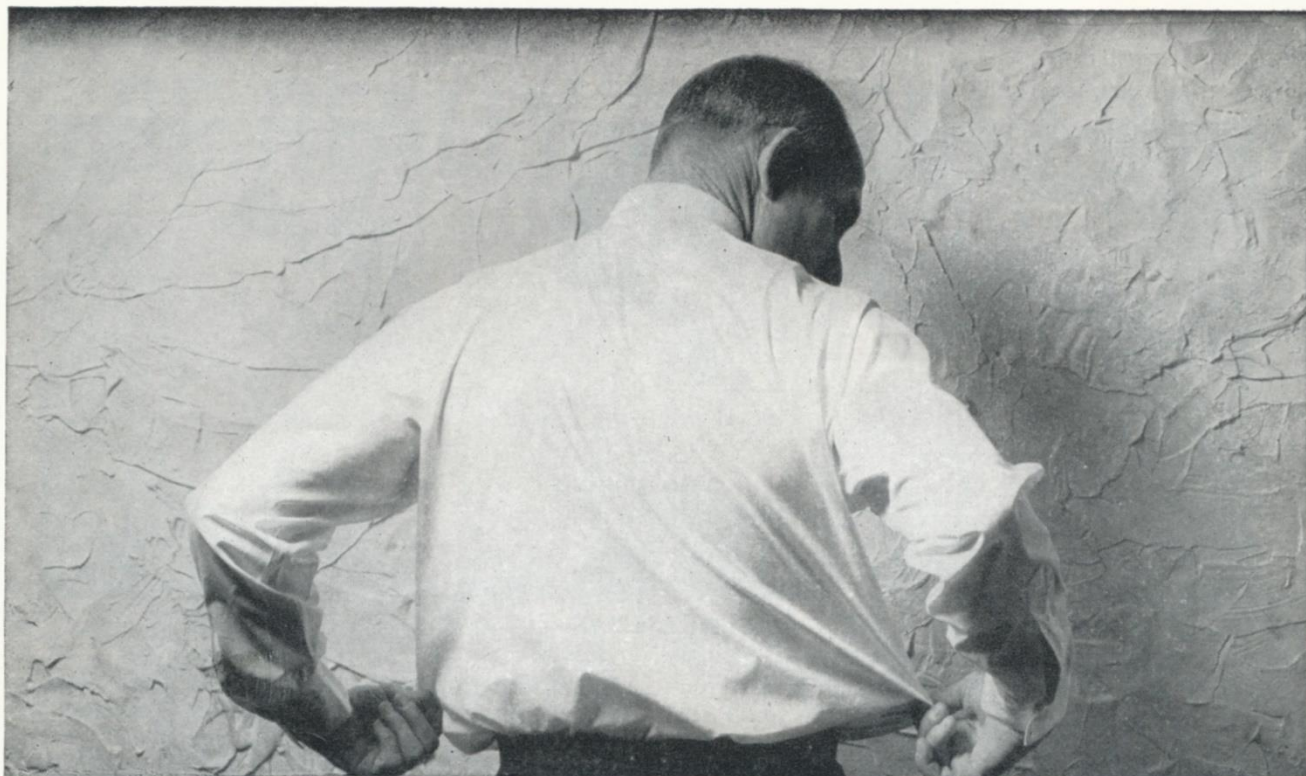

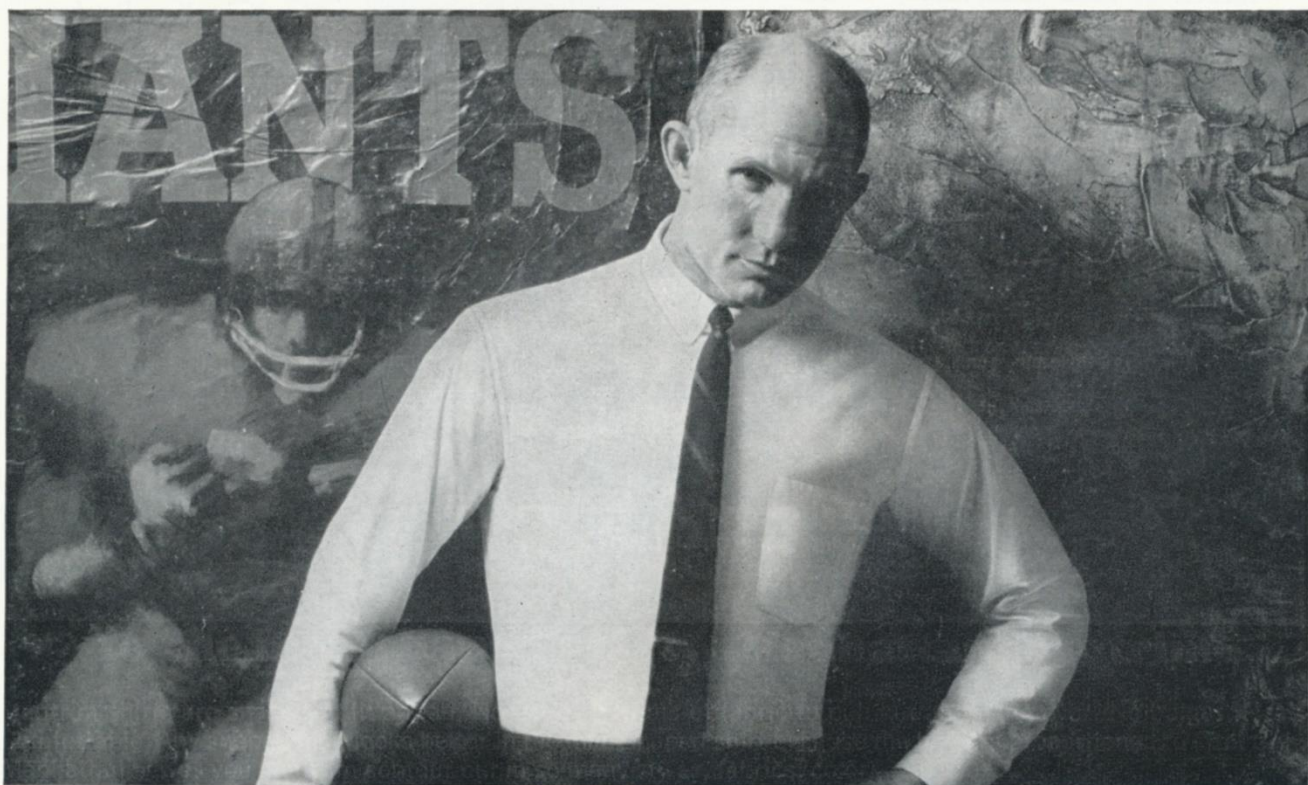

PITTSBURGH AT NEW YORK

NY defensive end Jim Katcavage said it for both the Giants and Steelers after NY beat Washington 44-14 last Sunday: "The season starts next Sunday at 2:05." This is it—the winner is champion . . . With both Cleveland and St. Louis eliminated from title contention and with the Steelers having played three ties, there can no longer be a playoff in the East . . . The Pitt-NY victor plays for the world championship at either Chicago or Green Bay on Dec. 29 . . . If the Steelers and Giants tie, NY wins the title, its third straight in the Eastern Conference . . . Pitt beat NY 31-0 at Pitt Stadium the second Sunday of the season . . . NY fans say it would have been different had NY QB Y. A. Tittle not been injured and unable to play that day . . . Steeler fans say Tittle wouldn't have made any difference against the Pitt defense . . . Steelers scored 21 points in final quarter . . . Despite that shutout, Giants have scored 415 points to become only third team in NFL history to top 400 . . . Packers had 415 last year . . . Record is 466 by LA in 1950 . . . Steelers came from behind to beat Dallas 24-19 in last three minutes last week.

DETROIT AT CHICAGO

Only a Packer defeat on Saturday can keep this from being the one that decides the Western Conference race. . . . The Lions are hot, plenty hot. . . . They jolted Green Bay 13-13 on Thanksgiving Day, then roared out again last Sunday and beat Cleveland out of the Eastern title race 38-10. . . . Two straight years these clubs have played close ones in Wrigley Field . . . In 1961, the Bears' Roger Leclerc kicked

five field goals in five attempts, but Chicago lost 16-15 on a Lions TD in the last seconds . . . In 1962, the Bears won 3-0 on a 9-yard, fourth-period FG by Leclerc . . . This season at Detroit the last Sunday in September, the Bears won 37-21 on the strength of a 28-point second quarter, but the Lions never quit and Earl Morrall threw for three TDs in the second half . . . The Bears' Bill Wade also passed for three and scored one rushing . . . Wade, incidentally, has run over six TDs this season in addition to throwing 13 scoring passes . . . Lions need victory to clinch fourth place.

CLEVELAND AT WASHINGTON

Browns can achieve first second-place finish since 1960 and likewise can make first trip to Miami Playoff Bowl since its inauguration in January 1961 . . . Redskins battling Dallas for fifth place. . . . Rematch of opening day game at Cleveland which Browns won 37-14 as Jim Brown scored three TDs, gained 162 yards rushing and another 100 pass receiving . . . Jim now has 1,738 yards in the greatest year any rusher has ever had in the NFL . . . The earlier game featured the longest pass play of the season, George Izo to Bobby Mitchell for 99 yards and a TD . . . Mitchell with 65 receptions is trying for second straight receiving title, is one behind Bobby Joe Conrad of St. Louis.

DALLAS AT ST. LOUIS

Cowboys have never beaten Cardinals in six games, including 34-7 Saturday night opener at Cotton Bowl this year. . . . Cards broke loose for 17 points in last minute and half of first half

in that one . . . Cards can finish high as second first time since 1956 and also have shot at Miami Playoff Bowl given right set of circumstances . . . St. Louis' Pat Fischer has chance at individual interception title . . . Last game of NFL careers for both quarterback Eddie LeBaron and end Bill Howton of Cowboys.

MINNESOTA AT PHILADELPHIA

Inter-conference title rides on this. . . . East raced out in front 5-0 early in season, but going into this finale, it stands six apiece for each conference and one tie in 13 games . . . Viking win would be five for '63 and match total of first two seasons . . . Minnesota can still finish high as fourth in West . . . Eagles, by winning, can possibly get high as fifth . . . Individual battle for third place in League rushing and top spot among halfbacks . . . Eagles' Tim Brown has 774 yards, Vikings' Tommy Mason has 763 . . . Teams met only once before, Vikings won 31-21 at Minnesota in '62.

LOS ANGELES AT BALTIMORE

Colts need victory to improve on last season's 7-7 record, but Baltimore already has clinched third, a notch higher than Colts finished in '62 . . . Rams, now fifth with five times as many wins as last year, can nail fourth or slip to sixth depending on outcome of other games . . . Rams whipped the Colts 17-16 three weeks ago on Coast with come-from-behind field goal by Danny Villanueva . . . Game oddity was two carries for two TDs by Art Perkins, each one yard.
